TURNING SILAGE INTO BEEF

It Cannot De Considered as Substitute for Other Necessary Materials in Animal's Ration.

The word "silage" at one time suggested only brimming milk pails and big milk checks. Nowadays it is as well a big factor in petting the finishing touches on choice sirioin beef. Silos are common in the beef feeding sections of Wisconsin. The main reason for feeding silage to beef cattle is economy of production. It cannot be considered as a substitute for other necessary materials in the ration, according to J. L. Tormey, College of Agriculture, University of Wisconsin, who gives a few suggestions as to the feeding of shage for beef production under local conditions.





SHIPPED TO EUROPE

Animals Bought for Export for Use in the Great War Are Among Lighter Grades.

(By PROF. E. A. TROWBRIDGE, University of Missouri, College of Agriculture.)

About half a million horses and mules have been sent to Europe because of the war. Although the number sounds large, it really includes less than two per cent of the 28,000. 000 horses and mules on hand in the United States January 1, 1915, and a still lower percentage when we remember the 1915 colts must be added to this number.

The 400,000 horses bought for export for use in the war are among the lighter animals ranging from 1,000 to 1,500 pounds in weight. 
