

Dog ordinances, as a general rule, have been intended chiefly to curb the dog's power of doing harm by attacking, biting, killing or running sheep or stock. The part that he plays as a carrier of diseases to animais only recently has been recognized, according to the zoologists of the United States department of agriculture, who believe that when this is better understood rural ordinances and laws which lessen this danger will gain the support of the community.

Of the diseases carried to stock by dogs, the foot-and-mouth disease is probably of the greatest interest at this time. In this case the dog acts as a mechanical carrier of infection. The dog which runs across an infected farm easily may carry in the dirt on his feet the virus of this most contagious of animal diseases to other to the neighboring herds. 

SPECIAL CARE FOR POULTRY IN WINTER



To obtain good results from a flock of poultry during the winter all houses and coops should be put in good condition, only healthy fowls placed in the buildings, and good care given to the poultry. The houses should be thoroughly cleaned, disinfected and made tight for winter. If the house has a dirt floor, it is well to remove three or four inches from the top and substitute fresh gravel or sand. If the floor is cement or wood, remove all litter and dirt and put in four or five inches of fresh straw or litter. Be sure that the house is tight on three sides and that there is no chance for a draft to strike the hens. If hens roost or are placed in a draft during the fall and winter. colds are sure to develop, which may result in roup and other troubles The south side, or front, of the poul try house may be left comparatively open, but should be under control, so that the openings may be closed gradually as the weather becomes cold. Have muslin curtains in the front of the house, or leave a window partly open even on the coldest nights to allow some ventilation in the house. Fowls will stand considerable cold air provided it is dry, and ventilation will

A good scratch mixture may be made of equal parts, by weight, of cracked corn, wheat and oats; and a mash may be made of two parts corn meal and one part each of wheat bran, wheat middlings and beef scrap. Green feed, such as cabbages, mange wurzel, beets, cut alfalfa or sprouted oats, should be supplied to replace the green feed which the fowls have been securing in the fields; and beef scrap, skim milk, cut green bone or similar feed is needed to replace the bugs which the fowls have been getting on the range. Beef scrap of feed of this nature is very essential in se-

HAVE COMFORTABLE STALLS FOR HORSES

It Often Happens That Places Where Animals Are Kept Are Entirely Too Narrow.

A horse cannot talk and tell his owner in the morning that he has been uncomfortable during the night. but if such is the case and the trouble continues the effect will show in his work, or more serious trouble may follow. Sometimes the stalls are badly constructed, made too narrow or the horse's feet wear holes which are neglected.

One of the greatest evils is having a stall too narrow. It may not have been properly constructed in the first place or perhaps has been made for a small horse. If the barn changes hands or is rented and a larger horse put in it, this horse may have difficulty in rising and so because of his dread of lying down on that account remains on his feet longer than is good for him. Again a board or two may become dislodged and not being replaced at once occasions a draft.

In a number of barns that have come under my observation too little care has been used as to the situation of the stalls. Quite often they are placed on the north side of a building owing to such a position being handier or not interfering with other arrangements about the barn. LAZY ANCESTORS OF **OUR MODERN FOWLS**

Industrious Hen of Today Lays 300 Eggs in Year, While

Jungle Bird Laid Twelve.

(By C. S. ANDERSON, Colorado.) The jungle fowl, from which all our modern breeds of chickens have originated, laid from twelve to fifteen eggs a year when in its wild and natural state. With years of selection, we have succeeded in developing from this low-producing fowl a type of bird the chief function of which is egg production. Our present-day Leghorns, and carefully selected fowls of several other breeds, lay close to 300 eggs annually, and in the course of a lifetime more than a thousand.

An average hen of the egg type breeds will lay in a year's time five times her body weight in eggs. Taking the standard weight of eggs as 24 ounces per dozen, this means an egg' every three days during the year. To accomplish this the hen must consume nearly thirty times her body weight in

The hen also has a market value when she is no longer an egg producer. Comparing the total marketable products returned for 100 pounds of digestible matter consumed, the hen ranks second only to the cow among all our common farm animals.







ENCOURAGE PULLETS TO LAY

Housed Together, Well Fed, With Plenty of Green Stuff and Fresh Water They Will Lay Eggs.

If you let the pullets run with the flock and feed them in an irregular way they will certainly take their time in beginning to lay. When the combs are showing up red and mature is the time to be getting the pullets in a house to themselves, with a good laying ration, and they will lay weeks earlier and more steedily after beginning if kept to themselves and not allowed beyond a small inclosure. No

A dry mash with a reasonable per cent of meat scrap is necessary, or, if milk is most plentiful, then the mash made up crumbly will help a speedy start. Housed together, fed well, with plenty of succulent green stuff like cabbage, with grit, lime, charcoal, and plenty of pure water at hand, and nothing else to think of but making themselves useful, they will produce the eggs.

The reason the pullets lay so few eggs in fall and winter, and put off regular laying until often late spring, is due to letting them run with the flock and giving no extra feeding or warm room to themselves. This last is the only way to get winter eggs from the early spring pullets.

BEST HOUSES FOR CHICKENS

One Subject on Which Successful Poultrymen Agree-Fresh Air and Sunshine Are Essential.

The most successful poultrymen we have today differ point blank on almost any subject, if we except that of housing. On this point they will agree. Any kind of house will answer the purpose, so long as it provides adequate room, sunshine and an abundance of fresh air so admitted that no draft strikes the inmates.

Given a cool, dry house, your fowls are reasonably safe; a warm, damp house and you have a roup producer. Repeated experiments have proved that fowls are more nearly in their natural environment when housed in dry, cold, fresh-air houses, than when in artificially heated ones. The egg production is much better in the former kind. In the matter of hatching and brooding, it has been found that the eggs hatch much better, and the chicks are stronger, from stock housed in the open-air houses. Many times when the chicks do not "escape the shell," the trouble is laid to the in cubator, when, as a matter of fact, it was caused by the breeders becoming short in vim and vigor from wrong winter care.

KEEP POULTRY HOUSE CLEAN

Promotes Comfort of Fowls and Les sens Chance of Disease-Provide Proper Dust Bath for Hens.

Good Sour Milk Ration.

A good sour milk ration: Corn, four parts; wheat, two parts; bran middlings, one part; corn meal, one part; sour milk, separately. Give 100 hens draft. 21/2 gallons of milk and from 19 to 25 pounds of other food a day.

Good Fowls to Keep. Choose those fowls having full bodies, good carriage, wide backs, short legs, full breasts and well-formed combs, this last feature being impera-

tive in the male.



URGE CLEANLINESS IN DAIRY

Mechanical Milker Admits No Dust or Dirt, but Must Be Kept Scrupulously Clean.

Much is said of the cleanliness of milk. Most people like to use a pail in milking that has as small an opening as it is convenient to milk into. The mechanical milker has no opening that can admit dust or dirt into the milk except where the milk is taken into the tubes. These can be packed with clean cotton if necessary, thus preventing the entrance of dirt or

But the milk taken into the machines may be contaminated by the dirt left in the machine from the



former milking. This makes it imper-

ative that the milker be well cared for. The milk separator should receive no more careful cleansing than the milker. After milking it is a good plan to dip the teat cups in cool water and allow the machine to pump water through the tubes. All parts should be scrubbed with a brush and washing soda and then rinsed. The metal parts may be well sterilized with steam and the rubber parts kept suspended in a solution of 11 pounds of salt and five ounces of chloride of lime in 10 gallons of water. The solution will have to be changed every week, and it is well to put in an extra ounce of chlo-

ride of lime every other day. When proper care is taken, extremely clean milk can be gotten with the milkers, some dairymen producing certified milk with them, but on the other hand, if no care is taken to keep the machine clean it will prove to be a collector of dirt.

DAIRYING ON BUSINESS BASIS

Farmers Must Use Milk Scales, Tester and Record Book-Keep Account With Each Cow.

In order to put dairying upon a business basis every farmer needs to use the milk scales, the tester and the record book. Farmers must come to this proposition and do a little simple bookkeeping to know where they are. Every successful business man has a ledger to guide him in his transac-

Every dairyman needs to enter a separate account with each of his cows so that he may have an indicator to tell him at the end of the year just how much feed each has consumed,

Too many farmers of this country are still keeping scrub cows, feeding One portion should be half dark, for and milking them twice each day, the laying and sitting hens, and a fourteen times each week and sixty

> Place for the Fall Calf. A clean, well-bedded place, well lighted and well ventilated, is important for the fall calf. The calf pen preferably should be on the south side of the barn and in a part of the barn where the temperature does not vary

> Avoid Dairy Drudgery. Do not make dairying or any other farm work a drudgery, Milking cows in the early morning, and late at night, and doing a full day's work in between during the day will eventually drive the boys to the cities, and the bired man will lose interest.

MAKING CORN FARMS PROFITABLE IN TEXAS

Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Suggests Plans for "Cashing In" On Scientific Advice, Etc.

Washington .- "To suggest to the corn-belt farmer of the Middle West, also the sections of Texas where corn, rice, Kaffir corn, milo maize, sorghum and other feeds are equally profitable -especially the farmer whose soil has been run down by continuous grain farming-some ways of co-ordinating and 'cashing in' the scientific advice offered him in hundreds of invaluable bulletins on single crops," is the purpose of Farmers' Bulletin 704, as stated by its author, Carl Vrooman, assistant secretary of agriculture.

The whole farm is considered as a unit. All grain crops suitable for the section are dealt with in their relation to one another, in rotation with vari ous legumes, green manures, cover crops for soil maintenance and feeding, and in connection with live stock as a profitable side line and especially as a source of manure and fertility. The following extracts, necessarily omitting detailed recommendations, give an outline of the author's plan for combining business farming and scientific agriculture to the monetary and social profit of the farm:

"The farm is vastly more than a business enterprise; it is a home, a social and civic center-the most important unit of civilization. What farmers need most to know is how to make the science of agriculture boost the business of farming.

The farmer who robs his soil is sawing off the limb upon which he is sitting. Your deed calls for the subsoil as well as the surface soil, and the subsoil is a mine of fertility and a well of water if properly utilized. Lime is the one thing most needed by the average run-down soil. Phosphorus, next to lime, is the mineral plant food probably most needed by the average unproductive soil. Manure as regularly as you harvest.

"Proper tillage becomes more important as the farm grows older until on 'worn out' farms it is a factor of chief importance. Tillage gives the crop more soil surface on which to feed without increasing your taxes, makes existing plant food more available, gives air to the roots, regulates water supply and kills weeds."

The farmer who cells all his crops off the place and then also burns all his cornstalks and straw reminds one of the burglar who takes all the valua-

Humus is the stuff with which nature fertilizes uncultivated soil. Plow under all stable manure, straw, cornstalks, stubble, leaves, weeds and green-manure crops. Feed as much of your grain as possible to live stock on the farm.

When you break even on your beeves you are ahead of the game, provided you save the manure-es pecially if you have kept hogs following the cattle. "Saving the manure" doesn't mean saving merely one-third or one-fourth. It means saving 70 per cent or more, liquid as well as solid. The problem of keeping live stock with profit is largely a matter of making use as silage, roughage, or bedding of stuff that is wasted on the average farm. Weeds may be put on the right side of the ledger by means of a few

Catch but one bad ear in testing seed corn and you save a good day's

As long as the average farmer "keeps his garden on the grocery shelf," he sells everything wholesale and buys everything retail. Side lines, such as canning, preserving, making apple butter, are profitable where the farmer is wise enough to see that the women of his household get all necessary help with their work.

The price difference between ham, lard and bacon and hog on the hoof shows the money gain for farm butchering and smoking.

Making Capital "Available."-Keep accounts-find just where your money comes from and just where it goes. Some men's wealth is like a good deal of the fertility in their soil-it is not 'available.

Preparedness-Preparedness is as important for the farmer as it is for the soldier. The farmer who wastes his leisure time and who fails to utilize many rainy days and slack seasons to get his affairs in shape can never hope to catch up during the

busy season. Marketing and Co-operation-It is not enough to grow a good crop, or even to grow a good crop at low cost. To make a big crop a business success it must be disposed of as efficiently as it is grown-graded and packed as to meet market standards and so marketed as to bring the farmer the highest current price.

The farmer who is too suspicious to get together with his neighbors in order to do co-operatively what no one can do alone is sure to pay dearly for his incapacity for team work.


