Women Vote There. "Our people are simple in their lives," said Miss McCoy. "There are only 195 souls on the island, and ships coldom visit us unless they need vegetables, and the only ship that we are sure to see is the yearly visit of a British warship, which is not allowed to carry women, the island being within the jurisdiction of the British high commissioner of the Pacific. We have our own little parliament and are selfelected yearly by the votes of both men and women over eighteen years of age. There is no competition for public office, and my father and grandfather have held the office for years.

"There has never been a resident physician on the island, for there is Httle sickness among us, and the people know almost nothing of medicine as it is practiced outside. If he is found to exceed your commendation rather than fall below it the effect is better. One's partiality leads to magnifying the good and overlocking the evil, even to making plausible excuses. Still more desirable is it that you should beware of excess in condemnation. You may have conceived a false impression of him. You may not know all the extenuating circumstances. By voicing your dislike or disapprobation, you may be doing

At the best, you are not helping to right the wrong. Let the world know by your conversation and conduct that you believe in truth, justice and kindness, but be careful how you put others under a ban as failing in these things. Excess in love is likely to carry jealousy, suspicion and selfishness in its train. Even religion may be carried to an excess that makes one intolerant and fanatical. Such excess makes the cause upheld unlovely to many. Learn moderation and you will make fewer mistakes.

Think your own thoughts and express them, but do not endeavor to force them on others by too strenuous insistence.

Chicken Salad Don't Go.

The Fourth Court of Civil Appeals rendered an opinion last week in the celebrated "Chicken Salad" case, affirming the decision of the trial court which held that Governor Colon his private table out of the publie funds.

Justice Fly wrote the opinion and commented freely on the rediculousness of the idea of such unjust graft. endorsement of President Wilson He called attention to the fact the Constitution clearly and plainly says that "the Governor shall be paid delegation led in two great demon-\$4,000 a year and no more."

It will be remembered that this case has been in the courts since the last Legislature was in session. The Attorney General ruled the bill for the luxuries of the Governor's private table could not be paid out of the public funds of the state. State Comptroller Terrell stood by the Governor, but he is now estopped from paying it, unless the Supreme, Court should reverse the ruling.

In the face of the above facts it appears our present Governor has gone even further than Governor Colquitt, and the records show that he has paid all such private bills, such as his meat bill, ice bill, garage bill, grocery bill, automobile repair bills, chauffer bills, the salary of his paign. 

SUMMER SPRAYING IS QUITE ESSENTIAL



(By C. C. WAGGANS, Missouri College of | production of first-class apples. Unsprayed fruit is usually scabby and very often shows injury from codling moth or curculio. Wormy or diseased fruit has poor keeping qualities. Thus, in order to have fresh apples during winter months, it is necessary to practice summer spraying.

Spraying consists of applying to the growing fruit and leaves some substance which will either kill or prevent the growth of the insects and disease spores. Some form of arsenic is used to kill the insects, lead arsenate being the most common form. It may be purchased at local drug stores and costs from ten to twenty-five cents a preventing the development of apple scab and other funkous diseases, since disease spores cannot develop in its presence. This substance in the form of concentrated lime sulphur may be purchased from companies handling spray supplies, and in small lots will cost about fifteen cents per gallon.

The spraying schedule recommend ed on the basis of the tests and experience of the Missouri agricultural experiment station calls for three sprays during the season. The first, to be most effective against the apple scab, should have been applied just before the blossoms opened. This spray of lime sulphur at the rate of three Foot- gallens of commercial mixture to 100 gallons of water is not very necessary velop only during damp weather.

Since the lead arsenate and the lime sulphur are placed in the same solution, one spraying is sufficient to apply both substances. This spray serves as a further protection against the scab, but its greatest value comes through its effect upon the codling laxative. Hundreds of horse owners moth and curcuito. CARELESS SPRAYING IS NOT EFFECTIVE

Several Excellent Rules Given by Every Part of the Surface of Tree Should Be Covered With a Fine Liquid Mist.

(By C. W. RAPP, Department of Hortfculture, Oklahoma A. & M. College,

Spraying, in ordinary language, means covering the plants treated. Every part of the surface should be covered with a fine mist. Spraying a little liquid spray into the tree to cover about half of the surface is not spraying, but, unfortunately, many folks think that it is.

When you spray, cover the tree or don't spray at all. A single unsprayed part of the tree, foliage or fruit leaves a door for the entrance of disease or provides food for insects. Once started on a tree, these pests will usually manage to develop. In a short time much of the spray may be washed off by rains, and the results will be almost the same as if no spraying had been done. If you have half sprayed your trees instead of covering them with a fine mist, blame is effective only when applied in the
