

BIG INCREASE IN POSTAL SAVINGS IS NOW EXPECTED

Limit of \$500 on One Account, Fixed Under Old Law, Raised by Amendment to \$1,000.

Uncle Sam's postal authorities are anticipating a big increase in the postal savings deposits as a result of an amendment to the postal savings act. which President Wilson has just approved.

The maximum interest-bearing account which a depositor may now have is \$1,000, as against \$500 under the old law. The restriction on the amount that could be accepted from a depositor monthly is done away with under the new legislation, so that he may now deposit all or any part of the maximum amount which may stand to his credit.

More than 35,000 depositors had reached the \$500 limit and many of them had expressed their desire to intrust more of their savings to Uncle Sam. It has been estimated that the restrictions on deposits have made it necessary to turn away as much money as it has been possible to accept at depository post offices.

The number of depositors now runs well over half a million and the deposits foot up over eighty million dol-

The buildings are thoroughly screened, and there are ample protected verandas the length of the buildings and an inclosed sun porch at one end.

Nurse Crop .- Sometimes alfalfa is seeded with a nurse crop. The nurse crop is supposed to keep the weeds experience is necessary to know just down. But the barley, or rye, or oats or whatever is seeded with the alfalfa will use moisture and plant food which may be needed by the alfalfa. It shades the young alfalfa plants, and when it is cut, the alfalfa is suddenly exposed to the sun's rays which may cause the weak plants to wither. The young alfalfa may be trampled when cutting the nurse All these things should be considered in deciding whether or not to sow with a nurse crop.

Care of Plot .-- After the alfalfa is well started it must be watched closely the first year. If it turns yellow or sickly looking, mow it down but don't become discouraged. The roots are probably all right yet, and if you give them a little help, they may surprise you later by sending up new shoots. Alfalfa which turns yellow is usu-

ally in need of lime, drainage, or bacteria, or all three. When alfalfa turns yellow it should be moved at once. Take good care of the baby plant and when it is a little older it will be
