

GRAIN RATION IS DESIRABLE

Corn-and-Cob Meal, Oats and Cottonseed Meal Mixture Is Recommended for Dairy Cows.

A desirable grain ration for cows, when corn and oats are used as a base, is one made up of 300 pounds of corn-and-cob meal, 200 pounds of oats and 100 pounds of cottonseed meal. Feed this at the rate of one work. pound for every three pounds of 4 per cent milk produced. In addition feed as much legume hay and corn stover as the cows will consume.

CHEAPEST GAINS ON PASTURE

Result of Trials Conducted at North Dakota Station-Animals Need Some Grain.

Pigs make the cheapest gains on pasture. Trials at the North Dakota amount of careful and painstaking experiment station indicate that brood sows running on good pasture and nursing litters will do as well when receiving one to 114 pounds of grain per each 100 pounds live weight of sow, as sows in dry lot receiving 21/2 pounds grain per day per each 100 pounds live weight. The pasture just about cut the feed cost in two. The pasture alone does not furnish enough feed for either the brood sow with litter or for the weaned pigs. They should be fed some grain, so as to make a rapid growth. In this way the spring pig can be ready for market before real cold weather sets in.

Alfalfa, clover, bromus and winter rve make the earliest pastures. When these have not been provided early spring seeding of such grains as oats and barley or rape are the next best

The rule among physicians is that children should never receive opiates in the smallest doses for more than a day at a time, and only then if unavoidable.





This, however, in the opinion of the department, is not the case. It is true that the economic losses from the disease at the present time are insignificant, but scab has not been completely eradicated, and it is necessary for the protection of the industry that dipping be continued for some time to come.

Common scab was formerly the greatest drawback to the sheep industry in the United States. It is, however, easily controlled by regular dipping in lime sulphur or nicotine and sulphur solutions. These are the only preparations recognized by the bureau of animal industry for official dipping. The dipping solutions are not difficult to handle, and every sheep owner is urged to make certain by their use that sheep scab does not gain a foothold in his flock. In the cost of dipping, labor, fuel and the necessary materials are the principal items. Homemade Bordeaux Mixture. Ingredients: Copper sulphate, 4 pounds; quicklime, 4 pounds; water to

make 50 gallons. Prepare the copper sulphate by suspending it in a gunnysack just below the surface of several gallons of water in a clean barrel. When the sulphate is dissolved, which requires three or four hours, remove the sack and stir into the barrel enough additional water to make exactly 25 gallons of the copper solution

Prepare the lime by slaking it slow ly and thoroughly in a clean barrel. strain and add enough water to make exactly 25 gallons of lime milk. Stir

Pour the two ingredients together into another barrel, or better, directly into the spray tank, if it will hold 50 gallons. It is highly important to stir the mixture very thoroughly and to strain both ingredients before they are combined, as otherwise clogging of the spray nozzles might result. Use a copper or bronze wire strainer of 18 meshes to the Inch. Do not put copper sulphate or Bordeaux mixture into tin or iron vessels; use wood or copper containers. Mix the Bordeaux as needed and apply at once. It is never

Hug the left elbow in close to the hip and drag the hose by the weight of your whole body, not simply by the power of your arm. Pull the hose up this way a little farther than you need it each time, then back up one step and take idvantage of the slack. A half-inch hose filled with water is no joke to drag about quickly all day, often through the mud, but the experienced sprayer soon learns the knack of handling it on the run. A smaller hose, while much lighter, reduces pressure by giving too much friction.

A Rhode Island Red weighs ar ounce and a half at the hatch. At two weeks old it weighs over three ounces; at four weeks, five ounces; and at five weeks it should tip the scale above the half-pound mark.

Rocks will weigh nearly an ounce less, at the different ages. Chickens probably make weight at less cost at this age than any other, which is why some people find profit in selling the broilers .- Farm Life.




