



After rinsing in cold or lukewarm water wash the utensils in hot water. Cold or lukewarm water is practically worthless for cleaning purposes. Use some standard brand of alkali washing powder with the hot water. 



The ewes should be alike in fleece characteristics. In addition to other very necessary requirements aside from wool, they should carry fleeces even in quality, density and length.






