

OBJECT IN PRUNING GRAPES

Like Other Fruits, Aim Is to Secure Maximum Quantity of Highest Possible Quality.

The fruit of the grape is borne on the new shoots which grow from the buds formed on the preceding year's growth. The grower should know something of the habits of the variety before pruning. Varieties vary somewhat in their behavior in different soils. In strong, heavy soils grapes usually succeed better if set at a greater distance and may be allowed to carry more old wood than when they are grown in poor, light soils.

Upon the form of the trellis used will depend to a considerable extent the necessities of the pruning. Four systems that are most used are: Four arm, Kniffen; six arm, Kniffen; fan arm system and Munson system. For the hardier varieties of the American grapes the two-wire, four-cane treffis is quite largely used. When the plants are set they are cut back to one or two buds, but the growth the first year mer girl hang. point to be secured is as large a growth of strong vine as possible.

TO RENEW STRAWBERRY BEC

Plants Are Rarely Profitable for More Than One Crop-Turn Under Some Green Crop.

Strawberries are rarely profitable for more than one crop. If the patch is to be refruited, mow off the old vines after picking is over and burn them, and then plow out the old plants. is the instructor who learns leaving the runners to renew the

patch Manure or green crops such as beans, cowpeas or clover should be turned under whenever possible. Very heavy and frequent manuring is not desired as it is not a balanced fertilizer, being deficient in phosphoric acid. In conjunction then with 15 to 25 tons of barnyard manure per acre, acid phosphate should be added at the

rate of 200 to 600 pounds. A complete chemical fertilizer is of value on a poor soll or where an apolication of manure was not given The materials can be purchased separately and mixed at home in the following proportions:

134 pounds nitrate of soda and 250 pounds tankage.


572 pounds acid phosphate. 120 pounds muriate of potash.

If the patch is burned over after harvesting the crop every year, rotated every two or three years, and varieties resistant to leaf spot planted, very little trouble from insects or diseases should be experienced.

BUCKET FOR FRUIT PICKERS

Bottom of Metal Receptacle Is of Canvas and Spout Closes by Means of Gathering Rope.

The bottom of this metal bucket is a canvas spout closed by a gathering rope. When the rope is released the grasp of anything. spout opens and the fruit may be discharged into a bag or barrel or other receptacle. The rope passes through

rings sewed to the canvas and through two loops soldered to the bucket; its ends are fastened by means of a spring clip attached to the side of the bucket. -Farmers' Mail and Breeze.

FALL SPRAYING FOR CANKER

In Bad Outbreaks of Apple Disease Application of Bordeaux Mixture is Advisable.

In very bad outbreaks of apple canker, fall spraying with rather thick bordeaux mixture, at least as strong as 5-5-50, is advisable. This treatment is not usually necessary in most apple districts of the United States, but if the grower is having a real fight against apple cankers, the fall eradication should be made rather promptly as soon as the leaves are off, and the whole orchard should be sprayed with this mixture. This protects the tree against most of the reinfections in the bark and probably kills the spores on the surface of the wood and possibly many minor or incipient cankers.

Russians Who Went to Arctic in 1912 May Yet Be Living.




FINE INVESTMENT IN CALVES

CLEANLINESS IS BIG FACTOR

Special Care Should Be Taken to Prevent Meal in Corner of Boxes From Fermenting.

Cleanliness is one of the most important factors in feeding young calves. Clean feeding pails, troughs, and stalls are safeguards against digestive troubles. Milk should be fed only in clean pails, which should be washed and scalded after each feeding. All feed boxes should be kept clean. Special care should be taken to prevent meal from fermenting in the corners of boxes. Fermented or moldy feed will often upset the digestive system of a calf and endanger its life. No more grain should be fed than will be cleaned up in a few minutes. The bedding in calf stalls becomes wet very quickly. The calf should by all means be kept dry, and it is therefore necessary to keep the stalls well bedded at all times.

WATER AND SALT NECESSARY

Important Requisites for Proper Manufacture of Milk, Says South Dakota Professor.

Don't stint your dairy cows on water, if you want them to keep up the milk supply, suggests Prof. C. Larsen of South Dakota State college. He states that the amount of water needed by a dairy cow is in proportion to the amount of milk she gives, The average cow will drink about 75 pounds per day, while some very large tollk producers drink 200 pounds per day. The dairy cows should also have free access to salt. The right method of feeding salt is to have a water-tight box 10 or 12 feet long in the yard, raised about two feet from the ground on solid posts. Then put a whole barres of salt in the box and keep plenty of it there all the time. The cow needs salt not only for her body but for the manufacture of milk.

COMFORT OF COW IMPORTANT

Animal Should Be Made Comfortable and Willing to Part With Her Supply of Milk.

At milking time it is important that the cow be comfortable and contented She should have consumed at least a portion of her food before the milking begins, so she will have been satisfied and willing to part with her milk. It is also well that clean, fresh water be offered her before the milking proc







KERRVILLE

Is the county seat of Kerr County, has a population of about 2500, is sitated 70 miles northwesterly from San Autonio, and is the terminus of the Kerrville branch of the S. A. & A. P. railroad. It has two daily trains to and from San Antonio, and daily mail route, carrying passengers in hacks, to Ingram, Junction, Rock Springs Harper and other places north and
