

There have been hours when I of waterproof paint. have heard overhead a continual tattoo of Lewis guns and when a great sweep of sky has been racked out with white shrapnel clouds following our flying squadrons engaged hotly with hostile machines. One cannot follow the progress of these aerial battles, It is only rarely that one can distinguish an enemy machine from ours. except by cloudlets of our anti-aircraft barrage. But far and high one sees the daring specks chasing through the blue, touched sometimes by sunlight, so that for a moment they are all golden or glistening or white as snowflakes, and down to one comes the loud drone of engines and the little hammer-knocks of Lewis guns.

Our soldiers on the march stare up at the war above their heads, so aloof from them, so dreamlike, and the men on the supply columns get their glasses out and laugh when one of our kite balloons is hauled down suddenly with great haste. "Old Rupert has got the wind up," they say; "a Boche plane must be sneaking round." It is no joke when a German airman descends out of a cloud and hovers over a battery, signaling back to his guns. Officer's Advice to Women Wish-

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ing to Aid Soldiers.

Suggestion Explained by Fact That Men Need More Sweets Than They Get in Their Rations.

Somebody asked someone in the quartermaster's department what she could do to make life for the soldiers at the front, wherever that might be, more attractive.

"Do they need sweaters, or wrist warmers, or what can I make them?" she queried.

"Don't knit," said the man quoted. "Make them candy. They crave sugar and they need sugar."

So the young woman in question promptly went to the nearest candy shop and placed an order that a pound of candy be sent every other day to the particular soldier in whom she was in-

terested. Years ago, when the Boer war was raging. Queen Victoria once celebrated her birthday or some other festal day by sending a package of sweet chocolate to every Tommy fighting in South Africa. And some of her subjects staying safely at home said to themselves and each other: "Why on earth is the queen sending sweet chocolate to men who are giving their lives for us? Why doesn't she send them something they need?"

Today most of us have come to recognize the food value that lies in sugar. We have learned that pure candy, if it is eaten as a food, is wholesome. It is harmful when it is eaten between meals, and so spoils the appetite. We know, too, that the more hard physical work we do, the more sugar we need, because it is an easily assimilated fuel food.

Hence today the quartermaster's mandate that we send candy to the front, although it at first seems strange, is easily understood. The rations of the soldiers are carefully balanced, but still, many of them, living outdoors all the time, crave more sweets than they can get, and are benefited by them.

So add to your list another chance to help the men at the front-and send them candy.



nor her Allies can crush the enemy::The great corn crop may be the real life saver for us

ROBERT H. MOULTON

HE farmers of the United States are on the firing line of the great war today. Their plows are worth many cannon. The seed they sow is worth regiments of men.

For no army can fight without food and no nation can sustain war without food. The allies, our allies, are beginning to feel the pinch of want, not in the same degree as the people of central Europe, but that will come unless America puts forth all her ener-

gies to supply them. But it is most essential to feed America first. Even now a large class of our people are feeling

the weight of food shortage. Food riots and partial famine are threatened by crop failure in the United States. So it is up to the American farmer to do his best.

Many conditions have contributed to bring about the situation in which there are hunger riots in a land so rich naturally. Much of the shortage of food is primarily due to costly habits of eating which for many decades have been holding all classes in their-clutch. The time is at hand when the nation will appreciate the many valuable articles which before Columbus came the Indians were developing. There are many food products native to the Western world which have been unac-

countably neglected. The most striking examples of unused value in foods is the corn crop. Every other nation in the world is eager for American corn, and yet this cheap and highly netritious cereal is neglected in the land which is its main source of supply. What wheat was to the armies of old, corn could be to

the forces of the United States. The legions of Hannibal and of Caesar subsisted on the whole wheat; Gaul's conqueror in his "Commentaries" tells how soldiers chewed frumentum as they marched. To this day Roman and Punic skeletons are unearthed on the old battlefields of Europe and the skulls are firm and hard because of the valuable salts and bone-building constituents which came from the wheaten diet of

the ancient soldiery. Corn is no less valuable as a builder of brave and sturdy men. The favorite ration of Davy Crockett was parched and ground corn, which he carried with him into the depths of the forest. It was a saying of his that if a man had a gun and ten pounds of parched corn he could easily live a His diet was a trick learned from the Indians, who were able to withstand the fatigues of warpath and hunting trail because of this simple and quickly assimilated food. The corn, rich in starch and protein, parched until it was made quickly digestible, was mixed with water. A cupful of this most simple of all the elixirs had the effect of almost instantly strengthening the tired

The government of the United States urges upon the people of this country that at least one-fourth part of cornmeal be added to wheaten flour in the naking of bread. As a matter of fact, corn has been used in the form of a fine flour for centuries by various tribes of Indians, and when well enough ground it is fully as palatable as the wheaten

The coarse cornmeal bears little resemblance to the impalpable powder of corn which the primitive races of this continent made by grinding between stones and that by hand. The outer covering of the kernels is scraped off after soaking them in hot water to which a little lye has been added. This flour is mixed with water at times, and the white liquid resulting is quaffed with much relish. It is an emergency ration of the highest food value.

In times of peace by means of the amount of gold braid and shiny buttons displayed the average man could usually guess the rank of an officer within a few grades, but in the stern days of war. when officers and men are clad alike in businesslike khaki, there is little to tell a private from a major. There is, of course, a method in this, for it would not do in modern warfare to make officers conspicuous to the enemy.

In all branches of the service, infantry, cavalry and artillery, the same symbols or insignia of rank are used. The corporal, at the bottom of the scale of officers, is distinguished from the private by the chevron, consisting of two bars on the right sleeve. In the case of the sergeant, next highest in rank, the chevron is of three inverted V-shaped bars. All enlisted men, including these non-commissioned officers, wear on one side of their coats or blouses a bronze hutton with the number of their organization, and in relief crossed rifles for the infantry, crossed sabers for the cavalry and crossed cannon for the artillery. Coast and field artillerymen may be distinguished by the fact that in the case of the former in addition to the cannon there is a shell at the point of intersection of

The second lieutenant, lowest in rank of the commissioned officers, may be distinguished from the enlisted man, despite the fact that he wears no insignia on his shoulder straps, by the gold marking on his collar. This symbol, as in the case of the enlisted men, is of crossed rifles, sabers or cannon, according to the branch of the service, and is worn by all regimental officers. On the other side of the collar are the letters "U. S." in gold. Infantry officers may be distinguished by the fact that the latter wear canvas leggings, while the officers have tan leather leggings.

First lieutenants have a silver bar on their shoulder straps, while captains have two bars. Of the field officers, the major wears a gold leaf, and the colonel a silver spread eagle. The brigadler general has one silver star, and the major general,

The hats of all enlisted men are alike, but the hat cord around the crown reveals by its color the branch of the service to which the man belongs. A blue cord signifies infantry, a yellow cord cavalry, and a red cord artillery, either coast or field. The men of the quartermaster's corps have buff, the engineering corps red and white, the signal corps orange and white, and the hospital corps maroon and white hat cords. Officers of all branches wear gold and black hat cords, the insignia on their collars being the only indications of rank.

The insignia of the quartermaster's corps is a winged wheel crossed by a key and sword, of the engineering corps three turrets, and of the signal corps crossed flags. There are a few other emblems, but these are the most important.

In addition to the hat cords used in the service there are frequently seen on the streets the red, white and blue cords of the men who have been at Platisburg or other camps, but who are not actually in the service. The home-defense men wear green and white hat cords and slate-colored uniforms to distinguish them from the regulars -New York Sun.





KEEP TRACTORS BUSY

"Help your neighbors" is the keynote of a special appeal to tractor owners issued by Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Carl Vrooman.

"Every farmer who owns a tractor," he says, "owes it to his country this spring to do all the custom or exchange work he can do without neglecting his own work. Every hour that his tractor would otherwise be idle it ought to be at work beloing a neighbor who is behindhand with his plowing or harrowing. Make your outfit work from dawn to dark: make it work all night if you have enough operators to fill the shifts. The acreage to be harvested this fall hangs on the plow. Don't let an acre that might otherwise be planted go untilled because your tractor is in the shed. Help your neighbors and thus do your part in strengthening the allied lines on the battle fronts of Europe."

LARGE CROP OF SOY **BEANS IS REQUIRED**

Farmers Should Greatly Increase Acreage of This Crop for Oil and Human Food.

Although farmers have planned to grow a far larger crop of soy beans in 1917 than ever before, they should now greatly increase the acreage of this The department of farm crops of the Missouri college of agriculture predicts that as a result of the war the crop will be in demand as a feeding concentrate, for oil and for human food in addition to its normal

use as a forage crop. Experiments have shown soy bean meal to have about the same feeding value as cottonseed meal; and cottonseed meal will probably be so high for anticipating a great demand on the shelter for the porkers on hot days!

Although the soy bean is not considered a source for oil in this part of the country, in Virginia and North Carolina, threshed crop is sold mainly to the cotton oil mills, where the oil is expressed and the residue, or cake, ground into meal. Indeed soy bean seed is actually second only to cottonseed as a source of vegetable oils. It now seems certain that the demand for soy bean oil will soon become greater than can be supplied by the Eastern crop and that the Missouri crop will be drawn on to meet the

During the war, when foodstuffs of all kinds will continually diminish. many unusual kinds of human food will be brought into use. The soy bean is one of the crops which will be utilized. Already several manufacturers in the East have successfully substituted soy beans for navy beans in baked pork and beans. Indeed the demand in the East for soy beans for packing and for planting has been so great since last fall that the cotton oil mills have practically ceased crushing the seed and are turning ing any other period. them to the planters and packers. One mill which last fall bought 10,000 bushels of seed and planned to crushat least 100,000 bushels did not crush any seed but disposed of the whole stock for food and planting. With the war-time demand on the soy bean crop for an animal concentrate, for human food, and for oil, in addition to the normal demand for forage and seed for planting, there is no doubt that high prices will be maintained. Soy beans are now selling at \$3.50 to \$4.00 a bushel-at double the usual price-and farmers should not fail to plant the largest possible acreage. It will be a profitable and patriotic enterprise.

PROPER SUNSHINE FOR HOGS

PARTICULAR CARE FOR MILK

Flavors in Dairy Products May Be Prevented by Keeping Cows From Eating Weeds.

Don't let your dairy products taste of weeds or grass, if you can avoid it. Because butterfat absorbs flavors, particular care should be taken in handling milk, cream and butter, according to N. E. Olson, instructor in dairy husbandry in the Kansas State Agricultural college.

"The principal flavors derived from feeds are the weedy flavors," said Mr. Olson. "In the spring creamerles have trouble with the wild onion flavor. This is something that the farmer cannot prevent, and is caused by early pastur-

"Another common flavor is the halfgrass flavor, produced from green feed in the early spring. It can be tasted in milk, cream, and also in ice cream. It is found in practically all dairy products in the spring."

The method of preventing these flavors is keeping the cows from eating weeds, pointed out Mr. Olson. Weedy patches in pastures should be fenced off so that the cows cannot get to them. Other flavors are produced through the feeding of alfalfa and silage. If silage is fed, it is advisable to feed it after milking rather than before.

FEED COWS BEFORE CALVING

Practical Dairymen Agree That Preparation Has Much to Do With the Amount of Milk.

(By H. H. KILDEE, University Farm, St. Paul, Minn.) The proper time to begin feeding a

dairy cow is six or eight weeks before calving, and practical dairymen agree that this preparation has more to do with the amount of milk and butterfat which a cow produces during the lactation period than does the feeding dur-For cows calving during the sum-

mer or early fall most dairymen like to have a small pasture away from the herd but with an abundance of grass and, in addition, they like to feed a sultable grain mixture. Corn sllage, with clover or alfalfa hav and a limit ed grain ration of three parts ground oats, two parts of bran and one part of oilmeal is especially good for cows calving during winter or early spring. After calving the cows should be brought slowly up to full feed and thereby steadily to a higher produc-

GOOD SLOGAN FOR DAIRYMAN

Corn Silage and Other Roughage Have Value That Cannot Be Overestimated-Have Purebreds.

High-priced dairy feeds of last winter should teach the dairy farmers two things, according to the animal husbandmen at Cornell. The first is that good corn silage and other roughage have a value that cannot be overestimated; the second is that there is s greater need for good cows than ever before. This is no time to be feeding poor producers, and the man who has purebreds is getting double value for his feed. The dairyman's slogan for next year should be purebreds, a sile, and clover or alfalfa hay.



Serious Disorders Often Caused by Overfeeding Animals Which Are Working Hard.

More work horses are sick on Monday than on any other day in the week. This is good evidence that something is often wrong with the method of feeding on Sunday, declared Dr. C. W. McCampbell, associate professor of animal husbandry in

the Kansas State Agricultural college "One form of illness to which the work horse is subject occurs so often just following the Sunday rest that it is popularly known as 'Monday morning sickness," said Doctor McCampbell. "This trouble is noted most fre quently in those cases where horses are working hard, require heavy feeding, and are given the regular feed on Sunday while they remain idle in the barn. 

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

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
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
