Teachers, Attention!

The following letter from Superintendent Meeks of San Antonio to Judge Wallace in regard to the District Institute will be of interest:

Dear Mr. Wallace:

I am mailing you 75 Institute programs. Will you please urge your teachers to bring these with them. I trust that every one will be here ready to meet you in the room assigned to you Monday, Sept. 10th. I am particularly anxious that the work should start off on the dot Monday morning. Please urge your teachers to enroll with you; each County Superintendent will be responsible for his enrollment.

Let us have all the money collected early in the week. Superintendent Stewart will take charge of assignment of rooms. We will have a bureau at the school building where teachers can get information about rooms. If teachers get rooms assigned in advance it will be of convenience to them.

Supt. Stewart gives the following information:

I can quote you the following hotel rates. I am also securing a list of private families who will accommodate teachers:

Gunter Hotel, extra large rooms with bath, 5 to 8 in room, \$1 a day for each person. Single rooms \$1.50.

St. Anthony, very large rooms with bath, 8 to 10 in room, \$1.25 each person. Single rooms, \$2 up.

Maverick, without private bath, 1 person to room \$1.00; 2 persons, \$1.50; with bath, 1 person \$1.50; 2 persons, \$2.50; 4 persons \$5.00.

Lanier and Travelers, without bath, each person, \$1.00; with bath \$1.50.

Losoya, 2 in room without bath, 75c each; with bath \$1.00. 4 in room 75c each person.

The Bexar and Savoy at about the same rate.

Dispense with County Farm Demonstrator.

At the regular sitting of the Commissioner's Court last week the board voted unanimously to dispense with the County Farm Demonstrator for the coming year. The term of K. G. Baker closes in November, but he asked a hearing from the commissioners as to whether they expected to retain him for another year. Not one word of criticism of the work of Mr. Baker was given but to the contrary they passed a resolution highly commending him for his splendid services the past year under adverse circumstances. The reasons given for their action in dispensing with the Demonstrator was that high taxes, crop failure and general depression of the county would not justify the expense of keeping him. There is much regret expressed that the Commissioners could not see fit to retain him.

Red Cross Column

This column is given free for use of the Red Cross and is edited by officers of the local Chapter.

[Note—Application blanks for membership in the Red Cross may be obtained from Mrs. Geo. Morris, Chairman of the membership committee, at the St. Charles Hotel.]

The following is a telegram just received from Red Cross headquarters with the request that it be given full publicity:

"Red Cross has urgent call from Major Grayson Murphy for enormous quantity knitted woolen articles. Here is the cablegram from Major Murphy:

"Last winter broke record for cold and misery among the people here. Inexpressibly dread the coming winter finding us without supplies to meet situation. Urge you on behalf of our soldiers and those of our Allies who will suffer in these frozen trenches and also thousands of French and Belgian refugees and repatriates being returned through Switzerland to France. Every one here looks to America. Begin shipping at once one million five hundred thousand each of warm knitted woolen articles already requested. They must come before cold weather and in view of shortage of fuel and other discomforts they will be of inestimable value in both military and civilian work."

"We ask your chapter to furnish a definite number of these. Your allotment is one hundred sweaters, one hundred mufflers, one hundred pairs of wristlets one hundred pairs of socks. Full instructions will follow in a few days. Ask your members to finish all knitting work on hand and clear the decks for action: We want every chapter to have a chance to its part in making good on this call for help from France."

As the numbers of our forces in Europe increase the next few months the public will learn the incalculable value of a Red Cross institution—the Bureau of Casualties. This Bureau of Casualties of the American Red Cross has already been established at Washington. Its function is to notify friends and relatives here of casualties among the forces abroad; to act as a medium of communication for Americans held prisoners by our enemies; and to serve as a channel through which those at home and members of Red Cross units abroad may forward their letters or other communications.

Our Soldier Boys

Presented with Bibles.

Last Monday Morning was an interesting occasion at the camp of "D" Company, 1st Texas Infantry.

Among the many expressions of pride and interest in the company on the part of Kerrville the Sunday Schools of the town united to give each member a Testament.

Monday morning representatives of the Schools went out with other friends and presented the Testaments.

Captain Seeber assembled the men and in a very effective manner introduced the speakers.

Dr. W. P. Dickey of the Presbyterian church spoke of the interest of the community in the company and the great appreciation of all that these men are going out to represent and help light the way for a larger liberty and better manhood. He also spoke of the interest in the gift by Rev. B. Schleifer who could not be present on account of an appointment.

Bishop Johnston was then introduced as both an old soldier of another great war and a soldier of the Cross.

He spoke impressively of what it seems to be a soldier and reminded the company that they were now a part of the 1st Texas Regiment and heirs of the noble traditions of a command which was always in the thickest of the fighting. He also spoke of the great, overshadowing principle for which they are going out—not for plunder, not for adventure, not for hatred or national advantage, but for the divine principle of God given, free manhood the world over.

Judge Geddie, representing the Methodist Sunday School and also as Mayor, spoke eloquently and most convincingly of the great interest involved and of the unavoidable necessity which drove us into this conflict. In conclusion he called attention to the fact that a devout study of the book which was being presented had been the inspiration, progress and the character of liberty and had always made the most invincible soldiers as well as the greatest leaders, and citizens.

The interest and appreciation of the men was shown by an intense attention and hearty applause of every telling statement of principle and purpose.

In conclusion Rev. J. B. Riddle of the Baptist church made a strong testimony as to the value of daily study of the Book and an appeal for a constant study of its pages.

All hope that these little books will be a constant reminder to the boys of our interest in them and a pledge, day by day, that we are bound to them by bonds that can not be broken.

Soldiers Receive Uniforms.

The boys of Company D. 1st Texas Infantry stationed temporarily here received their uniforms last week and now present a splendid appearance. They also received sore arms from the vaccination of several days ago. They are expecting orders at any hour to entrain for Fort Worth.

Amendment Carried

The Conservation Amendment voted upon last week carried in the State by a safe majority. In Kerr County the vote was 64 to 49 in its favor.

The Governor on Trial

On yesterday morning at ten o'clock was begun in the Senate of Texas the trial of Governor James E. Ferguson upon twenty-one articles of impeachment filed in the Senate by the House of Representatives at ten o'clock last Friday night. The articles were adopted by the House one by one and instead of 13 charges as made by speaker Fuller in the beginning, the committee appointed by the House for that purpose brought in an indictment with 21 counts. On the adoption of these separate counts the vote ranged from as low as 67 to 69 and as high as 84 to 50, the final vote to adopt all as a whole being 74 to 45.
This is the second time in the history of Texas that a State officer has been the subject of impeachment proceedings. In 1893 articles of impeachment were adopted against W. L. McLaughy, then commissioner of the Land Office, but upon trial he was discharged by the Senate. No governor of this State was ever subjected to such charges before.
A coincidence of note is that the presiding officer in the McLaughy trial was M. M. Crane, then lieutenant governor. Mr. Crane has been the leading attorney in the prosecution of James E. Ferguson in this and the former investigation by the House. Thus M. M. Crane figures in the only two historical and epochal events of this kind which have occurred in Texas.
It will be interesting to the voters of this Representative District to know that M. E. Blackburn, who is serving his second term as Representative, and who had always claimed himself a strict prohibitionist and reformer, voted in every instance and on every proposition in the entire investigation and its preliminary arrangement in defense of the governor.

Red Cross Column

The extensive scope of preparations for the health, comfort and recreation of the American soldiers in France is indicated by reports from Maj. Grayson P. Murphy, head of the Red Cross commission in France. "No need of our army which we can possibly foresee will be left uncovered," said Major Murphy, who has been made a member of General Pershing's staff to aid the co-operation between the Red Cross and army authorities. Thirteen thousand selected trained nurses have enlisted for duty in the fully organized base hospitals in France and great quantities of hospital supplies, drugs and instruments are already in France or awaiting orders of Major Murphy.

Six infirmaries and rest stations in charge of trained nurses have been established along the route taken by troops from the landing port to camp, a journey often lasting three days, owing to congestion of French railroads. Canteens with bath and refreshment facilities are being established for use of troops when the routine of trench duty begins.

Dr. E. T. Devine, director of the New York School of Philanthropy, has sailed for France to study methods of teaching crippled or blinded men to be self-supporting. A Red Cross Institute for encouragement of this work will be established in New York with \$50,000 given by Jeremiah Milbank of New York.

The need for warm knitted goods for the soldiers and sailors is urgent. The Red Cross is making constant appeals to the women who knit. Put your head, heart and hands to work. It takes time to knit and distribute garments for over 1,000,000 men. Soldiers and sailors depend on neither sunshine nor steam pipes but on warm clothing for good health and effective work. All women of the community who knit are earnestly urged to help with this work. This is your chance for real service.

Mrs. Geo. Morris again entertained for the benefit of the Red Cross on Wednesday morning, Aug. 22, from nine o'clock until twelve. Various games were enjoyed and dainty refreshments were served on the spacious St. Charles porch. Proceeds for the Red Cross were \$22.50.

George McElroy from Ingram was in town Saturday and told us of the miraculous escape of his little three and a half year old son, George Colvin, one day last week. There was a cistern 25 feet deep with only about two and a half feet of water in it. Little George decided to pick some flowers from a box that his mama had placed on the edge of the cistern and after crawling up stepped on one side of the cover and in he went. He yelled as he started down and attracted the mother who discovered him standing in the bottom of the cistern, in water up to his neck. She lowered the bucket and told him to get in and hold tight to the rope. He got in and said, "all right Mamma, I will hold tight," and out she pulled him out with not the least injury, only a pretty bad scare. The fact that his hair was not even wet showed that he must have gone down feet foremost and landed the same way.

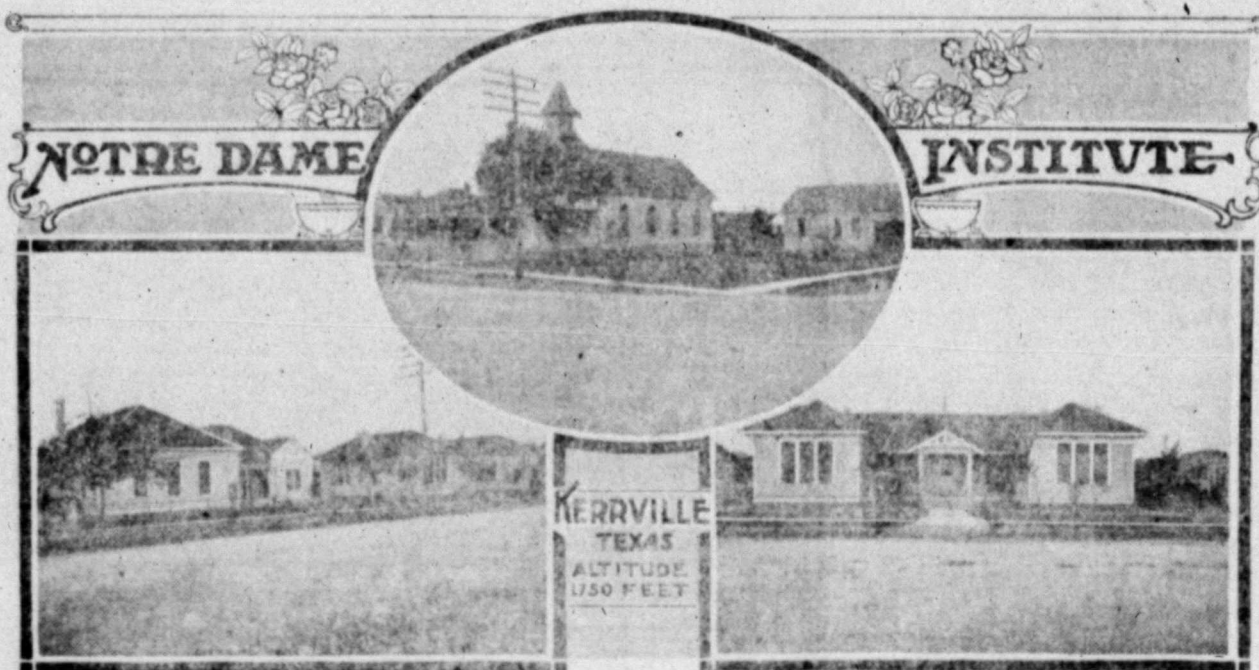

All records in granting pardons were broken when during the past three months Governor Ferguson signed the pardons of over 400 convicts, their crimes ranging all the way from murder in the first degree with a life sentence to the smallest sentences of two years for violation of the local option law. In less than one month just preceding his trial impeachment charges he granted 141 pardons, and on the last day before he stepped out of the governor's seat he granted 20. It is said he was busy up to the last minute issuing pardons. Many of the convicts with long sentences had only served a short time, among them being Monroe McKelvy convicted and given a life sentence three years ago for the murder of a barber in Bell county. It is stated that the House may bring another charge against the governor in connection with these apparently indiscriminate pardons.

Perhaps it is best we didn't get the West Texas A. & M. It is better to be a disappointed loser than a disappointed and humiliated winner as is the case with Abilene.

Yes, under the circumstances we would favor the repeal of all the new college laws passed at the last session of the Legislature.

M. E. Blackburn, representative of this district, is due the privilege of making an explanation of his vote to clear the governor of all the charges in the recent impeachment hearing in the House, and his constituents are ready to hear from him in this connection. We want to know upon what grounds he based his verdict after considering the law and all the evidence. To say that his former friends and supporters are alarmed and disappointed is putting it mildly. They are disgusted and indignant.

There is talk of a further cleanup at the State Capitol. If there is a real desire to rid our State Government of the graft and corruption to which it is subjected under present conditions, we would suggest to first put the brewery and liquor machine out of business in this State, and the rest will be easy.

The allies are just now striking the hardest blow ever delivered at Germany. Only the cooperation of Russia is needed to bring speedy and decisive defeat to the Teutons. But if it takes Uncle Sam to do the job we shall soon show to the world how well we can do it.


