## FEDERAL CHARTERS TO TEXAS GAINS MANY NEW MEMBERS FARM LOAN ASSOCIATIONS Red Cross Adds Approximately 17,500,

A Total of \$112,245 Was Placed In Two Days By Federal Land Bank at Houston.


