MILLIONS OF MEN BATTLE IN FRANCE

GERMANS LAUNCH FIERCE OF FENSIVE AGAINST THE BRIT. ISH ON MILES OF FRONT.

British Lines Forced to Give Ground in Some Places, But the Slaughter of the Germans Is Appalling.

In a battle that has rivaled in ferocity any that has preceded it during three and a half years of warfare the British on a seventy-mile front are withstanding a great German offen-

Fighting of a most desperate nature | land in one day last week. has been continuous since the initial attack, but so far the British have used few troops other than those who were holding the front lines. These shock troops have been making as gallant a defense as was ever recorded in the annals of the British army, and as a result they have enabled the main body of the forces to fall back deliberately and without confusion and occupy positions which had been prepared long before the German offensive began.

The Germans on the other hand, operating under the eyes of the emperor and the crown prince, have been hurling vast hordes into the fray with utter disregard for lives and have followed into the abandon positions, get ting further and further away from their supplies and finding their communications increasingly difficult.

More than fifty German divisions already have been identified by actual contact and many of these men were simply given two days' iron rations and sent over the top into the frightful maelstrom made by the allied artillery, machine guns and rifles. The slaughter of the enemy infantry as it advanced in close formation over the open has been appalling.

The British losses have been within the bounds expected due to the factics of the commanders. The allies have lost a considerable number of men in prisoners and a certain number of guns. But very few pieces of artillery have been taken by the Germans since the first day. In fact, the whole withdrawal has been executed in a masterly manner, showing how thoroughly events which have occurred.

Dairy products are essential to the well-being of the nation, and the dairy cow produces more food with less feed than any other of our domestic animals. Refore the war the United States received dairy products from about twenty foreign countries; now these supplies have been largely stopped and it has become necessary not only to replace them at home, but also to export large quantities. In-1914, for instance, we imported approximately 64,000,000 pounds more of dairy products than we exported, not including fresh milk and cream. In 1917 we exported 320,000,000 pounds]

The total amount of milk produced in this country in 1917 is estimated to be 84.611,350,000 points. Large losses occur, and the greatest is through the failure fully to utilize skimmed milk and buttermilk for human food. These products have all of the feed value of the whole milk except the fat. A given quantity of them would produce seven times as much food value in the form of cottage cheese as they would produce in the form of ment if fed to live stock. The possibilities of increasing the supply of food by the fuller utilization of these by products are enormous In brief, there should be a better utillzation of skimmed milk and buttermilk, both as food on the farm and through the market.


