My letter will be short as I cannot give descriptions or much about what we are doing. This is a pretty country. I went to a Y. M. C. A. last night here in camp and saw a picture show. It was certainly fine.

Say, Henry Ford is well advertised over on this side. The very first thing I saw when we marched off the boat was a Ford car. There is nearly as many here as in the U.S.A.

The trains over here are nothing like ours over there. You get in by doors at the sides and they have three or four apartments in them and each apartment carries eight people.

I have certainly seen some fine buildings and green fields. I saw a building here that I never knew was in existence. It is a great 'Cathedral and was built three hundred years before America was discovered.

I have been to three different camps here but have seen no one that I ever knew.

I am feeling fine and getting fat. Write me a letter as soon as you can. I want you to send me some I do they will sure look good.


