# **ALLIED LINE UNBROKEN**

The entire allied line in France and Flanders still stands firmly. Nowhere have the Germans been able to make a further deat in it. Hard fighting has been in progress on the Ypres sector around Voormezeele and to the south of Lecre. Both places have several times changed hands, but at last reports Voormezeele had been recaptured by the British, but the Germans had obtained another foothold in Lecre.

Voormezeele was taken by the Germans Saturday, but the British, in a night attack, won it back and since have held it, inflicting heavy casualties on the Germans in renewed efforts to take the place.
