Live Stock and Ranch Notes

Wool has begun to roll in from the ranches. The market has not yet opened but the Government will likely set the price at about what it averaged last July, which will be from 55 to 60 cents.

Buck Bishop bought 250 mutton goats from H. A. Bass at \$4.50 and 425 head from Bode Bros. at \$5.00. They were ones and twos.

J. M. York sold 568 ewes and lambs to Mr. Covington at \$15.00 a pair. Mr. Duncan sold to Lynn Clark about 400 mutton sheep at \$11.00 a head.—Edwards County Leader.

H. P. Roddie returned Tuesday from Hood and Erath counties, where he purchased 100,000 pounds of wool. The wool is being concentrated at Granbury and Stephenville for shipment to Boston. The wool was purchased at figures ranging from \$1.22 to \$1.68, clean basis, which is in accord with the prices fixed by the Government and the shipment will be taken over by U. S. authorities upon its arrival at market. Mr. Roddie estimates that there will be a shortage of 2,000,000 pounds of wool this season over last year. It is stated that at San Angelo, Menard and Junction as a result of the drought, there is a shortage of 300,000 sheep. Basing the value of the wool from this number at \$4 a head, and of the increase at \$2 a head, it can readily be seen there will result a loss of approximately \$2,000,000 to wool growers of this section.—San Angelo Standard.

The new chairman of the committee on foreign relations, Gilbert M. Hitchcock of Nebraska, was one of the men who helped defeat the shipping bill and who were so severely arraigned by Senator Stone three years ago.

A young woman who has spent most of her life at Postdam, where the kaiser's favorite palace is located, was in Washington while the German drive on the west front was at its crest.

Claude Kitchin, the leader of the house, has become an expert about government affairs. Who he became chairman of the ways and means committee, as he would probably acknowledge himself, he was not equipped in the way of knowledge for the big task which then confronted him.

A great many congressmen have sons or near relatives in one or other of the fighting services. One of those is Congressman Tillman of Arkansas, whose boy is an airplane observer.

It was quite a compliment to Congressman Tilson of Connecticut that he was asked by the house to describe from a military point of view the battle situation at a time when the country was most apprehensive that Germany was about to break through.

Postmaster General Burleson is quite frequently at the capitol. In fact, from the beginning of the administration he has been a sort of legislative agent for the administration and often tells senators and representatives what the president would like to have done in regard to some measure that may be pending.

Elihu Root, former senator from New York, left a good impression in the senate and he often receives high praise from men who were opposed to him politically.

The constant pounding of men opposed to river and harbor bills, or many of the provisions of such bills, has had the effect of materially reducing those measures compared to what they have been in the past.

About 200 canning club girls of Harris county held their semi-annual rally in Houston Saturday.

The Federal Land Bank at Houston has moved into its own home near the government postoffice.

Plans are under way for the establishment of a half million dollar eight-story hotel at Beaumont.

A contract has just been let for a high school building at Bryan to cost, when equipped, \$101,000.

The Texas railroad commission has postponed the May docket of hearings until June 11 at Austin, Texas.

It is unanimously conceded that the condition of all kinds of crops in Wharton county are the best in its history.

John A. Norris of Wharton has been named as a member of the State board of water engineers, vice R. J. Windrow, resigned.

Crime in Fort Worth has declined 75 per cent since the 10-mile zone law went into effect, according to police reports of that city.

The prospects for a bumper crop this year in Fort Bend county was never better. The chief crop is cotton, which looks fine.

In Nueces county this season the acreage in cotton will exceed 109,000 acres, and the acreage in feed crops will be nearly as large.

The high water in Guadalupe river bottoms recently has driven many meadow snakes to higher ground, and a number have been killed in Cuero.

During the month of April Sixty-two cars of crude oil were shipped from the Brownwood field, in addition to the crude taken by the two local refineries.

The Texas Egg and Poultry Show held at Houston last week was a great success from the standpoint of quality and variety of exhibits and prize winning.

A road bond election will be held in District No. 3, Palestine, Saturday for the purpose of voting on the issuance of \$40,000 bonds for road improvement. This district includes Tennessee colony and Cayuga.

The International Shipbuilding Company has been granted the right to install a cable ferry across Sabine river at Orange as a result of a public hearing conducted by Major Watts of the United States engineering corps at Dallas.

Appeals in four cases where convictions were had on alleged violations of the local option laws have been filed in the court of criminal appeals at Austin since May 1. Three of these cases were from Nacodoches county and the fourth from Wichita county.

In an opinion to the governor it was held by Assistant Attorney General Townsend that county treasurers are not entitled to any commissions for handling drought relief funds under the act of the legislature appropriating \$2,000,000 for aid in the drought-stricken districts of Texas.

Governor Healy has approved the application of Caddo county for \$15,000 aid under the \$2,000,000 drought relief act, making twenty counties granted aid under the governor's approval for a total of \$284,500.

A troop of Dallas Boy Scouts will spend their outing this year on the farm of C. S. Martin & Son of Mount Vernon, Texas, and will spend it at the time the immense peach orchards of Mr. Martin are yielding up their gracious harvest of fruit.

Trust companies chartered under State banking laws may sell Texas mortgages to life insurance companies, savings banks and other corporate investors in the State and enter into agreements with such purchasers to look after taxes without the purchasers taking out a permit under Texas laws as foreign corporations.

Dallas news of the annual meeting of the Texas Canning Club girls of the extension service of the A. and M. College of Texas will have the opportunity of providing breakfast for thousands of American troops aboard transports en route to Europe every month from now on until September.

All officers of the association were re-elected, and the executive committee was reappointed. The officers are: J. T. Justus of Howland, president; S. S. Frazer, Lone Oak, secretary; and the Daniels of Crockett, vice president.

The membership of the association represents 2,200 Texas girls, and sets of \$60,000,000. It has just been established on a firm business basis, and is expected to engage in some important organized activities for the improvement of cotton ginning.

A feature of the meeting was an address by Hugh Humphreys, head of the cotton seed section of the federal food administration, who told the gingers why the administration is going to control their business and something of how that is to be done.

The association endorsed every rule and regulation of the food administration, and pledged itself and its individual members to continue their support of this department by dedicating their business and influence to the government until the war has been won and the world has been made safe for human habitation, which action was recommended by the legislative committee.

Upon recommendation of the legislative committee the association empowered the president to appoint an advisory legislative committee consisting of one man from each senatorial district. This committee will select one or more representatives to look after the interests of the gingers at Austin.

Chicago—By defeat of the aircraft program and the selective service act, together with the practice of sabotage in the trenches in France and the factories at home, it was hoped by the Industrial Workers of the World to crumble America's war plans, according to evidence presented by the government Friday in the seditious conspiracy trial of Industrial Workers of the World leaders.

Washington—As part of the practice of commanding labor, the German military authorities in Belgium have registered all youths above 12 in the region of Mons and are employing many between 14 and 17 in digging and grading close to the trenches north of Verdun and near St. Mihiel, the American sector, said advices received Friday by the Belgian legation.

U-Boat Blown Out of Water. An Atlantic Fort—the sinking of a German submarine by a United States warship with a shot which lifted the U-boat completely out of the water and broke her in two was reported by officers of the ship on arrival Thursday. Because of the fine work of the gunners the crew of the ship was given an additional 10 days of ten days.

Man From London Comfortable Camp Yard with... London, England, where the government of Great Britain, the war office, announced in the house of commons Thursday that this man was in the Tower of London and would be court-martialed.

China Secures 20,000,000 Yen As Loan. Peking—A loan of 20,000,000 yen, secured by Chinese telegraph revenues, has been closed with Japanese bankers and the first installments are arriving. An additional loan of \$20,000,000, secured by the Tientsin Shantung railway, is reported to have been concluded.

Nicaragua Aids With Cereals. San Salvador—Nicaragua, having entered the war against the central powers, the national congress has declared the country in a state of siege. It is announced that Nicaragua will assist the allies with the supply of cereals.

King of Spain's Cousin Dies. Madrid—Princess Maria del Pilar cousin of King Alfonso of Spain, died Friday from meningitis.

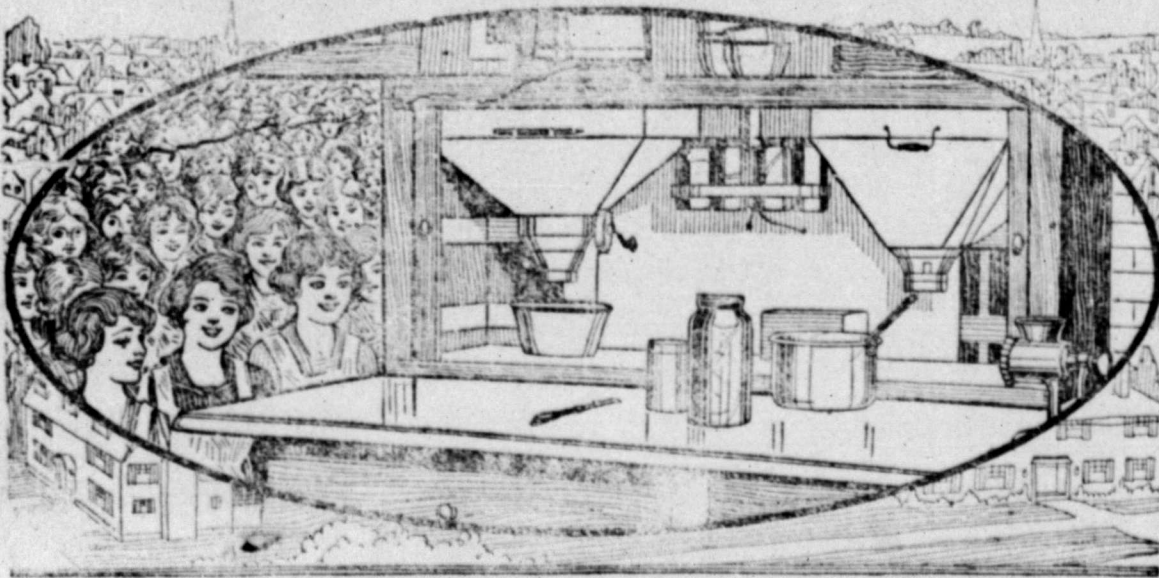

List of Places Where Texans Will Be Sent.

President Wilson issues Proclamation Designating the Week Beginning May 29 as Red Cross Week.

Washington.—President Wilson Tuesday issued a proclamation designating the week beginning May 29 as "Red Cross week" and calling upon the American people to contribute generously to the second \$100,000,000 war fund of the American Red Cross for the alleviation of suffering among the American troops in France and their dependents at home, and among the fighting forces and civilian populations of the allied countries.

The proclamation follows:

Proclamation. Inasmuch as the war fund of 1917, so generously contributed by the American people to the American Red Cross for the administration of relief at home and abroad, has been practically exhausted by appropriations for the welfare of men in our military and naval forces and those dependent upon them, and for the yet more urgent necessities of our allies, military and civilian, who have long borne the brunt of war;

And inasmuch as the American Red Cross has been recognized by law and international convention as the public instrumentality for war relief;

And inasmuch as the year of our own participation in the war has brought unprecedented demands upon the patriotism and liberality of our people and made evident the necessity of concentrating the work of relief in one main organization which can respond effectively and universally to the needs of humanity under stress of war;

And inasmuch as the duration of the war and the closer and closer cooperation of the American Red Cross with our own army and navy, with the governments of our allies and with foreign relief organizations have resulted in the discovery of new opportunities of helpfulness under the conditions which translate opportunity into duty;

And inasmuch as the Red Cross council and its commissioners in Europe have faithfully and economically administered the people's trust;

Now, therefore, by virtue of my authority as president of the United States and president of the American Red Cross, I, Woodrow Wilson, do hereby proclaim the week beginning May 29, 1918, as "Red Cross week," during which the people of the United States will be called upon again to give generously to the important work of relieving distress, restoring the waste of war and assisting in maintaining the morale of our own troops and the troops and peoples of our allies by this manifestation of effort and sacrifice on the part of those who, though not privileged to bear arms, are of one spirit, purpose and determination with our warriors.

In witness whereof I hereunto set my hand and cause the seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done in the District of Columbia, the 4th day of May, in the year of our Lord 1918, and of the independence of the United States of America the one hundred and forty-second.

Woodrow Wilson, By the President: Robert Lansing, Secretary of State.

Increase in Texas Potato Consumption

Washington.—Consumption of potatoes in Texas has increased in parts of the State from 50 to 200 per cent, according to reports reaching the food administration. As a result of a determined campaign to conserve wheat, R. A. Parker, Texas director for hotels and restaurants, reports that in some of the public eating places the increase has been between 200 and 300 per cent.

Young Irish Woman Votes.

Dublin.—The first Irish woman to cast a vote in a parliamentary election did so in the recent bye-election at Waterford. She was a young woman whose name had somehow been put on the list of voters in error. When she appeared at the polling booth and claimed her voting paper the presiding officer ruled that his duty did not go beyond ascertaining that she was the person whose name appeared on the register, and she voted.

Wine Can Be Shipped.

Austin, Tex.—Assistant Attorney General, Walter A. Koelling, in conducting the 10-mile zone law Wednesday, held that it would not be a violation of the law to make wine within the 10-mile zone or to ship same therefrom to any point within the State not included in the zone area. Also that wine could be given to friends in such places but that it could not be sold therein. Of course, shipments cannot be made after June 25, when the statewide dry law becomes effective.

Gompers Asks Removal of Governor.

Washington.—Removal of Arthur Yager as governor of Porto Rico was asked of President Wilson Thursday by Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor. Mr. Gompers charged the governor with incompetency in handling the labor situation in Porto Rico.

Aviator at Ellington Field Killed.

Houston, Tex.—Second Lieutenant Eddy Davis, whose home is in Bloomington, Ill., died Friday as the result of an accident when his airplane dropped into a tailspin and crashed to the ground near Pearland. Second Lieutenant A. Lawrence, who was with him, escaped uninjured.

Tornado in Iowa and Illinois.

Chicago, Ill.—Fourteen deaths—seven in Iowa and seven in Illinois—and a property loss estimated at more than \$1,000,000 was the toll taken by the tornado which swept through Iowa and Illinois Thursday. Approximately 150 persons were injured.

Mexican Bandits Kill Family.

Eagle Pass, Tex.—Mexican bandits murdered the entire family of Frederick Hillcoat, an Englishman, at La Mariposa, in the Santa Rosa mountains near Mazquil, Mexico, about 250 miles south of Eagle Pass, according to a telegram received Tuesday. Besides Hillcoat, his wife and son Jerry, and sister-in-law, Miss C. Lamars, were killed.

Propose Canceling France's Debts.

Washington.—Cancellation of France's financial obligations to the United States is proposed in a resolution introduced Tuesday by Senator Kenyon of Iowa. The resolution proposes that America for money borrowed or funds advanced since the commencement of the present war, including interest thereon, be and hereby are canceled.

Rehearing Denied in Spanell Case.

Austin, Tex.—The court of criminal appeals Wednesday refused to grant the state's motion for rehearing in the case of H. J. Spanell, charged with killing Lieutenant Colonel M. C. Butler, U. S. A., at Alpine, Texas, July 20, 1916.

Flyer Killed in Fall.

San Antonio, Tex.—Lieutenant Jas. G. May of New York City and stationed at Kelly Field, was killed Thursday in an airplane accident.

NATIONAL MEMORIAL DAY IS THURSDAY, MAY 30

President Issues Proclamation Asking Day of Public Humiliation, Prayer and Fasting.

Washington.—National Memorial Day, Thursday, May 30, was designated by President Wilson in a proclamation issued Saturday as a day of public humiliation, prayer and fasting. The people of the nation are asked to gather that day in their places of worship and pray for victory of the American armies which will bring peace founded upon mercy, justice and good will.

The proclamation issued in response to a resolution by congress follows: By the President of the United States:

A PROCLAMATION. Whereas, The Congress of the United States on the second day of April last passed the following resolution:

Resolved by the senate (the house of representatives concurring), That it being a duty peculiarly incumbent in time of war, humbly and devotedly to acknowledge our dependence on Almighty God and implore His aid and protection, the president of the United States be and is hereby respectfully requested to recommend a day of public humiliation, prayer and fasting to be observed by the people of the United States with a religious solemnity and the offering of fervent supplications to Almighty God for the safety and welfare of our cause. His blessing on our arms and a speedy restoration of an honorable and lasting peace to the nations of the earth; and Whereas, It has always been the reverent habit of the people of the United States to turn in humble appeal to Almighty God, for His guidance in the affairs of their common life;

Now, therefore, I, Woodrow Wilson, president of the United States of America, do hereby proclaim Thursday, the thirteenth day of May, a day already fraught with sacred and stimulating memories; a day of public humiliation, prayer and fasting, and do exhort my fellow citizens of all faiths and creeds to assemble on that day in their several places of worship and there as well as in their homes to pray to Almighty God that He may forgive our sins and shortcomings as a people and purify our hearts to see and love the truth; to accept and defend all things that are just and right, and to purpose only those righteous acts and judgments which are in conformity with His will; beseeching Him that He will give victory to our armies as they fight for freedom, wisdom to those who take counsel on our behalf in these days of dark struggle and perplexity and steadfastness to our people to make sacrifice to the utmost support of what is just and true, bringing us at last the peace in which men's hearts can be at rest because it is founded upon mercy, justice and good will.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done in the District of Columbia, this, the eleventh day of May, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and eighteen and of the independence of the United States the one hundred and forty-second.

WOODROW WILSON, By the President, Robert Lansing, Secretary of State.

Port Worth, Texas.—Following the choosing, by acclamation, of San Antonio as the next meeting place of the Texas Press Association and election of officers, the twenty-ninth annual convention adjourned Saturday at Fort Worth.

It was announced that the membership report was 200 per cent better than was expected. Not more than fifteen or twenty new members were anticipated and more than fifty were accepted. A resolution was adopted remitting the dues of all members in the service of the United States for the duration of the war.

Officers for the next year were elected as follows: President, Harry Koch of the Quannah Tribune; vice president, Sam Fore, Jr., of the Floresville Chronicle-Journal; secretary, Sam P. Harben of the Richardson Echo (re-elected); treasurer, C. P. Lehmann of San Antonio (re-elected); attorney, Clarence E. Gilmore of Wilb's Point; assessor, Miss Irene M. Davidson of the Denon Record-Chronicle (re-elected); orator, George Waverly Briggs of St. Louis (re-elected); poet, Miss Margie Nock of the Carthage Register; Lee J. Rountree and Tom H. Lusk were re-elected as members of the board of directors.

Following the election of officers, J. J. Taylor of The News in behalf of the members of the association, presented Sherwood Spotts, the retiring president, with a chest of silver. Henry Edwards of Troupe presented Mrs. Spotts with a handsome fan as the gift of the mascot of the organization, Miss Elizabeth Blaine Harrison.

It is not the committed upon There are this and soldiers, he deserted after several months' service and finally made his way to the United States. His disclosure of the unspeakable cruelties perpetrated by the German soldiers, under orders from their officers, is one of the most sensational documents the war has produced.

CHAPTER I.

I am a German soldier. Naturally at the time when the war started I did not know that there would be such a war as is being waged today.

Daily we soldiers were told that France and Russia wanted to attack us and that the kaiser was doing everything possible for our protection. Already on July 20 we were armed to the teeth and prepared to march away. During these preparations, which showed us all that war had to come, 18 men of my company deserted.

The government published, during this time, bulletins almost hourly to prepare the people for the war, a subterfuge that succeeded perfectly. Consequently two days before war was declared, the people were overwhelmed for war, but they were certain that it was only to be between Germany and France.

Of the intervention of Belgium, Russia, England and Italy, the country had as little thought as it did of any participation of the United States. All thought only of the promenade to Paris, which, to the disappointment of the people, and also, surely to the disappointment of the autocracy, has been longer drawn out than had been wished for.

In these days of uncertainty the soldiers, contrary to the cruel treatment which they had experienced before, were treated liberally with great quantities of supplies, delicacies and beer, so that most of the soldiers were so drunk continuously that they were unable to realize the seriousness of the situation.

And yet the majority of the soldiers could not be enthused over the war. They cheered and were enthusiastic because they knew it was the orders. On July 31, 1914, one day before the declaration of war, we left, after being brought to war strength for our garrison at Mainz-am-Rhein.

Where the enemy toward which we were to point our bayonets was we had not the slightest idea. All we did know was that we had to be transported somewhere to protect the border.

There were stirring times as we started out. Tens of thousands of people threw flowers at us and all were crying and shouting. All—even the children—cried: Many embraced their young brides. The bands' farewell songs and people wept and cried all at the same time. Strangers embraced and kissed each other. "A veritable witch's holiday" of emotion was witnessed and engulfed the populace like a storm. No one, not even the strongest, could resist its powers. Yet even this was suppressed by the leave-taking at the depot, where last farewells had to be said. This scene will never leave me! How desperately many women clung to their men! Many had to be forcibly removed.

But this was at last done and then we were placed in cattle-cars. Night came and we had no lights. The train went slowly toward the Rhine. It went smoothly enough. Our company, which had had days of great excitement, welcomed the rest that the journey afforded. Most of the soldiers slept with their knapsacks as pillows. Others looked dreamily into the future. Still others secretly pulled pictures from their breastpockets and only a very few killed time by discussion and comment on their possible destinations.

"Where are we going?" Yes, where? No one knew. Then after endless hours' the train stopped. We were in Ligny. What were we there for? I did not know. The officers only shrugged their shoulders at our questions.

heat was... from all... leather trappings... especially upon our hips... at 2 p. m. to halt at an... farm and rest on the grass... might have lain down about... us when suddenly we heard firing... We jumped up like lightning and hurried to our guns. The firing which was about three kilometers away, grew more lively. At once we were on the march again.

From the expressions on the faces of the soldiers we could read the minds of the men. Something took possession of them which they had never experienced before. As for myself I became very restless. Fright and curiosity lashed my brain. Everything whirled around in my head and my heart was beating wildly. But I strove to conceal my fright from my comrades. I am sure that I tried energetically. I don't know that I succeeded better than my companions.

Although I knew we would be in the fight in an hour, I tried to persuade myself that our interference would not be necessary. I clung tightly to everything which might strengthen this hope. The bicycles lying in the road indicated that the bicycle division was in the fight at this point. How strong the enemy was we did not know as we raced toward the firing line. Every body crouched down as low as possible, half jumping to the right and left. Before and behind us the bullets were flying continuously, yet we reached the firing line without losses. We were greeted joyously by our hard-pressed comrades. The bicycle regiment had not suffered any losses except for a few slightly wounded men who were still able to take part in the fight.

We were lying flat on the ground and firing in the direction ordered for all we were worth, even though we had not seen our enemies. That was apparently not interesting enough to some of our soldiers. They wanted to know how the people were looking whom they had to shoot at. They got up to a kneeling position. Two men of my company had to pay for their curiosity with their lives almost instantly. The first victim of our party went down without a sound. The second threw his arms high in the air and fell on his back. Both were dead instantly.

It is impossible for me to describe the feeling that overcame me in the first real volley as we advanced and came directly within the range of the fire. I no longer felt any fright, only an impulse to get into action as quickly as possible. Yet at the sight of the first corpse a terrible fear seized me. For minutes I was completely stunned, lost all self-control and was absolutely unable to think or do anything.

I pressed my face and hands close to the ground. I wanted to clutch my gun and shoot blindly. Presently I calmed down. I suddenly became contented with myself and conditions about me and when soon afterward the command was sounded along the whole line, "Spring out!" "Forward march!" I charged as did everyone else like one possessed. The order to halt followed. Like wet bags we plumped to the ground. Firing had begun again.

Our firing now became more lively momentarily and increased to a fearful loudness. If we had occasion to say anything to our comrades we had to shout so loudly in their ears that it hurt our throats. Under the effect of our fire the enemy grew restless, the fire weakened and his line wavered. As only 500 meters separated us from them we could observe exactly what happened there. We saw about half the enemy retire in the following manner: Every other man quit the line, leaving his alternate in his place. Those remaining held on until the retiring party halted. We used this moment to inflict the most severe losses on the retreating enemy. As far as we could see the horizon to the right and left we saw the Germans advancing in several sectors. Also for our detachments the order came to advance as the enemy retreated.

The task of clinging to the heels of the retreating enemy so tenaciously that no time would be allowed to make a new stand fell to us. We followed the Belgians, scarcely stopping to breathe on the way, in order to prevent their fortifying themselves in a village situated just ahead. We knew that a bloody house-to-house fight lay before us, yet the Belgians never attempted to establish themselves, but managed to escape with astonishing cleverness.

In the meantime we received reinforcements. Our company was now pretty well scattered and fought with whatever unit was nearby. The body I joined had to remain in the village to search systematically for scattered soldiers. From this village we saw that the Germans had gained on all sides. Field artillery, machine gun detachments and other equipment arrived and we were all astonished at their coming so quickly.

The Zeppelins and the 42-centimeter guns of the Germans—giant guns whose existence was unknown even to the Kaiser's soldiers—rain death and destruction upon the Belgian cities which dare to resist the invader. Gets Six Hun Flyers in Day.

Paris—Six German airplanes were brought down Friday by Sublieutenant Rene Foncke, the war office announced. "I am going to avenge Lieutenant Chaput," declared Lieutenant Foncke before taking the air. Chaput, who had accounted for sixteen German machines, was killed last Friday. Lieutenant Foncke had just left the region of the airdrome when he encountered an enemy squad. He drove straight at them, opening fire with his machine gun, and shot down two. He then went after a third machine and sent it crashing to earth five minutes later. He then returned to the airdrome for more gasoline. On this patrol he met another squad. One plane he shot to pieces in the air. Two others were brought to the ground, all within five minutes.

Quotas for 8,324 Men Completed.

Austin, Tex.—The quotas for 8,324 men from Texas under the last call, the movement of which is to begin May 25, were completed Friday by the selective service law department of Texas. The announcement of quotas made were those for Camp Travis, San Antonio, 3,999 men, and Camp Cody, Benning, N. M., 2,299 men. The quotas for Camp Bowie, Fort Worth, have already been announced. The quotas do not include any of the cities of Texas, all having credits which equalize the gross quotas. Approximately twenty-five counties also have sufficient credits to meet their gross quotas and for that reason are not to furnish men under the present call.

Federation Women's Club Convention.

Het Springs, Ark.—With an address on woman's committee, and coordinated work by Dr. Anna Howard Shaw, and the Red Cross phases at home and abroad by Dr. Esther Lovejoy of Portland, Ore., and George W. Simmons of St. Louis, and with a number of war camp songs sung by Mrs. Newton B. Baker, wife of the secretary of the convention, the fourteenth biennial convention of the General Federation of Women's Clubs Wednesday closed in "Auld Lang Syne" and passed into history. Mrs. Joseph E. Cowles of California was re-elected president.

Cannot Tax Usage Oil Production.

Oklahoma City, Ok.—Federal court decrees permanently restraining Oklahoma state authorities from levying a gross production tax upon oil produced by lessees of Osage Indian oil lands, were affirmed Monday by the supreme court at Washington. The contention of the lessees, the Gynax, Indian Territory, Oklahoma and Kansas oil companies, that they are, in effect, federal agents operating the land for the benefit of the Indians was upheld. More than \$1,000,000 already paid in taxes under protest now will be refunded.

Mexico Expelled Newspaper Men.

Washington.—Unofficial advices received at Washington tell of an order for the expulsion from Mexico by the Carranza government of Robert H. Murray, the representative of the committee on public information in Mexico City, who, in that capacity, has been in charge of the work conducted by the American government to offset German propaganda. At the same time, the unofficial advices say, one of the correspondents of the Associated Press in Mexico City, W. E. Weigand, was also ordered to leave
