The four saloons in Kerrville closed their doors at 10:30 Tuesday night under the Statewide prohibition law. They did a big business the last few days of their existence and it is said they sold out nearly all their goods. It is said at least one of their proprietors will open up a soft drink stand in the place used for a saloon and no doubt all the buildings will be utilized for some kind of business the output of which does not make men crazy and which doesn't demoralize the community. To the credit of all there seems to be a disposition to accept the result in a good spirit and to abide by the law. Let it be hoped that it shall be so.

## Sheriff Moore Arrests Deserter.

Sheriff T. Moore arrested a deserter here last Friday who had escaped from the guard house at Kelly Field two weeks before, and who was charged with the theft of the Oakland car he was driving. His name was Edward G. Schultz, but he gave his name here as J. S. Harrison, and wore the uniform of a first lieutenant. Mr. Moore took his prisoner to San Antonio Saturday and turned over to the authorities, and received the usual reward of \$50.

## Proclamation by County Judge

State of Texas, County of Kerr. Know All Men by These Presents:

Whereas, the President of the United States of America has designated June 28, A. D. 1918, to be National War Savings Day, and has authoritatively summoned every adult male and female to attend meetings to be held that day in their respective school districts and pledge to the United States Government the greatest amount they can save and invest in United States Government War Savings Stamps.

Therefore, I, Lee Wallace, Judge of the County of Kerr, State of Texas, do, at the request of the United States Treasury Department, call upon and direct all adult males and females resident or present in the County of Kerr on the said 28th day of June, A. D. 1918, to be in attendance upon such meetings to be held in the particular school districts in which they reside or may be present and solemnly pledge to the United States Government the greatest saving they can make this year and invest in United States Government War Savings Stamps.

Fail not in a punctual response to the authoritative Federal summons. By order of the United States Treasury Department such meetings shall be held at 2 o'clock of the afternoon of said June 28, A. D. 1918. Under instructions from the United States Treasury Department the duly accredited persons who shall hold such meetings for the Government shall cause an accurate roll to be kept of the persons present and those absent. The names of the absentee residents of any district shall be certified to the United States Treasury Department for official record and disposition.

I do most earnestly appeal to every resident of Kerr County to take cognizance of the bloodshed and loss of American life on the foreign battlefields and by their pledges to keep unswerving the fair name of Kerr County, showing to the United States Government, the other counties of Texas and to those men of this country who are now in the armed service of the United States Government and fighting for the retention of our liberties, that the citizens of Kerr County are loyal and steadfast here at home in the service of their country.

## Judge Dunbar's Qualifications.

Sheriff Moore will spend one day in each of the precincts for the convenience of the women who wish to register without coming to the county seat. The dates are as follows:

Center Point, Friday July 5.

Comfort, Saturday July 6.

Ingram, Monday, July 8.

## Mr. C. W. Howland.

C. W. Howland was born near Murfreesboro, Tenn., July 22, 1857, and died June 12, 1918 at his home in Center Point, Texas. He leaves a faithful wife and five fond children, two by his second wife and three by his widow. He had no children by his first wife whom he married in Tennessee and whom he brought to Texas for her health a few months later.

He became a member of the Baptist Church in early life and died in the fellowship of the Baptist Church at Center Point. He lived at Independence, Texas for about twenty years, but had been a resident of Center Point about thirteen years at the time of his death. For several years his Christian peace was marred by "an inconstancy" which in after life he "deeply deplored," saying a few months before he died, he repented it sorely and sincerely, and regretted it deeply; but rejoiced greatly in that God restored unto him the joy of his salvation early last April.

Mr. Howland was a man of uprightness. He was honest in all his dealings and generous beyond his means. As a husband and father he was especially kind, tender and indulgent. He fondly loved his wife and children who greatly deplore his death. He was a public spirited man and served for years in offices of trust in the communities where he lived. He was a successful business man, and he was recognized as one of the leading spirits in Center Point. The community will miss him sadly; while the church of which he and his family for the most part are members, will cherish his memory most kindly.

He was especially kind to people in trouble. His liberality was known in private, but not obstinately exhibited by him. Many little things were done and said by him to help to take care of those who were in need. Blessings will gather about his name as long as his benefactors shall live.

His family have the assurance that he has left for them a good name which is rather to be chosen than great riches.

**PROOF OF EARLIER THRIFT**

In San Antonio, Tex., a short time ago Governor Banger's address was a class of children in one of the public schools. He turned their heads and eyes to them and they were all looking at him with admiration. He was talking to them about the book and girls how the United States government was giving them an opportunity to save through the medium of war savings stamps.

"See," he said, holding up a card on which there were three stamps. "I have already saved 75 cents and you know and girls by saving your pennies and nickels can soon accumulate more than that."

The children's suggestion made a definite impression upon some of the children, particularly one little boy. This boy was named at the door until Governor Banger's name came out.

"See, governor," he said, "you must have saved a lot before you bought that automobile, didn't you? If you didn't, how could you get that big automobile?"

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### PALESTINE WINS CASE IN I. AND G. N. CONTEST

#### General Offices to Be Removed—Supreme Court Sustains Verdict of Texas Tribunals on All Phases.

Washington.—The general offices of the International & Great Northern railroad will be transferred from Houston to Palestine as a result of an opinion of the supreme court of the United States Monday affirming the judgment of the Texas state courts in the suit brought by Anderson County against the road. The suit grows out of an issue of bonds made by the county following a contract made by the Houston & Great Northern Company in 1872 with the citizens of Palestine to maintain its general offices, machine shops and roundhouses at that place. That year the road was consolidated with the International Railroad Company, under the name it bears today and the contract at issue was renewed in 1874. The general offices were transferred to Houston in 1911.

Following the receivership sale June 13, 1911, and under reorganization of the company, notice was given in court liquidating the office-shop agreement. In trial of the case the railroad denied the jurisdiction of the state courts, claiming that the forum was in the federal court, wherein the last foreclosure was obtained.

In sustaining the decree of the state court, the court here held that the action of foreclosure did not impair immunity into the purchaser of the property, but if it did, the court held, in the absence of action on the part of the federal court, it did not violate the state coast of power to dispose as to the existence of an alleged public duty on the part of the railroad within the jurisdiction of each state court. The foreclosure did not have the effect claimed for it.

The supreme court held that in the act of the legislature under which the contract between the company and the citizens of Anderson County was carried out, it was an implied contract, and the court said that the state's interest in the contract was not impaired by the fact that the state law created the contract. The court said the requirement of a public duty until the law was changed.

**TEXAS TAKES LEAD IN FOOD CONSERVATION.**

Texas again takes the lead in food conservation, and beginning April 15, every such home as is on record in the state may be inspected by the state food conservator, and if found to be in violation of the law, the conservator may issue a citation, and if the owner fails to comply with the citation, the conservator may issue a warrant for the arrest of the owner.

Three Aviators Killed at Moulton. Houston, Tex.—Three aviators were killed at Moulton, Tex., today. The aviators were from the United States Army Air Corps. They were flying a biplane over the town when it crashed into a building.

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### A Bird in the Hand

#### WHILE EGGS ARE PLENTIFUL SAVE FOR SCARCITY



For About Two Cents a Dozen Eggs Can Be Preserved in Water Glass Eight to Twelve Months.

### EGGS PRESERVED FOR WINTER USE

#### Either Water-Glass or Limewater May Be Used by Any Housewife.

#### TWO PLANS ARE DESCRIBED

#### Use Only Firm, Shelled, Fresh, Clean, and if Possible, Infertile Eggs—Cost Is Estimated at Two Cents Per Dozen.

While high prices for eggs last winter still fresh in your mind it is well to make a resolve to preserve some for the winter. There are two plans for the preservation of eggs for winter use. The first is the use of water glass, and the second is the use of limewater. Both plans are described in detail in the following article.

**WAYS TO PREVENT EGG LOSSES.**  
Here are five ways to prevent spoilage of eggs from both the great enemy of both female and infertile eggs.

1. Keep the nests clean, provide one nest for every two birds.

2. Gather the eggs twice daily.

3. Keep the eggs in a cool, dry room or cellar.

4. Mark the eggs at once to avoid confusion.

### TO TEST THE TEN MILE DRY ZONE LAW BY SUIT

#### Constitutionality of Law Attacked on Eight Grounds—Hearing Set by Appeals Court for April 24.

Austin, Tex.—A habeas corpus suit to test the constitutionality of the ten-mile zone law was filed in the court of criminal appeals Wednesday by attorneys of Fort Worth. The suit is the outgrowth of the arrests Tuesday of G. H. Hollingsworth, charged with selling a quart of whiskey inside the Fort Worth zone.

The court of criminal appeals granted a writ of habeas corpus for the defendant in the sum of \$3,000 and set the case for hearing April 24.

The constitutionality of the zone law was attacked on eight grounds as follows:

1. That it conflicts with section 20, article 16, which provides for local option elections.

2. That prior to the date of its enactment congress had legislated on the same subject, enacting a law making it a penal offense to sell or give liquors to soldiers.

3. That it is void and of no force because it is not a valid exercise of police power of the State.

4. That the title clause is defective and insufficient and conflicts with the body of the act.

5. That the act is void for the reason that the same contains more than one subject.

6. That it is void and of no effect because it contains more than one subject which is not expressed in its title.

7. That it is further void on the ground that it is vague, indefinite and uncertain in its application and operation and is wholly dependent upon the legislation, removal and shifting of army camps.

8. That it is void and of no effect for various other reasons manifested upon the face of the act.

Although Attorney General Loomis would not be heard, it is expected that the department will be represented at the hearing. It is regarded likely that Assistant Attorney General Hollingsworth, appointed by the governor to represent the state in cases in the court of criminal appeals, will take part in the case. It also is considered probable that the attorney general's department will be further represented.

**Blackburn for Ferguson.**

The editor of the Advance had a talk with representative M. E. Blackburn while he was in this city last week and undertook to get a positive statement from him as to his attitude upon the candidacy of Jas. E. Ferguson. Mr. Blackburn did not say that he would vote for Ferguson for Governor, but he said that he thought that no person had the right to demand how he was going to vote on that question. He said if Ferguson was elected that he would vote to seat him as governor. He said he voted against recommending impeachment proceedings in Ferguson's trial, that he witnessed the trial proceedings and that he now still believes that Ferguson was not legally or justly impeached. But, mind you, this statement comes from Mr. Blackburn after it is too late for an opponent to get his name on the ticket against him. His announcement contained no reference to this important question—which, by the way, is the most important question before the people of Texas today, next to winning the war. The real question we must settle is simply whether the law and constitution, honesty, integrity, morality, and free government, shall prevail or shall our fair State be humiliated, disgrac-

ed and misgoverned by again placing in power in this state a man who in his very principle is tyrannical, disloyal to public will, selfish and anarchistic. Mr. Blackburn is in favor of Jim Ferguson as against Mr. Hobby who stands for everything that is best for our people. Mr. Blackburn knows that Jim Ferguson was placed in power and kept in power by the liquor interests backed by the German-American Alliance; he knows that Ferguson today has the solid support of the liquor interests and will if placed back in the governor's office demand the repeal of all laws that have been passed under the Hobby administration curtailing the sale of liquor and giving suffrage to the women. He knows that it will result in a disrespect for law and order and popular government in that any man who holds office shall feel safe in prostituting the same to the extent of committing bribery, embezzlement or theft without fear of the penalty of the law or public opinion.

The fact that the time has passed to have printed on the ticket the name of a candidate in opposition to Mr. Blackburn does not prevent writing in the name of some one as his opponent, and as for the Advance editor, it shall be our pleasure to write the name of Judge H.C. Geddie of Kerrville and scratch Blackburn's name off the ballot.

The only reason Mr. Blackburn did not have opposition before the last day of filing the names was that myself and others felt that surely he would support the present administration by voting for Mr. Hobby. His support of the various reform measures passed at the late special session of the legislature justified such conclusion. But by his own statements, if we understand it, we now find that we are fooled in this as we were disappointed and fooled in Mr. Blackburn when he stood with Ferguson in the trial.

We cannot vote for Mr. Blackburn, and shall have to scratch his name, just as we shall scratch all others who are in any way support-

ing Mr. Ferguson. And there is not the slightest degree of personal malice, intended in this frank statement. The writer has "torn his shirt" to elect Judge Blackburn in the two last elections and would be glad to support him again but for the reasons above stated.

We call attention to the endorsement by the local bar of Judges Phillips and Greenwood for re-election as our Supreme Court Judges. The two men opposing them are running on Jim Ferguson's rule or ruin ticket. The Ferguson candidates were both elevated to their present positions as district judge by the appointive power of Ferguson while he was filling the governor's office. One is Judge Harvey of Houston and the other Judge Spann of Temple. Spann was once attorney for the Temple State Bank of which Ferguson was president. Harvey recently rendered an opinion declaring that Ferguson was not properly impeached. Both are being boosted by Ferguson with the hope of having a Supreme Court that will carry out his unholy purposes. But the people are onto his scheme. Like Jim Ferguson they will be buried under an avalanche of votes that will forever eliminate them from Texas politics.

Under the new prohibition law no liquor can be kept anywhere except in the private home or residence of a person who expects to use it, and he must not be guilty of distributing it out to others in a manner calculated to be termed an evasion of the law, or to the pen he goes. Liquor cannot be carried on a public road, or be kept in any public house, and the word "possess" means that it cannot be kept in a grip or in the pocket. So if any one gets a drink of intoxicating liquor anywhere except in his own private residence the law has been violated. A penitentiary sentence is the penalty for the violation of this law and if enforced it means sure enough prohibition.



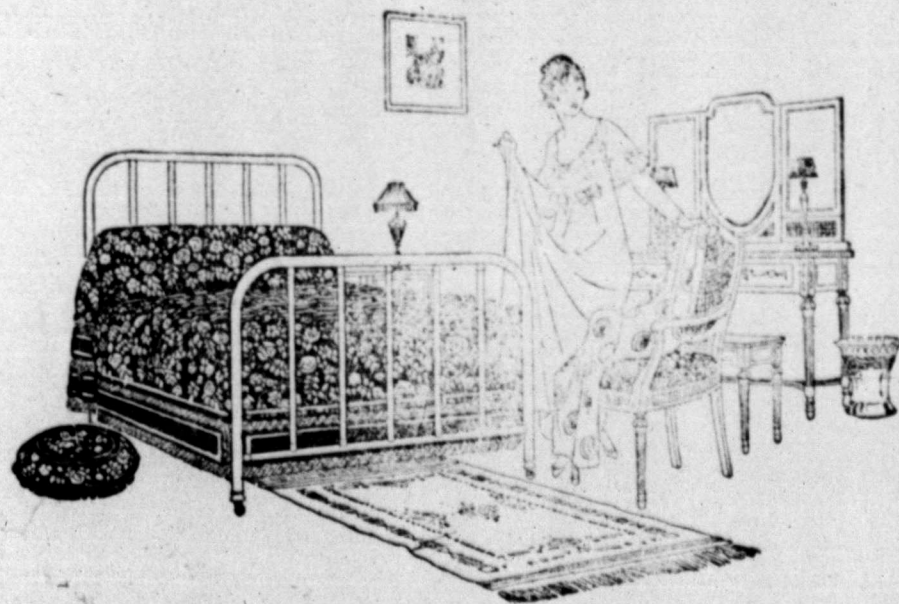

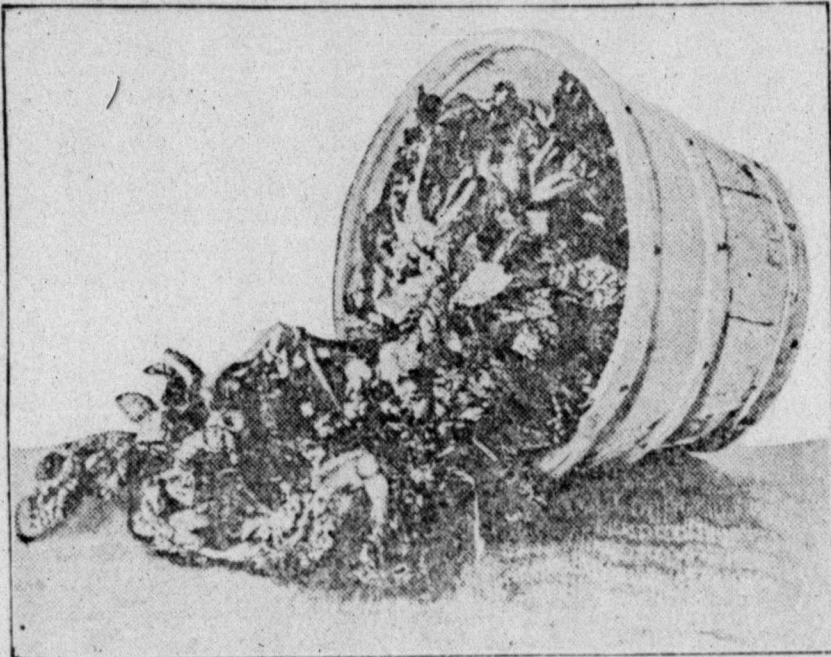

# The Housewife and the War

(Special Information Service, United States Department of Agriculture)  
SPRING GREENS—GOOD TO EAT, GOOD FOR BODY



It Takes Half a Bushel of Spinach to Make a Pint of Food, but That Pint Has Valuable Iron and Mineral Salts Which Human Bodies Need.

## GREENS GOOD TO MAKE RED BLOOD

Housewife Should Not Overlook Dandelion, Lamb's-Quarter or Wild Mustard.

### IRON NEEDED FOR THE BODY

Leaves of Various Vegetables Furnish Another Useful Substance Not Yet Named—Cream of Dandelion Soup Recipe.

It is springtime! Don't neglect to give your family some good old-fashioned greens. If you live in a large city, you may have to depend upon the greens which some country woman brings to market or upon spinach or kale, which can usually be bought even in winter. If you live in the country, perhaps your instinct has already told you that the tender green leaves of the dandelion, lamb's-quarter, wild mustard, or whatever variety of greens your locality affords are waiting for someone to gather them for food. People from primitive times to this have manifested a craving for green food as winter passes and springtime approaches. Probably this craving arises from a real need of our bodies for the materials which such foods furnish.

#### Iron is Essential.

What is the particular use of such foods to our bodies? All green leaves contain in combination with the green coloring matter more or less iron. If we are to have rich, red blood, we must furnish this iron to our bodies. Dandelion greens are one of the very best sources of iron, containing more than many other sorts of green leaves. If we serve greens with hard-boiled eggs for garnish, we have a dish very rich in iron, for the egg yolk contributes its share.

Besides the iron and other mineral salts, the leafy vegetables contain a very important substance which the body must have for normal growth and development. This substance, recently discovered and for which a name has not yet been given, is also found in butterfat and some other animal fats, but not in every food.

Greens have a place of real worth in the diet and should be used in every household not only in springtime but late into the summer and, when procurable, in the winter also. The tender beet tops, celery tops, radish tops, onion tops, and turnip tops should not be discarded, but served as greens. A little space in the garden devoted to spinach, New Zealand spinach, or French chard will supply the family with summer greens and also should afford some material for canning for use during the winter months.

Lettuce leaves, which are sometimes cooked for greens, and spinach, both being mild flavored and containing much water, require no water for cooking in addition to that which clings to the leaves from washing. Other stronger-flavored greens are usually cooked in a small amount of water. Greens should be cooked until tender, but not overcooked. A tiny bit of baking soda added to the water they are cooked in will help the greens to retain their color.

In the country where meat is cured at home, it used to be the custom to keep the bowl of the hog for the special purpose of cooking it with greens in the spring. If the bowl is not at hand, a small piece of salt pork or the rind from smoked bacon gives richness and flavor when cooked with greens.

Children should be encouraged to eat greens, as they especially need the iron and the growth-promoting substance which greens furnish. Sometimes they object to the slightly bitter taste which some greens have, but if made into milk soups, the flavor is diluted so that it is not noticeable.

Such soups make a desirable lunch or supper dish for the entire family.

**Cream of Dandelion Soup.**  
1 quart milk (skim or 2 tablespoons fat skimmed)  
2 tablespoons flour  
1 cupful dandelion leaves that have been thoroughly washed.  
Stir flour into melted fat and mix with cold milk. Put the thoroughly washed dandelion leaves through a sieve or chop them fine and add to the milk. Stir until thickened.

**Rice a La South Carolina.**  
No food, regardless of its merits, will appeal to the consumer unless it can be made into an attractive dish. In this country rice usually comes to the table as an unwhiting, glutinous mass, except in certain sections of the Southern states, where it is served with each grain distinct and separate, making a very tempting and appetizing dish. A platter heaped with loose, flaky kernels of rice is not only pleasing to the eye, but satisfying to the appetite. It is very probable that the attractive appearance of this dish on the South Carolina table has had much to do with the popularity and usefulness of rice in that state.

In seeking information to the art of cooking rice, no mistake is made in referring to South Carolina, where the true value of this cereal has been presented for over two centuries. A Carolina housewife would advise the sipping of one pint of rice, after thorough washing, which she considers important, "to a quart and a pint of water," and a teaspoonful of common salt. "This is to be boiled over a quick fire for ten minutes, stirring occasionally. Then pour off all or nearly all the water; cover the vessel and put over a very slow fire, and allow it to steam for 15 minutes at least, stirring occasionally. The rice will be soft or grainy, according to the quantity of water left on it when put to steam, and the length of time allowed in the steaming. The larger the quantity of water and the shorter the steaming, the softer will be the rice."

Of course, other methods are used in boiling rice or at least modifications of the recipe given, but it must be remembered that the results should not be a glutinous mass and that success depends upon the proper amount of water used and the length of time in steaming.

#### Protect Food in Lunches.

The precautions which must be taken to keep lunches clean and safe differ with circumstances. In dusty seasons they should be wrapped particularly well. In hot weather the use of soft, moist foods in which molds and bacteria are most likely to grow rapidly should be avoided. Although chopped meat moistened with a dressing of some kind makes a good sandwich filling, such foods are less desirable in hot weather than slices of meat, peanut butter, or other foods less liable to spoil.

#### USE A LITTLE VINEGAR IN CLEANING GREENS

All greens must be picked over carefully and carefully washed. This is sometimes a long process, for a large quantity is required to make a dish of the cooked greens. It takes about a half bushel of spinach to make a little more than a pint when cooked. A half cupful of vinegar in the water in which the greens are allowed to stand before washing is of advantage as it kills the small insects that are sometimes hard to distinguish from the leaves themselves.

When buying cooking utensils choose those with round corners instead of square, whenever possible. They are easier to keep clean.

Aprons made of crossbar pattern can be easily mended without the patch showing.

## WOMEN MUST HELP RAISE WAR FUNDS

Lovers of Home and Country Called to the Colors.

### ALL CAN BUY LIBERTY BONDS

Wives, Sisters, Mothers, Sweethearts Never Before Called Upon to Play Such a Vastly Important Part—Lend Your Money.

(By DOROTHY DIX.)

Buy a Liberty bond, ladies. No matter how many you have bought before, stretch a point and buy another. You can't shoulder a gun and go off and fight for your country, as the men are doing. You can't put on a nurse's uniform and go and nurse wounded soldiers or drive an ambulance or work in a munition factory, as many other women are doing, but you can do your bit by backing up these other men and women, who are risking their lives to defend you with your money.

Without guns and munitions, without food and clothes, without hospital supplies, the army in France is just so many sheep led to the slaughter; if we let them die for the lack of the things that money buys, their blood is on our heads, and our crime against them will be blacker than the Hockes, because they trusted us.

It takes money, money, money and yet more money to carry on war, and this war is to be the war of the biggest pocketbook. It is the last ton of bonds, the last load of shrapnel, and the last big gun that will thunder out "Victory." Therefore, if we want to win this war, we must find more money, and it is particularly up to us women, who can fight with our hands to our throats, and our feet to our heels, and our eyes to our hair, and our hearts to our souls, to do our share.

#### Women's Greatest Sacrifices.

No war in all history have women been called upon to play such a tremendous part as in this war. Never before have women had to give so many of their husbands and sons and brothers to be cannon fodder. Never have women before gone into the trenches and fought side by side with men. Never have they gone into factories to make munitions of war with their own hands. Never have they had to take upon their shoulders the heavy burdens of hard physical labor that men laid down when they went forth to battle. And never before did their country call on women to make such sacrifices as they are called on to make now.

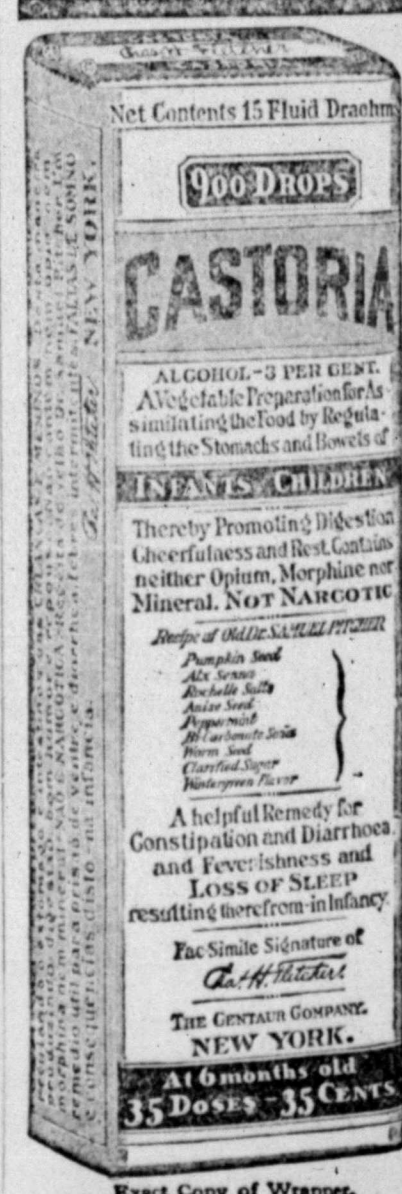

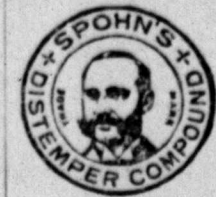
