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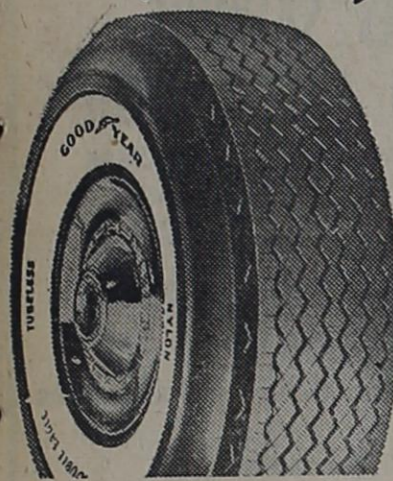

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# Invents Scalloped Disc Sharpener

"You can't do that. Scalloped discs cannot be sharpened. You buy brand new discs for what it will cost to have them sharpened."

But—it can be done, and it is being done by a man with a custom disc roller, who has rigged an attachment to a portable disc roller that does the trick.

The man behind the machine, the inventor is T. C. Sharp of Friona.

Sharp last week began rolling scalloped discs. It had been a little less than a year since he started rolling discs for Parmer County farmers.

"I'd been thinking about how the machine could be arranged to roll scalloped discs since then, and my partner, Ben Short, and I had talked about it a lot. Short did a lot toward inventing the new adaption of the disc roller, too," Sharp says.

The machine which Sharp uses is a patented invention, made by C. S. Bass of Plainview about seven years ago. Sharp has one of the two machines that was built.

Sharp's attachment holds the discs away from the rollers, to keep the gouged out section of the scalloped discs from hanging in the rollers. This has been the problem in rolling the

scalloped discs, Sharp says. Farmers find the main use for scalloped discs in stubble and stalks, and get better cutting action than the regular discs. But use of scalloped discs has been hindered because a method to sharpen them economically had not been found, Sharp explains.

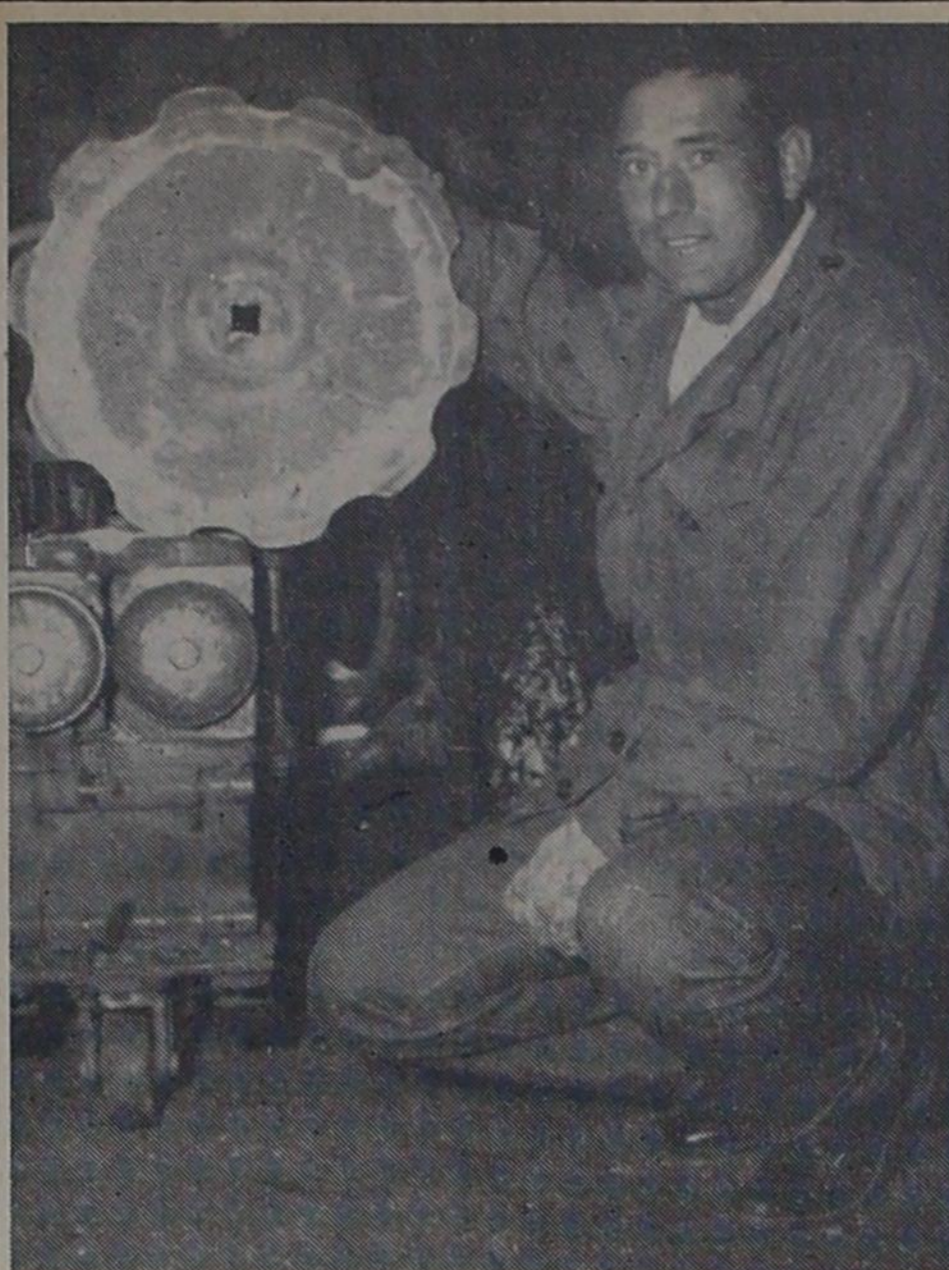
Sharp says his method will make it possible for farmers to have scalloped discs sharpened for about one-fifth of the cost of cheaper brands of discs. It should be the go-ahead signal for the use of scalloped discs to become more widespread, he says.

As an example of the value of his method, Sharp cites the following case:

A farmer was pulling a scalloped tandem disc, but not getting good cutting. Sharp offered to sharpen the discs, and did. When the farmer tried to pull the implement after the sharpening, the tractor would not pull it because of deeper cutting.

Sharp doesn't plan to apply for a patent. The machine's patent will likely keep competitive operators away from it, he says.

However, other portable disc rollers are operated by hydraulic pressure. Sharp's machine applies pressure to the edge of the disc mechanically. He does not believe that the attachment would work on the hydraulic machines.

After farmers have been hearing so long that scalloped discs cannot be sharpened, they'll probably doubt that it can be done.

### CLOTHING CARE

Clean, well-cared-for clothing can do much to give the wearer a good start on the day's activities. A sense of good grooming adds an extra note of confidence. Extension clothing specialists point out that certain practices involved in keeping garments looking their best also pay off with longer wear and less strain on the budget.

Take storage, for instance. Crowding is always bad for clothing. It not only destroys the effects of pressing but often actually cuts down on wearability. A good brushing and frequent airing will do a lot to freshen up clothes and keep them more wearable.

Prompt attention to spot removal and simple repairs will also prolong the life of clothing articles. Quick attention often avoids the need of sending garments to the cleaners.

Touch 'up pressing done at home between regular cleaning can also help to save on cleaning bills. The best way to save clothes is to give them the daily care needed to keep them clean as long as possible and hold them in shape so they won't need to go to the cleaners so often.

Careful buymanship, adequate storage facilities and special care in handling and wearing will keep your clothing budget at a minimum. At the same time you will be rewarded with greater clothing satisfaction.

Facts About Clothing Care, a new bulletin just out, written by extension clothing specialist, tells how to do the daily job as well as the seasonal job of caring for your family's clothing.

### BETTER FAMILY HEALTH

What's the status of health in your family? Could it be improved in 1958? Mrs. Eloise Johnson, extension family life specialist, suggests a check that is certain to add to better family health.

Here are the seven important factors: good nutrition, sanitation, regular health examinations, immunization, exercise, rest and recreation, an adequate home health center, and a means of achieving the state of radiant health which is the result of complete physical, social and mental well being.

An accepted guide for good nutrition is the Texas Food Standard. Mrs. Johnson points out that family attitudes toward food and the enjoyment of meal time are just as important as the kind and amount of food eaten.

Sanitation includes a healthful water supply, safe sewage and garbage disposal, cleanliness around the barn and home, as well as clean milk free from bacteria.

Regular health examinations for mother and father as well as for the children are one of the most important steps in improving family health. Your family physician can advise about immunization against contagious and infectious diseases.

Exercise, rest, and recreation is a fifth step. The important thing, Mrs. Johnson says, is to build toward a family attitude which considers rest and recreation as essential to good health and not a waste of time or evidence of laziness.

The sixth step is the maintenance of an adequate home health center. Every family should have supplies, equipment and medicine for the minor illnesses and emergencies that must be cared for at home.

Many physical and mental ailments are rooted in worry, fear, and concern. The seventh step

toward achieving a state of radiant health involves "talking out" problems as a family to give assurance and a sense of security to each family member.

**Of School Age Children**

The school census is being taken during the month of January this year. All children who are six years old on or before Sept. 1, 1958, but will not be 18 or older on or before that same date should be counted in this census. It is very important that all children six to 18 years be counted in the census. The child should be counted even though he may not be in school and even though he or she may be married.

If you, as a parent, have not been contacted to fill out a school census blank you are being overlooked and should do one of the following:

1. Phone the school office and ask for a census blank.
2. Call in person at the school tax office and get a census blank and fill it out.

Remember, if your child will be six years old next Sept. 1st he should be counted in the census now, even though he is not in school now. If he is six but not 18 or older on next Sept. 1st he should be counted now. All children from six to 18 should be counted. The six-years-old who start next September to school are the ones most often overlooked in the census. Failure to count them costs the school and taxpayers extra money. Please help us not to overlook anyone.
