

Mills points out, however, that farmers will not be left "out in the cold" with their moist corn, but will have what amounts to an option. They only one-half cent a bushel.

That will contract the government to take the corn at the loan price as late as April follows: 30. The farmer will then have time to dry, shell, and deliver his grain and obtain a price support for it, Mills says.

The deadline for obtaining these purchase agreements is the same as for the loan-the 31st of this month. Special legislative action



# Windbreak Protects, Beautifies Home

Early in the year is the time to start planning improvements and beautifying farm and home surroundings. One project that pays off in the two respects is establishing a windbreak. Cooperating with the Soil


Conservation Service and the Texas Forestry Service, County Agent Joe Jones offers two plans for obtaining the trees and advice and assistance in setting them out and caring for

Application blanks for trees from the Texas Forestry Service are available in the agents' office. Four varieties are offered-red cedar, ponderosa pine, Austrian pine, and Chinese elm, selling for \$3 per 100. Deadline for applying for them is March 1. Applications may be picked up in the county extension office or requested from that office by mail.

Orders are being taken at the Soil Conservation Service office or by Steve Messenger in Friona for potted red cedar or Arizona cypress seedlings which will be delivered around June 1. Obtained through a Friona nursery, the seedlings will cost 30 cents each.

Trees ordered under the first plan will be approximately one foot high and will be about a year ahead of the seedlings, says Jones. He added, however, that the seedlings will have a to a height of 35 to 40 feet over a farm home as well as prohigher livability.

The above encouragement is intended for on-the-farm consumption only, mind you. When it comes to selling on a cash market, you are back in the thick of the specialization battle. We are working in cooperation with County Agent Joe Jones on a series of stories we hope to introduce in the near future. These will deal with new possibilities in specializing farming,

For example, the new Texas Egg Law, which is just about to go into effect, will markedly improve the prospects for producers of high quality eggs. This state has long suffered under cluttered statutes in this regard, and top-quality egg producers have often been hurt because of lack of reasonable safeguards.

There will be other stories. too. Watch for them.





# To Parents Of School Age Children

The school census is being taken during the month of January this year. All children who are six years old on or before Sept. 1, 1958, but will not be 18 or older on or before that same date should be counted in this census. It is very important that all children six to 18 years be counted in the census. The child should be counted even though he may not be in school and even though he or she may be

married. If you, as a parent, have not been contacted to fill out a school census blank you are being overlooked and should do one of the following:

1. Phone the school office and ask for a census blank.

2. Call in person at the school tax office and get a census blank and fill it out.

Remember, if your child will be six years old next Sept. 1st he should be counted in the census now, even though he is not in school now. If he is six but not 18 or older on next Sept. 1st he should be counted now. All children from six to 18 should be counted. The six-yearsold who start next September to school are the ones most often overlooked in the census. Failure to count them costs the school and taxpayers extra money. Please help us not to overlook anyone.
