



TOLD IN MESSAGE From Suffering by Getting MESSAGE OF HOPE FOR GREAT ACHIEVEMENTS DELIVERED TO MEMBERS OF LEGISLATURE.

RECONSTRUCTION BIG TASK

The Governor Said: "There is Scarce ly a Limit to Ability of Texas and Yourselves to Participate in the Glorious Reconstruction."

Austin, Tex.-Governor W. P. Hobby in his message to the legislature Friday recited the condition of the state, recommended certain legislation and referred to finances. The Thirty-fifth legislature was in second called session when he assumed the duties as acting governor August 25, 1917. He became constitutional governor September 25, 1917, and was elected govmor at the recent general election.

> Paris .- The peace congress, destined to be historic and on which the eyes of the world are now centered, was opened Saturday in the great Salle de a Paix. The proceedings, which were confined to the election of Georges Clemenceau, the French premier, as permanent chairman of the confernce, an address of welcome by the president of the French republic, Raymond Poincare, and speeches by President Wilson, Premier Lloyd George and Baron Sonnino, were characterzed by expressions of lasting friendship and the apparent determination of the representatives of the various nations to come to an amicable understanding with respect to the problems to be decided by the conference.

When President Poincare spoke the entire assembly stood, and the fact that, according to custom, no applause greeted his utterances, gave greater solemnity to the scene.

M. Clemenceau's acceptance of the presidency of the congress was both a feeling expression of personal gratitude and a definite outline of the great questions immediately ahead. Three of these larger general subjects he deined as responsibility for the war, reponsibility for crimes during the war, and international labor legislation.



Owners of automobiles or motor vehicles of any kind must get a new license to operate them-that is, for the year 1919. The license seals are handed out this year from the county collector in the court house, and already a number have been issued and are beginning to appear on the cars. Buyers of new motor vehicles can also get their numbers from the tax collector. The local officers will be lenient, of course, as they have been in the past, but inasmuch as the seals are available here now, there is no excuse for any vehicle to be operated long in the new year without a seal. Heretofore, or at least until the middle of last year, it was necessary to send the license money to the Highway Commission at Austin and often much trouble was experienced in getting back the seal and numbers. Increase in American Hogs Will Help to Meet World Fat Shortage.

FARMERS SAVE SITUATION. Government Justified in Stimulation

of Pork Production-Sevenfold Increase Over Pre-War Exports.

Through increased production and conservation we will be able this year to export seven times our pre-war average exports of pork products. With the heavy demands added in caring for the millions who have been freed from German oppression, the Department of Agriculture and the Food Administration are justified today in our every action of stimulation of hog production. 
The contribution made by the producers of this country to the war program as applying particularly to animal food products is illustrated by the following: Reports compiled by the U. S. De-

partment of Agriculture indicate an Increase in cattle of 10,238,000 head and 12,441,000 hogs. These figures were compiled to January 1 last. In this period there was a decrease in sheep of \$19,000 head. The indications are that this decrease will show an increase, according to recent reports.

Since January 1 unofficial information indicates an increase in hogs of not less than 8 per cent, and not more than 15 per cent, as compared with one year ago, with an increase in the average weight. Following the request of the U. S.

Food Administration for an increase in hog production for marketing in the fall of 1918 and the spring of 1919 the increase may yield not less than 1,600,-000,000 pounds more of pork products than were available last year. Without this increase the shipping program arranged by Mr. Hoover regarding animal food products would have been impossible.
