Enemy of the Boll Weevil.

He says was committed on the gallery of in pursuit of McDonald. that these little flying bugs, which have a very sharp nose, go, into the cotton squares and deposit their larva on the boll weevil larva, and that they propagate faster than the boll weevil, and when they hatch out a worm it subsists on the boll weevil larva. That after they have fully developed the worm webs up in the cotton square and develops into another fly, and that the time required for them to reach perfection is only eleven days. He thinks that inasmuch as they develop so much faster than the boll weevil and are so much more active, that they will eventually destroy the boll weevil. Some of the advanced the theory that the solution of the problem was to find some natural enemy of the boll weevil and Mr. Lipscomb has made the discovery, he believes. He suggests that when the farmers pick up their dead squares that have been punctured by the boll weevils that they be saved in a box covered over, so that the fly can develop and get out, as it will do much sooner than the boll weevil, even if all the boll weevils have not been destroyed in their embryostate. He brought quite a number. of these flies to town with him and was showing them to some of the cotton planters. He says that they are getting so plentiful in the cotton fields now that anybody can find them with very little trouble with since May.





I consider it my duty that you should punish me instead of those who accept my teachings, and I beg you to mitigate your severity." The authorities have decided, according to Vienna dispatches, to take no action against Count Tolstoi.
