





No More Corporal Punishments.

General Andre, the French minister of war, has issued a regulation forbidding all corporal punishment in the French army. The new regulations are aimed particularly at the companies that garrison African posts. These are composed chiefly of soldiers who have been sentenced in ordinary criminal courts before their enlistment. The cruelties practiced by subofficers in these regiments is all but beyond comprehension, and it is no uncommon case to have death result from them. One of the favorite modes of punishment is to smear the offender with fat and then expose him to the mosquitoes.

A Bear Story.

An extraordinay but well auther ticated story of a bear's freak comes from the village of Saretschye in the district of Gdoff, Russia. The village lies on the fringe of a forest, whence it is of frequent occurrence for bears to make prowling excursions both by day and night into the adjacent settlements. Some ten days ago two young girls, aged respectively 5 and 12, were surprised by a huge bear at a short distance from the village. The animal seized and carried off the younger child, while the elder, terror-stricken, fled home and gave the not unusual alarm. Towards sundown, three days later, the bear and her booty were discovered in a dense thicket. The child was perfectly unharmed and reclining in a deep mossy couch made for her by the bear. Although naturally delighted to be released from her strange guardianship, the little girl had subsisted fairly well on the nuts and other forest fruits brought to her laager by the bear.

A Progressive Shah.

Since ascending the throne vacated by the assassination of his predecessor, six years ago, Nassred Din, the Shah of Persia, has shown himself to be a man of progressive ideas. He has greatly reduced taxation, organized a postal customs service, built a university and several schools, equipped telegraph lines, and has made it possible for his subjects to obtain justice in the courts. He shows no taint of cruelty which so often characterizes Oriental rulers, and altogether has won from his people a measure of personal loyalty and affection never accorded to any of his predecessors on the throne.
