Regarding Transfer of School Chi dren Is Soon Effective.

Austin, Tex., July 6.-Prof. R B. Cousins, State superintendent of education, today sent the following circular to county · superintendents:

Dear Sir: Your attention is hereby called to the following provisions of the new school laws, which become effective July 14.

"Any child lawfully enrolled in any district or independent district may be transferred to the enrollment of any other district or independent district in the same county upon the written application of the parent or guardian or person having the lawful control of such child, filed with the county superintendent, at any time before the apportionment of the school fund by the county S. "The county board of examiners of each shall, if necessary, hold public instruction, and shall consuperindent and State superintendent of public instruction.

No county examination will be held in July this year for the reason that the low does not become effective until July 14, 1905.

Teachers and trustees desiring copies of the school laws should apply to their county superintendent for them after August

A fear of Blood.

The number killed and wounded in war during 1904 greatly exceds that of 1903 by reason of the sanguinary contest between Ja-pan and Russia. The total loss for the year (not counting the casualties at Mukden) is about 400,000, as compared with 86,000 | in 1903, 25,000 in 1902 and 3,000 in 1901. The total losses in the Russo-Japanese war have not been officially stated, but from most reliable unofficial accounts up to March I, amount to at least 370,000. Other losses have been as follows: Armenia, including nassacres, 7,864; Tibet, 6,492; Philippines, 3,239; Sumatra, 2,-379; Africa, 3,714; Uruguay, 2,-035; Macedonia, 820; San Domingo, 240; Bulgaria, 239; Morocco, 50; Arabia, 40. ·




