AFTER PUBLIC LANDS.

Believed to Mean End of Big Ranches.

Austin, Tex., July 18 .- There shipments from the ranches. promises to be a lively bidding for the State lands which are to be placed upon the market on September 1. Thousands of letters of inquiry concerning these lands and the method to be followed in purchasing them have reached J. J Terrell, State Land Commissioner, during the past foor weeks. The inquiries come from people from every part of the United States. The 6 million acres which are to be sold should provide homes for several theusand families. Many Texas people will compete for these western tracts. While the minimum price is \$1 per acre, it is said that much of the land will be onsiderably more than that price

Six million acres is a large area, although it does seem so large when compared with the big dimension of Texas. The state of Delaware has an area of only 1 million 200 thousand miles The land which Texas is to sell on September 1, is therefore i times as large as Delaware. It is twice as large as Connecticut, and is larger than Massachusetts, New Hampshire and New Jersey

RAILROADS AFTER FARMERS.

The disposing of the 6 million acres to actual settlers will be an other step toward the effacement of the big cattle ranches in Texas. There are many stockmen who will be anable to carry their business after the expiration of leases of the land in question. Some of them are seeking new locations in Mexico; others are going to Ari zona and New Mexico. The day of big ranches in Texas is over. The rrigationist and the stock farmer are taking their place with a mediately. rapidity that must be really alarming to the old time cow man.

. shocked Aristocracy.

Mrs Flora Annie Steel, the Anglo-acian novelist,, must have rather shocked her London audience the other day when she urged that the children should be taught to do things for themselves. "It would not hurt those of the upper class to do half an hour's scrubbing or blacking boots," she said; "it -would give as much healthful exercise as calisthenics, and would give them a pride in doing for themselves and waiting upon others." It is a caste matter in England; however sorry a kindly soul may feel for an overworked slavery, self-respect forbids menial work. There are things one may do and things one may not do, and there is noth ing more said.

Artificial Silk.

A wearable silk fabric made from gelatine solution is manufactured in Glasgow with undoubted success, It can be dyed any color and takes all the shades with a brillian; luster that rigals even that of natural silk. The fiber is prepared by ejecting fine threads of a strong solution of gelatine from a very small orifice on to an endless band conveying them to bobbins, on which they are recled. After leaving the small orifice the gelatine solidines in a continuous fiber, a thousandth of inch in diameter, possessing a luster even greater than that of a natural silk. The fiber in this state, how ever, is unsuitable for use, as it is easily spoiled by water. In order to render it impervious it is waterproofed by a special process.

Intersting Judicial Tangle.

The ten-hour law for bakers in New York state had an interesting judicial experience. It was pronounced constitutional by the state court of appeals by a vote of four to three; then the United States supreme court pronounced it unconstitutional by a vote of five to four. Combining the two courts, it will be found that sixteen judges passed upon the law. and that of the sixteen there were eight for the law and eight against it. The law is now null and void, because there is no appeal from the accision last handed down.

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
