Brownsville Tragedy.

Brownsville, Tex. July 31 .- This morning at 1:30 o'clock two pistol shots rang out in the vicinity of the county jail. Investigation showed the dead body of Corporal Thorp of Company K, Fort Brown, lying in the street. A few teet away lay a woman named Librada. who was walking down the street with the Librada woman and two other female companions, was wounded in the leg by the same bullet that entered the breast of the wounded woman. The soldier then placed the muzzle of the gun in his own mouth and fire, the bullet penetrating the brain and lodging beneath the scalp on top of the head. death was instant aneous. Corporal Thorp enlisted in Chicago where his people reside. He was about 24 years old. The remains are at a local undertaking establishment awaiting instructions from his relatives. If no instructions are received the body will be laid to rest in the National Cemetery.

Young White Man Shot by Negro Dies of Wound.

San Antonio, Tex., July 31.-L partment of the Southern Pacific,

refused to surrender to Deputy Sheriff Nipper, who was alone. Police headquarters were notified and two officers were sent to the scene. Mays then surrendered to the three officers. He still held the crowd off with the revolver. When he surrendered to the officers he asked them to protect him or give him the privilege of protecting himself. The officers did not go near the office with the prisoner, but left the yards by another route. On the way to police headquarters Mays said Woods had provoked him to do what he had done. Further than this he made no statement.+

The negro was seen at the jail after Woods' death. He was guarded in his statements. He said that Woods had bothered him for three day and he had appealed to the young man's superiors to protect him from being constantly annoyed. He would not say in what manner Woods had provoked the shooting.

Donegan and Ward say the shooting was absolutely without provocation; that the men in the office were merely having some fun at the expense of fellow workmen as they came in. When informed that Woods was dead the negro was perturbed. He sat with his head in his hands and batted his eyes nervously, but refused to answer questions.

"I will ask you to see me at another time," he said. Then he asked: "You wouldn't tell me this unless you meant it?". He was assured by the jailer that Woods was dead. Then he bent his bead in his hands and became persistently silent. He would not admit that he shot Woods, but repeated his statement that Woods had tantalized him for three days. Mays is about 35 years old, of slight build and ginger-cake color. When asked the question if he was a full blooded African he said that he was not. "Won't it do if I make my statement at another time?" he asked. "I was provoked until I had to do what I did. Any other man would have done the same." An affidavit was first made charging Mays with assault to murder. This was changed to a charge of murder.
