Tom Bell, Well Known Sheriff, Dies in Fort Worth. Fort Worth, Tex., Dec. 17.

Former Sheriff Tom Bell, of Hill county, died in this city Saturday night and the body was taken to Hillsboro last night where interment will take place as soon as his children arrive.

Tom Bell was one of the best known peace officers in the country and as a sheriff he had a State and National reputation. For 12 years he was sheriff of Hill county, and no man stood higher in the estimation of the people among whom he lived. He was always an active partisan in political affairs, and his political strength was so well known that it had to be asked how Sheriff Bell was, and that gave the answer as to Hill county where he lived, because his fellow citizeus the lands being donated to the latand followed his lead on many building of its line. men and many measures. Origin of American Eagle.

In a device for an armorial achievement for the great seal of the United States, the American eagle was offered in 1782 by Wil liam Barton, of Philadelphia. It was a very complicated design. one of the elements being an eagle displayed on the summit of a Doric column, and is thus explained : "The eagle displayed is the symbol of supreme power and authority, and signifies the congress; the pillar upon which i rests is used as the hieroglyph of fortitude and can there: the eagle being placed on the summi of the column is emblematical o the sovereignty of the govern ment of the United States." In an alternative design Barton rel egated the eagle to the crest, dis played and holding in his dexter taion a sword having a wreath o laurel suspended from the point and in the sinister the ensign o the United States. Neither of these designs satisfying the comwrittee which had the matter in charge, another submitted by Charles Thomson, the secretary if the congress. . In this design the shield is born on the breast * of an American eagle, on the wing and rising proper; in the dexter talon of the eagle an oliv branch, and in the sinister a bun--dle of arrows; a nota bene con eys the information that the head if the American eagle are white the body and wings of a lead on dove color. erted it into an ornamental garlen, with trees, flowers, founains, etc., and in the center a sort of temple for the musicians. This vas the original Niblo's summer garden. On July 4, 1827, the Sans souoci theater was opened by Tharles Gilbert in this garden and year later it became Niblo's garen theater.




