

J. R. Saunders, Missionary for Baptist Church, Tells of Conditions in the Celestial Empire.

Paris, Texas, Feb. 20.-J. R ustiss, of this city, is in receipt of letter from J. R. Saunders, a young Baptist missionary in China, who went there from this county. Mr. Saunders was stationed at Ying Tak mission, which is the nearest Presbyterian mission to Lien Chow, where five missionaries were murdered in December by a Chinese mob.

Since then all the missionaries ave gone to Canton on advice of he American Consul until the hreatened trouble subsides. While Mr. Saunders' wife and baby are still in Canton, he writes that he returned to the field alone and made hasty tour in which he met with great success, baptising 72 on the rip.

"One man was almost paralyzed and had to be carried twenty-five / miles to be baptised."

While on the tour, he writes, he was robbed on a small river boat. He was trying to return to Canton and was traveling late at night ou the boat when a large number of robbers descended on the vessel and overpowered the crew and passengers, who were relieved of ev-Tything.

Mr. Saunders was stripped of his dothing, his hat and money, and even his Bible He purchased some Chinese clothes and continued his tour in that garb. He says that thieves are numerous in China.

The Industrial Precious Metal.

The world's total supply of platinum during the year 1904 was, according to the Electrical World, about 13.860 pounds, 13.- iter 200 pounds of which came from Russia. The United States produced 200 ounces, valued at \$4,-160. All of this came from California and Oregon, the Wyoming mine having suspended operations. The price of platinum increased to per cent during the year. According to Dr. David T. Day, of the United States geological survey, the outlook for an increased production during 1906 is good. The present price of platinum-\$20.50 an ounce-is the highest which this metal has reached in recent years,
