## GEORGE BOWLES

TALKS ABOUT CHILDREN AND THE  
DUTIES OF PARENTS.

I do not think the Bowles family ever figured in any contest, either County, State or National, for laurels on account of numerical strength. The family from which I came could boast only thirteen children, and my own brood is not yet so large but what one or two more small ones could get into the yard, but I have a rather large yard. Anyway what with personal experience with my own and observation of other people's children, the fact that I am getting a little childish myself, I am going to take chances in talking a little bit about them.

In the first place I shall lay down the incontrovertible proposition that there is something morally and mentally wrong with the man or woman who does not love children. The man and woman who are childless from choice have committed a crime against God, nature and the government. They who are childless from affliction have the heaviest burden of sorrow that can be imposed, whether they know it or not.

The future of the world depends upon the children of today, but the capability of those children when they shall have reached man's estate depends upon the parents of today. We can find no more reliable authority upon this matter than Holy Writ. "The sins of the father shall be visited upon the children to the third and fourth generation." A wise writer of profane literature says, "a curse will be on the parents who corrupt the morals of their children." Now, the average parent would be up in arms at the mere insinuation that they had in any way corrupted the morals of their children. Well, let us see about that. Do you think that in order to corrupt your child's morals you would have to teach him to lie, steal, gamble, swear and get drunk? Not a bit of it, but in order that his morals be not corrupted, you must teach him that it is morally wrong to do these things, and you must teach him more. You can corrupt the morals of your child by lack of confidence in him, and by showing that you believe him to be both a liar and a thief unless he can prove himself guiltless. You can corrupt his morals by precept and example, of course, but there are few parents so depraved as to do it, and I do not expect that one of that class will read this. The

greatest harm done to the morals of children is done by their parents. The greater part of it is done before the child is ten years old. Much of it is done because parents do not think—which is a high crime in itself; people ought to think. If this great government of ours entrusted you with a few pitiful, paltry thousands of dollars, you would think a lot about giving a clean account of your stewardship, because it is your intention to be honest and you think you are, yet you are careless about the future moral conduct of your child which is worth more, alone, than all the treasure of the world, just for the time he lives in the world, leaving the welfare of his immortal soul entirely out of the question.

Mothers begin teaching their children to lie before they are a year old. Now who wants to fight? Is not deception lying? Who says no? Just a wee little bit of a story, that don't count, why, it made baby laugh. Ah! yes, thirty years ago I lived in a country where a wee little downy looking seed fell from some where, no one knew where, perhaps from an eagle's wing in his flight, but it fell and looked harmless. It sprouted and a plant grew and it had beautiful blooms, its seed matured and a million speaks of down blew about over the country and sprouted and bloomed and billions of seeds were the result until some of the finest farms in the middle west were almost ruined with the "Canada thistle," and it took years of unremitting toil to eradicate it. You don't know what the result of seeds will be sown upon the fertile soil of the childish heart and brain.

Fathers commit the worst offense along this line in refusing to believe that a child has reasoning power before he is fifteen years old. I am convinced that children begin reasoning before they learn to talk and if the average parent would sit down and talk to an erring child and treat him like an intelligent being and try to merit the love and respect that nature gives children for their parents, instead of grabbing a strap and angrily trying to beat morality into them when they have never been told what it was, more than half of all the childish errors could be eradicated and the result of their wrong doing be turned to their benefit.

Threatening children is a crime that nobody but a coward was ever guilty of. There are a multitude of ways of corrupting your child's morals that people practice every day and "don't think." But there is room to say more on this subject than could be contained in the largest volume in the world and yet the theme would not be freely discussed. So far, I have dwelt upon cold blooded, undeniable, ethical facts, but there is a side of the question so poignantly sentimental that it must appeal to every human heart. Those people who do not believe in cold theories have but to look about them and read in flaming letters of sensationalism, the truth of all that I have written. Ask this father whose hair is prematurely white on account of the misdeeds of a son whom he neglected in childhood in order to look after his cattle, hogs, sheep and crops. He didn't have time to attend to the morals of his son. Ask that broken-hearted mother whose soul is in torment, while her body yet

lives, on account of the misdeeds of her daughter, whose morals were ruined by the little seeds of deception sown when the girl was a toddling infant. Men may lecture and preach to correct the morals of the men and women of the world, but the one who performs the greatest duty to the world is he who stands in high places and calls out to the parents in thunder tones that reverbrate through the innermost recesses of the earth, "God has given you the stewardship of the world in the training of your children, be mindful of your charge."

Another great misfortune is that people do not love their children as they should and too many cross-words are spoken. Every cross-word that has ever been spoken on earth left a scar on some one's soul. Sometimes a mother gets too tired to love her little child, but my observation has been that the woman who works and struggles hardest with poverty loves her child most. Once a woman who didn't have to work very hard got so tired from making calls and shopping that she could not love her only little child. But a day came when the shutters were closed and a procession wended its way to the cemetery and cold cloths fell with a hollow thud upon a little coffin. The woman returned to her desolate home and realized that the wee little, curly-headed lad with the sunny smile and laughing eyes was the biggest thing in all the world to her, and with her heart strings drawn tight almost to breaking, she said:

"I wonder now that mothers ever fret.  
At little children clinging to their gown;  
Or that the footprints, when the days are wet,  
Are ever black enough to make them frown.  
If I could find a little muddy boot  
Or cap or jacket on my chamber floor,  
If I could kiss a rosy restless foot,  
And hear it patter in my home once more.  
If I could mend a broken cart today,  
Tomorrow make a kite to reach the sky  
There's no woman in God's world could say  
She was more blissfully content than I  
But, oh! the dainty pillow next my own  
Is never rumbled by a shining head;  
My singing birdling from its nest has flown;  
My little boy I used to kiss is dead."

This woman realized more fully than most people ever do that children need less silk and lace, and more of the blessed sunshine of love from their parents. I would that every parent in the world would begin now and never cease to "think" everytime they act in every relation to their children. Truly, "a curse shall be on parents who corrupt the morals of their children."

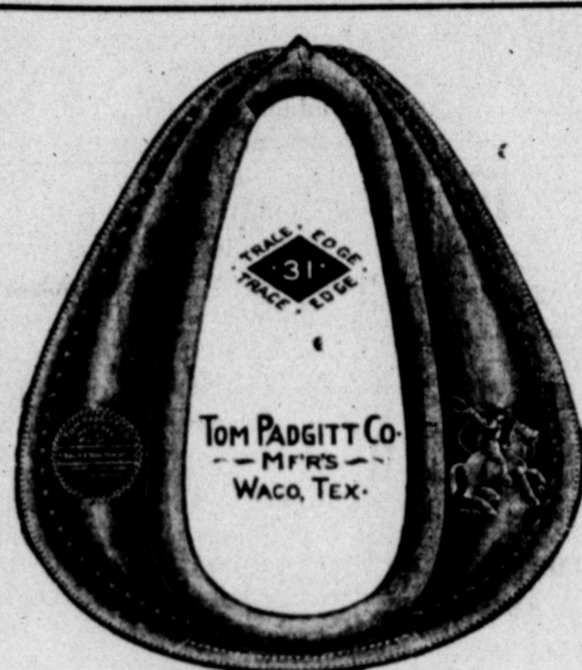

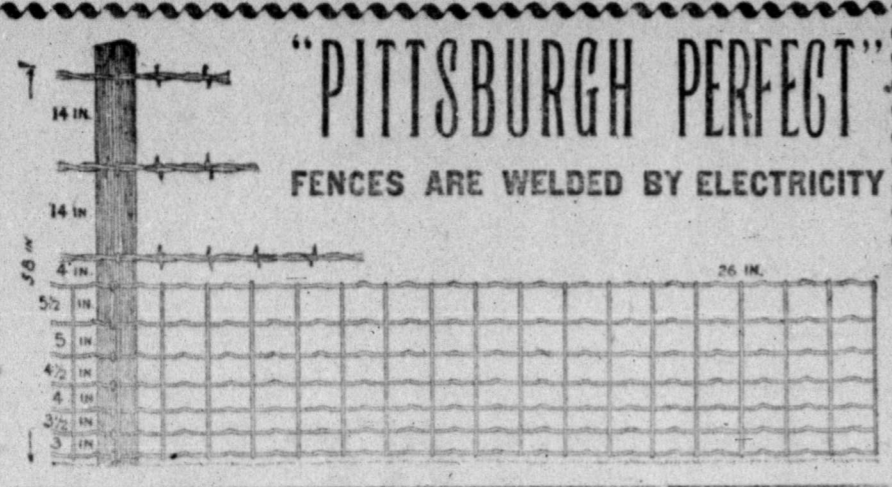

**HE FELL OFF A SKYSCRAPER.**

**A Plunge From The 200-Foot Long Building by a Workman**

John A. Michaelson, a foreman of terra cotta workers, slipped and plunged headlong at 3:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon from the cornice at the top of the fourteen story Long building on the Tenth Street side, where it is 200 feet to the pavement. Twenty feet downward he seized the pulley ropes used in hoisting material to the roof and hung on. His hands slipped along the rope for a few feet under the weight of his body. Then he stopped.

With blistered hands he climbed back up the rope, hand over hand, to where his fellow workmen were and they pulled him back to the cornice. Michaelson tucked in his shirt, rubbed his hands, tired a rag around one of one of his burned fingers and went to laying terra cotta again just as

if he had not stared death in the face a few minutes before.

"What did I think about when I went down?" He said repeating a question half an hour after his fall.

"You for the ropes. You for the ropes. It's your only chance. That's the thought that flashed through my brain when I felt my footing gone. I knew the ropes were there. I'd been working alongside them for weeks. Of course, I didn't have time to think much, but that was 'you for the ropes.' And it was my only chance. No, it wasn't presence of mind, it was just instinct which is a part of the high building trade. I just grabbed the rope. But say it was a long climb back when your hands burnt like mine."

Here Michaelson exhibited the palms of his hands. There were the marks of the rope and on one finger the friction had drawn blood. "I was going head downward when I caught the ropes," Michaelson continued wrapping his injured finger again. "They slid through my hands about three feet."

Michaelson, with four other men, was standing on the scaffold six feet below the top of the southwest corner of the cornice of the building. They were putting in place the large pieces of terra cotta cornice. Michaelson was lifting one of these pieces from the outer edge of the scaffold when it made an unexpected turn which overbalanced him. Four other workmen on the building saw Michaelson fall from the scaffold. One of them, Geo. Anderson, a negro, was standing on top of the building looking down. When he saw Michaelson disappear he turned away and held tightly to one of the iron girders. He refused to go back to work even after the foreman had taken a brief rest and resumed his duties.—Kansas City Star.

#### ABOUT TALKING.

Some would-be philosopher in the past, has inadvertently made the statement that "talk is cheap." No man of the present has a right to do violence to the character of the author of that statement by laying down the broad and extremely uncomplimentary statement that he lied, but he did most woefully err. The cold facts in the case are that there are not many people who do not often in the short space of their mundane existence indulge in conversation that costs. It may not cost the talker money in actual dollars and cents of the currency of the realm where his lot may have been cast, but it costs somebody something.

Some other wise paragrapher has said: "He who dances must pay the fiddler." As the performer in the circus requires a lively air for his hair-raising feats, so it requires for the conversational gymnast's of some linguistic acrobats, a furious strain for which somebody must pay. It may be paid for by the ill will of one neighbor toward another. It may be paid for in scalding tears of humiliation by a woman or a child. It may be paid for in the spilling of innocent blood, or perchance it may be paid in the pitiful puny loss of dollars to the talker, or of some innocent party, but it is always paid. The cash books of human life always gets balanced.

In discussing the habit of over

production of conversation we do not wish it understood that we include in our remarks the "common gossip," because we have no way of expressing the contempt that class of people deserve without language unfit for publication in a journal of this class. There is enough superfluous talking done by people who consider themselves, and are often considered by other people, to be above reproach on that score, to create a belief in the minds of thinking people that men and women should be made to give bond for the privilege of talking, the same as a saloon keeper does for conducting an orderly house.

As an abstract proposition "there is no harm in talking if you don't say anything," neither is there any harm in talking and "saying things" if the thing said will do no harm or will do at least more good than it will harm. And sometimes we hear people say "oh, well, it was only so and so who said it, and nobody pays any attention to him." Perhaps, that is true. A man may tell something designed to hurt some one and his own reputation is so bad that no ill will occur to the one he seeks to injure, but the fact remains that a hurt has been done to the one who does the talking, for every-time a man says a mean thing or has a bad impulse in his heart it makes him a poorer citizen, and though he may not realize it lessens his self respect. Clean, intelligent, harmless conversation, backed up by "thinking" is the one great advantage God has given men over lower animals, but when that matchless privilege has been abused it puts him lower in the scale than the chattering apes of the tropical forests.

#### Big Cotton Crop.

This section of Texas, and especially Kerr County, has never been considered a cotton country, but the crop this year is breaking records to smash. The gins at all points in Gillespie county are crowded, some of them being sixty bales behind with cotton in sight, and the fields white as a snow bank. Bandera county has a rousing crop. Kerr county will produce this year from 20 to 30 per cent more cotton than ever grown in any one year before.

Schreiner's gin at Kerrville ginned only 350 bales during the entire season last year, while 385 bales have been already ginned here this year and it is expected that the 1906 season out put will be at least 750 bales. The proportion for other gins in the county is about the same.

The market this week has ranged from ten cents to ten and three-eighths, and the market has been steady and strong all the week. The cotton crop of this section has been considered heretofore as one of the lesser resources, but the big crop and prevailing good prices this year will make it a leading feature in the prosperity of the country.

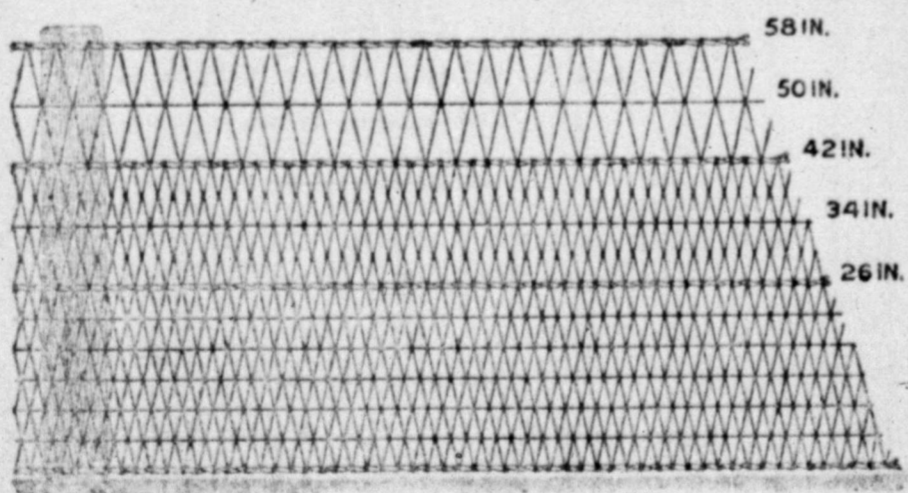

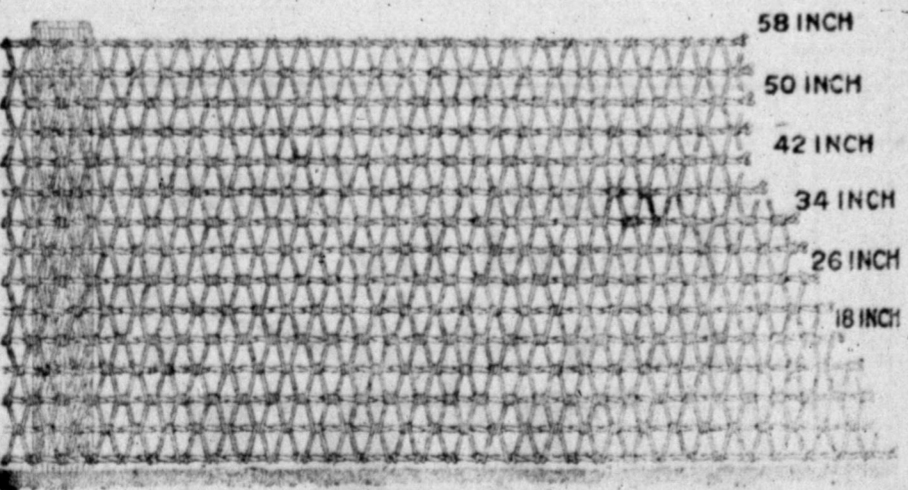
