## THE ANNIVERSARY OF THE FALL OF THE ALAMO

### HER FIGURES WROTE THEIR NAMES ON THE SCROLL OF FAME.

Seventy-one years ago March 2, three of the most heroic figures in American history wrote their names on their country's scroll of fame in letters that time will never fade. On the 6th of March, 1836, was enacted the final scene in the tragedy of The Alamo, in which David Crockett, William Travis and James Bowie, with their handful of devoted and fearless followers, yielded up their lives. There were less than 200 of these daring spirits within the walls of the ancient mission at San Antonio, Tex., and they were opposed by an army of more than 6,000 Mexicans, under command of Gen. Santa Anna. The Alamo, the old Spanish church edifice, wherein was enacted one of the sublimest tragedies in the entire history of the American continent, is now little more than a splendid ruin at San Antonio, but around it have been written song and story that will never die.

Every one of the heroes of the Alamo was an American frontiersman, and all had chosen Texas as their homes, though Texas did not become a part of the United States until nine years afterwards. On February 22, Santa Anna crossed the Rio Grande at the head of an army for the purpose of putting down the revolt that threatened to sever Texas from Mexico. This invasion of Texas stirred up all the fighting blood in the gallant spirits, but at the best they knew that they could not muster more than 2,000 men with arms, and to do this would take at least two weeks, as the soldiery were scattered. The Texan leaders seemed to have been divided among themselves. Gen. Sam Houston, who was the commander-in-chief, thought best to retire across the Colorado river and await re-inforcement; some of the others did not agree with him, and these, with Col. William Travis, in command of the regular garrison, took refuge in the old Spanish mission at San Antonio, and determined to make a last stand against the Mexicans. Col. James Bowie, famous as a duelist and as the maker of the Bowie knife, was with Travis, and fully agreed with his plans. David Crockett joined them almost immediately. The three intrepid commanders had a mere handful of men and only one small cannon. Against this little company came the great Mexican army. The doors of the makeshift were barricaded, and when on the last day of February a messenger came from Santa Anna demanding surrender he was sent back with words of defiance. The Mexican army surrounded the old stone building, and a big gun was wheeled into position and opened fire. Crockett was asleep when the cannon ball announced that the opening of the last fight had commenced. Col. Bowie was bedfast from a wound, but Travis was in active command. Crockett sprang from his bunk, and saw in a minute that the gun was within rifle range. Crockett was a dead shot, and he picked off five Mexican gunners with rifles loaded and handed to him as fast as the Mexicans at

tempted to use their cannon. Finally they were actually driven back by Crockett's accurate aim.

Then the Mexicans let things settle down to a state of siege. This the Alamo seemed well calculated to stand. The walls were thick, and though built more than a century previous, were solid and could withstand the long range firing of the Mexicans. The windows were high and very narrow, and there were few doors. For five days the state of siege continued, and then Santa Anna decided to try to carry the place by assault. The entire building was surrounded by a high adobe wall, since torn down. Dawn of March 6 showed the Texans guarding this wall, which was strong on three sides, but weak on the north. The place was entirely surrounded, and the devoted souls in that old stone church building knew that their fate was sealed. The storming parties were held at bay by the Texas riflemen on three sides, but a column under command of Gen. Castrillon attacked the weak north wall, and made a breach. Then came the most desperate hand to hand fight of which history makes record, as the Mexicans came pouring in. The Mexicans were beaten back again and again, each time they renewed the attack they made better headway. The outer wall was carried, and the Texans retired within the church. The Mexicans crowded them closely. It was butchery then, and no slaughter house was ever more completely blood soaked. Into the very last part of the old building the Texans were crowded, and separated from each other in different parts of the structure. Still they fought on, with clubbed guns. Crockett was still on his feet and with him a band of five or six. He had nothing left but the barrel of his rifle, and with this he laid about him. Gen. Castrillon wanted to spare the lives of the remaining Texans, and besought his commanding general to do so. Crockett heard Santa Anna's refusal, and, dropping his gun barrel and clutching his knife, he tried to break through the fighting cordon that surrounded him and reach the Mexican general, but fell riddled with bullets.

Meantime, Col. Bowie, who lay on his bed in another room without being able to take a hand in the fight, assumed command of the wounded in this hospital room, and ordered them to sell their lives as dearly as possible. The doorway to this hospital room was very narrow—so small that scarcely more than a single person could get through it at a time. Lying on his bed, Bowie used his pistol and several other pistols that were loaded and handed to him, for he was as great a shot with the pistol as Crockett was with the rifle. Every shot killed a Mexican. Santa Anna saw he was sacrificing men as fast as Bowie could pull a trigger, and he restored to a most horrible expedient. The cannon that the Texans used in their defense was wheeled up so that its muzzle was right at the door of the little hospital room, and a load of grape shot and canister turned loose that destroyed every living thing in that room. Even after this cannon shot was fired Bowie leaped from his bed and plunged his knife into a Mexican and both fell dead together. History records that four persons escaped this massacre, and they

were all non-combatants. One was Mrs. Dickinson, wife of one of the Texan officers, and her daughter, Emily; the other two were negro servants. Miss Emily was an infant at this time. Afterwards she was known as the child of the Alamo. In less than a month afterwards the battle cry of the Texans, "Remember the Alamo," rang out as Gen. Sam Houston took an awful revenge at San Jacinto. The Mexicans were routed with terrible loss, and Santa Anna captured.

The Alamo still stands pretty much the same in appearance as it was 71 years ago, or a hundred years before that. From time to time movements have been set on foot to make some special use of it, with a view of making it a national memorial, and there have been several attempts by "enterprising" persons to get hold of it and turn it to some sort of money making purpose; but these have all been defeated. The latest is a tentative proposition to construct a handsome park about the historic spot, with a tourist's hotel. In every one of these efforts to profane what is now a sacred spot patriotic women have been instrumental in defeating the vandalism.

#### Legislature to Adjourn April 6.

Austin, Texas, March 13—If the Senate concurs in the resolution which was adopted today fixing April 6 as the date for sine die adjournment of the regular session, there will be some rushing work done in the two branches of the Legislature during the next three weeks. A resolution fixing the time of adjournment for April 6 is also pending in the Senate, and it is considered not unlikely that this date will be adopted by that body. A large number of the members of the House voted for March 30 as the date for adjournment.

Those who so voted are of the opinion that a special session will be necessary. The majority indicated by their vote that they believe the necessary legislation can be disposed of between now and April 6, and that a special session will be unnecessary.

In the discussion on the adjournment proposition a variety of views was expressed. The platform demands came in for their usual boosting, with the exception of one member, R. M. Brown of Wharton, who asserted while speaking to a question of personal privilege that he believed no bill, whether a platform demand or otherwise, should be taken up out of its order by unanimous consent. He said that the voice of a few members of the Democratic party in convention assembled at Dallas was no more the voice of the masses of Democrats in Texas than the bellowing of a bull in the Fort Worth stock yards is the voice of a herd of cattle on the Pecos.

## TIVY HIGH SCHOOL

### A TALK ON THE KIND OF LITERATURE TO READ. MUCH IN POETRY.

In last week's issue we discussed some of the advantages to be derived from a "graded library," selected from the different branches of literature. By such a plan we know in part what pupils are reading, and while this better class of literature may not wholly supplant the seriously objectionable "trash" pupils so often read it will do much to counteract its baneful influence.

But such a system requires more books—better equipment. Do you think the good which will follow worth the necessary outlay? How do you rate your dollars? Of course, by what they can buy. Do you not believe that you can purchase more future happiness for your children, more prospects of victory in life's struggle, by equipping them with the right kind of a library, if only they love this library and know how to use it?

Now, how are we to teach pupils to love good books? All true taste is cultivated taste. The richest and most highly favored fruits are those for which we at first have no relish. The same holds true of literature, especially of poetry whose enchanting strains as Shelley says redeems from decay the visitations of divinity in man. The average man does not love poetry and laughs at another who does. This is not at all strange. Perhaps he has never read, all told, more than ten or fifteen poems. Every one knows, who knows at all, that the highest and most ennobling sentiments the human heart has ever felt have been enshrined in its poetry. One says, "I do not like so and so's poetry." I wonder why: Is it lack of ability to appreciate what is beautiful in life? Or is it because they have not read enough to form a just estimate? This does not mean that every man will love every poet equally. We all have certain tastes which lead us into certain channels of thought activity over which we have no mastery and for which in many particulars we are not wholly responsible.

#### HOW TO CREATE A LOVE FOR GOOD LITERATURE.

This effort should be made by parents early in the child's life. And there is no practice better than that of telling children beautiful and appropriate stories from the Bible, from myth or ballad poetry. Childhood is naturally imaginative and loves the romantic in life. They may not remember many facts learned at mother's knee, but in it all there is an at-

mosphere favorable to the growth of the purest and most elevating sentiments. The literature should be appropriate to childhood's ability to appreciate, to its peculiar bent of mind and feelings.

After a taste has been created for good literature, the child then should be taught to do systematic reading. The child need not necessarily know that it is systematic reading or why it is systematic reading, but such a course should be outlined, comprehensive enough, yet strictly followed. This should hold true not only with respect to the different kinds of reading, but later in life every one should read authors of the same period—or movement in literature—until such authors and their writings mean something. Did you ever read one book ten or fifteen minutes, then lay it aside for another until three or four had been disposed of in the same way and the evening passed away without your having read anything? How many times have you ever looked up the definition for the same word? Or do you let them pass without ever looking them up at all? No reader's time can be more profitably spent than in thoroughly familiarizing himself with the meaning of words. Desultory reading, careless habits about systematizing what we read are faults characterizing too many who would lay claim to being "well read." No man is well read who can not use to advantage what he has learned. How many books have you read from which you did not derive a single useful thought? How many books have you ever reviewed systematically with an effort at picking out the important truths which they were intended to convey? Did you agree with the author? Did you ever stop to think whether you did or not? Or are you in the habit of accepting as true every man's philosophy of life whom you meet?

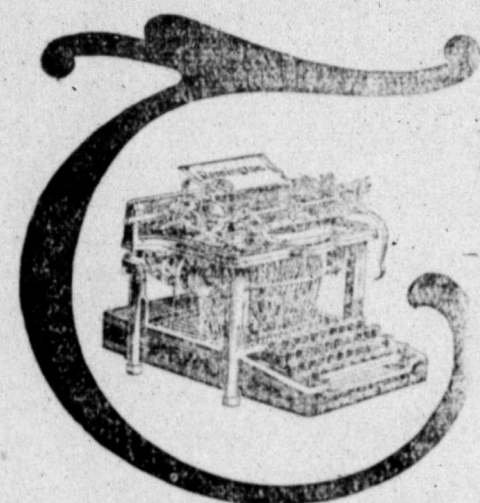

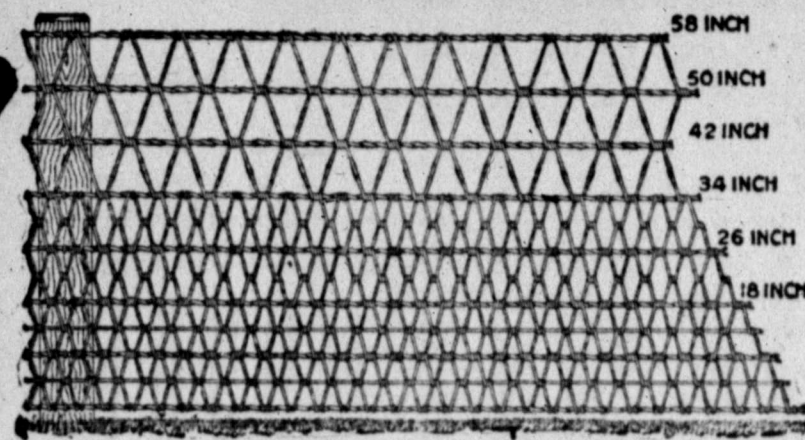

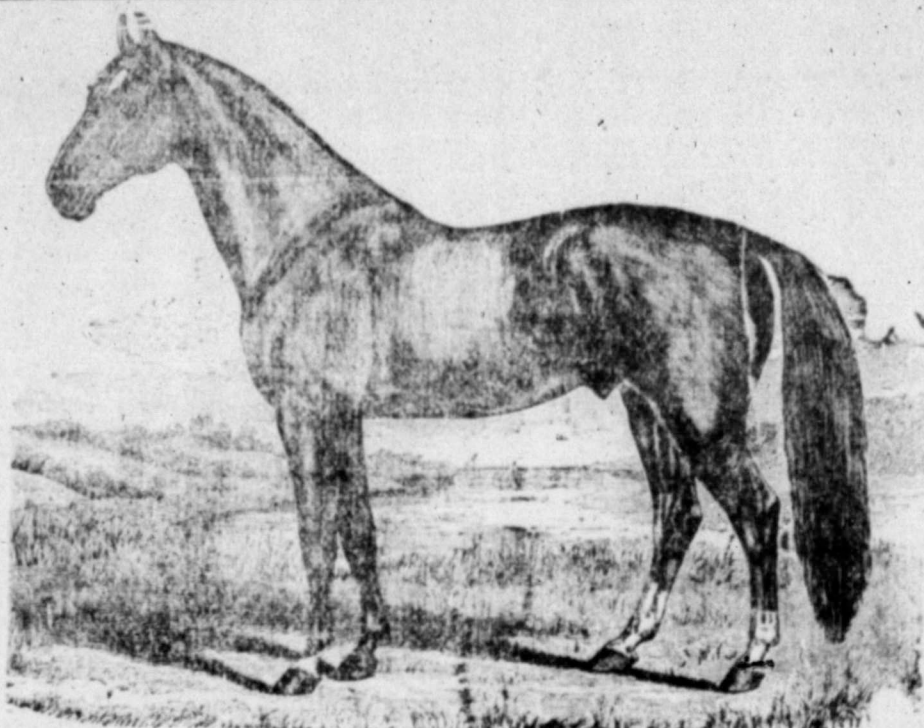
