Davy Jones. The funnel was a box built of scantling and lined, with sheet iron. <br> Fhe funnel the Sir Richard carried when she left Huelva on June 21 चith a cargo of pyrites was swept away on Sunday. The boat was then about 800 miles from Sandy Hook and going along smonthly in a meat wat not very rough. About three aclock is the afternoon Chpt. Jones says a wall of water that almost topped the furnel came aboard amidship on the port side. Most of the crew wite below and luckily those on deck-were ferward.
