

just to "fill the quota within the department" will surely adversely affect our state's highway system, rather than being able to hire the most qualified person for a position--with the idea of using women or minorities if at all possible.

By the way, one of the other of Governor Richards' appointees is Anne S. Wynne.

With 14,500 employees, and an annual budget of \$2.5 billion, the Transportation Department has been called the "Pentagon of state government." We don't doubt for a minute that some of the predicted 4,000 employees may need to take early retirement, in order to make way for new blood.

But to go in and completely overhaul the agency, from top to bottom, may be stretching it just a bit

We could go from having a state system of highways that is the envy of the nation, to having trouble getting from here to Lubbock without stopping off in Littlefield for a new tire or two.

That may be a bit extreme, but if you need a comparison, may we suggest that you look closely at highway 84 between Clovis and Las Vegas, N.M. On the Texas side, Highway 84 from Farwell to Snyder is a beautiful road--four lanes, divided, well-maintained. The only thing these two segments of the road have in common is its federal number, which remains the same on both sides of the state line.

A highway official says that the department is planning to go from a "construction oriented" to a "service oriented" department under the new regime.

That would indicate that it's a darned good thing we got Highway 60's expansion approved and funded, because it might not have made it in the future. And if we have other such needs in the future, either locally or elsewhere, the travelling public might be out of luck.

Personally, it appears that in a state that's growing, with more and more vehicles, you couldn't just cut off all construction, without adversely affecting the safety of motorists using our state's highways.


Farmers The Home Administration has loan funds to help members of socially disadvantaged groups, including minorities, buy land for farming or operate farms in Parmer County, Thomas S. Taylor, FmHA county supervisor, said this week.

Under this program enacted by Congress, socially disadvantaged population groups are Hispanics, Native Americans, African Americans, Asians and Pacific Islanders.

FmHA tries to find members of those groups who are interested in farming and can qualify for an FmHA farm ownership loan. The agency can sell or lease to those who are eligible, a farm held in its inventory or make a loan for purchase of land on the open market, Thomas S. Taylor said.

FmHA can also provide other loan assistance, including operating loans, and advice, if needed, to help the borrower get started.

People who think they may be eligible, whether they already are in farming or would like to become farmers, are urged to contact the Farmers Home Administration county office in their area, Thomas S. Taylor said.

DPS Offers Course For Motorcycle Riders

With more than 700,000 licensed motorcyclists and nearly 175,000 registered motorcycles in Texas, it is clear that motorcycle riding is a popular form of transportation and recreation for many people across the State of Texas.

To encourage safe motorcycle riding, Governor Ann Richards has proclaimed May as Motorcycle Safety and Awareness Month. "Texans should be encouraged to do everything they can to ensure the safety of motorcycle operators and other drivers on all Texas streets," Governor Richards said.

Safe motorcycle skills can be acquired in a motorcycle rider training class.

"The course for motorcycle riders skill. is challenging and fun, and it may even earn riders an insurance discount," said Henry Palma, manager of the Motorcycle Safety Bureau at the Texas Department of Public Safety. "It teaches riding skills that most riders fail to learn when taught by family members or friends."

The course is offered at two levels: the advanced course for experienced riders and the basic course for beginning riders. Most classes are offered over one weekend or several evenings.

In the 17-hour basic course, novice or occasional riders learn the proper techniques to operate a motorcycle and how to handle dangerous situations. The goal is for these new riders to achieve the same skill level as someone who has been riding for two years. Motorcycles and helmets are provided.

Riders under 18 are required to take the basic course to be eligible for a motorcycle driver's license.

In the eight-hour advanced course, experienced riders are challenged on their own motorcycles. Skills taught include high-speed maneuvering, avoidance
