

It is not the intention to attempt in this work what is known as a "modern historical romance," hat merely to fix in the mind of he reader a certain historical occurrence of almost international consequence, that he may more fully understand and appreciate the story.

This section of the country at that time, was the strong hold of a tribe known as the Arapahoe Indians, who were an exceedingly fierce and warlike people. In this fight, the Spaniards, whose numbers and prowess the savages had misjudged, completely routed their enemy, and after the fight ed it "La Puerto de los Banderos" or the door of the flags. 
TIN, AT FREDERICKSBURG.
