There are some drawbacks to stock shows, as most everyone associated with them knows, but we daresay that the advantages far outweigh those disadvantages.

With their projects, young people are "learning by doing" and what they're learning is a good lesson about the game of life. They do many hours work for the few minutes they get in the spotlight, too.

Your attendance at the shows can be encouraging. Same goes for your support verbal and/or financial.

We clipped the following from the column of Sig H. Atkinson in a recent issue of The Brownfield News. He says it'll work:

Take your age. Multiply by two. Add five. Multiply by 50. Subtract 365. Add the amount of change in your pocket under a dollar. Then add 115. The first two figures of the answer are your age and the last two are the amount of change you added.

You can take that information and a dime or 15 cents and buy a cup of coffee almost anywhere around.

West Texas gave its successful football coach a raw deal when it invited the invitation of his and his assistants' resignation last week.

That's the way it looks to us from several miles away, at least.

Kerbel put the Buffs on the country's football map and in appreciation the school gave him an invitation for his resignation. Beginning without a conference and with not much following, he put the Canyon school in a position of national prominence. He entered a hard fight with a short stick . . . and won . . . with winning football teams.

We have nothing but admiration for the man named to succeed him, but that's another story.

The school used Kerbel's success and influence to gain admission to the Missouri Valley Conference. WT teams will be allowed to compete in that league next season. But Kerbel, who was probably more responsible for the school being there than anyone else, won't be around to take part in it.

Using the conference affiliation as a base, the football fortunes of the school can be expected to continue to rise. And the conference is supposedly even more advantageous for basketball than for football.

No doubt but that Kerbel had his faults. They weren't, whatever they were, any greater when the board decided not to renew his contract than they were the day he was originally signed, though. And in the meantime, he had conducted a highly successful football program at the Canyon school against odds that a lesser coach wouldn't have been able to overcome.

Critics of Kerbel complained that he used too many athletes from far-away sections of the country instead of filling his scholarship quota with area players.

Possibly that complaint was justified, except that it's difficult to fairly criticize success. Chances are, Big K would rather have used boys from the Panhandle and adjoining states if he had sincerely believed he could win with those who would play for him. And he did use some area boys, needless to say.

Critics also said, we read, that attendance at WT games wasn't as good as it should be. Is that the fault of a winning football coach? We doubt it.

If Kerbel was ever the man for the job, he still was when the powers-that-be decided it was time for a change.

Since it's all over for Captain Kerbel, anyway, we kinda hope he got caught in a power struggle with the people who wanted the successor to lead the Buffaloes and really had nothing against the outstanding job that had been done.

Mostly, we guess, we're just disappointed to see a man dismissed for doing what we thought was an outstanding job. Nobody ever said life was fair, though.

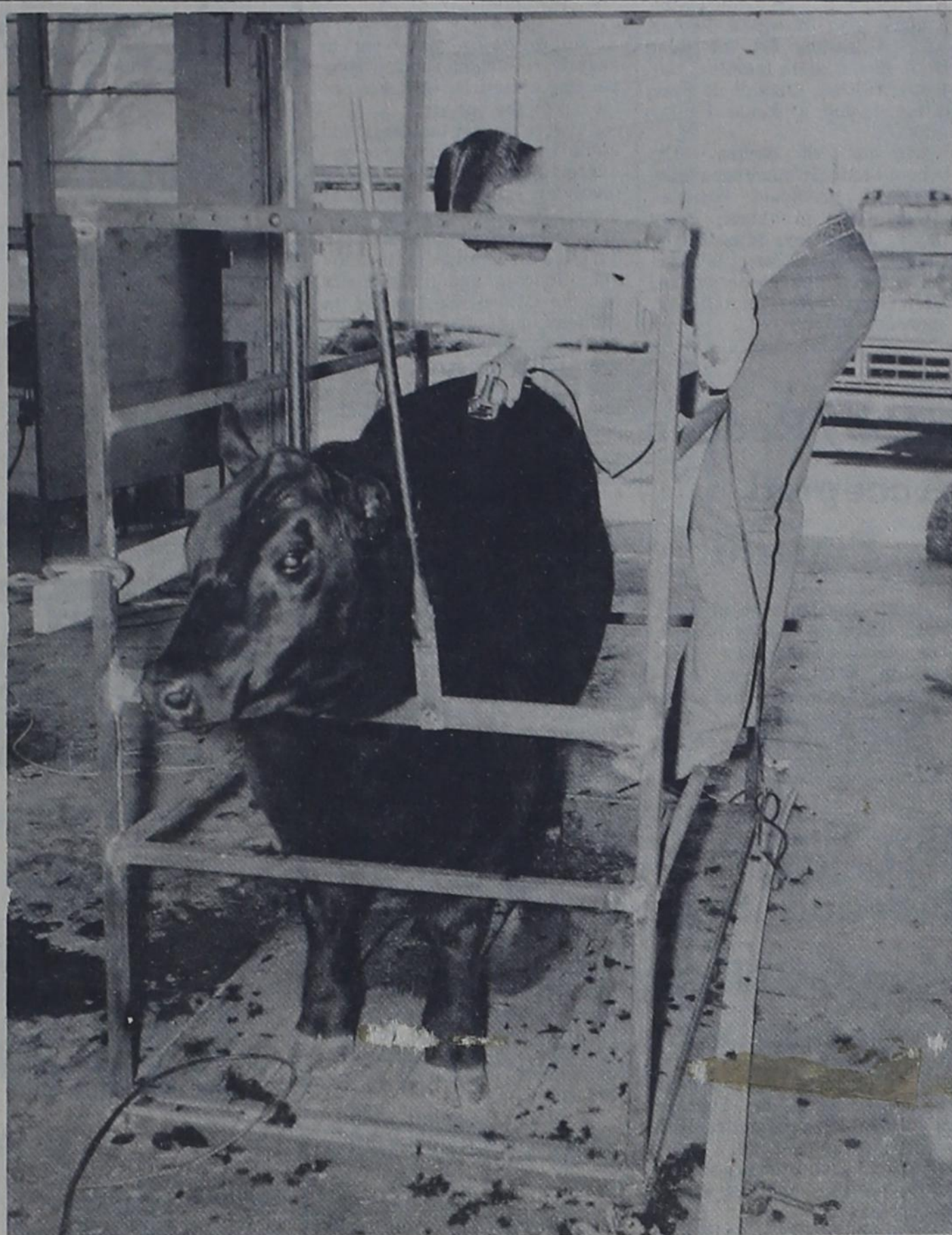

All seven of the contracts were renewed by unanimous votes of the board. Contracts for classroom teachers for the forthcoming year are scheduled to be considered at the March meeting of the board.

Meeting with the board to discuss "inconsistency of school rules" were Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Beauchamp and Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Hromas.

The resignation of Dick Allen as a custodian was accepted. He resigned because of ill health, according to Superintendent L. F. Jacobs. Hired to

the position, subject to his acceptance, was Raymond Delgado.

The board formally called the annual school trustee election for April 3, a Saturday. Deadline for candidates to file is 30 days prior to the election, March 3.

Three positions on the seven-member board will be filled by the election. Expiring are the terms of Lawrence Jamerson, Leon Ware and Leslie McCain. The three were petitioned this week as candidates to succeed themselves.

Signing the petition for Jamerson, Ware and McCain were Johnie Horn, A. L. Hartzog, Mina Horn, J. B. Barrett, Earl Stevenson, T. C. Wiseman, J. D. Kirkpatrick, B. L. Marshall, Wayne Spears and Brooks Davis.

Board members with one year remaining on their present terms are Earl Whitten and Thomas Rhodes. Those with two years remaining are Robert Read and Edwin Lide.

Discussed was the possibility of adding a snack bar to the school cafeteria. No decision was made, however, pending further study.

Parmer Co. Cattle Co. --

New Owners For Feedlot

A change in the ownership structure of Parmer County Cattle Co., commercial cattle feeding facility located between Bovina and Farwell, was announced this week by C. C. "Cap" Naegle, manager of the firm.

New majority stockholders of the company are Nelson Bunker Hunt of Dallas and A. R. Dillard of Wichita Falls. They own 45 per cent of the business each. Naegle, who will continue to manage the business, retained his 10 per cent interest.

The feedlot, which has a capacity of some 37,000 head, started in business in March of 1967.

Five people, including Dillard and Naegle, were involved in the ownership at the beginning and until the recent change. Dillard's interest was increased from 22.5 per cent to the present 45 per cent in the change.

For practical purposes, the business will remain unchanged under the new ownership. "We will continue to operate as a commercial feedlot just as we have in the past," Naegle said in making the ownership change announcement.

Last year was the first such promotion here and received area-wide publicity in newspapers, radios and TV stations.



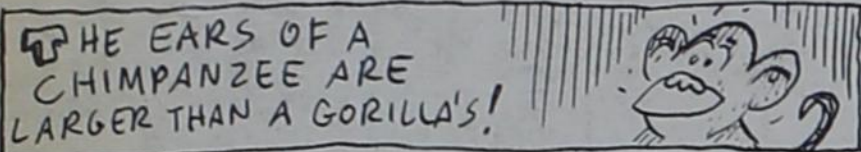

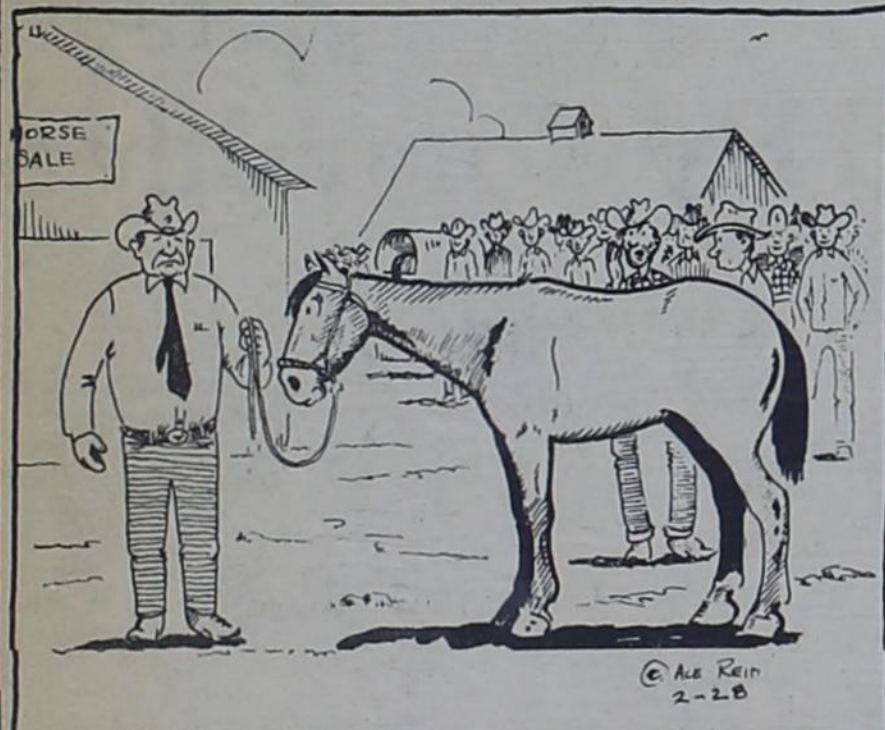

Board members went on record as commending "the Student Council and members of the student body who worked with the Council for the work that has been done this year and the honors and prestige earned for Bovina High School and the community."

The following statement in regard to school policy concerning athletic events was released by the board:

"Due to recent incidents and some in the past that have occurred during athletic contests involving Bovina and area schools in which action by some of our contestants and fans has hurt the reputation of the Bovina Schools and its students and the City of Bovina and its citizens, the school board and administration will take whatever action necessary to correct this action on part of a few that greatly affects many people.

"The attitudes and actions of students participating in all extra-curricular activities and representing our school and city will need to meet certain standards before being allowed to participate. It is a privilege and not a right to participate in these activities.

"Schools are charged with the responsibility by the Interscholastic League officials in Austin with the conduct of its students and fans at or around any contest. Schools can be penalized along with many innocent young people for disorderly conduct before, during and after contests or activities sponsored by the school. It covers three primary areas: (1) sportsmanship during the game, on and off the court or playing field or place of the activity by players, coaches, and fans; (2) the treatment of officials before, during and after the contest; and (3) the treatment of the opponents' contestants, coaches or sponsors and fans.

"If parents, administrators, teachers, coaches, sponsors and fans are to teach respect for constituted authority, then they must indoctrinate and educate the contestants under their control in this direction.

"We appreciate the support and sportsmanship of the majority of our loyal students, parents and fans and hope we can all strive together to make the reputation of our school and city one of the best in the Panhandle and in the State of Texas. Cooperation from all concerned will be appreciated and will prove beneficial to all."

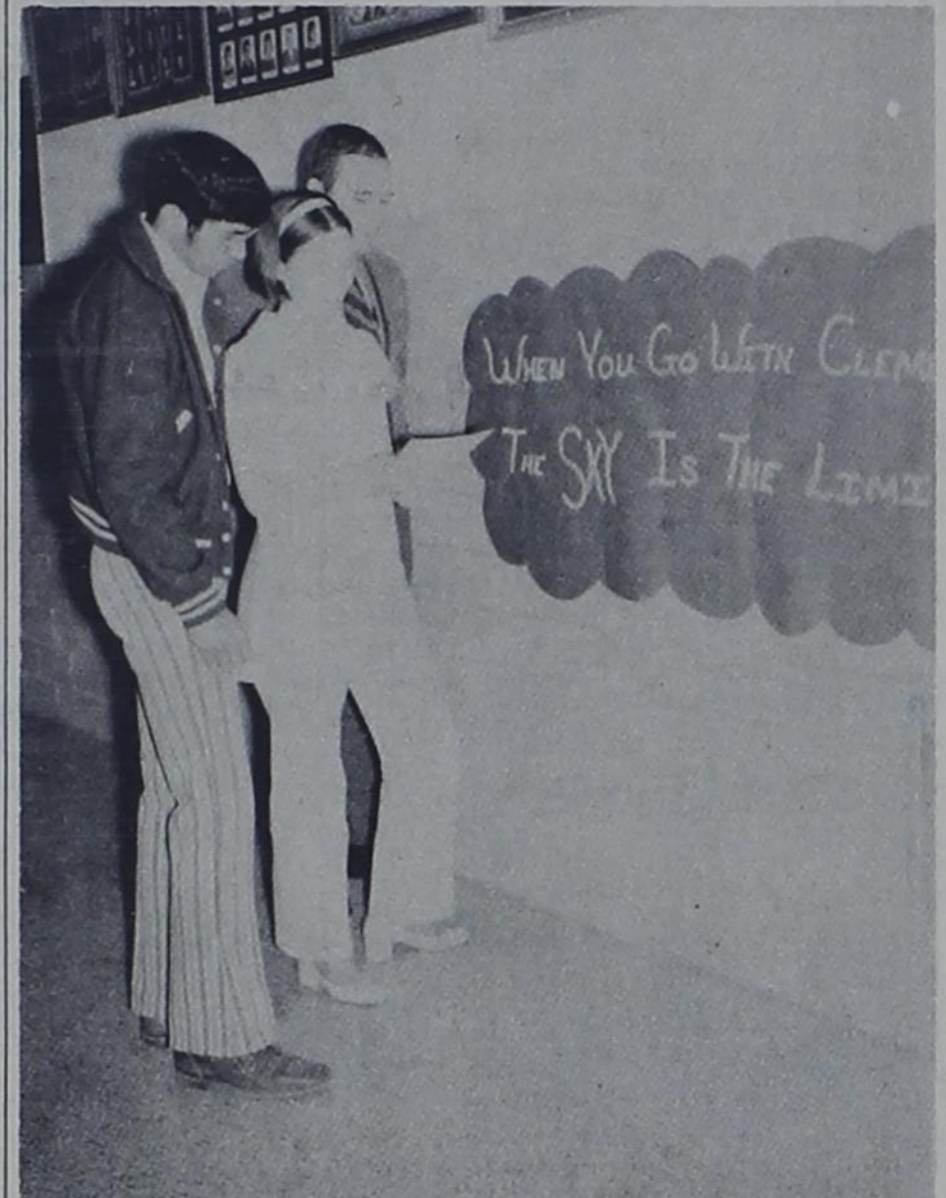
Rites Held In Friona For John W. Holt

Charge Woman With Murder

Mrs. Ann Horta, 32, of Lazbuddie was charged with murder Wednesday of last week following the shooting death of her husband early that morning.

The shooting occurred at the Hortas' home on the Henry Ivy farm.

Mrs. Horta was arraigned in the court of Justice of the Peace J. R. Thornton. She was released on \$3000 bond and bound over to the grand jury which is scheduled to convene Friday.

Horta had been employed by Ivy for about two years and the family had lived in the Lazbuddie Community for the past four or five years, according to information from the sheriff's office.

The couple had five children at home. Horta was reportedly shot one time in the heart with a .22 calibre rifle.

Collision Damages 2 Cars

Extensive damage was done to two cars involved in a head-on collision at the intersection of Third Street and Avenue C Sunday about 11 p.m.

Harold Eugene Reed of Friona, driver of a 1971 Vega, was traveling north on Third Street when he was hit head-on by Leonidas Cardoza, driving a 1968 Camaro, who was going south on Third Street in the northbound lane. Neither man was injured in the collision.

Cardoza was charged with DWI in county court and fined \$100 plus court costs. His driver's license was also suspended for six months.

The Camaro suffered about \$500 worth of damage and the Vega was totaled, according to Ronald Mitchell, city marshal, who investigated the accident.

Two calves were killed in an accident on Highway 60 Thursday morning about 7 by Charles Steele who was on his way to work. Steele was going west and couldn't avoid hitting the cattle.

Steele's pickup was totaled in the accident. Patrolman Glen Fant was the investigating officer. About 40 of Darrel Norton's cattle were loose at the time in the early morning darkness near Wiley's Switch.

Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons.

"Nothing in this section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment removing the limitation on the total State appropriations for assistance grants for the needy aged, the needy disabled, and the needy blind, and setting a limitation on total State appropriations during any fiscal year for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children."

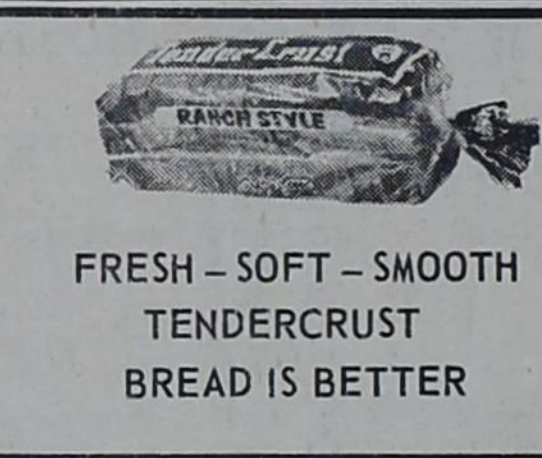

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 5) Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-a, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services to or on behalf of: (1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years; (2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps; (3) Needy blind persons; (4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children. "The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation in these programs as it deems appropriate. "The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of State funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of State funds to or on behalf of any needy person shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; provided that the total amount of State funds paid for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of the children shall not exceed Fifty-Five Million Dollars (\$55,000,000) during any fiscal year. "Provided further, that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate federal statutes, as they now are or as they may be amended to the extent that federal matching money is not available to the State for these purposes, then and in that event the

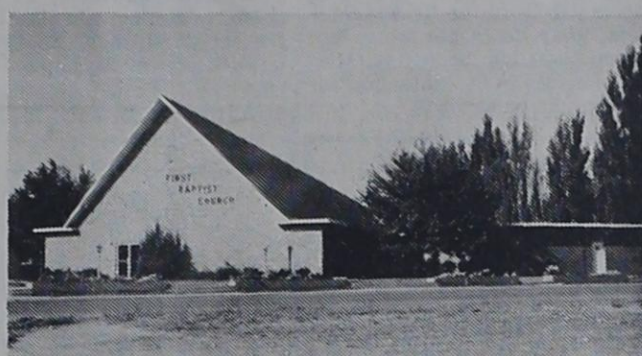

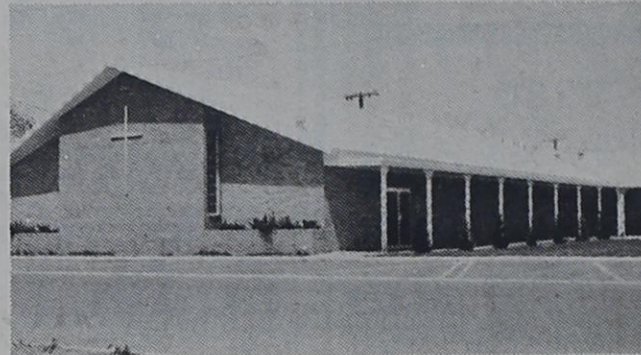

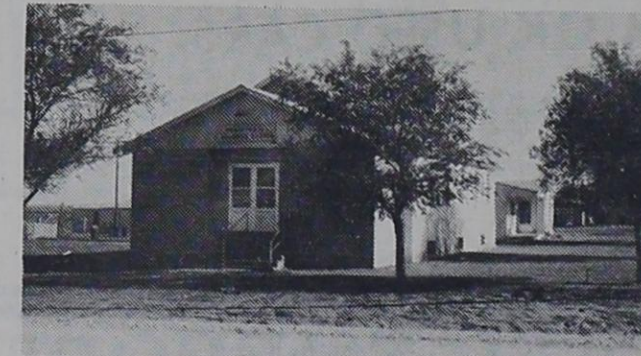

Electric Co-Op Sets Contest

Expense-paid trips to the nation's capitol city will be awarded winners of an oratorical contest which was announced this week by James Hull, manager of Deaf Smith County Electric Cooperative.

The contest is open to any boy or girl at least 16 years of age but not 18 years of age prior to September 1, 1971, Hull says. Winners will join winners of similar contests sponsored by other electric cooperatives across Texas on the sixth annual Texas Electric Cooperatives Government-in-Action Youth Tour to Washington, D.C. All expenses of the 12-day trip beginning June 12, will be paid by Deaf Smith County REC.

Each entrant will be required to give a five to eight minute talk on the subject "Rural Electrification - Challenge of the 70's," and answer one or more of 50 questions asked by the judges.

The oratorical contest will be judged on the basis of (1) knowledge of subject - 40 per cent; (2) speaking ability - 30

per cent; (3) poise - 10 per cent; (4) personality - 10 per cent; and (5) appearance - 10 per cent.

Interested young people may obtain an official entry blank from their school or the offices of Deaf Smith County Electric Cooperative. The deadline for submitting entries will be February 26, 1971.

As participants in the Texas Electric Cooperatives Youth Tour, local contest winners will travel by chartered bus to Washington, D.C., where they will spend four days visiting places of historical interest and seeing the nation's government in action.

On Wednesday, June 16, the Texas group will meet more than 1,000 students from other states for a program sponsored by the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association and the Rural Electrification Administration. The program will feature presentations by officials of these organizations and other Washington personalities and possibly the Presidential staff.

The eventful day will end with a chartered cruise down the Potomac River.

Also included on the 12-day agenda will be visits to George Washington's Mount Vernon home, Arlington National Cemetery, the U. S. House and Senate, the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the Smithsonian Institute, the Lincoln Memorial and other places of interest.

New Farm Program --

Acreage Diversion ASCS Release Topic

Prentice L. Mills, county executive director of the Parmer County ASCS office, has released information concerning the acreage diversion levels for the new farm program.

The minimum acreage set-aside (diversion) requirements under the 1971 wheat, feed grain and upland cotton programs are:

1. Wheat -- a participating wheat farm must have an acreage set-aside that is equal to 75 per cent of the farm allotment.

2. Feed Grain -- a participating feed grain farm is required to set-aside an acreage equal to at least 20 per cent of the feed grain base for the farm.

3. Cotton -- a participating cotton farm is required to set-aside (divert) an acreage equal to 20 per cent of the upland cotton allotment for the farm. Note: When you acquire an acre of cotton allotment, by sale or lease, you are also adding two-tenths of an acre to your set-aside (diversion) acreage requirement for cotton on the farm.

Now that the set aside requirements are known, a farmer can easily figure out just what his acres are going to be devoted to. Also, he can compute the minimum amount of price support payments he can receive under the 1971 feed grain and cotton programs. It works like this - to arrive at the minimum cotton payment for a farm, multiply the payment yield for the farm by 15 cents and multiply the result by the farm allotment. For

example: A farm has a 40 acre allotment with a 520 pound per acre payment yield.

15 cents X 520 lbs. X 40 acres equals \$3120.00 total minimum payment.

For feed grains, the minimum payment is computed by multiplying the payment yield by the payment rate per bushel (29 cents for grain sorghum and 32 cents for corn) times 50 per cent of the base acreage for the farm.

For example: Take a farm that has a 272 acre grain sorghum base with a payment yield of 114 bushels per acre. 114 bu. X 29 cents X 136 acres (1/2 of base) equals \$4496.16 total minimum payment. Note:

The same formula would apply for corn using 32 cents per bushel.

Under the 1971 wheat program, there is no way to compute the minimum payment rates at this time. These rates will be announced around July 1, 1971.

Notices of wheat allotments, wheat yields, feed grain bases and feed grain yields along with payment rates will be mailed to farmers on February 25, 1971. The sign-up period will begin on March 1.

On The Farm In Parmer County
By R. MACK HEALD County Agent

A LOOK AT 1971 LIVESTOCK PICTURE

A substantially increased production of beef cows, yielding a larger calf crop, more feeding, and a greater cattle slaughter is part of the outlook for 1971, according to Dr. Ed Uvacek, Extension Livestock marketing specialist.

Dr. Uvacek indicated that he feels slaughter cattle prices will move up slightly through the first half of the year and

level off for the remainder. He predicted that feeder and stocker calf prices will move up sharply into the spring months, with a pattern similar to last year.

The manufacturer meat market has had a fantastic growth which isn't being met by domestic production, and this is one reason slaughter cows will again demand premium prices, especially in the spring, Dr. Uvacek predicted.

Another of his forecasts is that beef heifers, that could possibly go back into breeding herds, may be demanded more than usual, causing the price differential between steer and heifer calves to be narrower.

Dr. Uvacek also predicts high pork production throughout the next six months, keeping pork prices low. He says no improvement in hog prices is expected until after mid-year.

He also includes in his outlook a slight drop in sheep and lamb numbers with little price change from the previous year, and top prices for spring lambs little different from 1970.

The livestock outlook will undoubtedly depend a great deal on general business conditions. In this area Dr. Uvacek predicts that the economy will swing up and be well on its way by mid-year; that inflation will remain with us, but that it should continue at about only half the rate of recent years and that emphasis on cleaning up pollution and reducing the use of potential hazardous drugs and growth stimulants will become vident.

He added that projections in our economy are closely tied together, and any forecasts are related to some respect and depend upon each other.



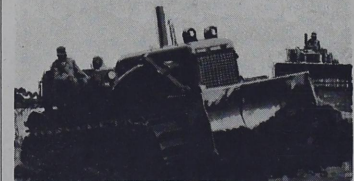


