ATTWATER VISITS KERRVILLE

Well Known Entomologist Spent Several Days in Kerr County Looking After Experiments Being Conducted

Prof. H. Attwater, industrial agent for the Sunset route, and one of the leading entomologists and plant life students of the south, spent several days at the ranch of Howard Lacey, on Turtle creek this week. Prof. Attwater was here to discuss results of experiments made on new breeds of corn that have been conducted by certain Turtle creek farmers this year. While here Prof. Attwater took advantage of the opportunity to visit his old friend, Capt. Lacey, who is also an entomologist of note, and has made many contributions of specimens from this section, and information regarding insect and plant life of the "Hill Country," to Smithsonian Institute and like institutions.

Biggest Catfish

C. C. Carr, of San Antonio who is camping on the river near Kerrville, caught a 65-pound catfish Tuesday. Mr. Carr had a trot line set in the river, near his camp, which is a mile from the courthouse. When he went to the line, alone, Tuesday morning, he soon discovered that there was something doing. Mr. Carr succeeded in dragging his catch out on a shoal, but the fish was dissatisfied and decided to return, whereupon the fisherman started a shooting affray that resulted in killing the big catfish. When this big catfish was finally landed it was found to be 4 1/2 feet long and weighed 65 pounds.

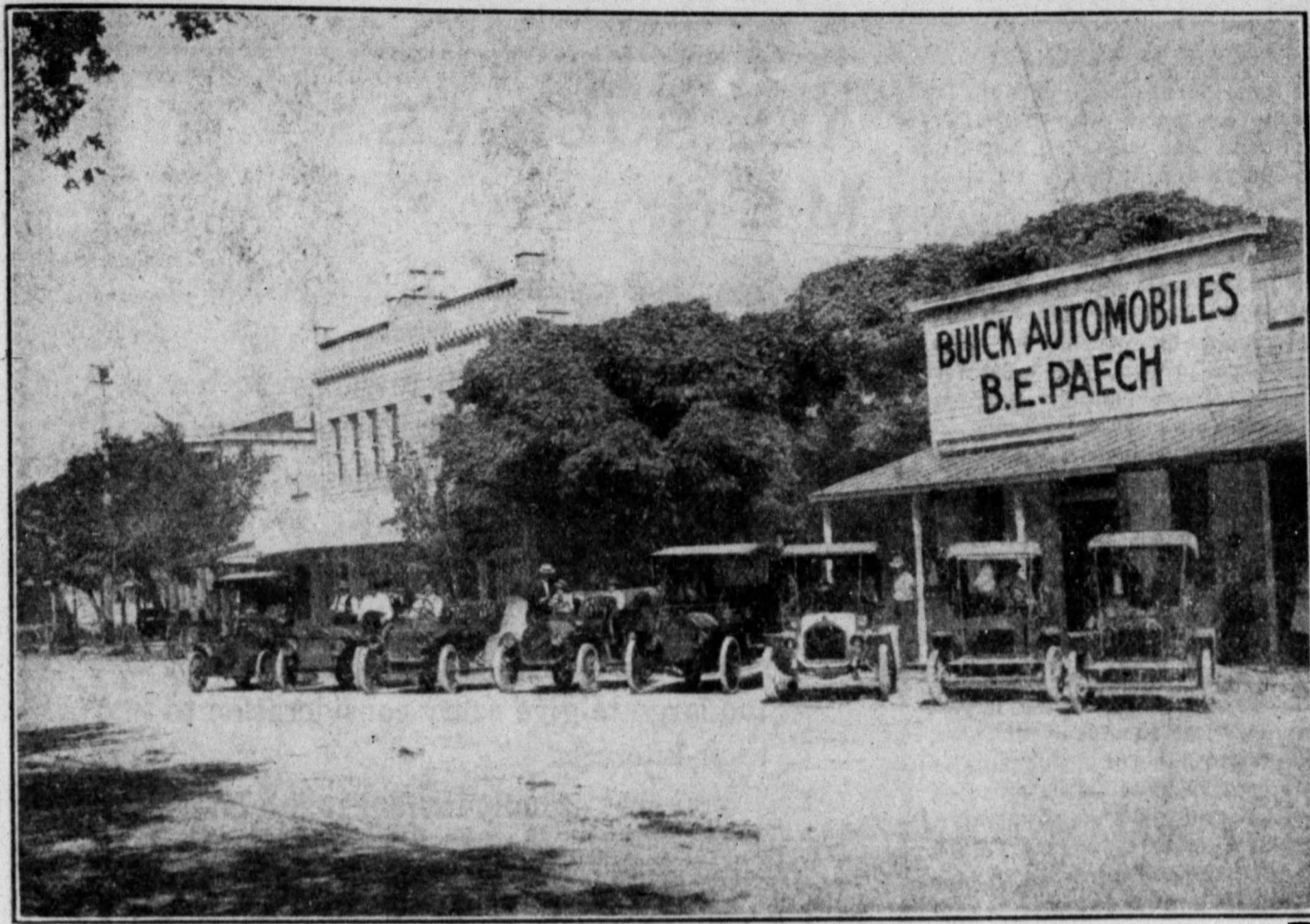

THERE is no more hospitable city in America than San Antonio, Texas. The people of the entire south are proud to see the Alamo city make preparation to demonstrate the open-hearted hospitality of the Southland, but \$5,000 is too much to spend for a single day's entertainment of any personage that is now, or has ever been on earth, however exalted his position may be. There are no more charitable people in the world than the people of San Antonio, and when cases of suffering, poverty and distress are referred to their attention this winter they will be reminded frequently of the distress that could be relieved with \$4,500 and will no doubt feel that \$500 would have been an abundant outlay for the entertainment of the nation's chief executive. If Mr. Taft is big enough for the position he holds, that of the greatest ruler on earth, he is too big to care for attempts on the part of the people to mimic Cleopatra's reception of Mark Antony. If he is not big enough for his job, five cents would be wasted on his entertainment.

BRYAN and Bailey are a little early about "starting something" in the political line. The Texas farmer is busy, just now, figuring how it is possible for one bale of cotton from eight acres of bottom land, at twelve cents per pound, to be made to meet the same obligations that he expected to meet with eight bales from the same land, at nine cents per pound. The Texas merchant is also very busy figuring how he is to get hold of the one bale, and how he is going to make "arrangements" to carry over a big lot of accounts. These two great classes of Texans are too busy to be "put right" on politics, and the other class, the professional politician, "won't stay put," so the wind-jamming looks to the working man like wasted energy.

FORAKER.—you have probably heard of him as the self-appointed champion of the poor, down-trodden nigger soldiers at Brownsville, "who didn't do a thing but shoot up the town and kill a few white people," has a new job trying to protect the down-trodden corporations from paying the corporation tax.

Harry Stokes Killed

John Owens shot and instantly killed Harry Stokes, at Fredericksburg, Monday, September 20. Owens and Stokes had had some dealings a few months ago and Owens charged that Stokes had swindled him, and made complaint against Stokes. The case came up for trial in the district court Monday, and Stokes, whose home is in Medina, went to Fredericksburg to answer the charge.

Owens was standing in the door of a barber shop about noon, when Stokes came up the street. Owens drew his pistol and fired, the bullet passing through Stokes' head, and killing him instantly. Owens gave himself up to Sheriff Klaener, and was immediately lodged in jail. It is stated that Owens claims that Stokes had repeatedly threatened his life.

John Owens is proprietor of a kind of wild west, "broncho buster" show, which had been giving performances at fairs, and famous about the country, and is said to be a man, usually, of quiet and inoffensive habits.

Stokes was quite well known in this section of the country as a turbulent character. Just a month ago he got into an altercation with H. H. Baker, and Baker cut him so severely that it was thought he would die. Stokes was just recovering from that wound when he was killed.

Death of Joseph Jackson.

Joseph Jackson, who had been an invalid for some time, died at his home near Kerrville, Tuesday, September 21. Decedent was 60 years old, and had been a resident of this country 20 years, coming here from England in 1889.

The funeral took place Tuesday afternoon from the Episcopal church, of which deceased was a member. The service was conducted by Rev. R. Galbraith and Rev. J. E. Ellis. Interment was made at Glen Rest Cemetery.

Killing deer, is today a luxury, and there are hundreds of sportsmen who are willing and anxious to pay for the privilege. This is practically an undeveloped resource of the country. The Business Men's Club is anxious to co-operate with land owners in making this a source of revenue to the country. Dr. A. F. Thigpen, secretary of the Business Men's Club, is compiling a list of those who will lease hunters rights. He earnestly requests that all such communicate with him, stating amount of acreage, distance from Kerrville and terms. Under such an arrangement the ranchman is protected, because he can so draw his contract with hunters as to make himself safe against possible loss or damage. This is as much a business proposition as selling pasturage. Call on Dr. Thigpen or write to him, as stated, and put the "hunting industry" of this section on a business basis.

"You often maintain things you don't believe," Margaret retorted, though her manner momentarily relaxed a little.

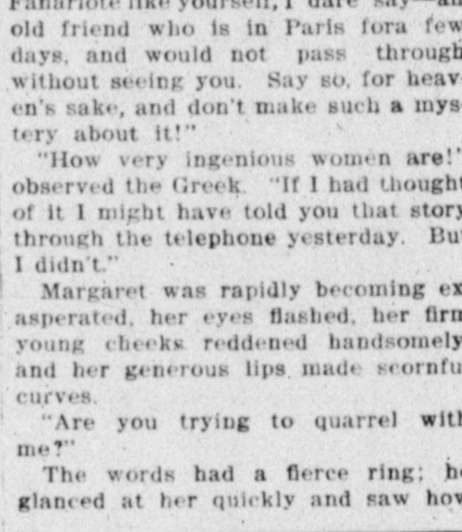
"Only in matters of business," answered the Greek with imperturbable calm.
