## SHEEP AND GOAT GROWERS' MEET

**OBJECT ORGANIZATION OF PRODUCERS WAREHOUSE COMPANY - TEMPORARY ORGANIZATION WAS EFFECTED**

**\$2,700.00 SUBSCRIBED**

**Committee Appointed to Solicit Subscriptions - Meeting Adjourned to Meet Wednesday, March 23**

Pursuant to a call published in these columns, and other papers, a meeting of the sheep and goat raisers of this section was held at Pampell's Opera House Wednesday afternoon. The meeting was called to order at 2 o'clock, p. m., and the purpose of the meeting stated by J. W. Burney, who is one of the promoters of the enterprise. Mr. Burney expressed his belief in the need of such organization on the part of the wool and mohair producers. The speaker dwelt at length upon the benefits that in his judgment would accrue from competitive warehouses and lower interest rates.

Mr. Burney was followed by Judge Ben H. Kelly, who discussed the legal phases of the enterprise. Mr. C. H. Thalman, of Bandera, made a short talk on practical lines.

The matter of temporary organization was then taken up. J. W. Burney was elected temporary chairman, and S. H. Huntington temporary secretary.

Ways and means of reaching permanent organization were then discussed. After a recess a motion was made and carried by which the chair was authorized to appoint a committee to solicit stock subscriptions. All stock to be in shares of \$50 each, \$25 to be paid within 30 days and the remainder in 25% payments at intervals of six months. It is understood that if stock is not subscribed to the amount of \$50,000 those who have subscribed are not bound and may withdraw from the organization at their option. The committee appointed under this motion is as follows:

C. H. Thalman, Bandera county; J. W. Garrett, Kimble county; Ernest Dietert, M. D. Sharp, Edwards county; H. Welge, Ben H. Kelly, Kerr county.

A motion was also carried providing that expenses of the soliciting committee be paid by a pro rata amount of cash collections if organization is not perfected.

The meeting then adjourned to meet on Wednesday, March 23.

### Committee Votes Thanks.

At a meeting of the wool growers committee held Wednesday night, a vote of thanks was extended to Manager Pampell for the use of the Opera House as a convention hall.

President Burney stated after the committee meeting, that additional lists of stock subscriptions had been received raising the aggregate to \$15,000.

## COMMISSIONERS' COURT ADJOURNS

**SPENT LAST WEEK LOOKING AFTER AND ADJUSTING COUNTY'S AFFAIRS**

## ROAD FUND APPORTIONED

**Numerous Claims and Accounts Allowed, and General Business Disposed of**

The February term of the Commissioners' Court of Kerr county adjourned last Saturday.

In the matter of trespass of a county road upon and parallel with the right-of-way of the San Antonio & Aransas Pass railroad, an order was made disclaiming any right or title thereto on the part of Kerr county, and setting forth that said Kerr county would vacate said right-of-way at any time upon 60 days written notice.

Petition signed by Wm. A. Albrecht, et al., praying for a change in the road from Kutzer's gin to Flach's mill, was granted and the change ordered to be made.

A petition signed by Chas. Presler, et al., praying for a change in the Cherry creek road was granted.

The quarterly report of County Treasurer, A. B. Williamson was examined and approved.

An order was issued allowing the sale of certain land belonging to the Silver creek school.

An agreement was entered into by the court with Miss Adele Whittle for the compilation of delinquent taxes on all lands and lots in Kerr county since 1888.

The report of W. H. Rawson, treasurer of Kerrville Public Schools, was examined, found correct and approved by the court.

The quarterly reports of A. H. Moore, county clerk, J. T. Moore, sheriff and tax collector, and E. H. Turner, Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1, were approved.

An order was made by the court re-establishing certain county line school district, formerly abolished as unconstitutional, but lawful under an amendment to the state constitution adopted last year.

A pauper allowance of \$4 per month was made for eight persons living in Kerr county.

The jury of view appointed in the matter of a third class road petitioned for at the November term of court by Louis Biermann, et al., reported and the road was ordered opened.

Dr. E. E. Palmer was appointed by the court as county physician of Kerr county, vice Dr. F. L. Fordtran, deceased.

An order was entered, allowing the sheriff 35 cents per day for feeding prisoners incarcerated in the county jail.

The road and bridge fund for the four commissioners' road precincts were assigned as follows:

Precinct 1, \$1000.  
Precinct 2, \$ 750.  
Precinct 3, \$ 600.  
Precinct 4, \$1650.

The remainder of said fund to be used for general expenses, and to hereafter be divided to the various precincts at the discretion of the court.

The county treasurer was ordered to pay all interest on the county's bonded indebtedness and to redeem two bonds of \$500 each.

### INTERSCHOLASTIC TRACK MEET

**Will be Held at Austin in May - More Than One Hundred High Schools and Seminaries Will Participate**

The following letter was received from the manager of the Texas Interscholastic Track Meet:

Austin Texas February 1, 1910.

Tivy High School, Kerrville Texas.

Dear Sir:

The University of Texas department of Track Athletics extends a cordial invitation to the track team of your school to enter the Annual Texas Interscholastic Track Meet, to be held at Austin, Texas, May 5th and 6th, 1910. Invitations have been extended to over a hundred high schools and academies in the State. This should result in the most successful Inter-Scholastic Meet ever held in Texas. Over one hundred athletes will compete for the State Championship honors.

All expenses incident to the meet, will be assumed by the University of Texas department of Track Athletics. The net receipts, after deducting expenses of the meet, will be divided equally among the competing teams. Provision for the entertainment of the teams while in the city has also been made by the co-operation of the different clubs, fraternities and associations of the city.

All assistance possible will be rendered by the Track department of the University of Texas in making this year's meet an absolute success. Further particulars concerning this meet will gladly be given upon request.

### Drilling Deep Well.

Capt. Chas. Schreiner is drilling for artesian water. Wm. Davidson, who conducted the drilling on a number of the best wells of the San Antonio Water Supply Co., arrived in Kerrville Tuesday. Mr. Davidson has the contract for the Schreiner well. The derrick is now up and machinery placed. Drilling will begin at once. The original contract is for a depth of 1,000 feet, but Capt. Schreiner is going in for abundance of good artesian water, regardless of depth.

The well is going down on property owned by Capt. Schreiner, near the new ice and Electric plant. In the work the same casing is being used as that used by the water works companies of the large cities. It is believed that an abundant flow of water will be found at less than 1,000 feet.

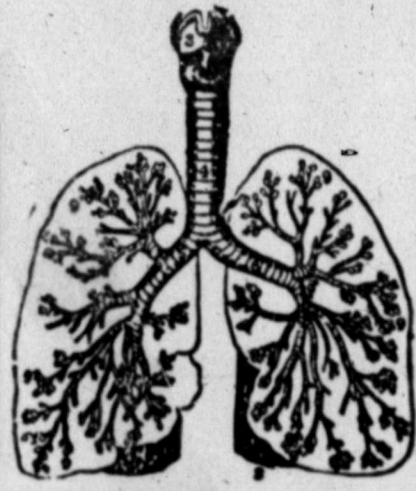

### Pipes of Redwood.

The decay-resisting properties of the California redwood, which have made it a favorite building material on the Pacific coast, have recently led to its use for irrigation pipes and conductors for hydro-electric power plants. For this purpose the wood is cut in long staves which are fitted together like those of a barrel and firmly banded. Some of the pipes are carried across deep canons and gorges as well as through trenches underground. They are even used to some extent in the eastern states. The chief source of supply is the great forests in the neighborhood of San Francisco bay, which are estimated to cover about half a million acres.—Cleveland Leader.

**PLANTING MORE HOGS.**

Louisiana and Mississippi planters in the region about Natchez have decided to plant more hogs and less cotton, and a meat packing company is to establish a plant in Natchez to take care of the surplus hogs from the farms.

Mississippi and Louisiana planters have heretofore been in the habit of buying their pork and bacon in town instead of raising it on the farm, and it has usually taken about all they got from the sale of their cotton to pay for the bread and meat bought from the grocer.

This was not good business policy at any time or under any circumstances and it is especially bad business policy now when bread and meat are so dear and the market price of cotton so uncertain. The establishment of a packing plant at Natchez will be an inducement for farmers in that surrounding country to raise more hogs, and if the farmers will greatly increase the hog raising industry it will be an inducement to the packers to establish additional plants or to enlarge their facilities for taking care of the surplus. There is money in hogs. There can be no question about that, because the demand exceeds the supply, and the market price is always up. No great amount of care is needed in raising hogs after the pigs are old enough to root for themselves.

In eight months after the litter they may be made ready for market at a comparatively small cost of finish up. The skim milk, which has heretofore gone to waste, mixed with a little cornmeal in the proportion of one pound to 4 or 5 of milk makes an ideal feed for pigs, both before and immediately after weaning time. Grass, herbs and a peanut patch will do the remainder of the work except to finish them off during the last two or three weeks on corn, and they should weigh, say about October, 250 pounds, which, at 8 cents, would return to the farmer \$20 a head. There is no probability that hog production will catch up with the demand for at least three years to come, and prices next fall will be as high as there are now. With an increased acreage and the outlook for a favorable season, the price of cotton will not be so high next season as this. Mississippi and Louisiana are to be congratulated on the very sensible idea of crop diversification which Texas is adopting, but not with the energy the situation demands.

If the farmers in Southwest Texas should emulate the example of those of Mississippi and Louisiana by going into the hog raising industry on such a large scale San Antonio would have little difficulty in securing the location of a packing plant would furnish a market for all that could be supplied, and in the meantime the farmers would find their hogs in active demand both in the local market and from the packers at Fort Worth and elsewhere.

The same amount of labor and expense involved in the growing and picking a bale of cotton would be sufficient for the raising of several hogs, and at \$20 a head the return would be handsome. —San Antonio Express.
