





### MAKE GUN TOTING FELDNY

Texas Legislature Would Put Crimp in Bad Practice

AUSTIN, Tex., March 3 .- The House aimed a blow at Texas' deplorable homicide rate today when it passed to engrossment the bill by Us sery, making it a felony to carry a, pistol. The offense is punishable by imprisonment in the State penitentiary from one to three years.

Several attempts to amend the bill failed and one amendment was accepted; cutting the punishment down from two and five years minimum and the maximum.

The House devoted more than half the entire session to Lane's bill changing the antipass law. Lane's bill xeempted many classes of citizens including public officials and Confederate veterans. The bill was passed to engrossment with all the new provision stricken out except that granting the railroads the right to give Confederate veterans fee

The bill provovked debate from all parts of the House and nearly all the questions that were discussed six years ago when the original antipass las was enacted. The discussion brought out an amendment from Hunter, extending the exemptions to the degree of practically killing the law except as to legislators and newspaper men. Then ogers moved an amendment including legislators and newspaper men. The next step was to strike out all the exemptions except as to Confederate veterans and engross the bill.




