The former Zeldia Donaldson of Bovina, Mrs. Ellison gave birth to a daughter on February 14 and on that same day received the first copies of an album she started in November and completed in December.

"My husband joked about the baby and the records arriving on the same day, and sure enough, they did—on Valentine's Day," she exclaimed.

The baby, Tiffany Denise, weighed seven pounds, four ounces and was eighteen inches long.

The maternal grandmother, Mrs.

Sterling Donaldson of the Oklahoma Lane Community, taught school in Bovina for a number of years and Mrs. Ellison graduated from Bovina High School in 1968.

The Ellisons moved to Dimmitt in 1971 after she graduated from Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene. Prior to taking a maternity leave, Mrs. Ellison taught seventh and eighth grade English and eighth grade typing in the Dimmitt School.

Mr. Ellison is Vocational Adjustment Coordinator under Plan A with the Dimmitt Schools.

"I have always liked to sing, but it was always just for fun," Mrs. Ellison said. "My two sisters and I used to sing trios for church, and then recently my students started asking me to sing for their banquets and things."

LAST SATURDAY'S experiment by President Ford in visiting by telephone by some 42 folks in a two-hour session broadcast on CBS radio was a bold venture by the new president. Perhaps it helped to reinforce Carter's image as a "people's president."

The president was asked a good many questions by the callers that he hears in press conferences, plus several that weren't among the most asked.

THOSE WHO HEARD the broadcast may recall that when the program was kicked off, technical difficulties were encountered in broadcasting with the elaborate telephone equipment that had been installed. That must have been an embarrassment to the telephone company.

A caller from Wisconsin asked the president: "As the wife of a dairy farmer, what can be done about improving the public relations between the consuming public and the U.S. Agriculture Department in regard to the price increases for farm commodities and an explanation to the public that we as farmers receive only a small amount of these widely acclaimed increases?"

Carter's reply was that by putting a farmer into the White House, and an actual dirt farmer in as Agriculture secretary, two steps to solve the problem had been taken. Then, he said the American public needs to be told the truth about agriculture and the farm and ranch families of the nation, as to how to have a stable farm economy with predictable production and prices that don't fluctuate wildly.

A 13-year-old caller, John Herald of California, asked the president: "Why not ship from the East to the drought-stricken West?"

Carter replied "I think somebody found that it would be too expensive to ship snow to the West. I believe that in the future we're going to have to start worrying about water conservation as well as energy conservation."

Mrs. Esther Thomas of Pennsylvania asked the president "How can we as middle class earners expect legislation or reforms that would remove tax loopholes the rich use as deductions when all the legislation is made by the rich? There are no poor people, no lower-class wage earners in either the house or the senate."

The president re-emphasized his wishes to close up the tax loopholes that benefit the rich and powerful, in order to help the middle class taxpayers.

Mrs. Richard Nicholson of Fort Worth told the president "I feel that you are violating the states' rights when you call in to the different states and lobby for the ERA (Equal Rights Amendment). I was wondering if you don't think that this should be left up to the individual state legislators?"

Carter said "Well, I think you probably have noticed that the final decision is with the state legislators, and although I have made a few telephone calls since I've been in office and have talked to some personally and to some governors about the passage of ERA. I haven't tried to interfere or put pressure on them. When I ran for president, I made it clear that I was in favor of the Equal Rights Amendment passing and still am in favor of it and hope it does pass...I reserve the right to express my opinion just like you have a right to express yours."

Phyllis Rodgers of Albuquerque, N.M. asked "We are very concerned about the solar energy program here in the state of New Mexico, and we're hoping it will go through for us."

Carter replied that he would like to see the research and development programs decided on a merit basis, but said New Mexico has a head start on many places around the country due to their long history of research and development and the state's climate.

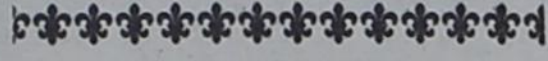

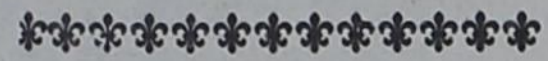

Bovina Boy Is Finalist In Contest

The names of 11 finalists in the Rural Electric Youth Tour contest sponsored by the Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative were announced this week by James Hull, manager of the Cooperative.

The 11 juniors were selected from a group of high school juniors who gave speeches on: "Rural Electric Coops-Good for All Americans." The 11 finalists are: Naomi Ramaekers, Darryl Birkenfeld, Ladonna Brockman, Joyce Acker, Nazareth, Texas; Bryan Johnston, John Carson, Jay Jarboe, Mark Edelman, Janice Peak, Friona; David Steelman, Bovina; Billy Ray Chance, Dimmitt.

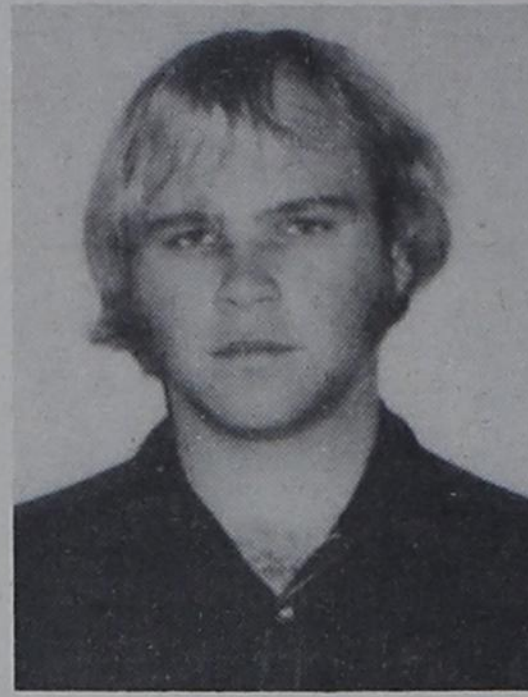
These 11 young people will give their speeches on March 9, 1977 to a panel of three judges. From the group of finalists, a boy and girl will be selected as winners of an all-expense-paid Rural Electric Youth Tour trip to Washington, D.C. the week of June 9.

Final judging of the contestants is to be based on the following: (1) knowledge of cooperative rural electrification, including a written test-40 per cent; (2) speaking ability-30 per cent; (3) poise-10 per cent; (4) personality-10 per cent; and (5) appearance-10 per cent.

The youth group will travel to and from Washington, D.C. by bus. Participants will be chaperoned by three adult couples.

During the four-day stay in the Nation's Capital, these young people will see the United States government in action, visit with their Congressmen and Senators and visit various government agencies and sites of historical significance. Included on the four-day agenda will be visits to: Smithsonian Institute, White House, Arlington Cemetery, Mount Vernon and many monuments.

On Wednesday, June 13, the group will meet approximately 1,000 young people from 30 states for a program coordinated by the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association. The morning program will be an informative question and answer

session with congressional leaders and high government officials. After a brief lunch, 37 buses will transport the young people to the South Lawn of the White House for a special program and tour of the presidential mansion. A fun-filled "shindig" will highlight the day's events.

Christian Tabbed Outstanding Farmer

The Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District has selected Troy Christian as the conservation farmer of the year.

Troy and Lillie, with their three children, live on their farm six miles south of Bovina. Troy farms seven quarters of land, each with a center pivot sprinkler. By farming corn under the sprinklers and cotton in the corners he is able to get the most efficient land use. Troy has been cooperating with the Parmer County SWCD as long as he can remember.

Present methods of conservation farming are an every day thing with Troy. It hasn't always been that way. He has pioneered water, soil and energy conservation in his community.

Troy put in one of the first center pivot sprinklers in his community. This has led to a number of conservation practices. Troy said he was spending a good bit of his tractor time getting furrows ready to receive the irrigation water. He has conserved both time and energy by cutting out this costly operation.

Troy does not use a deep bed. He has found out that he has less erosion with a shallow bed.

By going sprinkler he is able to trash farm. He said that he cannot go "No Till" because it is necessary to "bust out" stalks for insect control.

The minimum tillage Troy practices provides an insulation on the soil reducing the moisture loss through evaporation. The trash reduces wind erosion to zero. By leaving the trash on the surface, Troy has improved the water penetration from his sprinklers. He said water penetration wasn't much of a problem on his sandier soils, but his clay loam soils were a problem until he had built up his trash cover.

The kind of farming Troy is doing now has maintained his production. He is now shooting for optimum production because it is more economical than maximum production. Another thing Troy is doing, in fact, the day he was visited, is modifying his equipment so he can do a more economical job of trash farming. By saving time, labor, fuel, water, and soil, Troy is doing a complete job of conservation farming.

Getting the cart before the horse is not a bad way to summarize the problem faced late last year in one of the world's hungriest countries, India. An all-out agricultural development effort combined with the good fortune of ideal monsoon rains produced such a bumper crop of food grains that it forced officials to store nearly 20-million tons. Unfortunately, India's storage capacity is severely limited... so limited that the government is storing about half the grain in the open covered only by plastic sheets. Rather than risk the loss of the food grains, officials are seriously considering exporting it. Hopefully the situation will make clear the necessity for adequate grain storage. Development of such systems would protect the temporary surpluses produced in their own countries as well as give them the capacity to purchase imported grain on a regular basis. Preferably from American farmers.

Fillies Anticipate Banner Track Year

The Bovina Fillies are faced with quite a challenge for the 1977 season: beating their accomplishments of last year.

All the Fillies did a year ago was finish as runnerup at the State Track and Field meet, just three points behind state champion Paducah.

At first glance a year ago, it would appear that Coach Joel Nelson's Fillies might climb up the extra

rung on the ladder. Bovina didn't have a senior on its track team.

But junior standout Dianna Naegle, who performed on the team's winning mile and 440-yard relay teams, decided against running track this year. Miss Naegle also was strong in the long and triple jumps.

"We have added an 880-yard relay team this year. In order to make a

strong bid for a state title, it helps to have three relay teams," Nelson says.

He thinks the 880-yard relay foursome of Sandi Sides, Diane Gilbreath, Denise Read and Belinda Shelby have a good chance of going to the state meet, and eventually winning the gold medal.

In the mile relay event, Miss Read has replaced Dianna Naegle, and in the sprint relay, where Bovina set a new state record for Class A teams, Belinda Shelby, a freshman, is the new girl on the foursome. Sandi Sides, Diane Gilbreath and Debra Gilbreath are the returning performers who helped win two gold medals for BHS at the 1976 state meet.

The Fillies also can count as a returning performer Pat Shepherd, who finished second at state in the discus throw. Miss Gilbreath was third in the 220-yard dash.

The Fillies were on their way to a possible meet victory in their first outing at Littlefield last week until adverse weather forced cancellation of the meet.

Pat Shepherd had won the shot put with a toss of 38-4, and was winning the discus. Denise Read had won the high jump for the Fillies. Bovina's 440-yard relay team had the best time in the preliminaries, and was a good bet for a first place.

In other preliminary races, Debra Gilbreath had the best time in the 220-yard dash at 27.5; Denise McCormick had the second best time in the hurdles and Annette Stevenson had the fourth best time. Sandi Sides was second in the triple jump.

But the meet officials at Littlefield met and decided to cancel the afternoon finals, after the preliminaries had been held in blowing snow which had made portions of the track a bit hazardous.

The team will go to Olton on Saturday, where they will try once again to see just how they stack up against the other teams from this area.

Preliminary events get underway at 9:30 a.m., with the finals slated to start at 2 p.m.

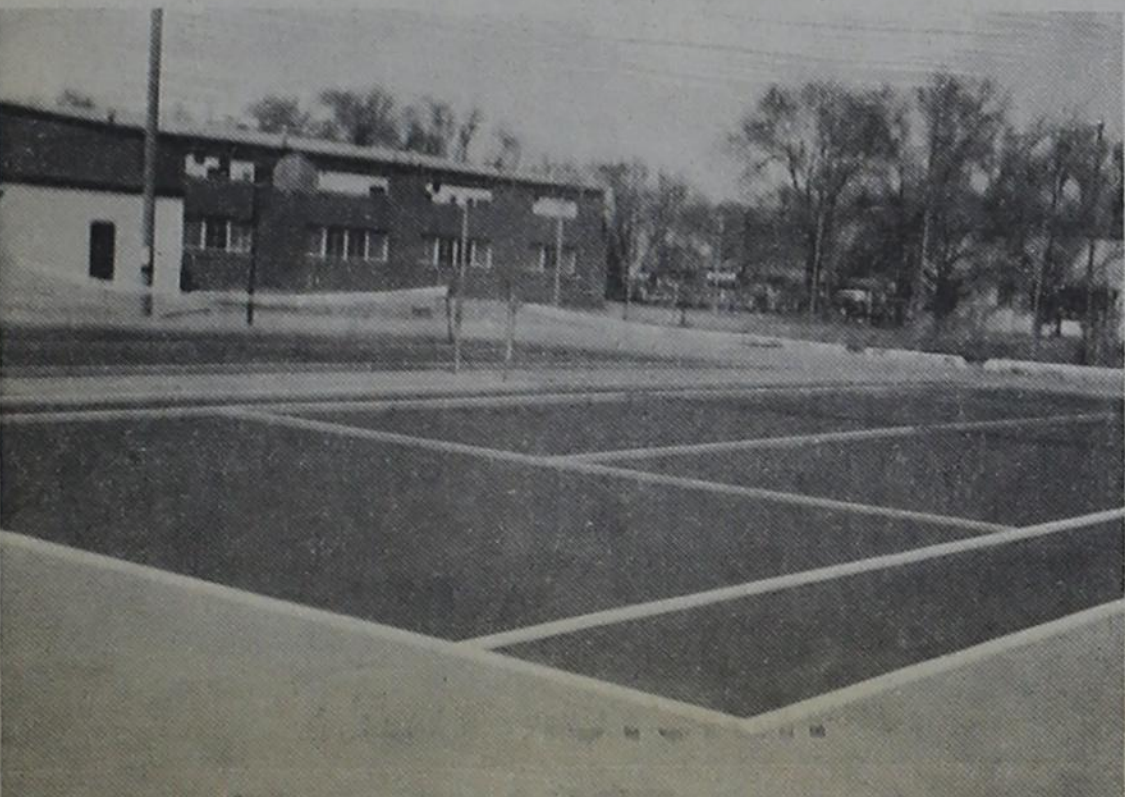

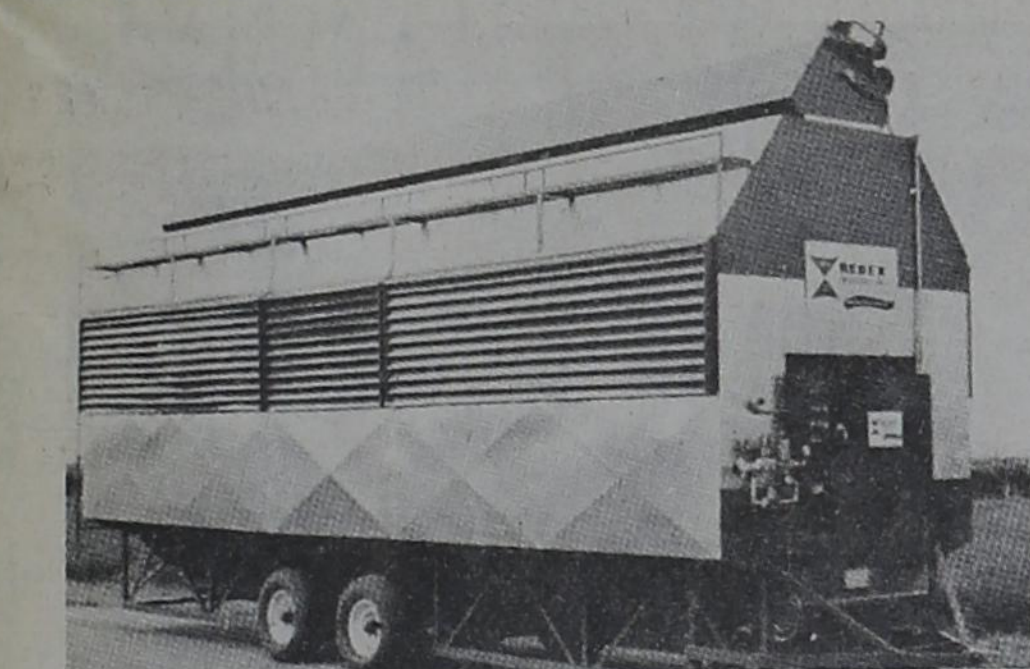

Area Roads Tabbed For Seal Coat

Parmer County will receive 13.1 miles of seal-coat work as its share of the 1977 State Highway Safety and Betterment and Farm to Market Road Improvement Program announced this week by District Engineer George C. Wall, Jr. of Lubbock.

The work in Parmer County will cost an estimated \$70,800 and is part of a \$40 million statewide program.

Included on the list of improvements for Parmer County will be seal coating of FM 2397 from State Highway 214 to the Castro County line, a distance of 12.1 miles.

Also, Spur 2397 from Fifth Street in Friona to FM 2397, a distance of .6 miles, will be re-coated, as will be Spur 270 in Friona, from U.S. 60 South to Fifth Street.

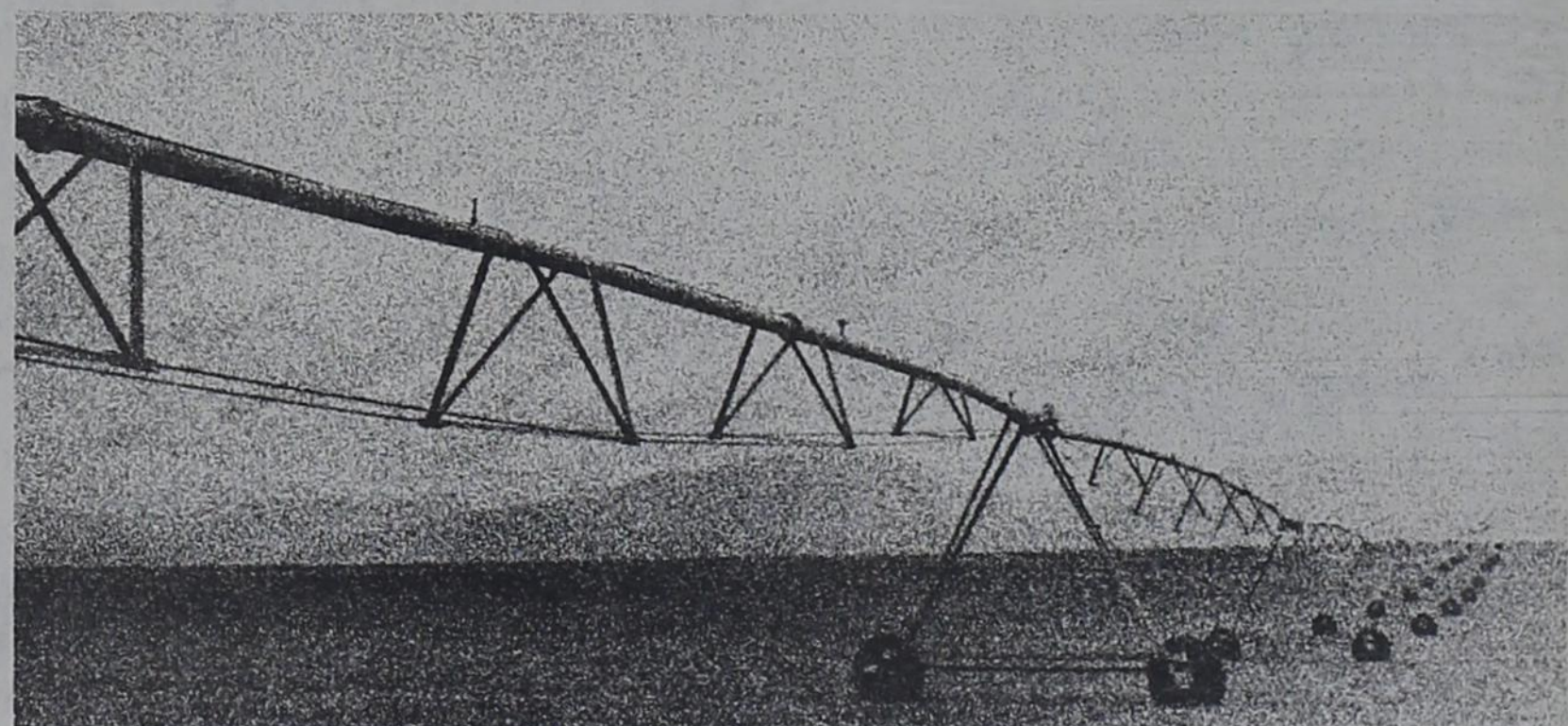
Statewide, the 1977 program provides for the improvement of some 4,665 miles of highways at an estimated construction cost of slightly more than \$40 million, with an additional \$7,700 earmarked for right of way acquisition and relocation assistance.

Similar programs were deferred for about a year in 1975 and 1976 as a result of the financial crisis of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

However, since such programs included rehabilitation of old and obsolete highways, safety measures, and provisions for increased traffic capacity, they could not be long deferred.

Approximately 61 per cent of the program funds will be devoted to State and US Highways, 37 per cent to Farm to Market Roads, and 2 per cent held in reserve.

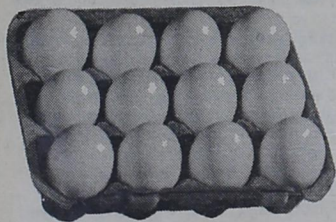
