For some who would like to have material for member programs, your County Extension office, 481-3619 in Farwell, has much material available on homemaking subjects. The material is based on research from recognized authoritative sources. All groups and individuals are invited to use this service.

Fall Shopping for Clothing - can be very exciting now, with all the beautiful colorful fabrics available in ready-mades and fabric materials.

This is a good time to do a little wardrobe planning, using a pencil and paper to better organize and coordinate clothing needs for the coming year. An inventory of what you have (on paper) can be a big help

and prevent disappointments later. That so often heard phrase "I don't have a thing to wear", is most usually true even with a closet full of clothes. Uncoordinated colors, clothes for all occasions are lacking and designs wrong for your individual figure are some of the disappointments experienced from lack of planning.

Knowledge of fabrics is needed if complete satisfaction is to be gained. A small Extension Service booklet titled "Clothing Action", gives information on characteristics, uses, care and trade names of the various fabrics. Some of these are being distributed by local stores and are available free from your Extension Office here in Farwell, at the County Courthouse. Come by the Home Demonstration Agent's office and get a copy or call 481-3619 and a copy will be sent to you.

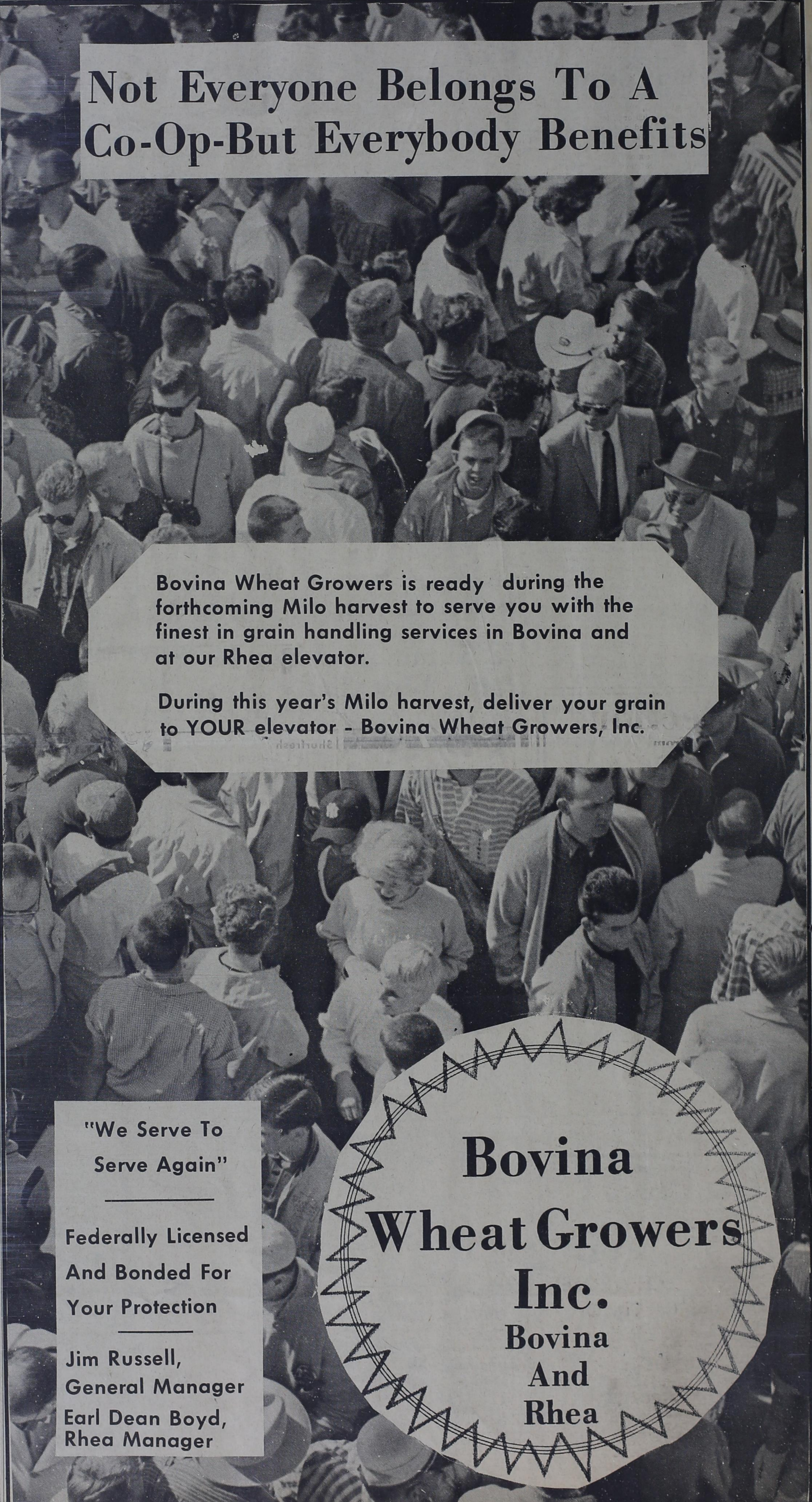
Dear Dolph,

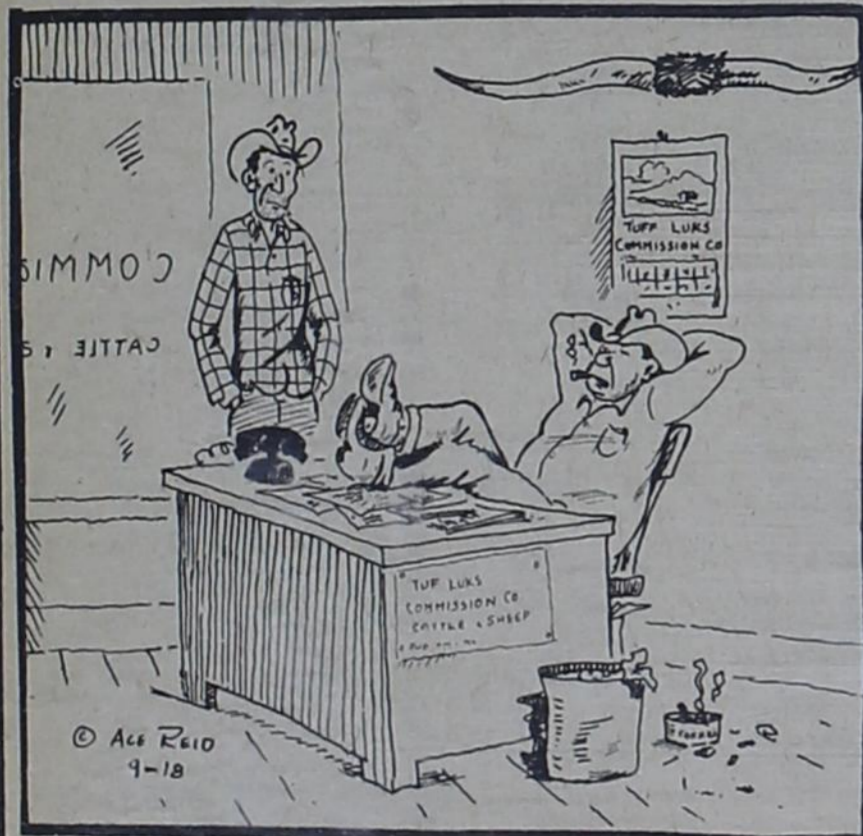

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On Peace --

Essay Contest Set By Lions

Young people of Bovina have been given a challenge to develop a plan for world peace by their Lions Club -- a challenge that could earn one of them a \$25,000 educational and/or career assistance grant.

Bovina Lions Club, with Lions Clubs throughout the world, is sponsoring a world-wide essay contest for the world's youth on the important world subject today -- Peace. The contest offers \$50,000 in total awards, including the \$25,000 first prize, eight semi-final world regional awards of \$1,000 each and travel expenses for the eight winners to Chicago, Ill., in July, 1967. At that time, the first prize winner will be chosen from the eight. Also, more than 20,000 local, district and multiple district awards will be made.

"We are hopeful one of our young people will win this world-wide prestige award," President H. J. Charles of Bovina Lions Club said in announcing the contest locally.

The contest, open to young people who will be 14 but less than 22 years of age as of January 15, 1967, was announced by the President of Lions International, Edward M. Lindsey, of Lawrenceburg, Tenn., during the Association's Annual International Convention in New York.

"The Peace Essay Contest is divided into eight world divisions for the \$1,000 prizes," President Charles said.

"Our Club's winner will advance to Lions District 2-T1 competition in his effort to qualify for the multiple district contest," Charles said.

The Contest sponsored by more than 20,000 Lions Clubs in more than 130 countries in the free world, will be the largest Peace Essay Contest in the world today.

In announcing the contest internationally, President Lindsey said that Lions International, the world's largest service club organization is well qualified to sponsor such a contest.

He said the world-wide representation of Lions, the attention given to international relations and friendship between different nationalities and their participation in international humanitarian programs were their credentials for the patronage of the contest.

Contestants should submit their entry in essay form, not to exceed 5,000 words.

"Judging will fall into four categories: 75 per cent of the essay's points will be devoted to content, ten per cent to organization, ten per cent to style and five per cent to mechanics," Charles said.

The mechanics segment will be used to appraise the grammatical construction of the essay.

"Three judges will be appointed to evaluate the entries submitted to our club," Charles said.


"If our winner can advance through the judging stages up to the world finals he will receive an expense paid trip to Chicago to attend the Lions International 50th Annual Convention for the final judging of his essay in addition to the \$1,000 award."

Charles said he hoped local young people would accept the challenge and enter his club's section of the contest. Closing date for the club's contest is December 10, 1966.

"Students wishing to enter the contest should contact one of the Bovina Lions to get full details of the contest," he said.

Charles announced that each applicant would be limited to one entry, with one winner's essay eligible to compete in the Lions District 2-T1 contest. Winner of district contest will be entered in state or country contest. Each country or multiple district winner will be entered in one of the eight world divisions.

Know The Truth By Lavern Stewart

Being ignorant of the will of God does not free one from guilt; however, it might help him in that God would give him an opportunity to learn of his guilt. Paul called himself the chief of sinners because he bitterly opposed the church; yet in view of his being ignorant of his guilt, God granted him mercy. This mercy was not salvation from sin, but merely an opportunity to learn of his guilt and know what to do about it, 1 Tim. 1:13-16.

Paul, the apostle, was once called Saul, a persecutor of Christians. On one of his trips to abuse disciples he was struck to the earth and blinded by the Lord. At this time he learned that he was a sinner, and asked what Jesus would have him do. His question and the Lord's answer are found in Acts 9:6, "And he trembling and astonished said, Lord, what wilt thou have me to do? And the Lord said unto him, Arise, and go into the city, and it shall be told thee what thou must do." According to his own account of the happenings, in Acts 22:16, when the Lord sent a man to inform him what he "must do" it was "to be baptized so that his sins could be washed away."

God's mercy to Paul included the occasion of learning that he was a sinner and, also, learning that he must be baptized to be saved. But, suppose that he would not have been willing to obey Christ, would Christ have been his Savior? Of course not, read Hebrews 5:9.

God's will for us has been revealed, and Jesus showed in Luke 12: 47, 48 that all sinners must be punished, whether they know that they are sinners or not. We are commanded to know God's will, Ephesians 5:17. One must "do" God's will to be saved, Matt. 7:21, yet one cannot do what he doesn't know.

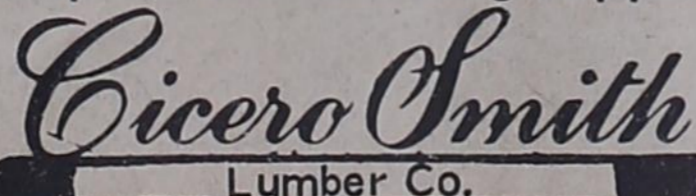
