MEXICAN'S DIET HAS DISHES ODD AND HOT

INSECT EGGS, CALLED "WATER WHEAT" STRANGE DELICACY.

Staff of Life. Since Days of Montezumas Has Taken the Form of Tortillas, of Indian Corn.

Houston Post: If the American soldiers had been forced to live on "the fat of the land" while on their punitive expedition into Mexico they would have found it decidedly lean and would have had occasion to complain bitterly of the commissary, for although the neighboring republic has within its borders an extraordinary variety of food products, including most of the vegetables, fruits and cereals grown in both the temperate zone and the tropics, there is neither variety nor abundance in its northern States. A bulletin on culinary practices in the Southern Republic, issued by the National Geographic Society in Washington, says:

"Since the days of the Montezumas, Mexico's staff of life has taken the form of the tortillas, made of Indian corn, which is indigenous to the country. The preparation of the tortilla is the work of the Indian women, who first boil the grain and then, while adding water, grind it to a stiff paste on a metate, or flat mortar. This paste usually is molded with the hands into thin cakes and is cooked much after the fashion of the 'hot cake' of Dixieland.

"The frijole, or Mexican bean, frequently fried in fat, is another staple, both when served alone and when constituting an important ingredient of the famous chile con carne, a sort of goulash, compounded, customarily, of beef and beans, with a plentiful seasoning of chili, the Mexican pepper.

"The hot tamale has made its way across the border, but it does not have the same flavor when taken from an earthenware pot as when the particles of meat are seasoned with pepper, mixed with corn meal, wrapped in corn shuck, boiled until thoroughly cooked, peeled out of and eaten from the shuck.

"One of the odd dishes of Northern Mexico is the pipian, made of finely ground squash seed, boiled in a sauce pan.

"While the tortillas, frijoles, chile con carne, and tamales, 'washed down' with liberal portions of pulque, may be considered the foundation of his menu, the peon of Southern Mexico has various appetizers which are unknown to the peon of the north. There is, for example, the 'water wheat,' which is not exactly what its name implies, but the eggs of flies. The native Mexican eats his water wheat with the same epicurean relish that the Chinese mandarin eats his expensive bird nest, the Central African his raw hippopotamus, the Canton merchant his stall fed dog, and the West Indian his palm worms stewed in fat. The water wheat fields are ponds in which the peon places bundles of reeds a few feet apart, so that their tops are just above the surface. On these reeds or rushes the insects deposit their eggs in incredible numbers. The bundles are then removed and the 'crop' is shaken off. The eggs, resembling fine fish roe, are made into small cakes and are sold in the markets, to be eaten either as we eat cheese or mixed with corn meal and fowl eggs. The insects themselves, which are about the size of our house flies, are also eaten; the method of preparation being to pound them into a paste and boil with corn husks.

"The fruits of Southern Mexico are numerous and some of them are delicious. One of the most unusual is the papaya or melon zapote, which grows on a tree and often weighs as much as 20 pounds. It has characteristics which link it to the cantaloupe, the pumpkin and the watermelon, and in addition contains considerable pepsin, so that the diner may take his aid to digestion and his desert at one and the same time.

"The parrot fruit is peculiar chiefly on account of its striking resemblance to the green parakeets which are to be found in Mexico. These little birds frequently elude hawks by perching among the fruit, from which they are almost indistinguishable.

"The traveler who plucks fruit from the arbol di dinamite and stows it away in his suitcase will be startled to hear a loud explosion in a short time, as the product of the apply named dynamite tree detonates whenever it is placed in a warm spot.

"Lovers of chocolate bonbons and drinkers of cocoa are indebted to the ancient Mexicans for the cacao bean. The Montezumas called the beverage made from this bean, which was at one time used as money, chocolate, from choco (cocoa) and latl (water). Another valuable bean from tropical Mexico is the vanilla, which grows on a climbing orchid.

MEXICAN WAR RELICS IN NATION'S MUSEUM

GENERAL MAGRUDER'S SWORD AMONG OLD MEMENTOS.

Exhibit Includes Epuletts Worn by Captain Thornton, Hero of First Engagement of 1846.

Washington, D. C.—On the 25th of April, 1846, 70 years ago, the first skirmish of the Mexican war was fought on the north bank of the Rio Grande at La Rosia. General Zachary Taylor's army was encamped near what is now Brownsville, a point in Texas opposite Matamoros, Mexico, when he learned that a large body of the enemy cavalry or lancers had crossed the Rio Grande some miles above his position. He at once detailed Captain Seth Barton Thornton, U. S. A., with a squadron of the Second Dragons to reconnoiter. While endeavoring to execute his orders, having lost his guide, Captain Thornton was surrounded by a Mexican cavalry force of over 500 men, but gave a good account of himself. In attempting to cut his way through he lost an officer and several men, was himself wounded and captured with the remainder of his force.

This was the first blow of the Mexican war. The United States forces were successful in the battles of Palo Alto and Resaca de la Palma, and finally the Mexican General Arista evacuated Matamoros, whereupon Taylor crossed the Rio Grande himself on May 18, and Congress formally declared war on May 20, 1846, calling for 50,000 volunteers and increasing the regular army to 30,000.

In connection with this first skirmish of the war there are in the National Museum the epuletts and service sword worn by Captain Thornton, who was killed in a later engagement with the enemy at San Antonio, Valley of Mexico, while at the head of his squadron.

There are many other relics and mementos of famous Mexican war officers in the division of history of the museum. Among them are some recent acquisitions from Mark Burckle Hatch, son of Brevet Major General John Porter Hatch, U. S. V., who took part in all the principal battles of the Mexican war. He was brevetted first lieutenant for gallant and meritorious conduct in the battles of Contreras and Churubusco, and captain for gallantry at Chapultepec. Later he served with distinction in the war between the States, following which he was presented with a fine silver service, consisting of a large tray, pitcher and four goblets, by the citizens of Oswego, N. Y., in recognition of his services to his country. These objects, together with a sword and scabbard, and his uniform coat worn when a lieutenant during the war with Mexico, are on display in the museum.

Two pairs of spurs used by Brigadier General George W. Morgan, U. S. V., are in the collection, as well as a flintlock pistol captured during the battle of Churubusco. Morgan, being a former army officer, was commissioned as colonel at the opening of the war with Mexico, and at the battles of Contreras and Churubusco, where he was severely wounded, he was twice mentioned for gallantry receiving also the thanks of the Ohio State Legislature and eventually becoming brevet brigadier general. General Morgan's shoulder straps and two swords are also exhibited.

The service saber carried by Brevet Brigadier General William H. Browne, U. S. V., when a lieutenant in the Mexican war, is in the museum exhibits. A Spanish sword marked, "Fabrica de Toledo, 1827," captured from a Mexican officer by Lieutenant Browne is also to be seen here.

A presentation sword and a silver pitcher relate to the career of Lieutenant Colonel John Bankhead Magruder, U. S. A., who commanded a light battery of artillery in General Pillow's division in the Mexican war. He was brevetted as a major for gallantry at the battle of Cerro Gordo, and as lieutenant-colonel at Chapultepec, where he was wounded. Later when Virginia seceded he signed and entered the Confederate army as captain of artillery, becoming a major general during the war. At the close of the war between the States, after surrendering his forces in Texas, he went to Mexico, where he served Maximilian as a high civil officer. He finally returned to the United States to lecture on Mexico, and settled in Houston, where he died, one of the authorities of his time on Mexico.

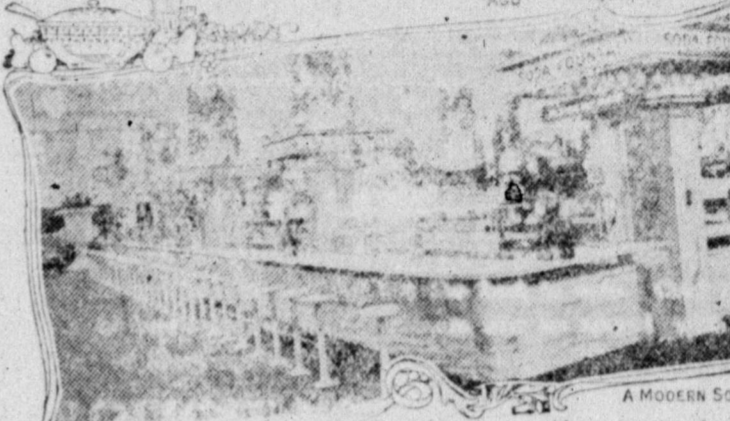
Another conspicuous figure of the Mexican war, Brigadier General James Shields, U. S. V., is recalled by several relics, including two presentation swords, from the citizens of Illinois and South Carolina. Shields served on the Rio Grande, at Chihuahua and Cerro Gordo, where he was

wounded and gained brevet of major general. He was again wounded at Chapultepec. After being mustered out 1848 he became Governor of Oregon Territory, serving later as United States Senator, and as a brigadier general in the war between the States.

The exhibits include a dress sword presented to Brigadier General Gabriel Rene Paul, U. S. A., by the citizens of St. Louis, for his services in Mexico. He was wounded at the battle of Cerro Gordo while captain and brevetted as major for gallant conduct at Chapultepec, where he led a storming party and captured a flag of the enemy. In the Civil War he was conspicuous for his bravery, but was unfortunately blinded by a rifle ball at Gettysburg. He eventually became a brevet brigadier general, with full pay granted by a special act of Congress.

Among the other exhibits are a gold-headed cane and telescope, said to have belonged to General Santa Anna; a uniform coat, hat and service sword, one worn by Captain Charles O. Collins, U. S. A.; a Spanish blunderbuss and a sword captured from Mexicans and a dress coat worn in Mexico by Lieutenant Baldwin J. Crosswaite of the Third Ohio Infantry.

EARLIEST BALE ON RECORD ARRIVES IN HOUSTON

Houston, Tex., June 10.—The first bale of cotton of the 1916 season, and also the earliest bale on record in the history in the cotton-growing industry, arrived in Houston Friday night from Lyford, consigned to William D. Cleveland & Sons, cotton factors, and will be sold at auction at 11 o'clock Saturday morning on the floor of the Houston Cotton Exchange by Secretary J. F. Burwell.

This first bale was grown by R. F. Deyo of Lyford and was produced in one field of 32 acres. It was ginned in Lyford Thursday and shipped by express Friday morning over the St. Louis, Brownsville & Mexico Road to Houston, arriving in this city Friday night. The bale weighed about 600 pounds, and is the largest of all the extremely early bales.

The previous early record for first bales was that made in 1911 when the first bale came from San Benito, arriving in Houston on June 11, which was a Saturday night. It was auctioned on Monday, June 13, 1911, by Secretary Burwell of the Houston Cotton Exchange. That bale was received by Gohlman, Lester & Co., and was bought by Jesse H. Jones for \$1,015, which was the high record price for the first bale. It weighed 493 pounds.

A Large Job.

Dallas Evening Journal.—The historian of the future, particularly that intrepid one who attempts a reliable record of the great war, will essay a staggering, if not impossible task. The scope of operations and the vastness of the opposing armies are sufficient in themselves to deter, but the chief deterrent, one may well believe, will be the censors' suppression and distortion of results on field and water. There may be a way some day to get at the official reports, but it grows more evident daily that most of these have been and are being shaped for home consumption. For that reason the historian who arrives at correct conclusions must be gifted with a capacity to delve deeply and to eliminate and accept with a certainty little short of infallibility.

THE REAL REASON OF KERRVILLE'S REFUSAL

The "Giants" defeated Kerrville again last Sunday, 6 to 2. The game was featured by Kerrville being out-classed to such an extent that they refused to play a return game under any conditions. This is a disappointment to the Fredericksburg fans as they had made preparations to entertain the Kerrville lads with a luncheon the next time they come over. As matters stand this hospitality will have to be conferred on some other team that can take the short end of a game without getting their feathers ruffled.—Fredericksburg Standard.

The Fredericksburg fans and the majority of the "Giants" are all to the good by the dirty tactics of one or two of the players are beyond endurance, and to the opposing team and the spectators. The Kerrville boys play clean ball and don't mind taking the short end of a game, provided it is worthy the opposition fairly. So far this season they have not received a fair deal from Fredericksburg and the management very properly refused any further games.

FOUR BILLION FISH AND EGGS IN YEAR

REPORT OF GOVERNMENT WORK SETS NEW RECORD FOR U. S.

Conservation of Food Fishes Given Close Attention and All Branches Covered During the Past Year by Bureau.

Washington, D. C.—The annual report of the Commissioner of Fisheries to the Secretary of Commerce shows that the bureau has just completed the most successful of the forty-five years of its existence. The number of fish produced and distributed was greater, and the cost of production per million less, than in any previous year. Fifty permanent hatcheries and 76 subhatcheries, auxiliaries and egg-collecting stations have been conducted and the output during the fiscal year 1915 was over 4,000,000,000 young fish and eggs, an increase of more than 241,000,000 over the previous year. Plants of food fishes were made in every State and Territory; fish eggs were distributed to the fish-commissions of 27 States, and consignments of eggs were sent to Porto Rico, Cuba, India and Japan. The distribution of the output required over 145,000 miles of travel by the five special cars of the bureau and 491,000 miles by detached messengers. The introduction of the humpback salmon of the Pacific coast into Maine streams, which last year was an experiment, is now a reality, as numbers of these fish were taken during the summer of 1915 in the Maine rivers; furthermore, ripe eggs have been taken from them—a proof positive of thorough acclimatization. The counter-experiment of transplanting the Atlantic lobster in Pacific waters is still in progress.

The steady decline of the lobster industry has been a source of great uneasiness. The causes of this decline are well known, and a conference of fishery experts was held in Woods Hole early in July to consider just what remedy should be applied to the alarming situation. The resolutions adopted clearly point out the course that the States must pursue to arrest the decline, and show the need for greater efficiency in artificial propagation.

The marked diminution of the shad also presents a serious problem. Shad are caught in every coast State from Maine to Florida and have for many years formed a substantial contribution to the food supply. Now, because of inadequate protection afforded the fish on their way from the sea to the spawning grounds, the supply is being rapidly depleted. Shad hatcheries built and maintained at great expense by the Federal Government have been put out of commission by the inability to obtain eggs for hatching purposes. The most serious condition exists in the Chesapeake basin, where last year the fishery was the poorest ever known.

The pearl button industry of the Mississippi valley is reposing much faith in the output of fresh water mussels from the Fairport (Iowa) biological station of the bureau. The fresh water mussel begins its life as a parasite on the gills of fishes, and part of the work of the Fairport laboratory is infesting fishes with these parasites—a process which in no way injures the fish but merely provides a vehicle for transporting the mussels to the places where they mature and become of commercial value. About 300,000,000 young mussels were thus put into suitable nurseries in 1915.

The Bureau of Fisheries has done and is doing much for the conservation and utilization of food fishes which have heretofore been wasted. Considering the universal cry of the high cost of living, the efforts of the bureau along this line entitle it to be regarded as a public benefactor. Each year when the Mississippi and Illinois Rivers, with their various tributaries, overflow their banks and later recede, millions of young fish are left stranded in temporary pools or where in a short time they would perish. Rescue work is, however, undertaken by the bureau, and in 1915 over 8,000,000 valuable food fish were saved and delivered to applicants, deposited in public waters, or returned to the main rivers. Another phase of this work is the exploiting of unknown or little known food fishes and other aquatic products. The campaign carried on by the bureau put the sea mussel, a wholesome food, for centuries highly regarded in Europe, on the American market as a regular article, and established a permanent and growing industry. This work has been extended to other neglected sea foods, and still further exploitation is promised, the recent establishment of the tlefish being a case in point. Aid is given also to fisheries also established, and during the past year fishing

here, submitted in January, 1915, and presents in detail a statement not alone of the condition of the seal herd but also of the fox and reindeer herds belonging to the Government, and of the natives who inhabit the seal islands. These natives have always been a more or less difficult problem for the bureau. Recent reports show a material improvement in the physical, moral, educational and industrial relations of the natives. The suppression of the manufacture of intoxicants by the natives and the restriction of the use of alcohol for medicinal purposes only have worked much good. An innovation in the relations of the Government to the natives is in the method of compensating them for services rendered. Heretofore labor was paid for in cash, which was in turn largely spent for supplies obtained from the Government, the money thus received being covered into the United States Treasury. This made a double drain on an appropriation already too small for the needs of the service. Now all able bodied natives are required to perform some kind of labor for which they receive compensation in supplies. A new method of obtaining supplies for the Pribilof Islands was instituted in 1914-15, and a large saving will result therefrom.

"Titanic" Wheat.

United States Department of Agriculture: The department has recently been advised by a correspondent in California that a variety of wheat is being advertised under the name "Titanic." The assertion is made that it is a new variety of wheat discovered in England about four years ago, and that a small quantity of seed was brought to the United States by one of the survivors of the ill-fated Titanic. The wheat is represented as having extremely high yielding power, the returns reaching as high as 7,000-fold. A photograph sent by this correspondent shows a head identical in appearance with the widely exploited "Alaska" wheat. Five acres of the wheat are said to be growing in the State of Washington, and the seed, it is believed, will be offered at high prices after harvest. The department

has no further or more definite information concerning this variety, but farmers and dealers are cautioned to be on their guard concerning this new exploitation.

Administration of Justice.

It certainly was not the intent of the law-making body of the State government in the enactment of laws prohibiting and punishing illegal combinations or combinations in restraint of trade to enact revenue laws to acquire funds for the support of the State government. The evident intent and purpose was to prevent such combinations. Instituting suit for one hundred million dollars, and compromising it for a paltry half million dollars, cannot have a restraining influence on violators of the law. On the contrary, it encourages the continuance of the practice; knowing that they can buy immunity for a comparatively small sum, they readily and cheerfully pay the price, and go on doing business at the same old stand in the same old way, perhaps changing the name only.—Captain B. B. Paddock.

Lawyer's Relation to Community.

Few people stop to appreciate the real relation of the lawyer to a well ordered community; he is the man above all others officially licensed to advise respecting all personal and property rights embodied in the phrase, life, liberty and property; he is counselor in respect to legal rights and duties, and advocate for their enforcement or defense; he occupies a position in the community of great opportunity for righteousness or abuse; he is the licensed and ordained minister of justice, as the clergyman is the minister of religion and the physician the minister of health. When he abuses the confidence which is placed in him he uses his privileges to prey he is a real menace to the community. It is, therefore, to the great and substantial interest of the whole community that these privileges should be committed only to men of integrity and worthy of confidence, men of honorable purpose and high moral and professional ideas.—Charles A. Boston, Committee Chairman, New York Lawyers' Association.

CRISIS IS EXPECTED AT ANY TIME IN MEXICAN AFFAIRS

Washington, D. C., June 13.—State and War Department officials today describe the Mexican situation as worse than at any time since American troops entered Mexico.

Repeated raids by bandits on American territory, and the growing efforts of Mexican leaders to organize a movement to drive American forces out of Mexico, threaten to force a crisis at any moment, officials said today.

While reports of spreading anti-American demonstrations are reaching the State and War Departments in increasing volume, there is strongest evidence that the Administration had adopted a stiffer attitude with reference to Mexico.

The War Department is known to have begun preparations for calling out additional National Guard organizations for possible service in Mexico. If developments necessitate more troops the War Department will have to call on the National Guard, as the resources of the regular army practically have been exhausted. Officials are doubtful of the wisdom of making further inroads into the Coast Artillery, as there are less than 12,000 of these troops left to man the sea-coast defenses.

Official confirmation of the report that the leader of the bandits that raided the Coleman ranch on Sunday was Lieutenant Colonel Villareal, an officer of the Carranza army, reached the State Department today. Villareal's body was identified. He wore his Carranza uniform when killed by American pursuers.
