

Lt. Gov. Smith Speaker For Clinic Dedication

Preston Smith of Lubbock, state lieutenant governor and Democratic Party nominee for governor, will be the featured speaker at dedication of the new Bovina Medical Clinic. The ceremony is scheduled for Sunday afternoon at 3:30. Open house at the clinic will follow the dedication --- from 4 to 7 p.m., announces Mrs. Bob Estes, who heads a committee in charge of the ceremony.

Other members of the committee are Mrs. Jesse Walling and Mayor Bedford Caldwell. Caldwell will be master of ceremonies.

Also on the program will be Mrs. Virginia Hammet of the

Sears Foundation. She will present a plaque to the citizens of the community for erecting the new clinic.

Smith will be introduced by Ross Ayres of Friona. Plans furnished by the Sears Foundation are being followed for the dedication. The new brick building is located east of FM Road 1731 in the south part of town.

The clinic was constructed this spring at a cost of approximately \$50,000 which was raised from citizens of the community on a voluntary basis.

As the clinic was nearing completion, Dr. Cornelius

Blesius, a native of Germany, agreed to practice medicine in Bovina. Arrangements were made between Dr. Blesius and the clinic's board of directors for the doctor to use the clinic.

Dr. Blesius began his practice here the first of July. Formal invitations to the ceremony have been sent to all contributors to the clinic fund and to others throughout the area interested in the project, Mrs. Estes says.

Serving as hosts during the open house will be members of the clinic board of directors. They include A. M. Wilson, president; Mrs. Earl Whitten, secretary-treasurer; Mrs.

Walling, Rouel Barron, Buck Ellison, Earl Stevenson and Dolph Moten.

In charge of refreshments during the open house will be Mrs. Whitten, Mrs. Walling and Mrs. Leon Ware.

Mrs. A. M. Wilson will be in charge of registering guests. Members of Bovina's Boy Scout Troop, under the direction of Scoutmaster Clenden Suddeth, will present the colors at the beginning of the program.

Chairs for those attending will be arranged outside the clinic.

The program will include a ribbon-cutting ceremony.

Bull Town Days 'Better Than Ever'

Whew! Another Bull Town Days has come and gone and with some mighty good fun and visiting, eating, and a lot of hard work. Best part about the celebration is that almost everyone who participated in one form or another was happy and satisfied with it. "Seems like it gets better each year," we heard more than one person comment.

Nothing succeeds like success and certainly Bull Town Days falls into that success category.

The carnival rides were a beneficial addition to the overall state of events this year. Not only did they provide six nights of entertainment for those who like that sort of thing, they added festival atmosphere to the town during their week-long stay here. Too, the rides were something that almost all children could participate in, if heretofore Bull Town Days have had a shortcoming, it has been a lack of activities for children. The carnival rides filled that void this year and we hope they can become a permanent part of the celebration.

And, oh yeah, the rides brought in some \$800 net money to the general Bull Town Days fund. That, in itself, is enough to make them highly popular with leaders of the celebration even if they didn't offer all the aforementioned advantages.

We don't mean to give the carnival rides more than their share of the credit, but they were new and different this year, they were here all of Bull Town Days week and they did bring in more than their share of revenue.

Money has never been a big problem of Bull Town Days. Businesspeople loosen up their purse strings sufficiently to take care of all the financial needs. Still, there wouldn't, possibly, be anything wrong with the promotion being self-supporting, free barbeque and all, if such could be done without making it appear that the community had its hand out to take money from the casual LTD visitor.

In other words, it's all right to take in enough money to break even if we don't have to be overly commercial about it.

And most people realize there's nothing really free and they're happy about it. That's the reason it's no problem to sell shave permits for \$2 each and raffle tickets for LTD at \$1 a throw. We know of several shave permits which went for \$5 when the \$2 figure was plainly printed on them. People want to contribute to something good and they plan to get their money back, with interest, in good food, fun and fellowship.

Our biggest 1968 LTD disappointment was the cow calling contest.

We entered again, as usual, figuring we would, as usual, place down among the also-rans. It didn't happen that way, though. We placed second, which is better than we had done in the previous four years. We should have been happy about that finish and we were, in a way. We got a plaque of which we're especially proud.

The trouble was the fellow from Hereford who finished in first place---ahead of us. He was our Republican friend, Frank Ford, who is running for state representative.

Since we're Democratic precinct chairman, we felt that we might have let our party down

2800 Attend Free Barbeque

Bull Town Days 1968 came to a close Saturday night after a three-day run. "Better than ever" was the consensus of opinion from leaders of the celebration which started on Thursday and continued through Saturday.

Highlighting the celebration was a huge free barbeque Friday night in downtown Bovina which attracted more than 2500 people.

This was the fifth consecutive year for the event to be staged here and the feeling is that it's getting bigger and better and running more smoothly as time goes on.

Nancy Mitchell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dean McCallum, who will be a junior in Bovina High School this year, was crowned Bull Town Days queen following judging of contestants on horseback and in personal interviews Thursday evening at the roping arena.

First runner-up was Toni Pinner, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Pinner. She will be a BHS sophomore. Second runner-up was Darlene Denney, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Denney.

Miss Mitchell was crowned at the beginning of the variety show later Thursday evening in the school auditorium by LaNelle Christian, the 1967 LTD queen.

A total of eight girls competed in the queens' competition.

Champion beard growers was Pat Quintana. Placing second in the beard competition was Tom Sloan of Williamsburg, N.M. Keith Scott of Texico, N.M. was third. Others competing in the beard growing contest were Darrell Read, R. T. Harbour and Joe Dutton.

Mrs. Ed (Alta) Hutto won first place in the women's division of the cow calling competition. Second place went to Mrs. Buck Ellison, the 1967 champion, and Mrs. Bob McMeans was third.

In the men's cow calling competition, Frank Ford of Hereford took first place, Dolph Moten was second and Quintana was third. Honorable mention went to Micheal Hodges, five-year-old great-grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Reagan Looney. Looney was the '66 champion.

The beard growing winner and the first three finishers in the cow calling competition received plaques, also prior to the variety show.

Thursday's events opened with jack-pot calf roping. Attendance at this event was fairly light, but the competition was keen and the 20 to 30 contestants on hand enjoyed the competition.

The Thursday night variety show, directed by Betty Hawkins, played to a crowd estimated at 1000. The school auditorium, where the show was held, has normal seating for 714. However, folding chairs were set up in the aisles and several watched from the doorways and the outside windows.

Friday's activities started early --- at 7 a.m. --- with a chuckwagon breakfast at Bovina Gin Co. Fire for the breakfast cooking was coals left over from the meat barbequing of Thursday night.

More than 300 attended the breakfast which was prepared by a crew of men cooks under the direction of Vernon Estes.

Old timers and former residents of Bovina were registered from 10 a.m. until 12 noon at the school cafeteria by members of Bovina Woman's Study Club. A basket lunch was served at noon.

Board Approves \$446,408 Budget

A budget for \$446,408.00 for the 1968-'69 school year was approved by the board of trustees of Bovina Independent School District at a regular meeting Monday night.

The tax rate was set by the school board as the same as last year, \$1.83 per \$100 valuation.

The board also accepted two resignations. Those of Mrs. Jay Boothe as a second grade teacher and Mrs. Gene Ezell as cafeteria supervisor.

Mrs. Leola Williams was approved as a second grade teacher. Mrs. Ezell's replacement has not yet been named, according to L. F. Jacobs, superintendent. Mrs. Ezell has been in charge of the cafeteria for the past 12 years.

A pay raise for Mrs. Zoe Clary, school district tax assessor-collector was approved. The increase was from \$4570 to \$4800 per year.

The board sold a surplus school bus for \$1607 to D. E.

Krawuse Bus Sales of San Antonio. The high bid was one of three submitted.

Also accepted was a bid from the Borden Co. to provide milk for the cafeteria at a cost of .068 cents per half pint.

Routine business included ap-

proving the amended budget for the past school year.

Income for the forthcoming school year to the school district are expected to be \$228,330 from local taxes, \$184,411 from state and county funds and \$17,595 from state and federal funds.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR14)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 14 proposing an amendment to Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section 52a to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 52a to read as follows:
"Section 52a. The Legislature shall have the power to authorize cities, counties, and towns to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes, or in aid thereof, provided that property acquired from proceeds of the bonds shall be subject to ad valorem taxes. Legislation passed in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment shall not be invalid solely because of its anticipatory nature. The tax revenue, the utility revenue, and the revenue from services of any county, city or town may not be used to pay any bonds issued pursuant to this authority nor the interest thereon."
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:
"FOR the constitutional amendment to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes."
"AGAINST the constitutional amendment to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes."
Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (SJR24)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. Article 8, Constitution of the State of Texas, is amended by adding a Section 2-a to read as follows:
"Section 2-a. (a) The Legislature may, by General Law, exempt from ad valorem taxation by the state and its political subdivisions all or a portion of any equipment, device or improvement installed or constructed on real property, which is designed to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions or water effluents on the air and water quality in this state, to the extent that the capital investment in such property is made to comply with or to exceed air or water quality standards established by law.
"(b) Legislation which may be enacted in anticipation of the adoption of this Section is not void because of its anticipatory nature."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment giving permissive authority to the Texas Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation by the State of Texas and its political subdivisions equipment installed on real property to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions and water effluents, provided that the capital investment in such equipment complies with the air and water quality standards established by the State of Texas."
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment giving permissive authority to the Texas Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation by the State of Texas and its political subdivisions equipment installed on real property to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions and water effluents, provided that the capital investment in such equipment complies with the air and water quality standards established by the State of Texas."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ELEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR60)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to add Section 64 to read as follows:
"Section 64. (a) The Legislature may by statute provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within El Paso or Tarrant Counties. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require.
"(b) The county government, or any political subdivision(s) comprising or located therein, may contract one with another for the performance of governmental functions required or authorized by this Constitution or the Laws of this State, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe. No person acting under a contract made pursuant to this Subsection (b) shall be deemed to hold more than one office of honor, trust or profit or more than one civil office of emolument."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR37)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 52e to read as follows:
"Section 52e. Bonds to be issued by Dallas County under Section 52 of Article III of this Constitution for the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, may, without the necessity of further or amendatory legislation, be issued upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and to provide that bonds hereafter or hereafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."
"Section 52e. Bonds to be issued by Dallas County under Section 52 of Article III of this Constitution for the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, may, without the necessity of further or amendatory legislation, be issued upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and to provide that bonds hereafter or hereafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."
"Section 52e. Bonds to be issued by Dallas County under Section 52 of Article III of this Constitution for the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, may, without the necessity of further or amendatory legislation, be issued upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and to provide that bonds hereafter or hereafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR61)

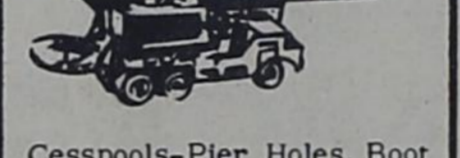
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:
"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year and a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day of each Regular Session and each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.
"Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:
"FOR the constitutional amendment providing the members of the Legislature shall receive as salary an amount not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year."
"AGAINST the constitutional amendment providing the members of the Legislature shall receive as salary an amount not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year."
"Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, association of individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever; provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors under such regulations and limitations as may be deemed by the Legislature as expedient, and to their widows in indigent circumstances under such regulations and limitations as may be deemed by the Legislature as expedient; provided that the provisions of this Section shall not be construed so as to prevent the grant of aid in cases of public calamity."
"Section 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment continuously reducing State ad valorem property taxes and abolishing all State ad valorem property taxes after December 31, 1978, except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning."
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment continuously reducing State ad valorem property taxes and abolishing all State ad valorem property taxes after December 31, 1978, except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning."

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PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR32)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 1-e to read as follows:
"Section 1-e.
"1. From and after December 31, 1978, no State ad valorem taxes shall be levied upon any property within this State for State purposes except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning.
"2. The State ad valorem tax established by Article VII, Section 3, of this Constitution shall be imposed at the following rates on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the years 1968 through 1974: On January 1, 1968, Thirty-five Cents (35c); on January 1, 1969, Thirty Cents (30c); on January 1, 1970, Twenty-five Cents (25c); on January 1, 1971, Twenty Cents (20c); on January 1, 1972, Fifteen Cents (15c); on January 1, 1973, Ten Cents (10c); on January 1, 1974, Five Cents (5c); and thereafter no such tax for school purposes shall be levied and collected. An amount sufficient to provide free text books for the use of children attending the public free schools of this State shall be set aside from any revenues deposited in the Available School Fund, provided, however, that should such funds be insufficient, the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the State.
"3. The State ad valorem tax of Two Cents (2c) on the One Hundred Dollars valuation levied by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution shall not be levied after December 31, 1976. At any time prior to December 31, 1976, the Legislature may establish a trust fund solely for the benefit of the widows of Confederate veterans and such Texas Rangers and their widows as are eligible for retirement or disability pensions under the provisions of Article XVI, Section 66, of this Constitution, and after such fund is established the ad valorem tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, shall not thereafter be levied.
"4. Unless otherwise provided by the Legislature, after December 31, 1976 all delinquent State ad valorem taxes together with penalties and interest thereon, less lawful costs of collection, shall be used to secure bonds issued for permanent improvements at institutions of higher learning, as authorized by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution.
"5. The fees paid by the State for both assessing and collecting State ad valorem taxes shall not exceed two per cent (2%) of the State taxes collected. This subsection shall be self-executing."
Sec. 2. That Article III, Section 51, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

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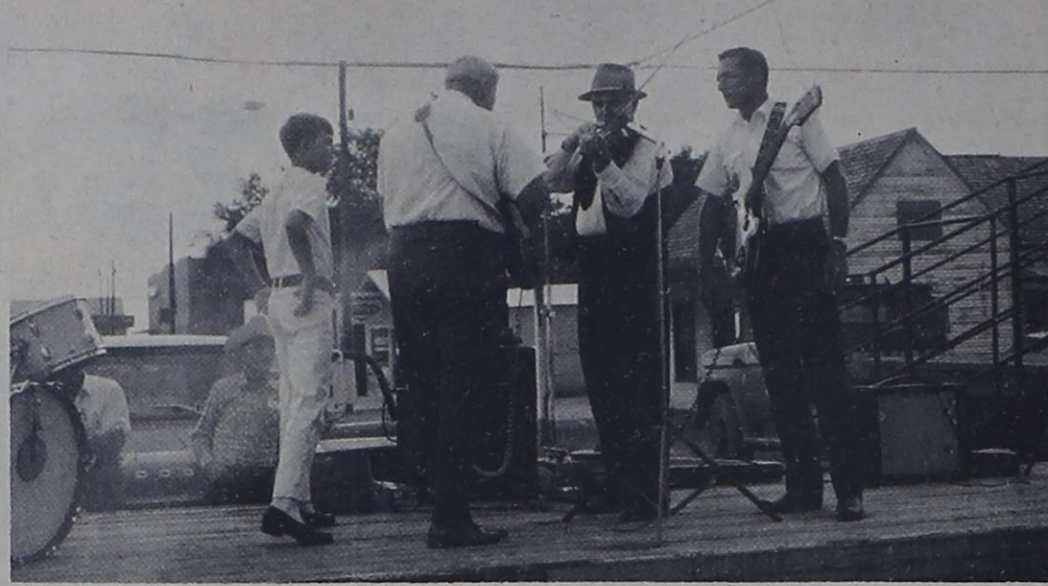

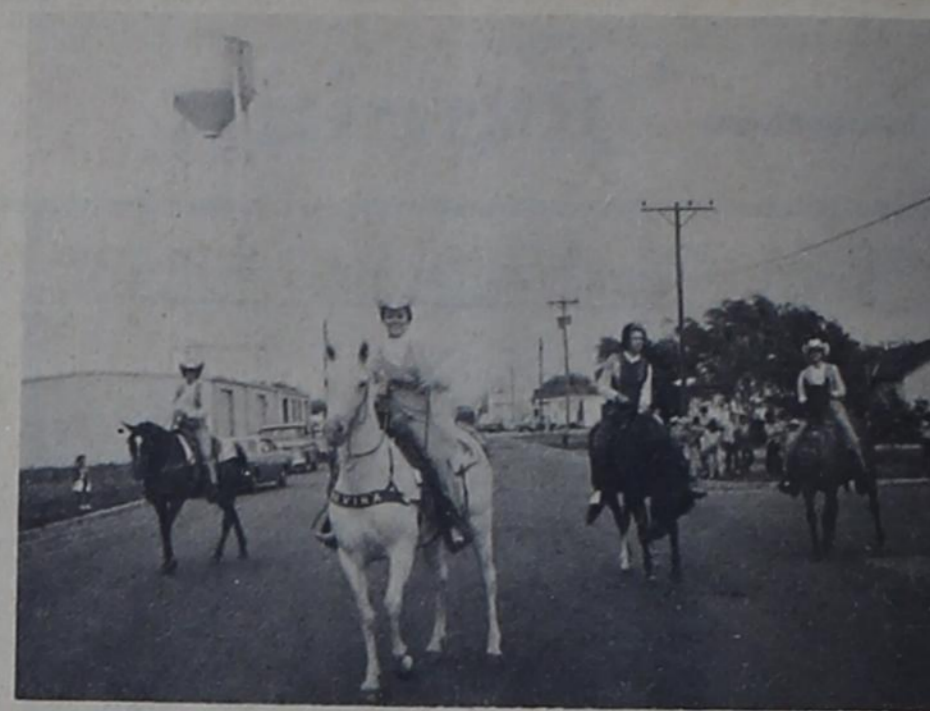
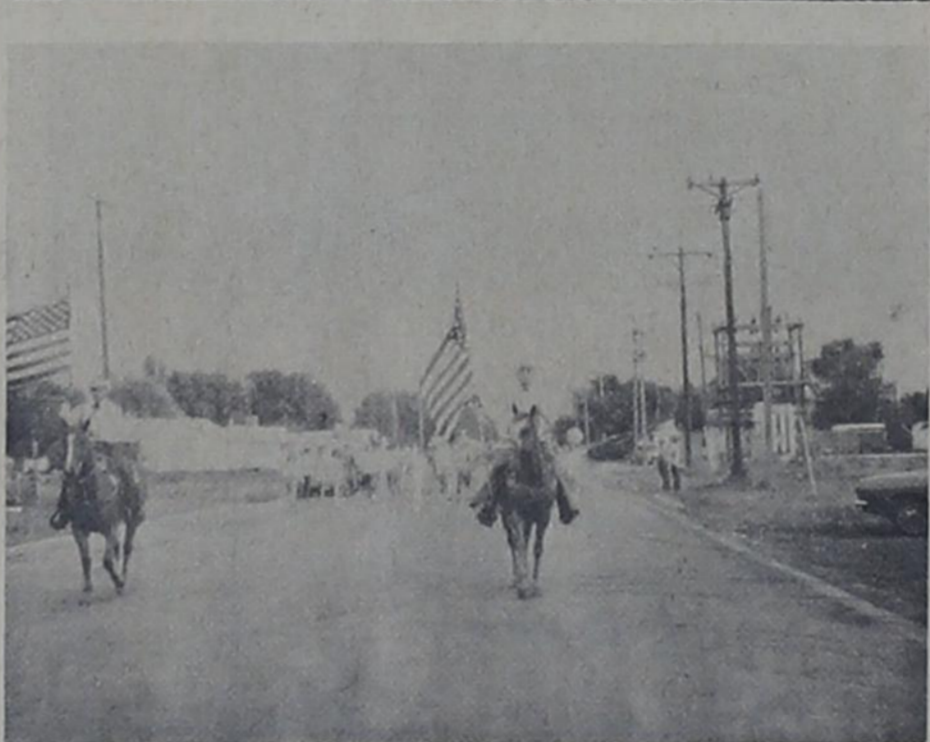
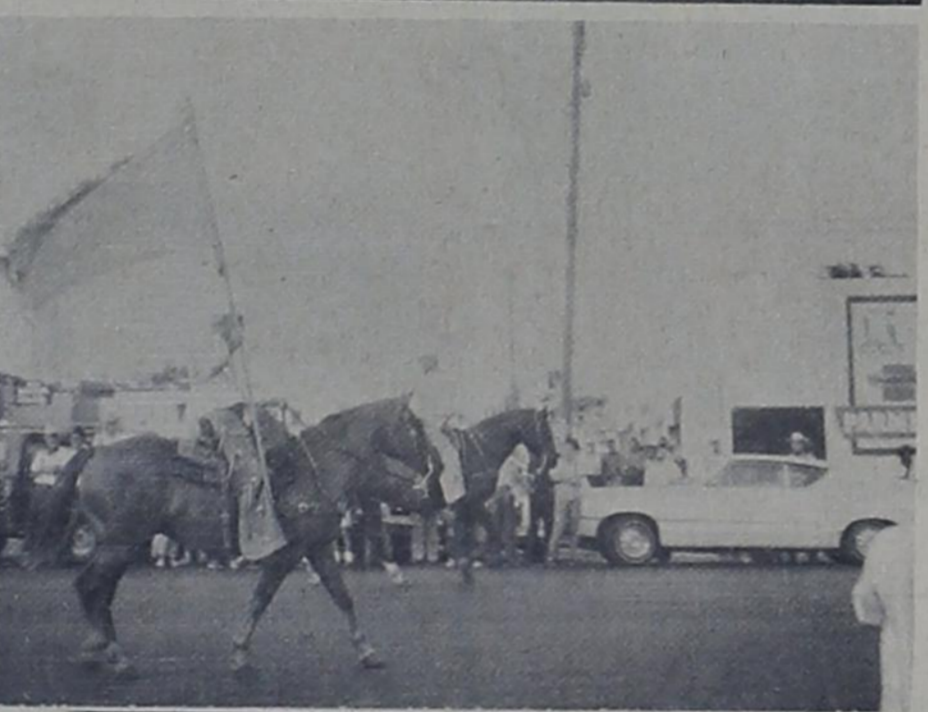
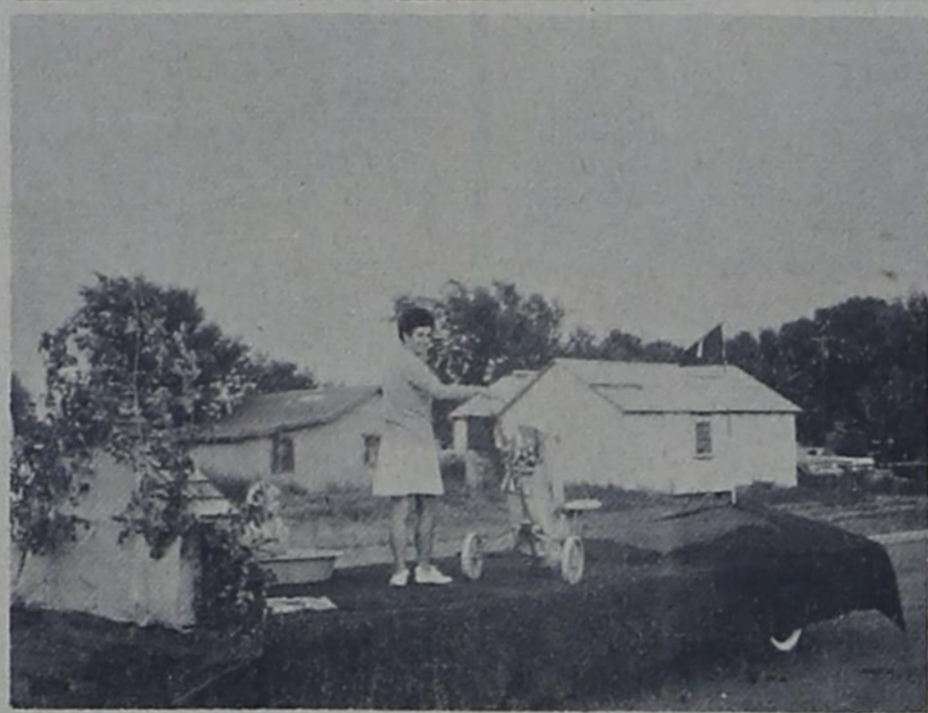
Professional wrestling matches in Williford Gym Saturday night concluded the regularly scheduled activities of the celebration. Highlight of the bouts was a mixed tag team match.

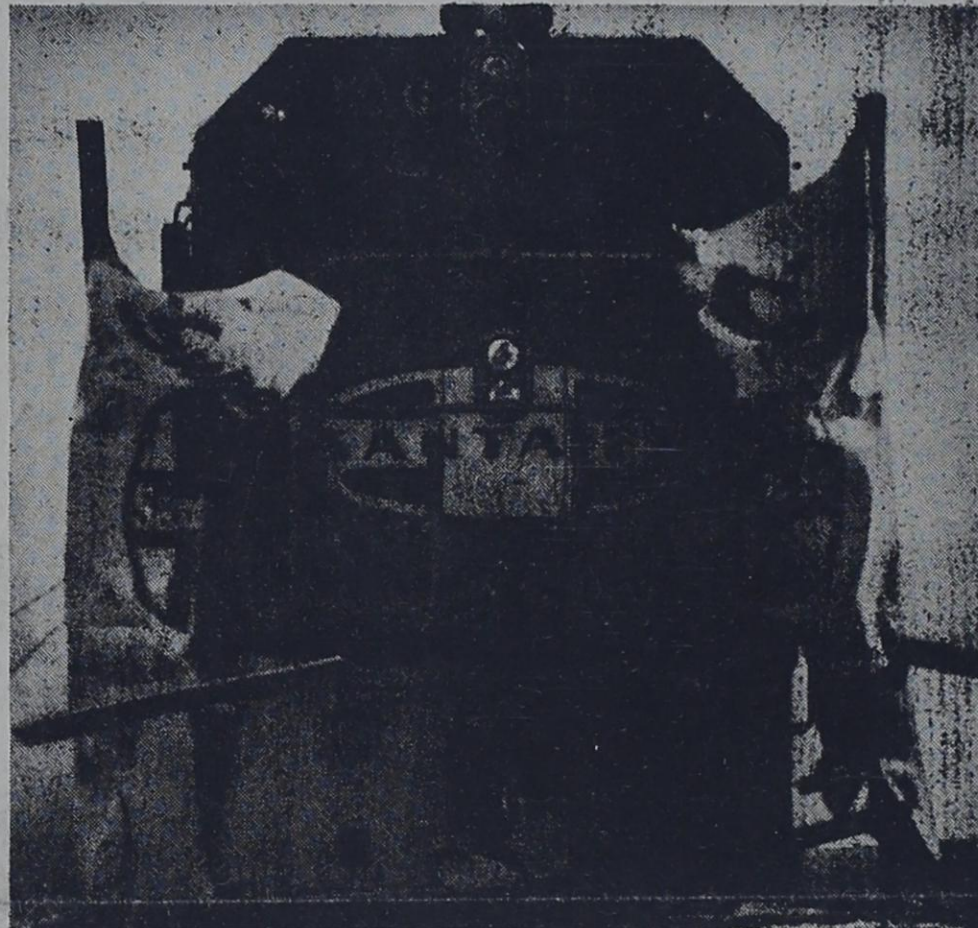
