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SANATORIUM CONSTRUCTION IS TO START SOON

Schreiner Family and Col. Otto Wahr-
mund Thanked for Gift of
\$40,000 Site.

Construction of the Benevolent War Risk Insurance Sanatorium for soldiers suffering with respiratory diseases will be commenced at an early date, according to representatives of the McKenzie Construction Co., of San Antonio, which concern has the contract. The site, 740 acres of land, is situated three miles southeast of Kerrville on the Potter Brown place which was selected by the locating committee from the standpoint of Kerrville and the institution itself. The magnificent site was a gift from the Schreiner family and Otto Wahr-
mund, and represents an outlay of more than \$40,000.

Workmen are now engaged in drilling a well on the site and others are hauling material to the grounds preparatory to commencing the buildings. A gang of engineers, representing the S. A. & A. P. Railway, is surveying the right of way for a spur to be laid to the reservation to handle building materials and supplies for the institution. Laying the track will be finished at once, it is said.

The construction of a switch, which is also being done through the generosity of the Schreiners, will save great sums in transportation and will be beneficial later in enabling the handling of patients direct from the incoming trains without the necessity of having to transport them from the city depot.

In a letter from Dr. Goddard, State Health Officer, on the matter of locating the site for the sanatorium, he says of the committee:

"The committee wishes to thank the Schreiners and Mr. Wahrmund for the magnificent gift of the lands, so ideally situated. The site is far enough away from the City of Kerrville and traffic to not interfere with the work and purposes for which it is created."

This letter from the executive of the Health Department is highly appreciated by the people of Kerrville and shows the wisdom of both the writer and the locating committee, to say nothing of the farsightedness of the givers, Messrs. Chas. Schreiner, A. C. Schreiner, G. F. Schreiner, Walter Schreiner, L. A. Schreiner and Col. Otto Wahrmund, whose interests for the city are evidenced in this choice of a site.

Water from the famous Kerr County artesian strata will be furnished the sanatorium from wells now being drilled, it was announced yesterday by those connected with the contracting firm.

In choosing the site for the institution it was considered best that it be

at least three miles from the city proper, thus eliminating noise of traffic, which is sure to interfere seriously with the rest of the men. Treatment of lung trouble consists largely of rest and rich foods, it was pointed out. The site selected also holds many other advantages both for the patient and the city, according to those acquainted with details of such work. The elevation is just right, affording an excellent view of the surrounding valleys, hills and stream; the peaceful Guadalupe winds at the foot of the rise, offering pastime for the convalescent men in the way of bathing and fishing, to say nothing of a park made beautiful by nature.

LEWIS DAIRY TO CONTINUE

In regard to the recent offer of D. R. Lewis of his dairy and site to the Benevolent War Risk Society, which has been considered and turned back to him, Dr. Goddard makes the following explanation and requests:

"April 12, 1920.—To the People of Kerrville: We desire to express our appreciation of the splendid and courteous manner in which D. R. Lewis dealt with the Benevolent War Risk Society. He exemplified a high sense of patriotism toward the ex-service men and fair dealing with the officers of the society, which is so commendable. Mr. Lewis will retain and continue to operate his splendid dairy farm. We hope that the recent announcement that he had sold his farm and would discontinue its operation will not cause any of his patrons to discontinue purchasing his dairy products. This dairy will for a time at least be quite helpful to the Benevolent War Risk Society in supplying dairy products to its constructor forces. It is with pleasure that we commend Mr. Lewis to you and trust that he may have your good will, support and patronage.

LOCAL EPISCOPALIANS CAPTURE FIRST HONORS IN THIS DIOCESE

The Episcopal Church at Kerrville has the distinction of being the first parish in the diocese to raise its quota in the campaign being conducted in the Diocese of West Texas for \$75,000 for the benefit of the West Texas Military Academy and the University of the South. Dr. W. B. Stevens, campaign chairman, has announced that the quota of \$1,000 was subscribed at a meeting held at Kerrville Tuesday night. Among those present at the meeting were Bishop W. T. Capers, Rev. L. B. Richards of Christ Church and W. R. Ulrich, campaign manager.

As the campaign nears the week of the intensive drive, from April 25 to May 1, increased interest is becoming manifest and the parish at Cuero is expected to over-subscribe its quota of \$2,500 by at least one-fourth.

SENATOR BAILEY SAYS HE IS IN RACE TO THE FINISH

Irrespective of Result of Precinct Conventions He Will Make Campaign for Governor.

Dallas, Tex., April 13.—Senator Joseph W. Bailey is in the race for the Democratic nomination for Governor until the last vote is counted in the July primaries.

Until after the May conventions he will not pay particular attention to State issues or to the attacks being made upon him. He says that these attacks are made to divert attention from the issues to be determined in May and refuses to follow his opponents off into an immaterial discussion of personalities, but let his enemies know that they and their records will be taken care of in a manner cordially satisfactory even to themselves after May 1.

Mr. Bailey's signed statement follows:

"Those who are opposing us are industriously asserting, sometimes in public, and more frequently in private that I do not desire the office of Governor and that I will withdraw from the race after the presidential precinct conventions are held, whatever their result may be. One purpose in making that assertion is, of course, to discourage my friends by inducing them to believe that they may be left without a candidate who espouses their views, and another purpose is to insinuate into the minds of men whom they consider ignorant a belief that I have some ulterior motive in making the race.

"Anxious to Rescue Party"

"I am not anxious to assume the great responsibilities which attach to the Governorship of this State; but I am sincerely anxious to rescue the Democratic party from the control of those who are deliberately divorcing it from its great principles, and I became a candidate purely and only because it was the unanimous judgment of my friends that my candidacy would most clearly present the issue between the fundamental principles of Democracy and the modern heresies which our opponents call 'progressive democracy.'

"In order that every Democrat who feels an interest in that question might have a fair opportunity to express himself upon it, we proposed to the committee managing the opposition that it should be submitted to a primary election, instead of to precinct conventions. We believe—indeed we know—that at least five times as many Democrats would express themselves at a primary election as will be able to do so in precinct conventions. It should not be otherwise; because in establishments where four or five men are employed, all cannot leave their business at one time, as they must do in order to participate in a precinct convention, but each of them could go at some time during the day to cast his or her vote in a primary election; what is true of the business man is true also of the farmer. Ever if they go to their precinct convention the politicians may prolong its session so that many of them must leave in order to attend their work at home before a vote is ever taken; and knowing that may happen thousands may not go at all, though they would cheerfully take the time to vote at a primary election.

Wants People to Decide

"If a primary election had been agreed to, and the Democrats of this State had rejected the Fort Worth declaration of principles, I would have promptly announced my withdrawal as a candidate for Governor; because even if I desired the office, I would not accept it, though it might come to me without a contest, unless I was authorized to administer it upon what I consider sound principles.

"The refusal of the other side to agree to a primary election has convinced me that they want this issue decided by the politicians instead of by the people, while we want it decided by the people instead of politicians.

"If our friends attend the precinct conventions, as I hope and believe they will, we will carry eight out of every ten counties in this State, but whatever may be the result of those conventions, I shall continue this contest to the end of the gubernatorial campaign, in order that the people may

have a fair chance to decide between the principles which we advocate and the principles advocated by the opposition.

THE OLD SPANISH TRAIL GRADUALLY TAKES FORM

H. B. Ayres, the managing director of the Old Spanish Trail, reached Kerrville Thursday night last on his way to San Antonio over the trail from El Paso. Mr. Ayres had been about two weeks on the trip, spending enough time in all counties and towns to thoroughly acquaint himself with all conditions and give the people a clear understanding of the work that lay before them. He reported all counties preparing to do their part.

"From El Paso to Van Horn," he reported, "the highway is essentially completed now. This embraces 120 miles. From Van Horn through Jeff Davis, Pecos and Crockett Counties to Ozona are 270 miles more. Each of these counties is preparing to get promptly at work. The highway from Ft. Stockton to Ozona is now well graded and does not call for much engineering work. Good gravels are near and a standard highway all the way to Ozona seems assured inside of a year. Mileage is so long through all of this country a year's time seems short for the working out of the finances, labor and building problems."

"Eastward from Ozona," he continued, "the road is a continual rough winding trail. The worst section is between Junction and Kerrville, and while I was at Junction the people there awarded a contract for the thirty miles from the Kerr County line to the six-mile crossing west of Junction at about \$7,500 per mile. This is an illustration of some of the problems to be overcome and how splendidly the people are going to it to overcome them. In Kimble County all river crossings will either be made easy or discontinued, the road will be carried above flood water and all grades will be brought to 6 per cent. This in general is what we understand as a standard highway; that is, a highway safe in all kinds of weather and that can be maintained and kept in condition under all circumstances.

"Sutton County has \$300,000 in road bonds. The engineers there expect to cut seven miles from the mileage. They will work for scenic beauty and, of course, for easy grades and good road building. Wherever Federal money is involved all these standards must be met."

While in Kerrville Mr. Ayres conferred with officials of the Old Spanish Trail Club, road officials and numerous citizens in an effort to assist in helping along the work. In view of the progress being made in Comfort and Boerne districts, where those people are now engaged putting their mileage in first class condition Mr. Ayres was anxious to see Kerr County get to work on her part, so this Hill Country might be open to automobiles this Summer without a single link offering any unpleasant driving. He also called attention to the fact that work is progressing all along the way between San Antonio and Houston, and that as soon as that portion of the Old Spanish Trail was completed all East Texas would have an artery for travelers from East Texas into the Hill Country, and that if construction work could be sufficiently progressed this summer to throw this road open from Houston, the Old Spanish Trail officials would see that the fact was extensively advertised.

Mr. Ayres reported himself as pleased with the fine way all the people through West Texas are taking hold of the Old Spanish Trail. In every county he said he was given constant assurances that the highway would be built in spite of the bigness of the task. The people in that country are prosperous and the scenery all the way to the Davis Mountains is fine, and when the highway is finally open both tourists and Texans are not only going to be delighted with that country but the "Hills of West Texas" will become famed from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

STANDARD MEASURES FOR BUTTER, MILK AND BREAD

Copies of an order by F. C. Weinert State Superintendent of Weights and Measures, prescribing the units of standards for the sale of butter in Texas after April 1, have been received by Judge W. G. Garrett, County Attorney.

The order prescribes that when sold in packages or containers butter may be sold in the following sizes only: One-quarter pound, or four ounces; one-half pound, or eight ounces; one full pound or sixteen ounces.

Copies of orders establishing units or standards for the sale of milk which became effective March 1, were also sent Judge Garrett and prescribed measure divisions of the standard gallon as follows: The half gallon, the quart, the pint, the half pint and the gill.

Standards for bread, which also became effective March 1, are as follows: A three-pound or forty-eight ounce loaf, a two-pound or thirty-two ounce loaf, one and one-half pound or twenty-four ounce loaf and a one pound or sixteen ounce loaf.

Judge Garrett informs The Mountain Sun that he hopes all dealers will carefully obey the new regulations, as he will have to prosecute all violation thereof.

It is quite probable that at these meetings the preliminary steps, at least, will be taken in the matter of forming a poultry organization and beginning preparations for a poultry show about next January that will open a lot of eyes that have not yet seen the importance of the poultry business in this section.

CATHOLIC CHURCH NOTES

Next Sunday will be the last session of the Bible Class for the present scholastic year. On the succeeding Sunday, April 25, about a dozen of the local Knights of Columbus will motor to San Antonio to see five additional Kerrville candidates initiated into this energetic and patriotic society, that has been such a blessing to our boys during the war. The Knights are contemplating the erection of a million dollar tubercular sanatorium to be located, most probably, at Denver unless a better site can be agreeably determined upon. Dr. Lawrence Flick, a staunch K. C., who received the Laetare medal this year from Notre Dame, has reduced the mortality of consumptives in Philadelphia by 75 per cent since his initiative in this line in 1886.

Instigated by the splendid success that the Guadalupe parishioners had with their annual rendezvous on Easter Monday, the faculty of Notre Dame Institute arranged for a similar gathering for their pupils and the American Catholics on May 10. Entries in the various prize races and contests among adults and among juniors are now being listed.

The feast day of the Superiress of Notre Dame will be observed on Monday, May 19.

During the Easter holidays all the class-rooms were decorated with Windoophanie in order to add to the neatness of the interior and at the same time minimize outside distractions for the students. A double coat of paint is being applied to hallways and porches. The prohibitive price of paint caused a postponement in painting the exterior of all the buildings.

Unfortunately, the Easter frost seems to have killed our apricots, peaches and plums, which till recently promised to be a bumper crop.

On Sunday, after a painful illness with heart trouble, Marcello Vargas resigned his ghost to his Maker in a pious, Christian manner. His corpse was buried the following day from the Guadalupe Chapel, accompanied by a throng of sorrowing friends.

So great have been the crowds at the Mexican Church for the past few months, Sunday after Sunday, to hear the pure Gospel of Christ in their native language, that it has become necessary to increase the seating accommodation with the help of benches and folding chairs in the aisles.

About one hundred and twenty children are now in attendance at the Mexican School, and among these, several pupils in the Eighth Grade have been recently honored with credentials from the Palmer Penmanship Co. of Cedar Rapids, Ia.

It is regrettable that one source of local support for the upkeep of this worthy cause has been withdrawn since Father Kemper's upright attitude towards the dying tubercular soldiers; but through the watchfulness of Divine Providence for Whose sole glory the work is being done, a splendid bequest has been made by the late Andrew Ziebert, according to legal notification sent on Saturday night.

Last Wednesday Cecilio Fuentes and Dorothea Mata were united in the sacrament of holy matrimony. Baptism was administered to Arthur Strackbein in Secor's Hospital on Saturday.

Miss Anna Pehl of Fredericksburg, who was operated on at this hospital last Tuesday, is rapidly convalescing. Her uncle, Emil Jenschke, as well as her parents, spent the early part of the week with her.

Mrs. Daniel Morgan came from Verde Creek Tuesday to fulfill her Easter duties.

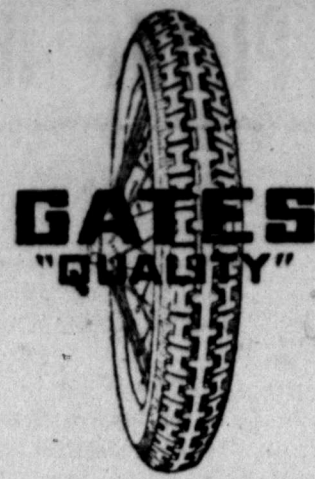

BAILEY FOR GOVERNOR

H. B. Terrell in Texas Monthly Review
In a series of speeches former Senator Bailey has clearly defined the issues of his campaign for Governor. He stands for preservation of State rights, economy in government and a return to principles recognized as Democratic for more than a century.

The editor of The Review has been a supporter of Senator Bailey for 20 years and at no time in the past has Bailey engaged in a campaign of greater importance to the State and country than that which he is at present conducting.

The emergency of war disarranged the program of the Democratic party announced in 1912, and, that emergency having passed, the party should return to its old principles and carry out its pledges.

It is now generally felt that the tendency to solve all important questions by centralization has grown dangerously strong. The States are in danger of being reduced almost to the condition of administrative provinces and the increasing demands upon general government threaten to make still heavier the present burdens of taxation.

In this situation, the Republican party has signally failed to offer remedies, and the same may be said of many Democratic leaders. Republicans have presented little more than criticism of administrative details while Democrats, finding themselves on the defensive, have devoted their attention largely to defending the record of the present National and State Administrations. While calling themselves "Progressives" those at present in charge of the Democratic machinery have not made plain the principles by which they intend hereafter to be guided. Rather they defend acts which have been done and demand endorsement of past performances.

Senator Bailey points out a path which the party may follow with safety to itself and advantage to the country. His platform is made up of principles not limited in their application to any particular time or problem.

He proposes to take up the tasks of reconstruction and pursue them along lines of approved soundness.

Senator Bailey's ability to serve the people has been demonstrated in long years of public life. He has entered the race for Governor at a time when Texas needs an executive of proven ability and fidelity to principles, and the reception given him wherever he has appeared to put his platform before the people shows how welcome is his candidacy.

Believing that his election will mean an administration of great worth to the State and the triumph of the principles for which he stands will have influence beyond the borders of Texas, rehabilitation of the Democratic party and its increased service to the county, The Review commends Senator Bailey's candidacy to the most thoughtful consideration of its readers.

Recently the Government started an investigation on paper, gasoline and other things but it seems not to amount to a hill of beans, these investigations; they don't even fool the people any more, into expecting protection."

Brockhausen, San Antonio. The State Conference will have headquarters in the St. Anthony Hotel with the business sessions to be held in the Tapestry room of the hotel.

2ND MISSION COMES FROM PHILIPPINES

Body Headed by Senate President Quezon Reiterates Demand for Independence.

That the Filipino people are in earnest in their demand for immediate independence is indicated by the coming to the United States of a second Philippine mission to work for independence. Coincident with this announcement the War Department received a cable from Manila stating that the all-Filipino legislature had adopted resolutions reiterating its plea for immediate independence.

The second mission, like the first, is composed of the leading men of the islands and will work in the United States not only for immediate independence, but also to bring about "better understanding, greater confidence and closer economic relations between the United States and the Philippines."

The mission is again headed by Manuel L. Quezon, president of the Philippine Senate, who is well known in America, having been for six years resident commissioner to the United

States. Mr. Quezon and the Hon. Sergio Osmena, Speaker of the Philippine House of Representatives and Vice President of the Council of State, are the leaders of the Nationalist party, which has been in power since 1907.

While Speaker Osmena is not so well known in the United States as Quezon, he is considered one of the ablest men in the islands. Senate President Quezon recently referred to Osmena as "the greatest Filipino since Rizal."

The personal relations between Osmena and Quezon are probably without a parallel in modern politics. They have been the leading political figures in the islands for 12 years, yet there has never been the slightest indication of rivalry between them. Throughout their college life as well as their long political service each has refused to be a candidate for any position that the other aspired to.

During the years Quezon was the Philippine delegate in the American Congress he won the esteem and confidence of both the Republican and Democratic sides of the chamber. Whenever he spoke he was assured of a good attendance. One of the official short hand reporters once declared Quezon used the purest English of any member of the House.

Osmena, as president of the Nationalist party, is the leader of the national movement for independence. "Osmena is the premier 'de facto' of the Philippines," said a leading Filipino



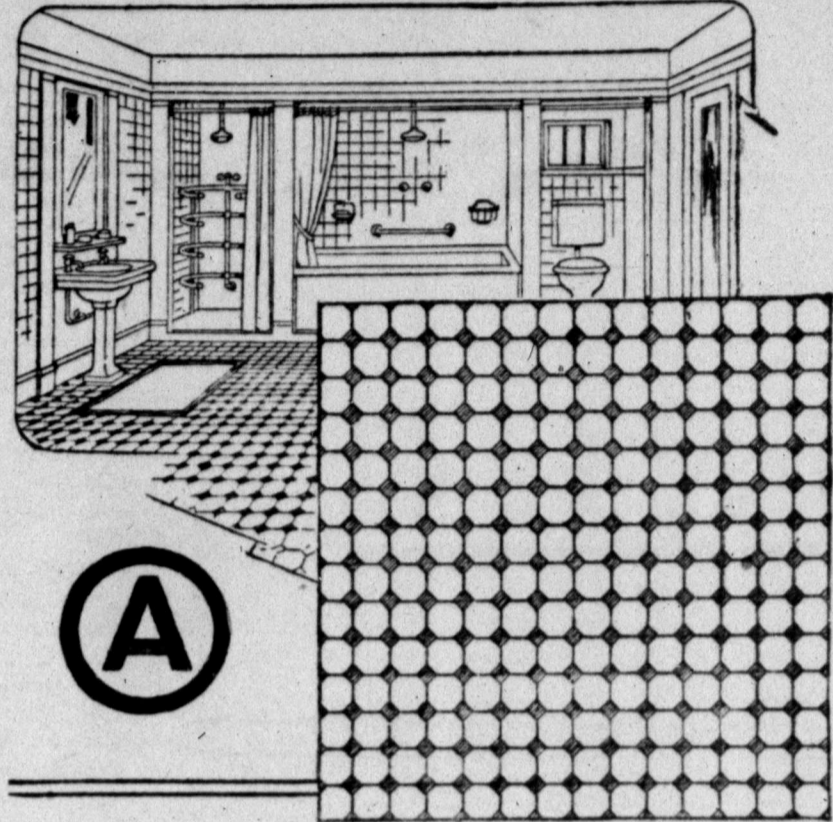

no Journalist, now in America. "A very conscientious and tireless worker, thorough and persistent, a genius for grasping the big features as well as the smallest details of public affairs, cool headed, quiet by temperament and education, a deep thinker, an eloquent speaker, a polished writer, a keen observer of men—such is Osmena."

Both Osmena and Quezon have been consistent advocates of Philippine independence, yet when the occasion demanded it they have never hesitated to champion the cause of America's good intentions toward the Filipino people.

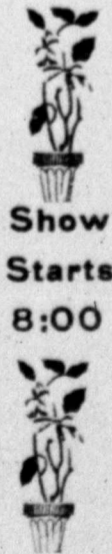

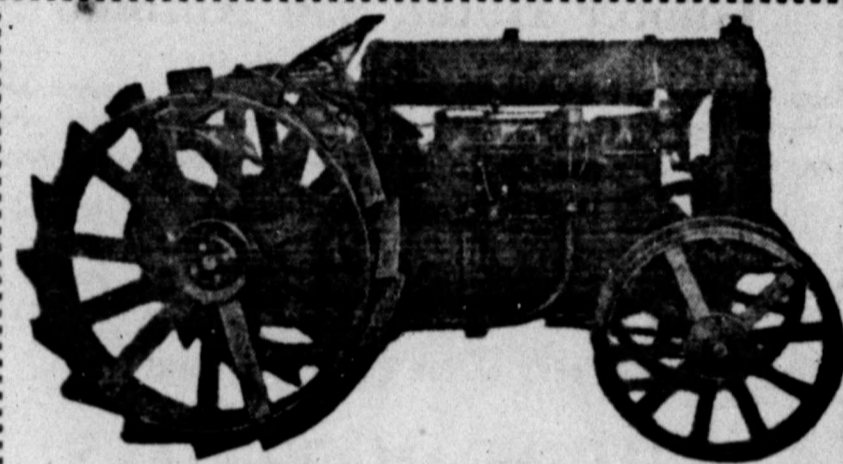

COUNTY AGENT QUINTAL URGES BUILDING SILOS

There is a serious proposition confronting our farmers in this county and that is a better way of handling and storing their feeds of different kinds. Last year we raised enough to have lasted two or possibly three years, but owing to excessive moisture most of it was lost, except to the farmers that had silos. After investigating the many different kinds of silos that have been tried out in the county, the Underground or Pit Silo seems to be the most practical and economical from every standpoint.

As an illustration of the advantages of the silo as compared to the methods we have been using, I call your attention to the following: Last week at the urgent request of Richard Holekamp, one of our progressive farmers living on Cypress Creek, I paid him a visit and found that he was contemplating putting in three new underground silos, as he already had one and wanted some assistance in placing them and using all of them with the same equipment, which we succeeded in arranging very satisfactorily.

Last year Mr. Holekamp fed a bunch of sheep on ensilage he had made from crops raised on his place. The sheep belonged to Mr. Stieler and consumed some forty tons of ensilage, for which Mr. Holekamp received \$10 per ton. In carefully figuring his expenses, planting, bringing the crop to maturity, harvesting and making the ensilage, he found at the termination of the feeding period that his venture had netted him almost \$100 per acre. This year he contemplates feeding many more and figures he cannot make money in a more satisfactory way.

Since actual illustrations, by people that you are personally acquainted with, are the most effective, I wish to mention the experience of another of our leading farmers and ranchmen with the Pit Silo, and that is Chas. Real of Turtle Creek. Last year Mr. Real was running very short handed (no help) when it came time to cut his crop for ensilage, but being very progressive he did not intend to neglect such an important matter, so cut his crop and put it in the silo, without packing and wetting as he should have had been able to get the help but immediately after getting the silo completely filled he was so fortunate as to get a good rain, in fact it was the beginning of our wet weather in the Fall, and greatly improved the quality of the ensilage; on the other hand, he still had more cane and maize in the field which he had just finished shocking, but instead of improving the crops that were shocked in the field he had a loss of two-thirds or more. Mr. Real expects to build another silo soon.

I have mentioned the advantages of the silo, referring especially to conditions under excessive moisture, and as we DO have a drouth once in a while, will say that every man that has a silo when a drouth hits us can cut his crop and make silage, thereby getting the full value of the crop while if he has no silo he is compelled to see his crop burn in the field and be almost if not entirely a total loss. I could call to mind several other instances along the line of the two mentioned, but this will suffice to show you the need of the silos and the best way of saving your crops. I will be pleased to give any information you wish regarding the Pit Silo for our county.

FORMER KERRVILLE GIRL TEACHING IN UNIVERSITY

Austin, Tex., April 9.—Miss Francesca Bellamy Taylor, formerly of Kerrville, is a tutor in English at the University of Texas, and teaches courses in English by correspondence and one in residence at the University. The courses in correspondence at the University offer the opportunity for home study under the direction of expert teachers and scholars and have the advantage of giving the student unlimited time in preparation initiative in working out his assignments, and thoroughness in requiring each student to answer all the questions about any one assignment. As E. W. Banta of Goldsboro, a student of Miss Taylor's by correspondence, said in a paper written for her, initiative, self-reliance, accuracy, and above all, perseverance, are developed to a high degree. This student especially commends the courses on account of the efficiency and excellence of University correspondence work.

Many advanced courses are offered as well as professional courses and preparatory courses. More work is being added each year to the curriculum of the Division of Correspondence Teaching of the Department of Extension of the University. These courses are adapted to students in absentia who wish to get University credit, to graduates who wish to do further study, to teachers preparing for State examination, to those who wish to make up entrance credit, and to those who wish to do some particular directed study without University credit.

Miss Taylor took her Bachelor of Arts Degree at Moore's Hill College and her Bachelor of Music from the same institution. She took the degree of Master of Arts at the University of Texas in 1918, and was awarded a graduate fellowship upon her graduation. She won the D. A. Frank Poetry Prize at the University in June, 1918. Miss Taylor held an assistantship in English the year she did her M. A. degree work.

INTEREST IN EDWARDS PLATEAU RUNNING HIGH

Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

Edwards County, with two deep tests and another about to be started and Kinney and Val Verde Counties played prominent parts this week in wildcatting for oil in Western Texas. Pecos County reported one new location and was to have spudded in its fifth deep well, the building of derricks for tests in Concho and Sterling Counties began, a highly favorable geological report was made upon the W. F. Cushing ranch in Glasscock County and activity in general in counties along the Texas & Pacific Railroad showed a marked increase.

After being shut down since last October, the Cash Oil Company of Terrell, which is controlled by Col. E. H. R. Green of New York, has resumed drilling at 2,200 feet on the Whitehead Ranch in Edwards County, Section 89, fifty-four miles north of Del Rio. Fuel oil, casing and other supplies in quantities sufficient to insure steady work during the Spring is on hand. It was a lack of fuel oil which caused the suspension of work in the Fall. Rains fell continually and the road leading to Del Rio was almost impassable.

A showing of oil was reported just before work stopped; geological reports upon the Edwards Plateau section have been very flattering and production is anticipated. Shallow oil was struck in three wells sunk on the Whitehead Ranch during the Winter of 1918-1919, before the deep test was started and the trio of wells would have furnished sufficient oil for fuel purposes. The Cash Company found however that it would be necessary to place pumps on each well and this plan was abandoned.

Edwards County's next deep well will be that of the Devil's River Oil and Gas Company on the ranch of Paul Turney, Sutton County, located thirty miles south of Sonora on the southwest corner of Section 162, Corpus Christi, San Diego & Rio Grande Narrow Gauge Railway Company survey. The derrick is building and machinery is en route. Headquarters of the firm are at Edinburg, Texas. Shallow oil was found on the Turney Ranch in drilling for water thirty years ago.

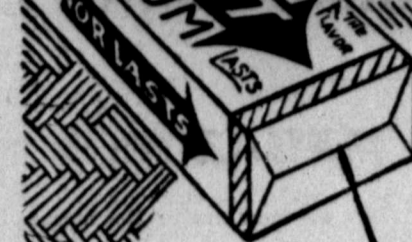

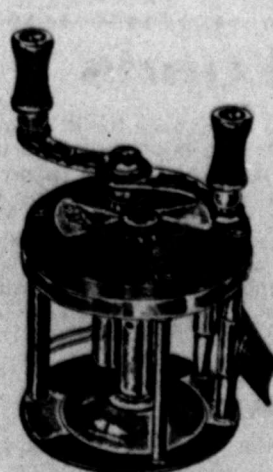

LOW COST OF THINKING

The cost of living will not go down permanently until the use of gray matter goes up. As long as the people of America are content to delegate their thinking to a select few, that select few will run matters to further their own personal ends. The average American does not function above the shoulders. The movies pay tremendous dividends because they furnish a form of amusement which requires no mental effort. We are a Nation of magazine readers; a long book demands too much sustained thinking to please us.

Are these accusations false? Put yourself to the test. Why are you a Methodist or a Catholic? Why a Republican or a Democrat? Your sectarian beliefs were probably settled for you by your great grandfather. You were a Republican or a Democrat fifty years before you were born. You have not thought the political problems and as a result the little group which have given these problems attention are leading you whither they will. The big asset of the political boss is the mass of voters which don't think on matters political and which welcome his advice. Do the people choose the President of these United States? They do not. A little group of men picks the candidate who best suits their purposes. Then they say to the people, "John Jones is the man you want for President," and the people, gratified at having their thinking done for them, shout, "He is." The average American has nothing to say about who will lead the Nation, because he doesn't want to.

And back to the cost of living. That problem is not solved because we have delegated the consideration of economic matters to a few financiers and college professors. The high cost of living is a result of something. The American people have got to think consecutively enough to work back from result to cause; they have got to understand the law of supply and demand, of production and consumption. The war took millions of men out of productive industry, goods became scarce and prices correspondingly high. The war is over. What's the answer? To buy everything in sight and to produce as little as possible, or to spend carefully and produce the maximum? Supply and demand: You cannot eat your cake and have it. Maximum production, careful spending, regular saving, these things are the only remedy. What if you make ten dollars a day and have to spend eleven? Do high wages get you anywhere?

Your Liberty Bond is below par. Have you thought why, or have you let some one tell you why and take your bond away from you in exchange for "phony" stock? The Government borrowed your money for a certain period of years, at the end of which time it will pay you back dollar for dollar and in the meantime the interest that was promised you. Like other bonds, Liberty Bonds are subject to market conditions including the law of supply and demand. The market quotations have declined chiefly because of the failure of the investing public to save in proportion to the enormous expenditure of capital during and since the war. Of the twenty million or more Americans who patriotically subscribed during the war, large numbers have been unwilling or unable to retain their bonds after the cessation of hostilities. Liberty Bonds and Notes were issued in such stupendous amounts in a short period that their absorption by the investors of the country necessarily requires time, with prejudice to their sale value.

These facts have not been considered by those who let other men do their thinking for them, and as a consequence thoughtful men are buying Liberty Bonds from the thoughtless men. Thoughtful men will know that the security behind the Liberty Bonds is the honor and faith of the United States and the whole wealth of this great Nation. They know that United States bonds issued in other war periods fell in value for a time, and then rose to par, and in many instances above, before maturity. If Liberty Bonds are not good, why are so many people trying to get them away from their original holders? Give money matters a little thought. Don't be content to let others do your financial thinking for you, if you want to get ahead in the world. The little group who has always done our money thinking for us has surrounded financial dealings with mysterious language which frightens the uninitiated. Don't let them fool you. The principles of finance are simple and clear.

Let us use our heads in politics, in religion, in finance. If we do our own thinking, then the life, liberty

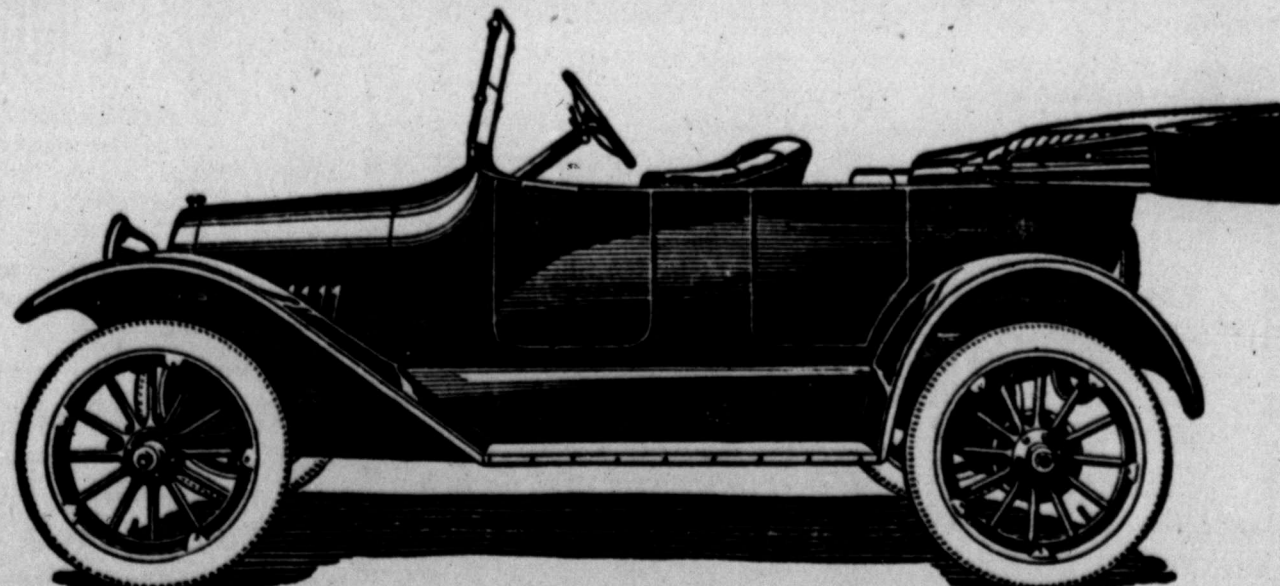
