OVER THE TOP AGAIN GO OUR GOOD PEOPLE

Once more has our community been put to the test in providing funds for a good cause, and once more has the test been worthily met.

Realizing the fearful condition of the public schools of the State in the matter of teacher salaries, a move was put on foot recently to push the passage of the proposed constitutional amendment permitting each community to impose upon itself sufficient taxes to meet the needs of its schools. To properly push the amendment will require funds, and to provide same the idea of "S. O. S. (Save Our Schools) Tag Day" was hit upon.

Last Saturday, accordingly, was "Tag Day," the program really starting the evening before, when Supt. Charles H. Meeks of San Antonio addressed a representative gathering of our people at the Court House, under the auspices of the Parent-Teachers' Club.

Next day the forces of the club were on the streets bright and early (and they stayed till late), with the result that \$186 of tags were disposed of. No other town of the State, population considered, has reported surpassing, if even equalling, this record.

PRECINCT CONVENTION ENDORSES MR. WILSON

Minutes of Precinct Convention, Precinct No. 1, Kerr County, Texas, held at Court House, May 1, at 4 p. m.

H. C. Geddie, chairman, called the meeting to order and stated purposes of meeting. E. F. Ferguson was elected secretary.

Chair appointed Credentials Committee, A. L. Starkey, Orion Procter and Tom Hagen, to co-operate with the secretary in listing names of voters present.

Chair appointed committee of three on delegates, and another committee of three on resolutions.

J. J. Starkey, J. W. Burney and Robt. Hagen, members of the Delegate Committee, recommended that following delegates be selected:

Morris, Dan Rees, A. B. Burton, Dr. P. J. Domingues, Robt. Hagen, J. S. Fitzsimmons, J. H. Graham, M. M. Hagen, Mrs. R. S. Newman and E. F. Ferguson.

Report was adopted.

The Committee on Resolutions recommended that the following resolution be adopted:

"Be It Resolved, By the Democrats of Voting Precinct No. 1 of Kerr County Texas, in Precinct Convention assembled:

First, That we heartily approve the great achievements of our Democratic National Administration under the leadership of Woodrow Wilson, both in peace and in war, and we favor its unqualified endorsement by the Democratic National Convention, to be held at San Francisco, both in the platform it shall adopt and in the candidates for President and Vice President it shall nominate.

Second, That we instruct our delegates to the County Convention to vote for resolution instructing our delegates from this county to the State Convention to vote for no person for delegate from Texas to the

Democratic National Convention who does not favor and support the principles and purposes expressed in this resolution;

Third, That we direct our delegates to the County Convention to vote as a unit on all questions submitted to the County Convention for consideration;

Resolution adopted.

Resolution offered by J. M. Hamilton, relative to instructing the county delegates to the State Convention to support for one of the delegates at large some loyal Administration Democrat other than Gov. W. P. Hobby, was tabled.

There being no further business, the convention adjourned.

DR. C. W. GODDARD REPORTS HOSPITAL INTEREST VERY KEEN

Austin, Tex., May 1.—That general interest in the Benevolent War Risk Society has been stimulated by the commencement of building operations on the Soldiers' Tubercular Hospital at Kerrville is shown by the increasing number of contributions which are being sent in from all parts of the State, according to a statement today by State Health Officer C. W. Goddard, president of the society.

Dr. Goddard said the American Legion is especially active in the work of raising funds for the hospital, a number of local posts having succeeded in raising the quotas of the counties in which they are situated, and where the local draft board had failed to do so.

It was further stated that a draft for \$1,600 was recently received from the Lloyd Grubbs Post of the American Legion at Orange. The quota of Orange County was \$1,168. "The \$1,600, which was raised through the efforts of the Legion boys, represents the county's quota plus an over-subscription of \$432," said Dr. Goddard.

The Henry T. Rainey Post No. 41, American Legion, at Lockhart, recently played a base ball game for the benefit of the Soldiers' Tubercular Hospital, as a result of which a check for \$118 was received by the War Risk Society from the finance officer of that post.

Checks aggregating \$1,347 were received yesterday, Dr. Goddard announced, coming from C. M. Supple of Waxahachie, chairman of the local committee for Ellis County. This makes a total of \$5,347 raised by the Ellis County committee, which is made up of former members of the local draft board of that county.

"I hardly a day passes that one or two small contributions are not received from the public schools of the State," said Dr. Goddard.

DEMOCRATIC CONVENTIONS ENDORSE ADMINISTRATION

Dallas, Tex., May 4.—Texas Democrats in county conventions today were selecting delegates to the State Democratic Convention, which, in turn, on May 25, will name the Texas representation to the National Convention at San Francisco.

Of the 1,400 State Convention delegates to be selected today, more than 1,200 will carry instructions to vote for the full endorsement of the Administration of President Wilson as expressed in the will of Precinct Conventions held throughout the State last Saturday, when County Convention delegates were selected.

The Democratic element which waged a campaign against the endorsing of the National Administration and which was headed by former United States Senator Joseph W. Bailey, will probably control less than 100 State Convention votes.

The latest tabulated unofficial returns from the Precinct Conventions showed 1,210 votes for the Administration forces and 49 for the anti-Administration element. More than 100 precincts were missing in these calculations.

COUNTY DEMOCRATS HOLD HARMONIOUS CONVENTION

The Democratic Convention of Kerr County, Texas, was assembled at the Court House in Kerrville, Texas, at 3 p. m., May 4, 1920, on call of the Democratic Executive Committee, J. M. Hamilton, chairman of the Kerr County Democratic Executive Committee, called the convention to order.

J. S. Wheelless was nominated and elected temporary chairman and J. W. Merritt temporary secretary of the convention. On motion, duly seconded, the temporary chairman appointed a Committee on Credentials and Basis of Representation, composed of H. C. Geddie, J. M. Hamilton and James Crotty, and a Committee on Resolutions and Delegates, composed of George E. Thomas, Morris Hood and J. O. McNealy. Pending the action of the respective committees, the convention was at rest.

The Committee on Credentials submitted the following names as delegates to the State Convention: Dr. P. J. Domingues, J. J. Starkey, J. S. Wheelless, H. C. Geddie, James Crotty, Ed. Smith, Hugo Weidenfeld, George McElroy, Mrs. H. C. Geddie, Mrs. J. S. Wheelless, Mrs. John Burney, W. D. Burney, George E. Thomas and J. M. Hamilton.

Upon motion, duly seconded, the report of the Committee on Delegates was unanimously adopted.

A motion was duly made, seconded and carried that the temporary organization of the convention be made permanent.

The Resolutions Committee submitted the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted:

"Be It Resolved, By the Democrats of Kerr County, Texas, in convention assembled:

"We hereby pledge ourselves anew to the preservation of the fundamental principles of a republican form of government upon which this Nation is founded, and to the advancement of Democracy, Civil Liberty, Humanity and Peace throughout the world;

"We unqualifiedly oppose and condemn the principles and practices of any party or association of persons, in the United States or elsewhere, which would use force and disregard for law and order in the prosecution of its demands, and advocate the most severe penalties against those who are disloyal and who seek to attain their ends through force, violence and treachery;

"We believe and charge that the Republican party of the United States is now, and has always been, the party favoring the centralization of power in the Federal Government, and controlled and dominated by special interests, and that said party maintained itself in power by the use of large sums of money and by the corrupting and debauching of the irresponsible element in the electorate of the country, that said party has never stood for the preservation of States Rights or legislation in the interest of the common mass of the people as distinguished from the special few;

"That the Republican party has at all times sought by every means in its power to break down and discredit the National Democratic Administration, both in its domestic and foreign policy, and also by the systematic distribution throughout the country of false propaganda to disrupt and disorganize the Democratic party and make possible its own return to power;

"That the Democratic Administration, since the election of Woodrow Wilson in 1912, has enacted more constructive legislation in the interest of the people in the United States than the Republican party during the whole time it was in power. Some of the Acts referred to are: The Federal Reserve Bank Act, Federal Farm Loan Act, Federal Aid Road Act, Cotton Futures Act, Federal Co-operative Agricultural Act, Tariff Commission Act, Federal Trade Commission, Clayton Anti-Trust Act, Laws for the Development and Extension of the Merchant Marine, National Prohibition and Woman Suffrage, and all the laws for the protection of the American soldier and sailor throughout the World War;

"With great pride we refer to the glorious achievements of the Army and Navy of the United States in the great World War just closed, and pause now to pay tribute to the memory of those who sacrificed their lives, impaired their health and gave their unselfish services for the honor of their country;

"And the Democratic party of the Nation upon which was thrown the responsibility for the conduct of the war, is entitled to the lasting gratitude of the people of the United States for the wonderful manner in which they mobilized, cared for, and transported our Army to France, placing it there safely in time to give to the Allies the balance of power and thereby win the war;

"We earnestly commend the lofty patriotism and splendid statesmanship of the President of the United States, the high moral status to which he elevated this Government and its people in the conduct of the war and in negotiations for peace, and believe that the failure of the United States Senate to follow his leadership has to a large extent alienated the friendship of our Allies and dragged us down from the high position we oc-

cupied by virtue of the acts of our President and the valor and sacrifice of our soldiers;

"And to the end that the National Democratic Administration, under Woodrow Wilson, may be properly commended for its splendid achievements;

"Be It Further Resolved, That the delegates elected by this convention to attend the State Convention, to be held on May 25, 1920, be instructed to vote only for such delegates to the National Democratic Convention, to be held in San Francisco, as are pledged and instructed to approve the great achievements of the National Democratic Administration under the leadership of Woodrow Wilson, both in peace and in war.

"Be It Further Resolved, That the delegates to the State Convention be instructed to vote as a unit upon all questions coming before the State Convention."

MR. BAILEY TO REMAIN IN GOV- ERNOR'S RACE, SAYS MANAGER

Dallas, Tex., May 4.—Mr. Bailey will continue in the race for Governor, according to the statement issued today by his campaign manager, Luther Nickels, who added that the "fight had just begun." Close friends of Mr. Bailey gathered at the Oriental Hotel today and conferred with him.

After the caucus, a formal statement was issued making light of the effects of the Precinct Convention results upon the coming gubernatorial campaign of the former Senator, and saying that he is in the race to the finish. Mr. Bailey returned to Fort Worth after this conference, to go from there to Washington and Baltimore, where he has a couple of lawsuits to try. Mr. Nickels says he will be back as soon as possible to commence his gubernatorial speaking campaign.

Meanwhile Mr. Neff is on the stump, speaking every day and several times a week. Mr. Thomason expects to take the stump again this week, he says, and to conduct a busy speaking campaign. Mr. Looney and Mr. Lewelling have made no announcements.

Luther Nickels, Bailey's campaign manager, gave out the following: "Mr. Bailey's candidacy for Governor was not involved in the convention issue. Thousands of people who voted against us on the issue will vote with us in July and many other thousands who favor Mr. Bailey for Governor, but who stayed away from the convention on account of the nature of the issues there involved, and for other reasons, will be heard from in July."

"The great bulk of the support of all the opposing candidates for Governor manifested itself in the conventions, while but a small fraction of Mr. Bailey's support was present."

"Let the politicians understand now that their tainted apparent victory is short of life. The Democracy of Texas is bluffed, bullied or browbeaten; its expression will be made in July, free of fraud and intimidation, to the everlasting discomfiture of those who preach piety but who stand ready to sacrifice principle for patronage and self. Let no Democrat be downcast. The real fight is before us. We shall never say die."

BAILEY WILL STAY IN RACE, FRAUD CHARGED

Dallas, May 3.—Former United States Senator Joseph W. Bailey will stay in the race for Governor of Texas to the end and the "overwhelming appearance" of Saturday's Precinct Conventions which overwhelmingly endorsed the National Administration are due to the "precinct unit rule" and not at all supported by the relative popular vote cast in the conventions," according to a statement issued here today by Luther Nickels, campaign manager for the anti-Administration Democrats.

"Fraud and intimidation were never practiced to a greater extent and with more brazen effrontery than in these (Precinct) Conventions," the statement declared.

CATHOLIC CHURCH NOTES

The Mexicans observed the first Sunday in May with the opening of the Forty Hours' Devotion and the solemn reception of Holy Communion for numerous boys and girls of the parish. The children's choir sang all the rubrical chants and responses throughout the High Mass. More than one hundred and eighty people were counted before services began and fully two dozen more tried to find standing room after the solemnities were in progress.

After a Spanish scriptural sermon about the Manna of the Old and New Testament, two midjet girls, dressed like angels, escorted the candidates to the Eucharistic Table. Over one hundred communicants received the Sacramental Species on this august occasion.

A bountiful breakfast was served in the school dining hall to the members of the First Communion Class by the ladies of the Guadalupe Society, who had festooned the room and tables with gay garlands and streamers of their national colors.

Meanwhile, in the beautiful, adorned sanctuary, the Holy of Holies remained exposed to public adoration, and always claimed the presence of an unbroken chain of worshippers. In the evening the Blessed Sacrament was replaced in the tabernacle after Benediction had been imparted.

Prior to the close of Sunday's sacred functions, all the men of the parish assembled in one of the classrooms and selected the officers for their division of the Guadalupe Society. The women had completed their organization at a meeting during the previous week.

The object of this parochial confraternity is manifold. Primarily it is intended to give the adults that harmony and solidarity that every well-directed union confers. For this reason the members obligate themselves to go to the Holy Sacraments in a body on the second Sunday of every month, and to meet on the first Sunday and third Wednesday in order to conduct a Question Box of practical difficulties on strictly Biblical lines. Every associate is given a copy of the Sacred Scriptures as the text of first and last recourse.

Provision is also made to care for the many strangers, infirm and indigent that continually drift into the Mexican settlement. Lastly, the social feature is elastic enough to allow for a vast variety of wholesome and innocent amusements.

John Moreno was elected promoter-in-chief, with the following corps of able assistants: Guillermo Morales, Hippolito Rodriguez, Ramon Juarez, Hippolito Ayala, Santos Juarez and Marcelino Ayala. Presidency was vested in Rafael Herrera. Other officials are: Vice president, Francisco Ramirez; treasurer, Ramon Castillo; secretary, Donacion Espinosa, and librarian, Jesus Sanchez.

The large silk and hand-painted Guadalupe banner was blessed in the chapel, sponsored by selected officers of the ladies' division. This magnificent standard was then borne by the supreme officers of the men's branch in a public procession throughout the entire circuit of "Little Mexico."

At the head of the parade was the National Flag of Columbia, followed soon after by the red, white and green of our southern sister republic. The first communicants appeared in their spotless robes with waxen candles. They were preceded by a cohort of well-trained acolytes vested in cassock and surplice.

Students of the Guadalupe School in alternate rows waved the Star-Spangled Banner, or the college pennant. The chosen "Queen of May" was escorted by a retinue of princesses like a bouquet of matchless beauty.

Men and women, for a stretch of more than a block, closed up the line of march and helped the distributed bands of singers with the patriotic and devotional airs in both English and Spanish. Commencing with the martial tune of "Oh, Columbia, the Gem of the Ocean," practically every man, woman and child of Mexican lineage, tramped for nearly an hour through the lanes and avenues of the district.

Along the route, the communicants returned to the chapel, all the Communicants and their baptismal vows, and the use of their obligations in the corporeal presence of our Eucharistic Savior.

Cakes and chocolate were served by the ladies in free profusion on the school campus. The string orchestra enlivened the gathering by discoursing popular music. Later the artists betook themselves to a decorated auditorium, where a social and festive celebration closed an eventful day.

The last public appearance for this scholastic session of the Orestes A. Brownson Literary Society was held at Notre Dame Institute on Thursday evening. America's favorite poet, H. W. Longfellow, was made the principal topic for study, especially his well-known "Evangeline," which the members had seen screened a few nights previously at the Dixie.

In order to help along the Clean-Up Campaign, the boys staged a one-act comedy, which brought the lesson to heart very forcibly.

Another timely subject of special interest to those who are trying to preserve the cradle of Texas' independence was a historical oration about the Alamo. Many well-written essays by the High School students were read, alternating with humorous election selections and musical numbers both vocal and instrumental. The Brownsonites, during the course of their flourishing existence, have amassed a library of a couple of hundred volumes, which they bequeath to next year's pupils along with one

of the finest co-operative spirits that any student body can display. Commencement exercises will not take place at Notre Dame till Sunday May 30, and the closing of the Mexican School will occur on the first Sunday in June.

American Day, May 1, was observed at both schools, and a strong appeal was made to pupils and parishioners to interest themselves in improving the standard of the public school teachers, who, according to Superintendent Meek's lecture of Friday night, are truly in a pitiable plight. The Sisters, who have consecrated their life to teaching, are interesting themselves in helping their fellow co-workers among the laity for the honor of the pedagogical profession.

Next Sunday, the American children will receive their First Holy Communion in St. Mary's Church at 8 a. m., and mass at the Guadalupe Chapel will be deferred till 10 o'clock. Benediction in connection with the Forty Hours' Devotion will be given at 8 p. m., following a meeting of the parishioners, scheduled for 7:30 p. m., in Washington Hall, where details of the Ascension Thursday picnic will be discussed.

Earnest may not have been so different from other boys, but to his sensitive mind the Great Stone Face, looking down on him so kindly, with its expression of sympathy and Divine Compassion, became to him a teacher and friend, and unconsciously his life was shaped by its teachings. One by one the men, who were thought to be the man of promise, proved to be a disappointment, and always when Earnest turned to look sorrowfully at the Great Stone Face he saw only an expression of assurance and promise, and he turned away again with hope in his heart.

Earnest went about doing good. He worked hard all day out at evening he would go and sit and look up at the Great Stone Face and listen to its teachings and in his turn told his people the things he had learned. Quite naturally he became a minister, and when at twilight he gathered his little flock around him they did not realize that a great man was in their midst!

So wonderful were the words that fell from this simple man's lips that wise men from far and near came to hear him. A great poet on hearing of him came to talk with him. As he stood speaking to his people at sunset, the poet among them, they chanced to look from his face to that of the Great Stone Face and realized that the features and expression were the same! Then they knew the man of promise had come!

So if we live a life of unselfishness, a life of helpfulness to others, True Greatness will come of itself. Let us "live in our house by the side of the road and be a friend to man!" — CONTRIBUTED.

Express Conditions Improving

New efforts to improve the standards of the express service throughout the country are contemplated by the American Railway Express Company, which will continue the handling of the business as a single unit, for the time being at least. A statement to this effect was made one day this week by Agent E. W. Schmidt, in charge of the local express office, in urging shippers to be patient and to lend their co-operation in bettering the express service. "Now that the American Railway Express Company is operating under its own management," said Agent Schmidt, "we are gradually returning to normal conditions and are introducing a great many changes in methods which we expect will, within a reasonable time, show results very satisfactory to shippers.

"We have already accomplished much since the time of the merger in 1918, and the service is generally considered good. But we do not say it cannot be improved and that is our aim. Yet we cannot promise immediate improvement, owing to the unsettled conditions that have to be faced during this period of readjustment. With the improvement of the railroad service and with more facilities in cars and terminals, we believe that we can show great progress in this direction."

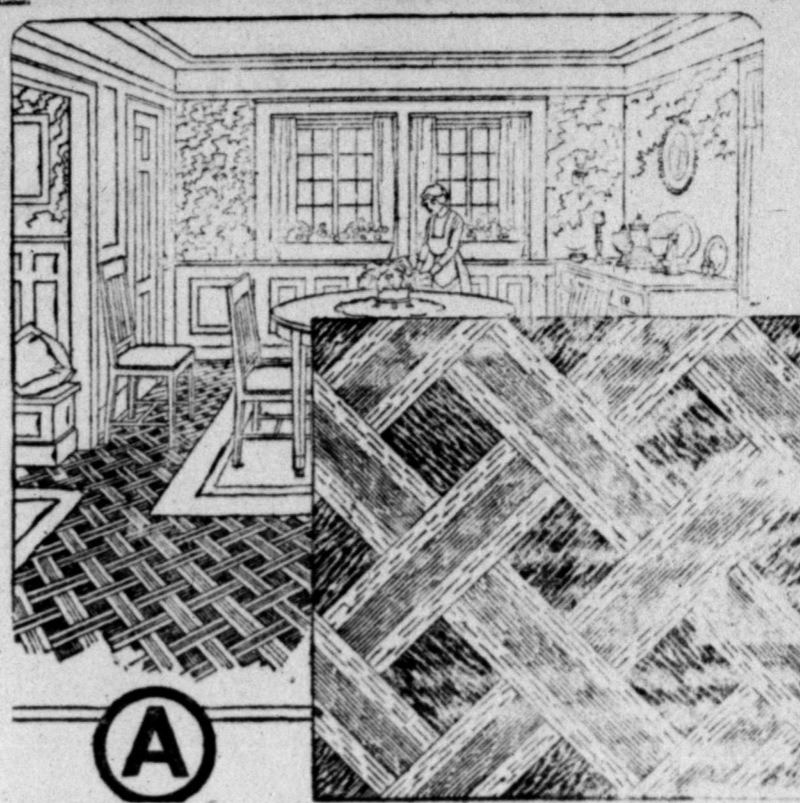

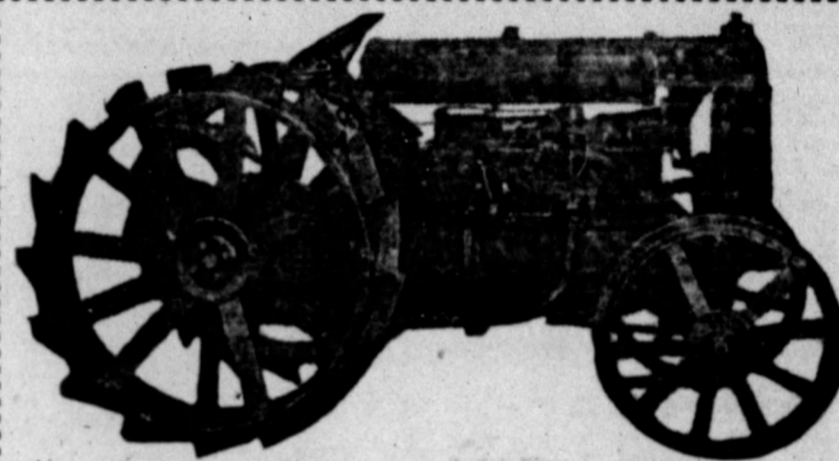

It is believed that the capital stock of the new company will not be opened to public sale, but that it will be held by the incorporators of the Henry Ford & Son corporation.

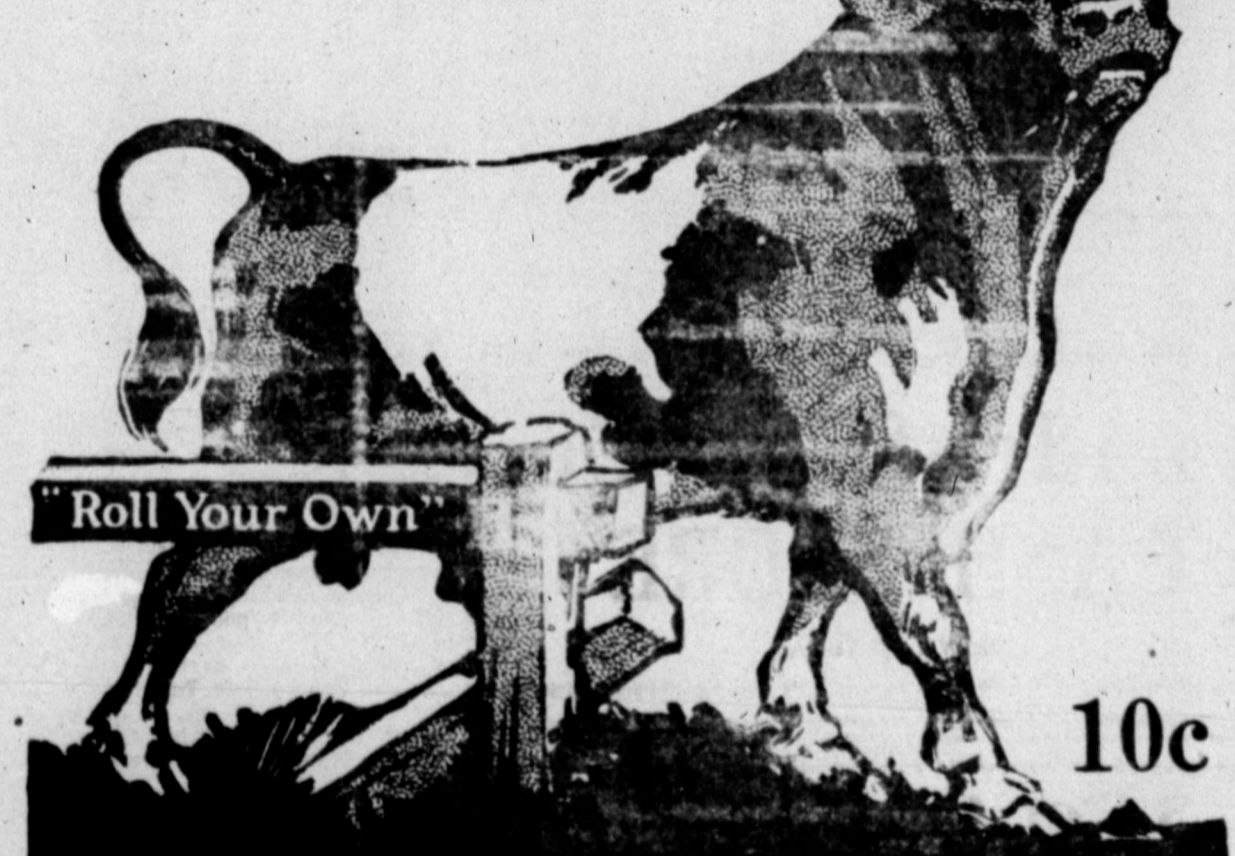

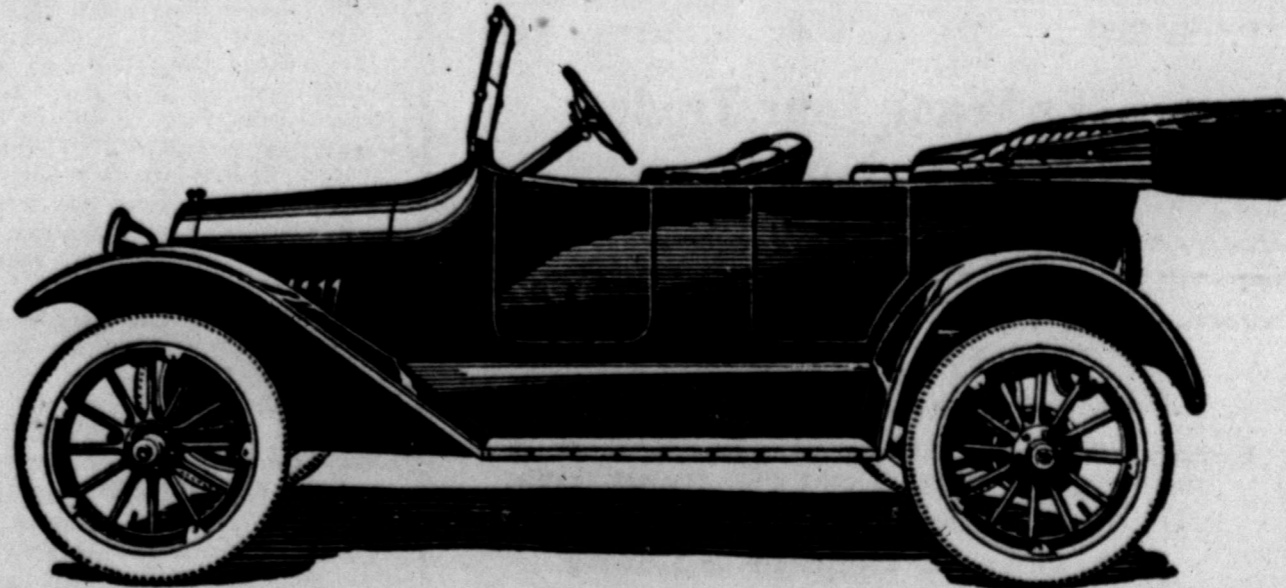
