## MILLION-DOLLAR TEXTILE MILL TO BE STARTED IN SAN ANTONIO

San Antonio, June 26.—Announcement has been made of a plan by which the large plant of the Lone Star Brewing Company on Jones Avenue will be converted into a big textile industry to be known as the Lone Star Cotton Mills, in which the Busch interests will invest heavily, supplementing their already large interests in the San Antonio property.

The new industry will take out a Texas charter and be capitalized for \$1,500,000. It will utilize the beautiful 14-acre trackage site and buildings formerly used in the brewing industry.

The decision to enter into this line of industry has been made upon the recommendation of Nationally known industrial engineers after a five months' study of the industrial situation and the adaptability of the present plant to other purposes.

Gregg & Co. of Newark, N. J., the engineers who made the investigation, go into complete details of the project. Outstanding features of it are the adaptability of the present plant, which could not be duplicated today for more than double its cost, the great available supply of Texas cotton especially suited to the cloth which it is proposed to manufacture, available labor and the market for the product.

Later it is the intention to go into additional branches of textile manufacture upon which highly favorable reports are made, but it is the immediate purpose to center on the manufacture of a beach cloth suitable for light clothing.

The report of the industrial engineers has been placed in the hands of Henning Bruhn, Franz Groos, Charles Grossman and Otto Merscheidt, trustees of the brewing association, and has also received the approval of Augustus A. Busch, who entered into the plan of leaving future use of the property to the recommendation of the industrial engineering experts.

Based upon their report, the proposed industry will be one of 15,000-spindle capacity, employing a force of approximately 300 laborers, besides foremen and skilled operatives. Under the arrangements, Gregg & Co., in addition to their preliminary investigation and report, are to have supervision of the proposition for a year to guard against mistakes that might be made by those unfamiliar with the industry in getting it launched.

Present capital stock of the brewing association is \$825,000, but agreement has been secured from stockholders to reduce the valuation to \$644,000, the book value of the plant as determined by the engineering experts, and their holdings they will transfer into the new organization at the latter figure. It is announced that the Busch interests will take \$300,000 additional of the capital stock of the new industry and the remaining \$350,000 will be placed with residents of San Antonio and surrounding territory.

## First Bale Sells for \$1,600

San Benito, Tex., June 26.—The first bale of cotton for 1920, raised at San Benito by Ernest Matz and shipped Friday on a special train to Houston, was sold this morning for \$1,600, a record price.

The second bale, which came from Edinburg and gave the San Benito bale a race to Houston, was taken to New Orleans by J. T. Lomax and was sold on the exchange for \$1,000.



### TYPEWRITER FLASHES MESSAGES OVER WIRE

Cincinnati, Ohio, June 26.—An invention in telegraph instruments which transmits and receives press messages through the operation of a machine similar to a typewriter was officially demonstrated between this city and Baltimore, Md., at the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad offices in the Central Union Railway Station here recently. The instrument is the invention of Dr. L. M. Potts of Baltimore, Md.

A message written with the instrument is transcribed on a similar machine at the other end of the line. It can be connected through the same wires from which the key and sounder have been taken.

The device has been used with particular and gratifying success on press and commercial telegraph busi-

ness, it is said, and next will be tried out on stock market business. It does away with the receiver writing the messages, or the sending operator's knowledge of alphabetic codes. All that is required of the operator is ability to manipulate an ordinary typewriter keyboard. The official Baltimore-Cincinnati experiment was on a wire distance of more than 600 miles, the longest ever attempted with the invention. The trial is said to have been exceedingly successful.

### SHEPHERD ZEALOUS, WIFE JEALOUS, EWE LAMBS OF CONGREGATION MAKE STEW

Lexington, Ky.—Refusal of Thomas J. Taylor, negro pastor of the Bland Street Baptist Church at Carlisle, Ky., a few miles north of this city, to heed the admonition of his congregation not to "marry with his ewe lambs," has resulted in his wife Mary L. Carter, seeking a divorce, and she has filed with her petition praying for a separation from her ministerial spouse a copy of a resolution adopted by his congregation at a recent church meeting.

The alleged misconduct on the part of the pastor was discovered by "observing members" of the congregation, and at the conclusion of the investigation which followed, this resolution, which is cited by the wife as grounds for her plea for divorce, was adopted and ordered spread on the minutes:

"Whereas, Our beloved pastor has been seen by several of the observing members of this congregation holding in his arms one of the ewe lambs thereof; and

"Whereas, He has sought to justify his action upon the Scriptures, saying that the Bible says it is perfectly proper for the shepherd of the flock to take and hold in his arms the lambs thereof; now, therefore, be it

"Resolved, In order to promote the best moral interests of this congregation, and the best interests of all kinds, whatsoever and wheresoever, that the next time he feels constrained to grab a lamb that it be a ram lamb."

### SUNDAY MOVIE VIOLATION OF LAW, HIGH COURT HOLDS

Austin.—Validity of the law which prohibits the operation of moving picture shows on Sunday was upheld by the Court of Criminal Appeals in affirming the case of J. M. Ealey of Wehita Falls. Ealey was fined \$50 in the County Court on conviction of having operated a movie on Sunday.

"Nothing appears in the record save evidence of a flagrant effort to trample on the law," said the court in affirming the case.

But the widow's income is not to be paid to her unless she excludes from her residence her father, Ernest A. Schmidt. If he resides with her or has anything to do with her children the trust provision is revoked. The testator was more kindly disposed toward his mother-in-law. She is to be cared for and have all her wants satisfied from his estate.

#### WHY NOT CODIFY THE STATE LAWS?

Too many obsolete laws repose peacefully or otherwise on the statutes of the State; there is also a surplus of new laws which mean little except to the ambitious solon who fostered them.

Nothing better could be done by the next Legislature than to spend its time codifying the State laws, culling out the bad ones and amending those which may have merit.

Few, if any, lawyers will admit that they understand or know of the existence of more than 10 per cent of the laws of Texas. Scattered helterskelter through the statutes are scores of measures bearing on the same point, hence if a case is decided upon the strength of one law it may not get by the Appellate Court because other statutes contradict or modify the point upon which the action was settled.

It is a similar situation at San Francisco to the fellow, who said "Water, water everywhere, but not a drop to drink." It was booze, light wine, beer with a kick, floating through the air and at every turn—in talk—but not a drop to drink. Every citizen of San Francisco said there was plenty of the much desired "o'erjoyful" to be had, but could not

lay his hand on the man who had it. There was certainly a thirsty lot there, because the more they talked about it the more they wanted it.

The Democratic Convention may be thoroughly Wilsonized, but what about a majority of the voters of the country? They are the fellows who are to elect the next President.

The rain is thought to be through for a while. It is said that more rain has fallen in this section for the past June than ever known before during that month. It is to be trusted that a little dry spell will now visit us.

Candidate Harding has made a speech into a record machine, which will be used throughout the country beginning July 4th. He pays little attention to that straddling platform of the Republican party and stresses the Americanism idea.

Cone Johnson was chairman of the Texas delegation and his wife was chosen as the assistant National committeeman. It seems the Johnson family know how to work the wires. It is a prelude possibly to the candidacy of the Honorable Cone for the United States Senate.

Postmaster General Burleson got in bad with the remainder of the Texas delegation to the National Convention by his advocacy of a modification of the Volstead act. The other delegates adopted a statement that Mr. Burleson was only representing himself, which he later affirmed.

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## J. W. BAILEY FAVORS SAME HOURS OF WORK FOR ALL

The following are some of the salient features in the speech J. W. Bailey delivered Saturday of last week at Atlanta, Texas:

The labor question was presented as one of the foremost and most vital questions of the campaign for former Senator J. W. Bailey in opening his personal campaign for Governor in a speech to about 3,500 persons.

To the greatest applause of a demonstrative audience, composed largely of farmers and with a considerable percentage of women, he declared his absolute opposition to union labor's control of the Government, his advocacy and support of the open shop and his opposition to an "eight-hour day by law." He insisted that if union labor forces an eight-hour law it must apply to farmers also, and union labor men must pay the price for farm stuff produced on an eight-hour basis.

Mr. Bailey pictured in dark colors the menace of union labor domination of the Government and predicted the destruction of labor unions if their members insist upon pursuing such an effort. The people, will destroy the labor unions rather than have the labor unions destroy the Government, said he.

Some one in the crowd yelled that the other candidates for Governor are afraid to declare themselves on the open shop question.

"I think it is ignorance as well as cowardice," commented Mr. Bailey "They do not understand how important it is."

"Every politician in Texas is afraid of union labor," continued Mr. Bailey "but I am not afraid of them because I am not a politician. If I was a politician I would not have trod on as many toes and broken as many noses as I have."

Mr. Bailey promised that if he shall become Governor and the people will also elect a simple, frugal and economical Legislature, he will reduce the cost of Texas government from one-third to one-half. He said he will trim everything except schools and roads, and will insist that the road money go more into roads and less into office expense.

He promised, furthermore, to fire one-third of the office-holders and force the remaining two-thirds to work for the money the State pays them. For these reasons, he added, the politicians and office-holders are opposing him.

His comment upon the recent primary conventions was to say that the women defeated him upon a deluded belief that he was "trying to bring whiskey back." He repeated his previous denials of this purpose and said politicians had deceived preachers into believing it and then the deceived ministers caused the women to believe it. Mr. Bailey said this statement was a base calumny, that he would not bring whiskey back is he could and could not if he would. He

had no harsh words for the women who had been deceived into believing falsehoods about him, or of the preachers who had been deceived by politicians into believing them. But he repeated his well-known views about the "political preachers" and the "politicians" who had "told these untruths."

Mr. Bailey said that if he is not elected Governor he will abide the result and pray success for the man who is elected. Early in his speech he said that the kindest thing the people could do for him, if he looked at it from a personal standpoint, would be not to elect him. Again, toward the conclusion of his unusually long speech—which held the crowd, two-thirds of whom remained standing throughout—he took up that thought again.

"You are infinitely more interested in this gubernatorial election than I am," he said. "If you consult my personal interest you could not do a kinder thing than defeat me. I am almost 57 years old. If I am elected Governor and re-elected I will be almost 61 when I leave the office. I will come out of there without a dollar—that may surprise you who may have heard that I am rich, but not so—I will come out without a dollar, without a home and without a cent in the world—and I will be 61 years old. That is not a pleasant prospect to face and I assure you that I do not face it with equanimity, but I believe that we must rescue this Government from the evil forces that control it, or we must see the destruction of this Government. I would like to be of some service in preventing that. I do not crave riches, or I would have had them. I would be ashamed to die with \$1,000,000 or \$100,000,000, but I do want, when I die, that my children shall be able to carve on my tomb 'Here sleeps a man who did his State some service and the people know it.' That would be worth more than all the money, all the office, all the power in the world. But, if it is your will that I shall not so serve you there will be no bitterness in my heart and no complaint on my lips. I am not here begging you to utilize my services. I am merely here tendering you my services if you think you need them. If you choose another I shall abide your choice, and I shall pray the God of Nations that he will be able to serve the State better than I could have served it." (Much applause.)

He said that he understands union labor is circulating literature saying to vote for any of the other candidates, but be sure to vote against Bailey. He granted the right of labor to vote as they pleased, but denied their right, as a class, to take control of the Government. He denied that right to any class. If there is to be an eight-hour day it must be universal. Eight hours for everybody or for nobody.

Saying he was for union labor when it was right and against it when wrong, Mr. Bailey added: "I warn you farmers that if you allow union labor to punish men who stand for equal rights for you, the time will come when men will not stand for equal rights for you. If you do not

Defiance, Iowa, June 26.—Defiance is today recovering from a spree—a real spree that lasted two days and nights. Furthermore, the town has enough of the same stuff stored away, so that it can get a dozen more sprees and have some left over for Fourth of July and Christmas.

Last Thursday morning there was a freight wreck right at the station. Several cars of wheat and a car of coconut oil were smashed. Also two oil tank cars were so badly smashed that their contents started leaking. When the odor of these cars got into the atmosphere old-timers got busy. The oil cars were filled with California wine and it was pouring from half a hundred spread seams. Each tank car was filled to capacity, 90,000 gallons. It was part of the Government stock of port wine being moved from San Francisco to New York.

The bucket brigade gathered with dishes and washbasins, anything that would hold wine. Then Defiance went on a spree, which lasted from Thursday night until today.

He added that the people will destroy every labor union in Texas before they will allow the labor unions to destroy the Government. He insisted that he is labor's best friend in giving this warning and that he is against any class, labor or what-not running the country.

## INTER-CHURCH MOVEMENT ABANDONS CAMPAIGN

New York, June 29.—The billion-dollar campaign of the Inter-Church World Movement has been abandoned, it was announced today, following a meeting of the executive committee. The entire project may end July 8, it was said, when the general committee will meet to consider what steps, if any, will be taken to carry on the other aspects of the campaign.

Several reasons were back of the decision, the committee stated, the principal one being the present prevalence of "drives" of various kinds which are being carried on throughout the country.

With the withdrawal of the Baptist Church, North, and the Presbyterian Church, North, also were said to be important factors. Originally the Inter-Church World Movement proposed to direct the raising of \$1,320,214,551 for the work at home and abroad of the 58 boards and societies which became parties of the movement. For the first year, 1920, the budget called for \$336,777,572, which was to be raised by a drive closely patterned after Liberty Loan methods between April 21 and May 20, last.

### Author of Immortal Song.

"Home, Sweet Home," was written in 1823 by John Howard Payne. In but a very few of the sixty years of his life Payne was sufficiently long at any one place to call it his home. He died in Tunis, Africa, April 1, 1852, and it was thirty-one years afterwards before his body was brought to his native country, the place he no doubt had in mind when he penned these appealing words.

### Smallest National Park.

The smallest of our national parks contains just thirty-eight acres and is on Prince of Wales Island, Southeastern Alaska. It was created but a year or so ago by presidential proclamation. The park is an abandoned Indian village, chiefly interesting for its totem poles. There are, also, some buildings, which are the best known examples of Hais Indian architecture.
