Highly successful the community's March 8 church attendance promotion, "I'll Be One of 1,000," turned out to be. Attendance at Bovina churches Sunday surpassed the initial goal as the total came up to 1,122.

In addition, the community received publicity across the area from its unusual promotion. There was a feeling, too, of unitedness in the community as various groups and individuals went about the tasks of promoting the special church attendance.

With such a successful beginning, the event will, no doubt, be conducted on an annual basis in the future.

As good as it was this year, the attendance figure can possibly be increased in '71?

Never have we seen a project which had greater support from all age groups in the community.

It was a great idea and a great project. And possibly the best part of it is that nobody will argue with those statements!

The candidacies of two women in the forthcoming school trustee election has revealed some 50-year-old history of which we were unaware.

A story in last week's issue of The Blade said that the female candidates were the first ever in Bovina.

"Not so," says friend and weatherman Willie Williams, who doesn't have to read a book or newspapers to know about much of Bovina's history.

"Fifty years ago," he says, "there was a woman on the school board here."

This school board member was Donna Gardner, who served as president of the three-member board around 1920, according to our informant. Other board members at that time were John Stagner and John Glover.

Miss Gardner was a sheep rancher and ran her sheep on the lush grass land north of town. She was an aunt of Tom Hartwell, Willie remembers.

There's a street on Bovina's north side, incidentally, named Gardner Avenue. Probably there's a connection between the name of the street and the school board member, who was a lady, of 50 years ago.

Yeah, the hog business in the Plains area is getting more popular. A public meeting on the subject in Lubbock a few weeks ago attracted something like 500 people interested in swine production.

A meeting of the same type, on the county level, will be conducted tonight (Wednesday) at the Hub Community Center. Purpose of the meeting is to take a look at pork production as another economic opportunity for Parmer County, according to Ronnie McNutt, county agricultural agent who is in charge of the meeting.

We're all for the hog business and think it offers great opportunity for this county and others which have good grain-producing capabilities. We've thought that for years, as a matter of fact, and we never did really understand why the cattle feeding business jumped so far out ahead of pork production.

Maybe it's time the hog business caught up with cattle in the expansion department. There continues to be more and more interest among local people in the opportunities that hogs offer. It's our guess that if you get in the hog business now, and stay, that you'll be in on the ground floor of a nice stable business that will return a more-than-fair return for the amount of time and labor invested.

There'll be some ups and downs, but over the long haul, hogs will be a good deal, we're guessing.

We wouldn't be surprised to some day see the cowmen and the hogmen going to the banks together . . . those with cattle to borrow and those with hogs to deposit! And that should make for a good strong, economy. The same money can be used!

Seriously, we think as do others, that the hog business offers a great potential for our area. We'd like to see it become as well established as the cattle business now appears to be.

If you're interested in hogs, it'll be a good idea to attend the meeting at Hub. It starts at 7 p.m., a story in this week's paper says.

"Money In Hogs" will be the topic of a meeting at 7 p.m. tonight (Wednesday) at Hub Community Center. The session is a result of interest in hog production for this area.

Parmer County Agent Ronnie McNutt says the purpose is to take a look at pork production as another economic opportunity for Parmer County.

Dr. William Thomas, swine animal husbandman with Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Texas A&M, will speak on "Factors to Consider When Entering the Hog Business." Ed Garnett, area farm management specialist, will discuss "Profit Potentials." Thomas will again appear on the program to speak on "Feeding Grain Sorghum."

Three speakers will also appear on a panel to discuss "Financing Hog Operations." These include Joe Montgomery, vice president of Security State Bank in Littlefield, Lev Connors, district supervisor of Farmers Home Administration in Amarillo, and Robert Neeley, manager of Friona Production Credit Association.

Clinic Hours Slated Here

Dr. Cornelius Blesius will be at Bovina Medical Center on Saturday afternoons and Sunday mornings to see patients here, according to Mrs. Hazel Hemke, who has kept the clinic open since Jan. 1.

He arrived here about 2 p.m. Saturday and saw about 25 patients until closing at 9 p.m. The clinic was open Sunday from 9 a.m. until 1 p.m.

Dr. Blesius agreed to come here on weekends until a doctor can be secured. He will fly to Friona from Dallas and

drive from there to Bovina. However, he will not arrive in time to see patients on Saturday mornings, Mrs. Hemke said, and will leave shortly after noon on Sundays to return to Dallas.

Dr. Blesius practiced 18 months here until going into residency the first of the year at Baylor University and Hospital in Dallas.

During the week, Mrs. Hemke will keep the clinic open for convenience of patients, but it will be closed each Tuesday.

Five Towns --

Fine Arts Program Proposed For Area

A fine arts organization for this area, including Bovina, Farwell, Friona, Lazbuddie and Muleshoe, is being considered following a meeting of a cross-section of citizens here last week.

Based on a membership-government assistance program, the organization would work both through the towns and the schools.

In a called meeting of Bovina school board Monday night, trustees here agreed to go along with the program, according to what is known at this time, and to see what can be worked out in future meetings. L. F. Jacobs, superintendent, said the group agreed if the program is beneficial to the students, the school will try to do its part.

The program must also be approved by either Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture or some other civic organization. It must also be approved

by both boards in other towns involved.

Mrs. Joan Liethen of Farwell and Mrs. Peggy Snider of Friona met with about 20 Bovina people here last week to explain the program.

It would bring several fine arts events to the area each year, including such things as symphonies, operas, ballet, art exhibits, etc.

At least 1,000 family memberships in the five-town region would be sold at \$5 each, or \$10 for voting memberships. National Endowment Fund would then match funds to provide talent needed for such productions. Tickets to performances

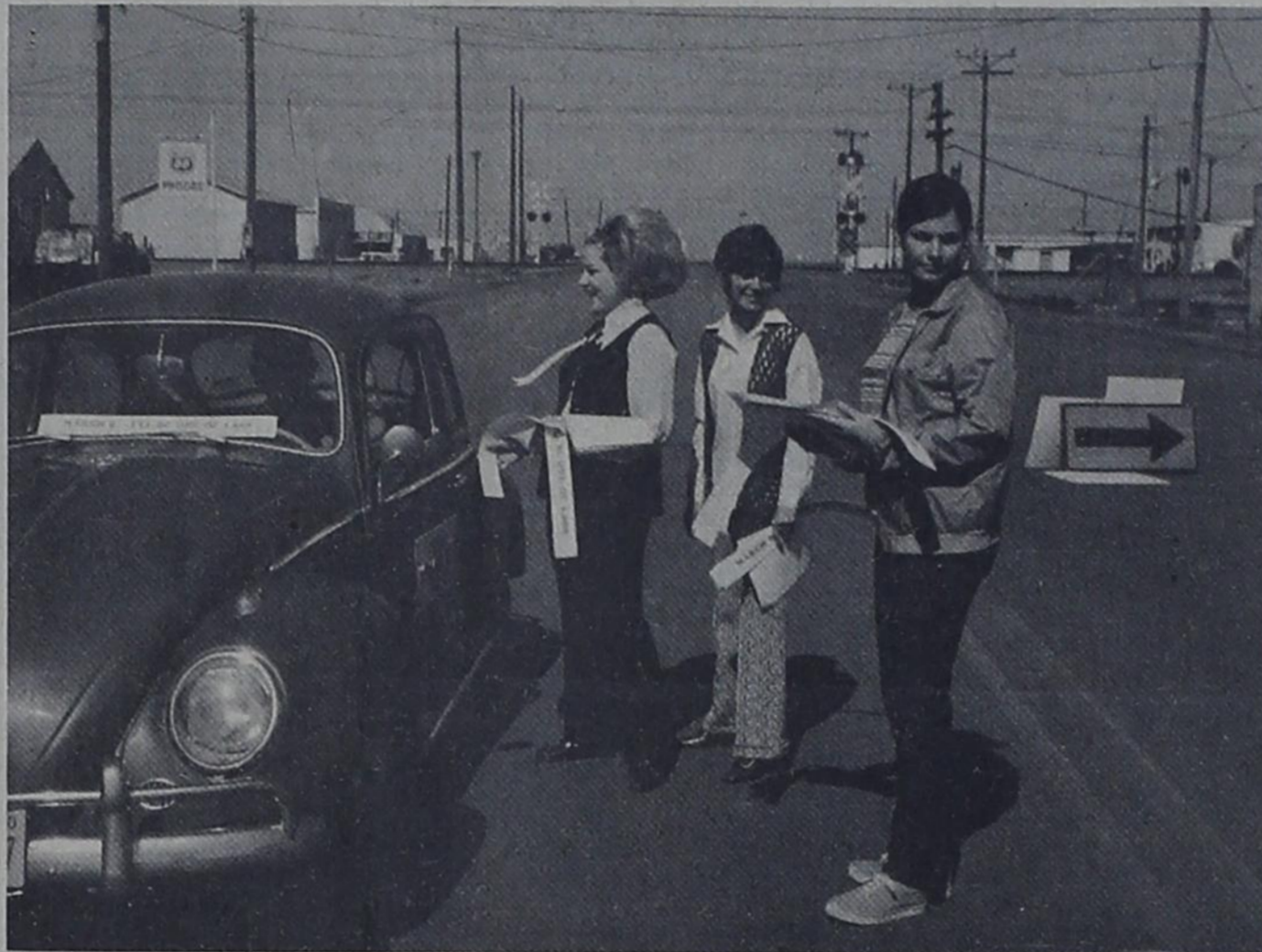

Housing Discussion Highlights City Meet

A discussion of Bovina's proposed government-backed housing project highlighted a meeting of the city council Thursday night.

A group of five interested citizens met with the council. They said they were afraid ad-

ditional families in Bovina would cause the schools to become overcrowded and necessitate building additional school buildings.

"To help 15 businesses in Bovina, you will put a tax burden on the rest of us," one of the spokesmen for the group told the council.

Mayor Bedford Caldwell explained that the council had acted in a way that the members thought would be the most beneficial for the community.

The project is expected to bring a minimum of 26 families to the community. The people are presently unemployed and living in the Brownsville

area. The men will be employed at Missouri Beef Packers and will purchase the houses here under a program of the federal government.

The houses will be located here from Amarillo. They will be refinished to meet FHA specifications. Moving of the houses here is expected to begin within the month and they are expected to arrive here at the rate of two or three per week.

Under the plan, Missouri Beef Packers will put the workers on at regular pay and will then receive \$1000 each from the government for training the men over a 44-week period. Citizens meeting with the

1,122 In Pews For Services

Bovina turned out, 1,122 strong, Sunday morning to attend the seven churches here. The total attendance surpassed the goal of 1,000 that Bovina citizens had set in its campaign for March 8.

The slogan "I'll Be One of 1,000" was adopted when civic leaders, school students and city officials met with Bovina ministers to plan the campaign several weeks ago.

With nearly every organization in town, along with the Student Council of Bovina High School, supporting the plan, the turnout was not surprising, according to thoughts of most people here.

A concentrated effort was made in the last week, with hat bands, tags evident. On Saturday teenagers passed out both on Bovina streets, along with bulletins.

First Baptist Church had an attendance Sunday morning of 404; St. Ann's Catholic Church, 225; Bovina United Methodist Church, 212; Church of Christ,

140; Mission Belen Bautista, 75; Pentecostal Holiness Church, 53; and New Jerusalem Baptist Church, 13.

The Church of Christ was without a minister that day, since Mickey Patterson has moved to Portales. Eb Randol of Farwell filled the pulpit.

Father Norman Boyd of St. Ann's said, "There were more people there than we've had before. It (the campaign) really did have its value."

"It was real good we had that many, but I see no reason we can't always have that good an attendance," Rev. J. B. Fowler of United Methodist Church said. "We should try to receive lasting value."

"I thought the campaign met even more than our expectations," said Rev. Ken Moore of First Baptist Church. "I am delighted the community supported such an effort as this."

Cold Blast Hits Bovina

Winter returned to the Bovina area Tuesday morning with blowing fine snow and freezing temperatures that had taken control of the weather picture.

Little snow was predicted for this area, but the cold weather is expected to remain most of the week. The thermometer stood at 28 degrees at 6:15 a.m. Tuesday, according to W. E. Williams.

Bovina received little of the rainfall that covered a portion of West Texas Friday, only .08 was measured here, Williams said.

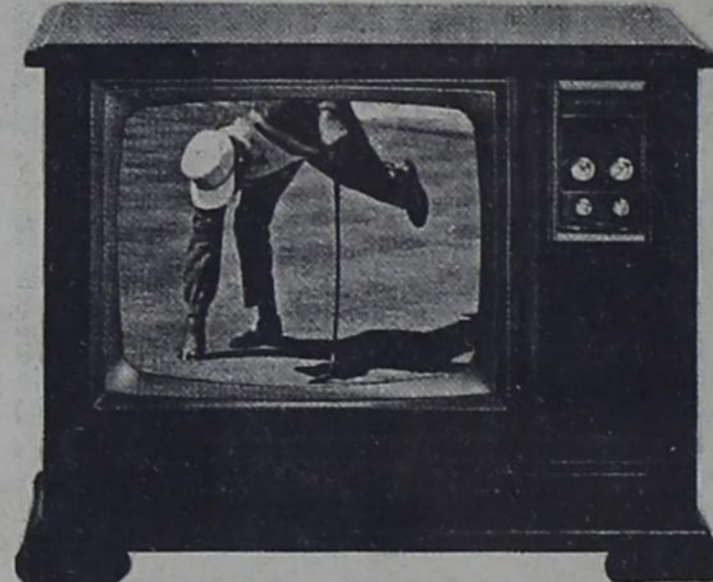
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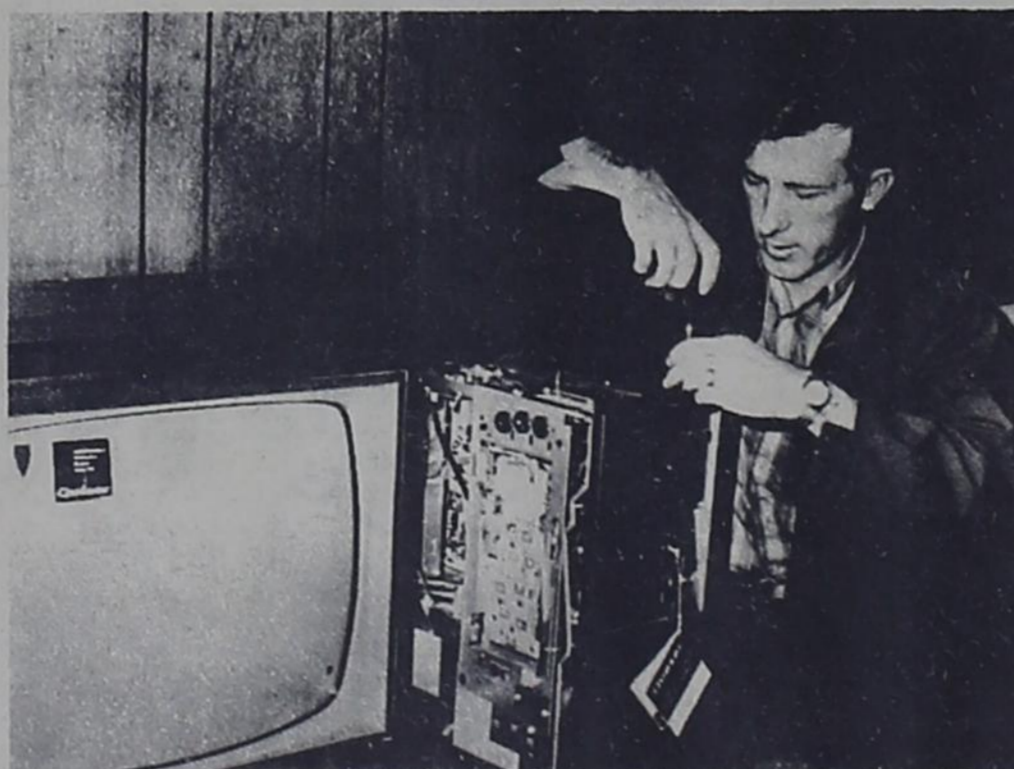

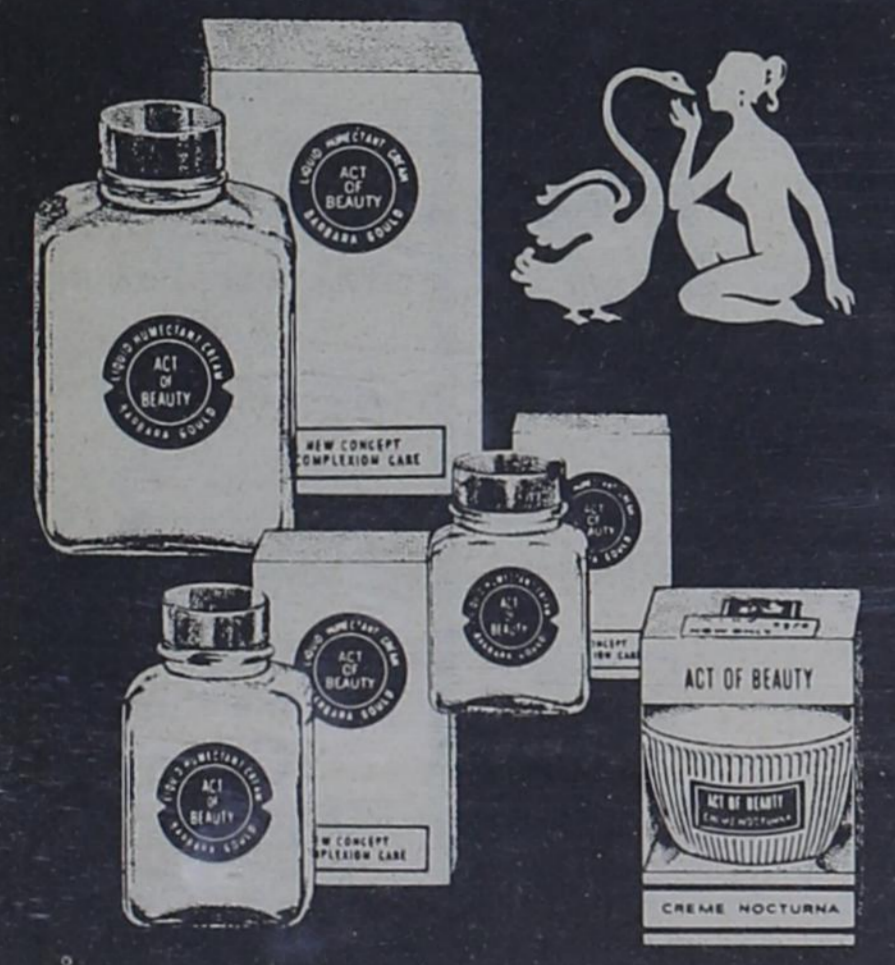

On May 9 the Junior High band will participate in concert, sightreading, solo and ensemble contests at Springlake.

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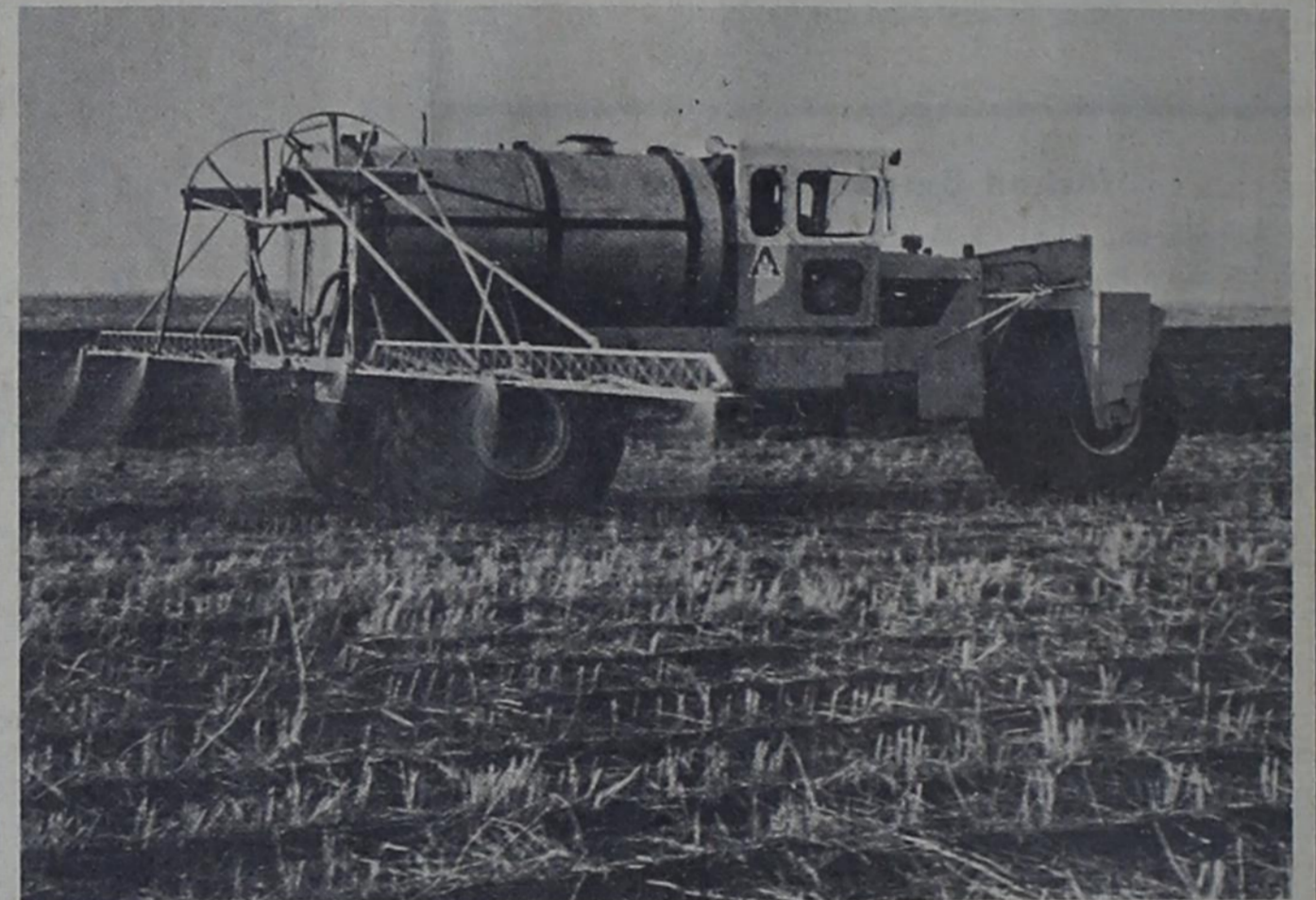
