

TREATMENT COMPANY OFFICERS ARE PLACED UNDER U. S. BOND

San Antonio Express, Sept. 29: Charged with using the mails of the United States in the operation of a fraudulent scheme, four officers, or former officers before the appointment of a receiver, of the Thompson Treatment Company were released on bond yesterday morning following their arrest by Deputy United States Marshal John L. Dibrell.

The four men-H. B. Thompson, president; Capt. A. F. MacManus, vice president; J. Fitzsimmons, treas-urer, and Dr. H. Fitzgerald-made bond in the sum of \$2,500 each, that amount being fixed by Judge Duval West in the Federal Court.

The arrest of the former officers of the company followed, directly the finding of indictments against them afternoon. Information concerning the mailing of descriptive pamphlets by the Federal Grand Jury Monday was furnished to the grand jury by postal inspectors and Leo Brewer. Assistant United States Attorney.

Circuiars alleged to have been sent out by the company stated that the treatment usually cures tuberculosis in from three to six months, except in old or last stage cases. The circular claimed further that many laststage cases had been cured and that life had been prolonged in others. One treatment was sufficient to prevent the recurrence of hemorrhages the circular said.
