PITTSBURG PLUS

Capper's Farmer: If a machinery, implement or any metal products manufacturer buys a ton of steel at Duluth, Minn., steel mill, he pays for the steel and in addition he pays \$13.20. That \$13.20 is the freight charge on a ton of steel from Pittsburg, Pa., to Duluth, Minn. And, although that Duluth steel was made from nearby Michigan iron ore, and never was within a thousand miles of Pittsburg, still the buyer must pay freight on it as if it had been shipped from Pittsburg.

The same is true if a manufacturer buys steel made at Gary, Ind., or at Chicago, or anywhere else. He pays the extra freight, \$7.60 a ton from Pittsburg to Gary or Chicago, on that steel, just as if it had been shipped to Gary or to Chicago from Pittsburg, although that steel was made in Gary or in Chicago from Minnesota iron ore and Indiana limestone and with Illinois coal.

So when the manufacturer fabricates that steel into implements, machinery, wire, pipe, sheet metal, nails or any of the thousands of steel articles used on the farm, he must add to his cost the \$13.20 a ton imaginary freight on the steel he bought at Duluth or the \$7.60 a ton imaginary freight on the steel he bought at Gary. The same condition holds if he bought the steel at any other point, for the steel mill made the manufacturer a price and then added to that price the freight rate from Pittsburg to that mill.

And the manufacturer passes thatimaginary cost, that Pittsburg Plus price, to the consumer. The farmer pays it on every piece of steel he uses, from carpet tacks to tractors.

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


