UNDER HUDSON RIVER
New York, $\overline{\text { Feb. }}$ 11,-Breaking
ground for the two ground for the two Yudson River
tunnels connecting Jersey Cite and New York is expected to take place about March 4.
The land work from the Manhattan
side, from West Street to the pier side, from West Street to the pier
heads, has already been completed at a cost of $\$ 650,000$. The six points are the two pier heads of West and
Canal Streets and the two pier heads out of the pier heads.
The tunnel contract is estimated at
$\$ 22,000,000$. The total cost will be more than $\$ 28,000,000$. The construction is to be of cast iron and concrete.
It is expected that the vehicular It is expected that the vehicular
tunnel, on completion, will take care
of $15,000,000$ vehicles a year. The of $1,000,000$ vehicles a year. The
present traffic of vehicles across the Hudson is about $48,000 \mathrm{a}$ das.. By

timated the traffic will have doubled. The project to build the two tunnels began in July, 1919. Survering
