## WHERE THE DAYS ARE SUNNY; CLIMATE HEALTHY AND BRACING

The following is the introductory of an extensive article in the San Antonio Light of last Sunday, accompanied by pictures of Camp Rio Vista and its manager, Herbert L. Crate. The article was written by Chas. Wesch and the pictures made by Starr Bryden. The Sun takes pleasure in reproducing this extract, and regrets that the pictures are not available for use:

"In the 'Hill Country' of Texas, on the head waters of the beautiful Guadalupe River, where days are sunny, the climate is healthy and bracing, a man who for thirteen years has been a leader of boys and has had charge of boys work in Y. M. C. A.'s in several States, has established Camp Rio Vista, a summer character camp for boys. This man is Herbert L. Crate, former secretary of Boys' Y. M. C. A. Work in Mississippi.

"Camp Rio Vista is situated on the banks of the Guadalupe River, ten miles northwest of Kerrville, far removed from summer resorts to insure proper supervision and freedom from molestation of visitors and tourists, the bane of any worth-while camp. Camping out under ideal conditions, which safeguard a boy's health, has ceased to be regarded as a fad and is now considered as a necessity. Well-planned and well-managed summer camps for boys fill the need for recuperation from strain of the winter months and of building up the boy for the coming year.

"An appreciation of God's great out-of-doors; the smell of the cedar log of the camp fire; the weird sounds in the hush of night; the star-studded canopy of heaven; self-reliance in the knowledge of swimming; the zest of

clean competition in sports; the hikes amid the mysteries of nature and the learning of her secrets; the doing of work in the spirit of fun; punctuality self-taught; orderliness through example; the growing knowledge of God through an appreciation of His works; the discussing of life problems about the camp fire; the spirit of service to others; the discipline based upon justice; the inspiration of messages from men who know boys; wholesome, appetizing food; the health-giving sleep of the open; development through self-accomplishment; the satisfaction of a summer spent in body and character building—these are some of the things that Camp Rio Vista has to offer to the boys who go there.

"The camp site consists of 180 acres of land. The camp proper consists of twenty acres in the shape of a square with the Guadalupe on one of its sides. About the other three sides are placed the snug, substantial, flored camp houses.

"These camp houses will be used as sleeping quarters and will accommodate seven boys and an adult leader. Each house is equipped with built-in steel cots, for which each boy must furnish his bedding."

## PLANS ARE ADOPTED BY BOARD TO START SCHREINER INSTITUTE

The Building Committee of the Schreiner Institute met on the 16th and adopted the building plan and type of architecture for the school.

There were present at the meeting: Dr. R. E. Vinson of Austin, A. C. Schreiner, Judge W. G. Garrett, H. Renschel, W. P. Dickey and Head Master J. J. Delaney of Kerrville, W. P. Clyce, architect, of Sherman, and W. W. Watkin, consulting architect, of Houston, Texas.

A general plan providing for the full development of the school to a capacity of five hundred students was adopted, which, when realized, will give Kerrville one of the most complete and imposing preparatory school plants in the South.

The style of architecture is the English Colonial, which is specially adapted to the rugged surroundings and has the further advantage of being very homelike and entirely different from any school plant in the State.

Three of the permanent buildings will be erected at this time: The administration building, which will be of three stories and will provide facilities for administration purposes for all future needs. One dormitory, which will accommodate about forty, and the Head Master's home, a handsome two-story brick dwelling.

The construction will be semi-fire-proof of hard, mottled brick with slate roof.

In a few weeks the specifications will be complete, contracts let and construction under way.

This summer the spacious campus will be plowed and graded, and in the fall shade trees will be planted and the lawns sodded, so that by the time the buildings are finished the grounds will be most attractive.

This plant will be a unit with the Encampment grounds, and will in a short while give Kerrville one of the most attractive public institutions in the State.

## TWO BISHOPS TO BE HERE; CLASS OF TWENTY TO BE CONFIRMED

Next Sunday, June 25th, the Right Reverend Bishop William Theodotus Capers, D. D., will make his annual visitation to St. Peter's Church. This will be one of the greatest days in the history of the parish, for one of the largest classes ever confirmed will be presented by the rector to receive the apostolic laying on of hands as recorded in the Acts of the Apostles. About twenty persons, almost entirely adult and the majority of them men, will compose the class.

The Right Reverend Bishop Johnston, retired Bishop of the Diocese, and who is deeply interested in St. Peter's, having been in charge of the church at one time, will, it is expected, also attend the ceremonies.

The leading baritone of St. Mark's Cathedral, San Antonio, Mr. Rogers of London, England, will sing the solo at the morning service and Mrs. Scott Schreiner at the evening hour.

## STRONG KELLY FIELD TEAM LOSES TO ATHLETICS, 5-3

The strong Kelly Field aggregation that has taken two games from Fredericksburg left Kerrville Sunday evening, beaten, but confident that they can take our measure in a return game. Few of those who saw the game will take the same view, however.

The home boys came from behind, as is their custom of late, and by hitting Pitcher Warner all down the line and playing errorless ball in the "pinches" demonstrated their ability to care for their own interests.

Horton started the game for the Athletics, but before the second inning was well under way wrenched his arm and was relieved by the "old reliable" Barry. Two hits had been made, two men were on and two out when Bob went in. Warner made a hit, bringing in a run. Another run came over on a base on balls and two misplays in the fourth, and in the ninth Cox slammed one over the fence. That was the limit, and Barry struck out the next two batters.

All in all, that same Mr. Cox of the visitors was a demon, making all three runs and two of the four hits registered for his team. Shortstop Brown is also deserving of mention. The shortfield was anything but an agreeable place to play. Several times he executed plays that won for him the plaudits of the fans. Being in the Air Service, of course he is not a "mud-horse."

Opposed to him was a newcomer, named Rowton, who is accustomed to mud, as he is engaged on the road work up the river a piece. He made a clean sweep of everything that came to him, or that he went after.

On offense and defense for the Athletics, "Slim" Renschel, after laying off two whole games, had a startling and eventful day. He batted in the first run and came through himself a moment later behind Barry. Robinson followed later, making a total of four in that second inning. In the field "Slim" had four chances and failed on not one of them.

Rowton, Keusel and Wilson worked a fast double in the third that saved a lot of trouble.

Captain Holchak showed his sportsmanship in the fourth by reversing Umpire Rawson's decision on a lightning snap throw by McCarty to catch Cox off third. From every angle it looked as though the runner was out, but after the umpire had so ruled, Holchak acknowledged that he had failed to touch his man. The play was attempted a moment later, the ball evading Holchak, permitting the runner to score.

In the ninth there was a question raised as to interference when Cox was making the last lap of his home run. The rule covering such a condition is not arbitrary but left to the discretion of the umpire as to whether the interference affects the result of the game. Any fair minded umpire could not have found cause to rule the runner out, even had the run been the deciding one of the game.

The fans likewise took exception to Robinson holding a runner at third while the left fielder was messing around with the ball. Cecil was using his head, however, as the fielder was trying to pull a hoax. There wasn't the slightest chance in the world but that his throw would cut off the runner at the plate.

Now, having demonstrated that we can beat the team that beat the Giants, who doubts that we can't trim Fredericksburg next Sunday; but have a care. "Keep your money in your pocket, for when it's there you know you've got it; for I belong to Gideon's Band and am searching for a home." Get out your drum and "beat it" to the game next Sunday.

## COUNTY COMMISSIONERS MAKE TAX LEVIES FOR KERR COUNTY

At two recent meetings of the Kerr County Commissioners they agreed upon the following tax levies:

Advalorem, 21c; tick eradication, 4c; road and bridge, 15c; Road District No. 1, 45c; Road District No. 2, 20c; Road District No. 3, 35c; jury tax, 2c; court house and jail, 2c; jail repairs, 1c. These levies are all on the basis of \$100.00 valuation.

School district levies are as follows:

No. 2, 50c; 3, 50c; 4, 10c; 5, 50c; 8, 50c; 9, 20c; 10, 15c; 11, 15c; 12, 15c; 14, 15c; 16, 20c; 17, 35c; 18, 10c; 19, 50c; 20, \$1.00; 21, 21c.

Confederate pension, 5c. Occupation tax, half of State levy. County poll tax for male and female, 25c each.

In School District No. 8, the Kendall-Kerr County line district, a bond election of \$16,000.00 has been made to build a stone school house and equip it, and it is to be located in Comfert.

## SOME EXCELLENT ROAD WORK BEING DONE ON HUNT ROUTE

The editor of The Sun had the pleasure last Monday afternoon of accompanying Chairman Renschel of the Road Commission on his trip of inspection on the North Fork road above Ingram, where some excellent work is being done under the personal direction of L. A. Bond.

At Ingram a concrete bridge is being put in at the crossing of Johnson Fork and the road changed a short distance so as to take out some of the acute curve and lessen the danger of vehicles passing there.

From the turn of the lane about a mile above Ingram, leading on toward Hunt, the old road was abandoned for about four miles—one mile or more in one place this side of San Juan Hill, and about two and a half miles, above Sherman's Mill. This new road has been dug out from the hillside in most instances and graded, gravelled and levelled with a large roller drawn by the new tractor, which is proving such a handy machine. In the low places and ravines there are stone and thick sheet-iron culverts inserted to take care of the water during rains.

At San Juan Hill there was a difficult piece of road to build, owing to the porous nature of the soil, so at the direction of Chairman Renschel, cedar brush was piled along there and then large rock piled upon it to constitute the foundation, and now they have a solid road.

A part of the iron bridge that was taken from Goat Creek has been put across Bumblebee Creek above Riverside Inn.

These sections of the new road are above high water and they have been

so graded and provided with draining ditches and culverts that the road ought to improve with use. It is certainly a fine piece of work and a pleasure to travel over even in its present new condition.

The Road Commission, composed of H. Renschel, Gus Schreiner and Tom Duderstadt, have been diligent in supervising this North Fork Road work, and they are to be congratulated upon having it built at a reasonable cost—estimated at about half what the main highway is costing—though the latter has some parts more difficult of construction.

## SAN ANTONIO AND KERRVILLE COLORED TEAMS BREAK EVEN

The annual Colored section celebration was punctuated by two ball games, played at the Fair Grounds Sunday and Monday. The Kerrville team, led by Neil, appeared in new uniforms and made a natty appearance as compared with their city opponents.

The Sunday game, played before a small crowd, was won by the visitors, 7 to 4.

Monday's game was well attended and the enthusiasm engendered a veritable din at times. Kerrville played two visiting pitchers for eleven runs. Butler and Ward, the local battery, were in trouble several times through errors, but held their opponents to seven runs. Rev. Moseby, playing second for home team, was the star batter and run getter.

San Antonio was well represented in the stands, which shows the Kerrville colored people are good entertainers.

## RIO GRANDE AT HIGHER STAGE THAN EVER KNOWN BEFORE

The crest of the most destructive flood in the history of the Rio Grande River passed Eagle Pass at 2 o'clock Monday morning with debris, wrecked houses and sodden tree trunks floating 46 feet and 8 inches above the normal river level.

This is the highest water stage ever recorded and about six and a half feet higher than the previous high record at Eagle Pass, established on June 14th, 1889, when the river reached 40.4 feet.

Two bridges have been washed away at Eagle Pass, and the two million dollar structure recently opened for use at Laredo is in danger owing to the great amount of debris piled against it.

More than 15,000 acres of land has been overflowed and damage of over one million dollars done. Hundreds of people have been forced to flee from the low lands and some were not quick enough, so a number of lives have been lost.

#### ALL NUMBER PLATES AFTER JANUARY 1ST TO BE BLACK AND WHITE

Austin, Tex., June 17.—The State Highway Commission at a recent meeting decided to use the black and white number plate beginning January 1st, 1923, instead of the buff and brown as it had heretofore considered. This decision was reached after consulting with persons familiar with Texas climate and with the making of number plates throughout the country, and also after a test had been made which proved that the black and white plates would stand up better under climatic and weather conditions.

It was the opinion of the commission that in view of the fact that the number plate was to be permanent, the black and white would be much more satisfactory than the buff and brown. Another feature taken into consideration was that a black and white plate would look more attractive on all colors of cars than the buff and brown.

The new plate is attractively designed, having the word "Texas," at each end of the plate and a small star separating the numbers in the middle of the plate. This will give the plate a distinctive appearance so that confusion with plates formerly used

will be almost impossible. Former plates had "Tex." on one end and did not have the star.

#### WOMAN WEDS HUSBAND OF HER OWN MOTHER

Louisville, Ky., June 16.—Mrs. Mary Clopton, former resident of Louisville, but now residing near Mundfordville, in Hart County, Ky., has seven husbands, it is alleged in an annulment petition filed yesterday in the Jefferson Circuit Court by Roy Clopton, overseas veteran of this city.

According to the allegations of Clopton, to one of these husbands, himself, Mrs. Clopton has been married twice, and one of them also is the husband of her own mother. She has been married nine times and divorced but once while none of the husbands are dead.

Anthrax Reported at Fredericksburg  
Fredericksburg, Tex., June 16.—Ferdinand Peterman, ranchman, has lost several head of cattle from anthrax. County Agent R. S. Miller and Dr. Harrison of the Agricultural and Mechanical College have been summoned. There is little chance that the disease will spread.

Peterman's was the only ranch from which disease among cattle has been reported.

This section is better adapted to cattle, sheep and goat raising, with poultry added, than it is for agriculture. Then, the labor is less and the return on investment more.

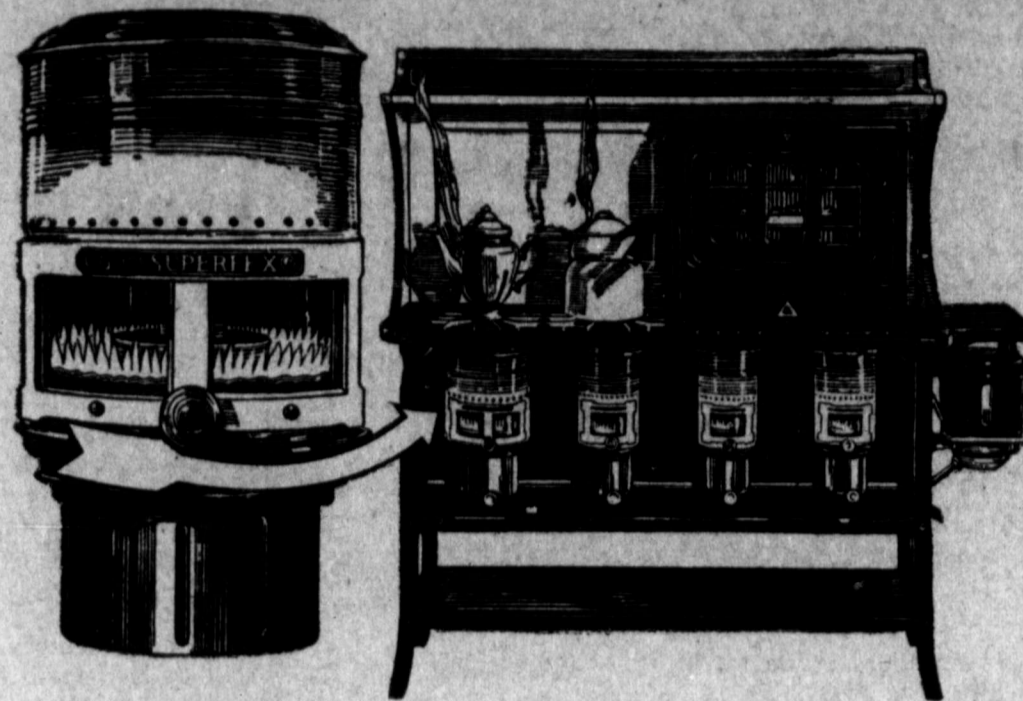
Our delightful climate and lovely scenery are pulling more visitors than ever before. And our people are beginning to arrange more and better accommodations for their convenience and entertainment.

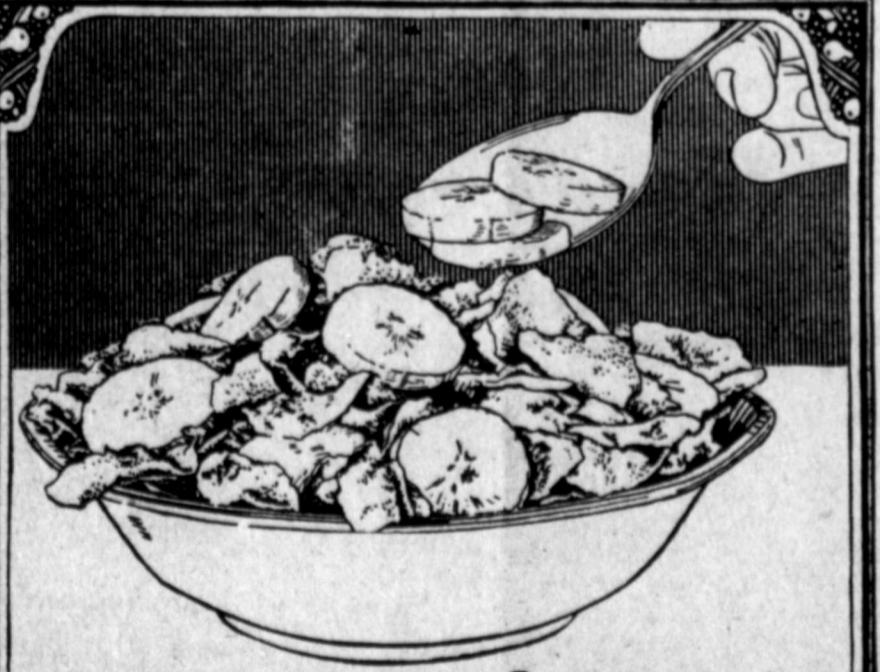

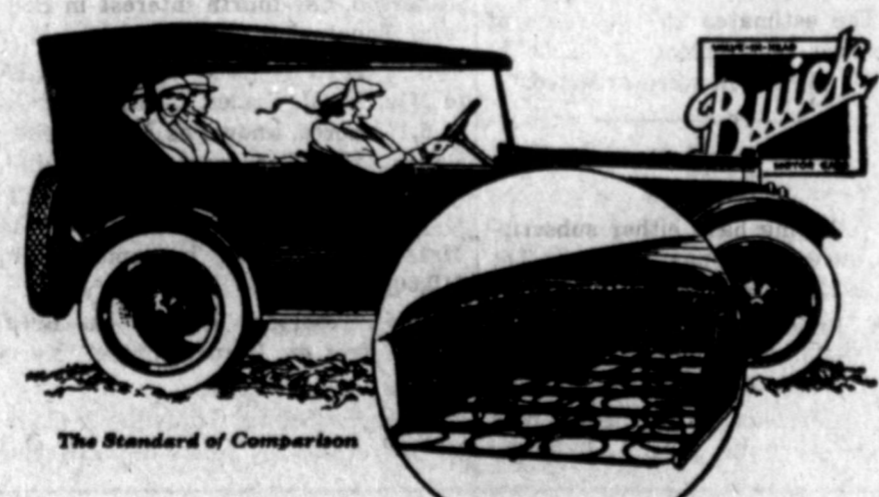

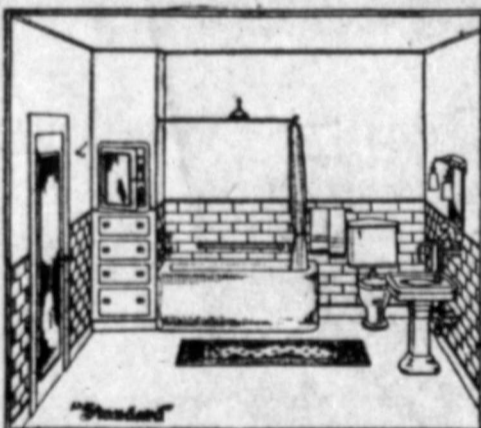

**COUNTY DEMOCRATIC EXECUTIVE**  
**COMMITTEE HOLDS MEETING**

The Democratic Executive Committee for Kerr County met at the Court House last Monday as required by law and transacted the following business:

All candidates, having opposition, had their places on the ticket drawn for.

A primary committee was appointed, composed of H. C. Geddie, J. M. Hamilton, J. M. Starkey, W. G. Carpenter and W. C. Baker, to act with Dr. S. E. Thompson, ex-officio chairman.

The test was that required by law, with the following recommendations to the succeeding Democratic Executive Committee of this county, to-wit:

We heartily concur in the recommendations of the State Democratic Executive Committee, that only those who supported the nominees at the last general election should be allowed to participate in the primaries and select the standard bearers of any party, except those who are thoroughly in accord with such party. But in view of the abnormal conditions that have existed throughout the whole country since the termination of the World War, and in view of the further fact that the committee was informed that a great many persons who voted the Republican ticket two years ago now recognize the fact that the Republican party has betrayed them and they desire to return, in good faith, and affiliate with the Democratic party, we believe that the best interests of the party, now and in the future, demand that these recommendations, for the present be not adhered to, and the test not made too rigid; with the understanding, however, that they are coming in on probation; and if, for any reason, they do not show their good faith by their works in giving loyal support to and in voting for the nominees of the coming primaries, then that hereafter the more rigid test be applied to exclude them from participation in the Democratic primaries.

F. G. Holekamp was appointed to fill the vacancy on the Executive Committee in Precinct No. 3. W. G. Carpenter was appointed to fill the vacancy in Precinct No. 1, vice A. T. Adkins, disqualified by reason of being Mayor of Kerrville.

An assessment was made of one dollar against all State and District candidates and fifteen dollars each against county candidates except the County Attorney, he being assessed ten dollars. All precinct candidates five dollars each.

**MARTIN DIES TO DELIVER**  
**TWO PATRIOTIC ADDRESSES**

Hon. Martin Dies, for ten years a member of Congress from the Second Texas District, has accepted an invitation to deliver a patriotic address at Junction July 3, and at Fredericksburg July 4.

Mr. Dies, as a member of Congress, voted against the 18th and 19th Amendments to the Constitution, that is, National prohibition and National woman suffrage. He also voted against the National child labor bill, recently declared unconstitutional by the Supreme Court.

Mr. Dies is unreconstructed, and is still of the opinion that woman suffrage leads straight to socialism, and that National prohibition is producing a Nation of bootleggers with Uncle Sam at the head of the list.

**1,000 CASES OF WHISKEY**  
**SEIZED AFTER GUN FIGHT**

San Francisco, June 20.—The largest liquor seizure in the history of prohibition enforcement on the Pacific Coast was made early today at a lonely beach point near Point Lobos, following a gun battle with a band of smugglers, in which 100 shots were fired.

The prohibition enforcement agents seized 1,000 cases of imported whiskey, ten automobiles and four trucks. A mystery ship which was unloading its cargo of smuggled booze, made off to sea. The estimates on the value of the seizure ran from \$100,000 to \$300,000. Ten men were arrested.

**A Nation and Its God—A Sermonette**

Upon reading the 28th chapter of Deuteronomy you will be struck with two things: First, the kind of God Israel worshipped, and second, the character of blessings she expected to receive from His hands. Jehovah with many was a tribal Divinity. He did not so much own the people as the people owned Him. The blessings they expected Him to give were for the most part temporal rather than spiritual. Some people think God is a weak, helpless creature to be brow-beaten into giving them anything they ask for, and if they do not get it are ready to cast prayer to the winds. They have forgotten the fact that their parents when they were young did not answer every request they made. Just remember this when your prayer is not answered, that perhaps God, our Heavenly Father, knows that certain requests had best go unanswered, just as our earthly parents know sometimes that certain of our pleas to them will be better not to be answered, and in this you will be satisfied.

In this Jewish conception of God a large part of Christendom still lives. In their religious development they are still in shackles of the Jewish swaddling clothes. They think of God who is local, provincial and limited. They think He has favorites and to these He reveals Himself in a partial way. A nation's conception of God influences its life more than anything else. When Florence Nightingale was asked what she considered to be the most influential thing in a nation's life, she answered promptly: "Its idea of God." The most careless review of history will reveal the fact that every civilization the world has ever had or built up has as its foundation stone some idea of God. Its religious system and ethics determine its moral thinking, and its moral thinking determines the

nature of the elements that go into the creating of its civilization. A Christian nation needs a Christian conception of God. He is not a national God, but a world God. That is the one fact that gives vitality to our national ideas and standards. It was a layman, not a preacher, who said recently that our Nation needed religion rather than more legislation, and one of America's most prominent business men made this statement. This God is everybody's God just as the sun is everybody's sun, and we must come to look upon Him in that light.

### Parent-Teachers' Club

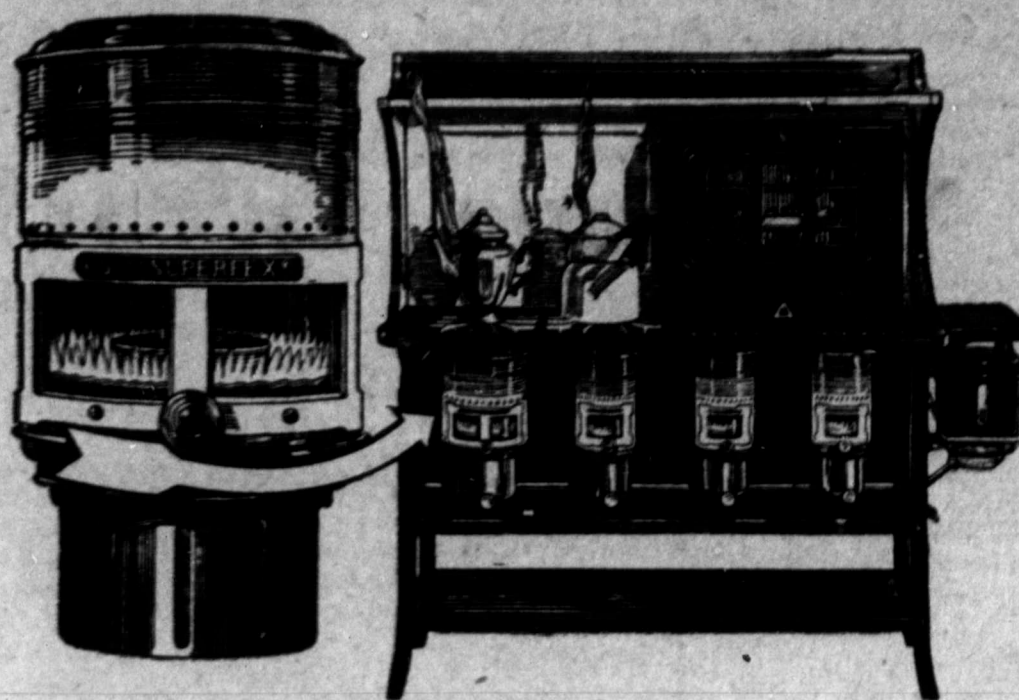
The Parent-Teachers' Club held its regular meeting on June 14th in the Tivy High School Auditorium. A short program was given as follows:

## COUNTY DEMOCRATIC EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE HOLDS MEETING

The Democratic Executive Committee for Kerr County met at the Court House last Monday as required by law and transacted the following business:

All candidates, having opposition, had their places on the ticket drawn for.

A primary committee was appointed, composed of H. C. Geddie, J. M. Hamilton, J. M. Starkey, W. G. Carpenter and W. C. Baker, to act with Dr. S. E. Thompson, ex-officio chairman.

The test was that required by law, with the following recommendations to the succeeding Democratic Executive Committee of this county, to-wit:

We heartily concur in the recommendations of the State Democratic Executive Committee, that only those who supported the nominees at the last general election should be allowed to participate in the primaries and select the standard bearers of any party, except those who are thoroughly in accord with such party. But in view of the abnormal conditions that have existed throughout the whole country since the termination of the World War, and in view of the further fact that the committee was informed that a great many persons who voted the Republican ticket two years ago now recognize the fact that the Republican party has betrayed them and they desire to return, in good faith, and affiliate with the Democratic party, we believe that the best interests of the party, now and in the future, demand that these recommendations, for the present be not adhered to, and the test not made too rigid; with the understanding, however, that they are coming in on probation, and if, for any reason, they do not show their good faith by their works in giving loyal support to and in voting for the nominees of the coming primaries, then that hereafter the more rigid test be applied to exclude them from participation in the Democratic primaries.

F. G. Holekamp was appointed to fill the vacancy on the Executive Committee in Precinct No. 3. W. G. Carpenter was appointed to fill the vacancy in Precinct No. 1, vice A. T. Adkins, disqualified by reason of being Mayor of Kerrville.

An assessment was made of one dollar against all State and District candidates and fifteen dollars each against county candidates except the County Attorney, he being assessed ten dollars. All precinct candidates five dollars each.

## MARTIN DIES TO DELIVER TWO PATRIOTIC ADDRESSES

Hon. Martin Dies, for ten years a member of Congress from the Second Texas District, has accepted an invitation to deliver a patriotic address at Junction July 3, and at Fredericksburg July 4.

Mr. Dies, as a member of Congress, voted against the 18th and 19th Amendments to the Constitution, that is, National prohibition and National woman suffrage. He also voted against the National child labor bill, recently declared unconstitutional by the Supreme Court.

Mr. Dies is unreconstructed, and is still of the opinion that woman suffrage leads straight to socialism, and that National prohibition is producing a Nation of bootleggers with Uncle Sam at the head of the list.

## 1,000 CASES OF WHISKEY SEIZED AFTER GUN FIGHT

San Francisco, June 20.—The largest liquor seizure in the history of prohibition enforcement on the Pacific Coast was made early today at a lonely beach point near Point Lobos, following a gun battle with a band of smugglers, in which 100 shots were fired.

The prohibition enforcement agents seized 1,000 cases of imported whiskey, ten automobiles and four trucks. A mystery ship which was unloading its cargo of smuggled booze, made off to sea. The estimates on the value of the seizure ran from \$100,000 to \$300,000. Ten men were arrested.

**A Nation and Its God—A Sermonette**

Upon reading the 28th chapter of Deuteronomy you will be struck with two things: First, the kind of God Israel worshipped, and second, the character of blessings she expected to receive from His hands. Jehovah with many was a tribal Divinity. He did not so much own the people as the people owned Him. The blessings they expected Him to give were for the most part temporal rather than spiritual. Some people think God is a weak, helpless creature to be brow-beaten into giving them anything they ask for, and if they do not get it are ready to cast prayer to the winds. They have forgotten the fact that their parents when they were young did not answer every request they made. Just remember this when your prayer is not answered, that perhaps God, our Heavenly Father, knows that certain requests had best go unanswered, just as our earthy parents know sometimes that certain of our pleas to them will be better not to be answered, and in this you will be satisfied.

In this Jewish conception of God a large part of Christendom still lives. In their religious development they are still in shackles of the Jewish swaddling clothes. They think of God who is local, provincial and limited. They think He has favorites and to these He reveals Himself in a partial way. A nation's conception of God influences its life more than anything else. When Florence Nightingale was asked what she considered to be the most influential thing in a nation's life, she answered promptly: "Its idea of God."

The most careless review of history will reveal the fact that every civilization the world has ever had or built up has as its foundation stone some idea of God. Its religious system and ethics determine its moral thinking, and its moral thinking determines the

nature of the elements that go into the creating of its civilization. A Christian nation needs a Christian conception of God. He is not a national God, but a world God. That is the one fact that gives vitality to our national ideas and standards. It was a layman, not a preacher, who said recently that our Nation needed religion rather than more legislation, and one of America's most prominent business men made this statement. This God is everybody's God just as the sun is everybody's sun, and we must come to look upon Him in that light.

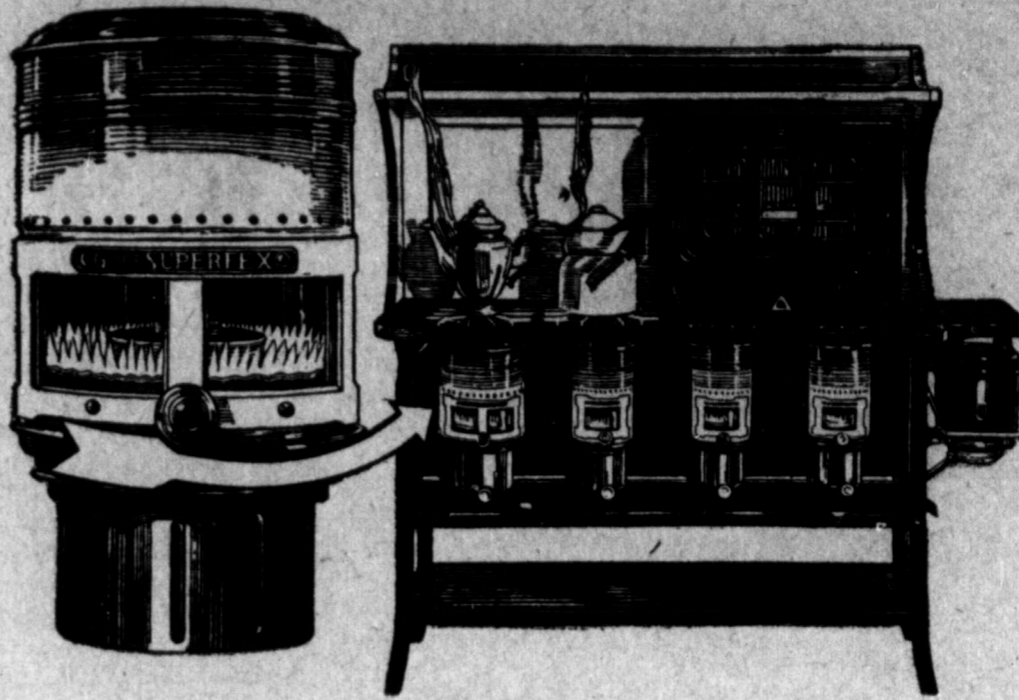
The president appointed members on each of the standing committees. For the purpose of raising funds, the club decided to give an ice cream Social at some early date, the plans for which will be completed and announced later.

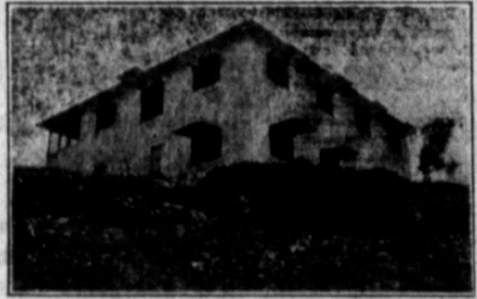
