This section is beter adapted to cattle, sheep and goat raising, with poultry added, than it is for agriculture. Then, the labor is less and the return on investment more.



MARTIN DIES TO DELIVER

TWO PATRIOTIC ADDRESSES

Hon, Martin Dies, for ten years a member of Congress from the Second Texas District, has accepted an invitation to deliver a patriotic address at Junction July 3, and at Fredericksburg July 4.

Mr. Dies, as a member of Congress, voted against the 18th and 19th Amendments to the Constitution, that is, National prohibition and National woman suffrage. He also voted against the National child labor bill, recently declared unconstitutional by the Supreme Court.

Mr. Dies is unreconstructed, and is still of the opinion that woman suffrage leads straight to socialism, and that National prohibition is producing a Nation of bootleggers with Uncle Sam at the head of the list.




