This cake may be made in light and dark layers and put together with plain white icing or made in loaf style. The only difference in the two styles is that one heaping teaspoonful of baking powder is used in the loaf cake instead of the two level ones in the layers.

THE PASSING DAY

Automobile travel is getting decidedly dangerous. The danger is due to reckless driving and as the roads improve the driving becomes more reckless. At least half the people on the roads seem to have the speed mania and a large proportion of these have little regard for the rights of others. Some method is going to have to be devised for better regulating road and street traffic and more severe punishment will have to be given those whose carelessness results in accidents. In the towns and cities much of the trouble comes from over-crowding the front seat of cars, thus interfering with the free action of the driver. When a car is crowded with young people they seem to forget that there is any one else on the road and they act as though they were out by themselves on a picnic.

Many Texas counties and communities will hold fairs next fall featuring county and community products. While it is good to get together the best things grown and to award premiums of sufficient size to justify competitors in gathering and making the exhibits, the competition for prizes is not the best thing coming from such fairs. Local fairs are valuable in almost exact proportion to the good feeling they create among the people. They afford the people opportunity to get together, talk thing over, know each other, and profit by the exchange of experiences. Every local fair should have a hospitality committee working overtime.

The best compliment yet paid Dr. W. M. W. Splawn, the newly elected president of the University of Texas, is that he likes people and is interested in them. That being true, he is going to make a great success of his administration of University affairs, for he has the background of a broad education and is a masterly business executive. Although his is perhaps the most responsible position in the gift of the people of Texas, there is no reason why a University president should act as though he were conferring a favor on the people in serving them.

A newspaper man whom I met at Amarillo, in speaking of the business men of a certain town, said that they are dead from their shoulders up. Since then a physician told me that most persons begin to die in their heads and that if the head can be kept active the body will respond in most cases. If your business is not what it should be, if you are just marking time in whatever you are doing, if you find that you haven't the energy or the will to hustle like the younger people about you or like the people of other places, then it might be well to have your head examined to see if it is either dead or dying. I have heard of people that are still walking around, but that, so far as any progress is concerned, are really dead.

Its purpose is to get people to thinking in a way to do them good, and through them to start others to thinking. That kind of an undertaking involves much responsibility and is certain to be a failure unless the writer thinks right. He tries to keep his brain in good working order, but often thinks that it misses fire. It is altogether probable that many readers think so, too. If you are one of that many and have any suggestions to offer, write them out in care of this paper and they will be forwarded to me. I can't promise to follow every suggestion offered, but I do want to be of greater service to a greater number of people. If you have any criticisms to make of "The Passing Day," or any suggestions for improving the column, let me have them.

While politics is tabooed in this column, it is not amiss to say that a good Governor is likely to be a failure unless he has the support of a good Senate and Legislature. A County Commissioner has a limited field of operation, but in that field he may be worth more to you than the President of the United States. In voting be careful from top to bottom of the ticket.

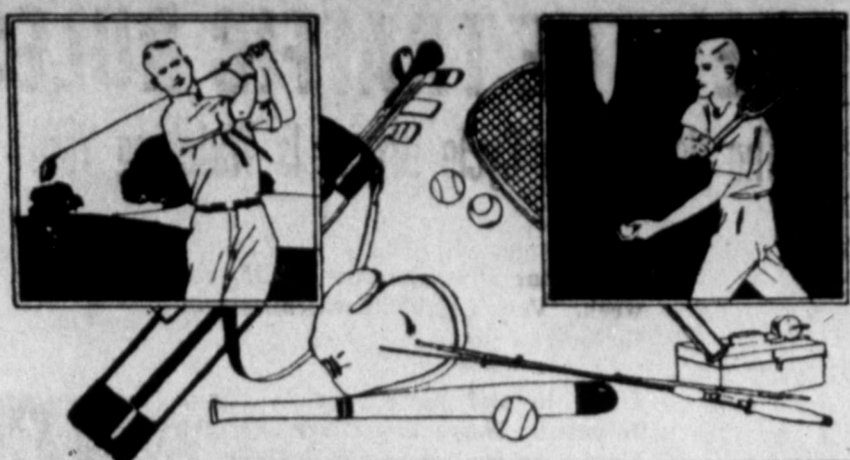

But when dusk brought to a close the greatest and most spectacular fight ever witnessed for international athletic honors, America shared the final glory with her gallant rival from the north, Finland.

Following is the record of points in the Olympic games: United States, 225; Finland, 166; Great Britain, 85½; Sweden, 31½; France, 26½; Italy, 19; Switzerland, 15; South Africa, 11; Hungary, 10½; Australia, 10; Canada, 8; Norway, 6; Argentina, 5; New Zealand, 4; Estonia, 4; Holland, 4; Denmark, 3; Japan, 1, and Chile, 1.

First places: United States, 12; Finland, 10; Great Britain, 3; Australia, 1; Italy, 1.

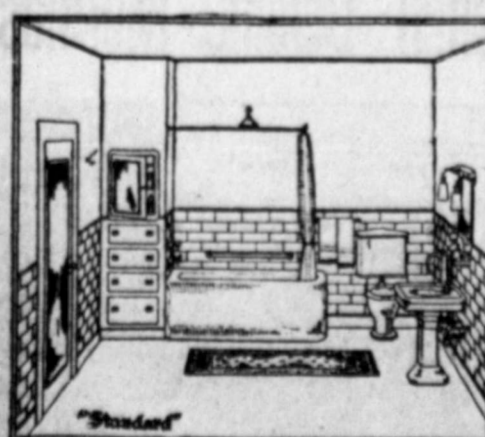
