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GOVERNOR NEFF GUEST OF CITY MONDAY AFTERNOON

Accepts Deed to Local Tourist Park on Behalf of State-Left for Junction Later in Day.

On behalf of the State of Texas Governor Pat M. Neff, in an approgovernor Pat M. Neff, in an appropriate speech Monday afternoon, accepted the gift of 42 acres of land for use of the State as a park site. The deed turned over to the Governor was signed by A. C. and L. A. Schreiner, who donated the land in the name of the citizens of Karryilla. of the citizens of Kerrville.

The Governor and party, originally scheduled to arrive at 12:30, did not arrive until nearly 2 o'clock, and after luncheon at the St. Charles Hotel, the Governor addressed the large crowd of citizens from the front steps of the hotel at 3 o'clock.

Accompanying the Governor and party were the State Park Board and the State Highway Commissioners. The party is on a tour of Southwest Texas, inspecting the State Highways and sites suitable for State Parks.

Members of the Board of Directors of the local Chamber of Commerce, with their ladies, had arranged a banquet for the Governor and party at the St. Charles Hotel for 12:30, but when the visitors did not arrive by 1:30, the luncheon was served. A party composed of J. E. Bell, R. L. Kott, John Ostrow and H. H. Sage-biel of Fredericksburg were guests of the Chamber of Commerce at the din-

Governor Neff was introduced by Dr. S. E. Thompson, after he and his party had refreshed themselves at a belated luncheon. Previously the deed to the park site had been presented to the Governor by Mr. Thompson and the Directors of the Chamber

of Commerce Governor Neff paid a glowing trib-ute to Kerrville and the Hill Country. He said that this was his second visit to this city, the previous one being last November, when he and his party were up here on a deer hunt and were water bound here for a couple of days. During the course of his tribute to this section of the State he said: You live in the center of the play-ground of Texas."

According to Governor Neff the world is just now beginning to recognize the necessity of parks. During the last two years the United States Government has established 19 National Parks in 14 States. In addition, 26 States have established systems of State Parks during the same

As Texas did not get one of the National Parks and had no lands available for a system of State Parks, the Governor and party are touring the State asking the different communities to donate land necessary for the establishment of the system. The parks are to be for the benefit of tourists and for local purposes as well, and it is planned to have a Park Chairman in each county who will have supervision of same on behalf

The site donated by the Schreiners consists of the present Tourist Park and the land adjoining on the north, in all about 42 acres. This site is admirably situated for park purposes, having on one side the main highway and one the other the Guadalupe River and being dotted with live oak

trees throughout. After closing his address here the Governor and party were taken out to inspect the site of the new State Park, after which they left for Junction, where they were scheduled to remain over night.

W. H. BLANTON ASSAILS **KLUXERS SATURDAY NIGHT**

Fiery Cross Burns on Hill Near City While Address Is Going On-Big Audience Heard Speech.

Defending and upholding the Constitution of the United States and in a stirring manner attacking the Ku Klux Klan, Hon. W. H. Blanton of San Antonio addressed a large crowd of Hill Country citizens at Lake Side Park last Saturday night.

The speaker was introduced in a The speaker was introduced in a fitting manner by Judge Julius Real, who, during the course of his remarks stated that he himself had many warm friends belonging to the Klan and deplored that they had been misled into joining and expressed the belief and hope that they would soon where membership in this organisee where membership in this organization was leading them.

Mr. Blanton is a native Texan, living for many years at Gonzales before moving to San Antonio. He is an eloquent speaker and was well informed on the subject on which he was speaking and repeatedly challenged anyone in the audience to contradict or correct any statements he might make. He held his audience spellbound throughout the evening and during the whole discourse was never interrupted.

Declaring that the Constitution was the greatest document of freedom ever written and that it had been sufficient for our forefathers; had been in the past sufficient for us to live under and rear our families, the speaker urged his hearers to refrain from religious intolerance and hatred and devote more time to upholding the laws of the country. He outlined the Bill of Rights, which entitle anyone accused of crime to a hearing before a jury of his peers and con-demned practices of members of the Klan in taking upon themselves punishment of individuals without trial and without due process of law. Mr. Blanton quoted several cases of this ought to be proud of Kerrville. character in the State as well as elsewhere in support of his conten tions.

Commenting on the recent Democratic Convention in New York City, the speaker likened it to the conven tion of the same party in 1860 and warned his hearers that a continuance of the present day religious Instructive Programs Arranged for hatred would inevitably lead to serious conditions as it did in those days unless the American people came to their senses.

After declaring that he was not a Catholic and denouncing practices of the Catholic Church in olden times and foreign countries, the speaker stated in an emphatic manner that the history or our country had revealed numbers of those of the Catholic faith who had demonstrated patriotism unexcelled by none and cited instances where Catholics had died rather than betray their country and their fellow man.





RELATING TO GRANTING OF CONFEDERATE PENSIONS

Senate Joint Resolution No. 10 Proposing an amendment to Section lished as required by the Constitution of Article 3 of the Constitution of and laws of this State, and the sum Legislature may grant pensions to Confederate soldiers, sailors and their widows, who have been citizens of the general funds of this State not the general funds of this State not providing that all soldiers, sailors and their widows eligible under the provisions hereof shall be entitled to be placed upon the rolls and participate in the pension fund created hereunder; levying a tax of seven (\$.07) cents on the one hundred (\$100.00) dollars valuation of property in this State for the payment of such pen-sion, providing that the Legislature may reduce the rate of pension for such purposes, fixing a time for the election to be held on such amend-



KERR COUNTY RANKS AT TOP IN TICK ERADICATION

That Kerr County is ranked at the top of the list in the matter of tick eradication and has done the necessary work so far with a minimum expenditure of money, is attested by the following letter from Jesse Robards, of the United States Department of Agriculture, with offices in San Antonio, who recently was on a tour of inspection of the counties in this district. The letter, addressed to Lee Wallace, County Judge and Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners, reads as follows:

"The work in your county is now nearing completion and I see no reason why all infection should not be located by December 1 of this year. Your county is already above the Federal quarantine line.

"Kerr County is at a disadvantage in so far as exposure from adjoining counties is concerned and I can hardly see how you have made such splendid progress and only spend \$2,000 in the work. In this connection I wish to state that there are few if any counties in Texas that has done the work that Kerr has done with the small amount of money expended. If you have any particular system by which you get these results from such small capital, kindly inform me what it is, tle thing like that could not disturb for I know of many counties that should adopt it. Tick eradication in a number of counties has cost more than it should but never more than it is worth to the county


