JAS. E. FERGUSON SCORED BY BAPTIST PREACHER

Rev. D. B. South of San Antonio Recounts Past Record of Candidate for Governor's Husband.

Rev. D. B. South of San Antonio was the principal speaker at a meet-ing held next to the Moore & Saner Lumber Company's yards in this city Tuesday night, in which the past record, both political and private, of James E. Ferguson, husband of Mrs. Miriam Ferguson, candidate in the run-off primary for Governor, was bitterly assailed, and in which Felix D. Robertson, Mrs. Ferguson's opponent, was heartily endorsed.

The speaker was introduced by Rev. R. W. Merrill, pastor of the Baptist Church of this city, who in a few well chosen remarks, recommended Felix D. Robertson to the audience, stressing the fact that Mr. Robertson holds a high official position in a Baptist Church at Dallas and commenting favorably on the fact that he has been referred to as the "praying judge."

CHOCOLATE POTATO CAKE

(Contributed by Mrs. Henry Henke)

Two-thirds cup Butter. Yolks of 4 Eggs.

cups Sugar. cup Cold Mashed Potato. cup Melted Chocolate. cups Flour. cup Nut Meats.

½ cup Sweet Milk. 3½ teaspoonfuls Baking Powder.

1 teaspoonful Nutmeg. 1/2 teaspoonful Cloves.

1 teaspoonful Cinnamon. Whites of 4 Eggs beaten dry.

METHOD: Cream the butter, add sugar, then potatoes, and the chocolate, which has been grated before measuring, and melted with I teaspoonful of hot water; add egg yolks, then spices, add the flour and milk alternately, then nuts; fold in stiffly beaten whites of eggs. Bake in a moderate oven for 45 minutes.

FROSTING-Boil 2 cups sugar and % cup sweet milk until the mixture bubbles, add ½ cup grated chocolate, and boil until a soft ball will form in water. Take off the fire and add 1 teaspoonful of butter, beat for 15 or 20 minutes or until the right consistency to







It should recognize no classes of interest, seek no favors, but should strive to merit the public's confidence and respect and support. In turn, the citizens of the community should support their home paper; the merchants should extend liberal ad-

In practically every case the men arrested entered pleas of guilty, paid fines, ranging from \$25 to \$50, and have promised not to repeat the offiense. One man was arrested for killing a deer. He paid a fine of \$38.70.
